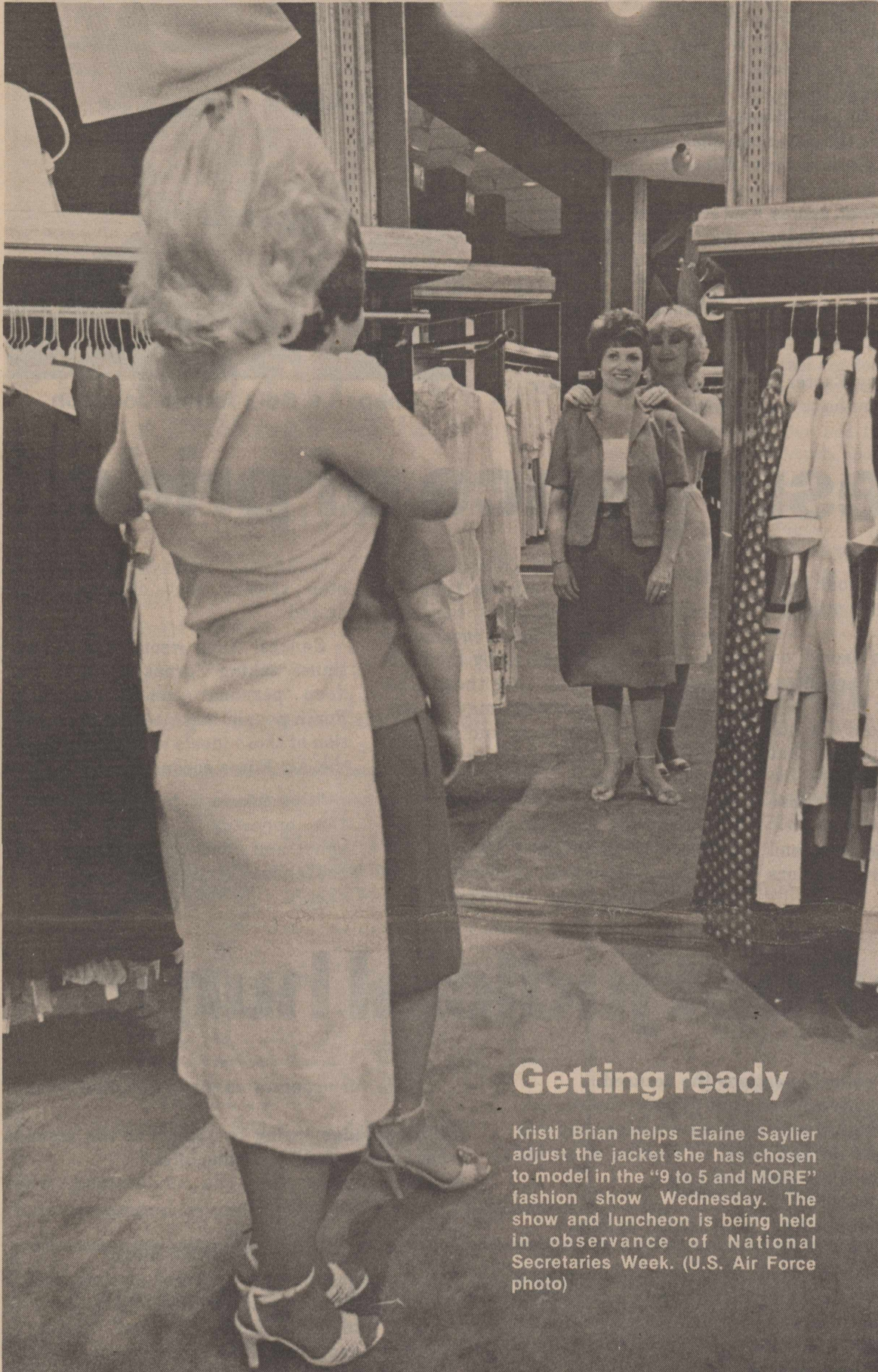

## Ellis calls for arms balance

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Correcting the nation's strategic imbalance with the Soviet Union must be a top priority in the years ahead, Gen. Richard H. Ellis told the House Armed Service's Research and Development Subcommittee here.

The commander in chief of Strategic Air Command told the subcommittee, "Years of indecision, cancellations and delays involving strategic force modernization have led to a serious strategic imbalance between the United States and the Soviet Union."

General Ellis, who is also director of the Joint Strategic Target Planning Staff and the Joint Strategic Connectivity Staff, said the United States has depended on a triad of land- and sea-launched ballistic missiles and manned penetrating bombers as the basis for strategic deterrence.

"Properly balanced and modernized, the triad poses insurmountable problems to an aggressor. However, the central systems of the triad, initially deployed in the 1950s and 1960s, are becoming non-competitive. The built-in compensation factor to offset temporary weaknesses in the individual elements is approaching maximum elasticity."

In the meantime, these weaknesses could be overcome, he said. National policy requires that U.S. nuclear forces be capable of riding out an initial attack with sufficient surviving firepower to retaliate.

"The day is rapidly approaching when a significant percentage of our silo-based intercontinental ballistic missile force will be unable to survive such an attack," he warned.

The general said the Air Force needs to deploy the M-X in a mobile-basing configuration to secure unquestionable credibility and long operational life.

"For more than a quarter century, the B-52 has been the mainstay of the bomber force. However, time and technology have passed it by. We must design, develop and deploy a follow-on strategic penetrator.

"The most pressing requirement is to prepare for the long term — 1990 and beyond. We should start now to develop an advanced strategic penetrator with the earliest possible initial operational capability.

"If the Air Force could field a penetrator that embraces new technologies by the mid 1980s, a single bomber would suffice. However, those responsible for the Air Force's technological programming say that a sound planning date for the first operational squadron of such penetrators is 1990. SAC sees no other workable alternative than to acquire a near-term penetrator for the 1980s while we continue to push ahead with the development of an advanced strategic penetrator."

Looking at the aerial refueling tanker fleet, he called it "stretched to the limit."

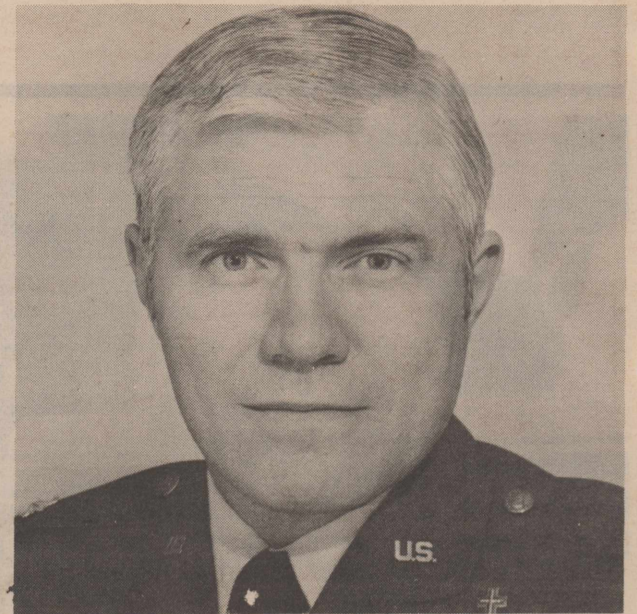
place - even by 20th century standards He was something special to watch.

# Allen claims resurgence of pride

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Gen. Lew Allen Jr., Air Force Chief of Staff, has cited the resurgence of national pride, patriotism and personal commitment of Air Force members in a letter to Air Force commanders.

"Recent weeks have brought a renewed sense of respect and appreciation among Americans for those who serve their country as members of the armed forces. This resurgence of national pride and patriotism should serve to remind us all that the Air Force is a unique in-

stitution and our people hold high ideals that set us apart from others," General Allen wrote.

"Ours is a profession based on common bonds of service to country, commitment to mission above self and an abiding sense of duty, honor and loyalty. History has proven that success in battle comes to those who unhesitatingly embrace these ideals, nurturing them with institutional pride and esprit de corps and skillfully passing them from seniors to juniors.

"I believe now is the time to strengthen our dedication to these ideas. Each officer and noncommissioned officer must live by them, in word and deed, so that those who follow in our footsteps may understand their importance and learn to cherish their place as cornerstones of our profession.

"Ensuring that all of our people adhere to the highest standards of personal discipline, appearance and performance is an important first

step toward that objective," he stated.

General Allen wrote that he continues taking "great pride in the deep personal commitment Air Force people make to the preservation of those ideals which have made the Air Force second to none.

"Our future is bright. Let's take this opportunity to rekindle our spirit and renew our dedication to the enduring ideals of our profession."

**\*\* The first of three Care Lines** this week deals with personnel who have been observed disregarding rules, regulations and speed limits on base. I know that we have people violating traffic laws daily. But let me

assure you, and to the violators let me warn you, the security police are doing their best to stop these violations. Approximately 100 violations are processed each week. If you observe a violation, get the license number, make and type of vehicle and report it to the security police. Your consideration for the safety of all Reese personnel is appreciated.

**\*\* Why does the HEART Program** schedule a nine-month follow-up exam for people who were not identified as a cardiovascular risk in the first examination? There are two major reasons. First, HEART personnel need to know how the program has influenced each individual's risk factors — either for better or worse. Secondly, it's possible that a person could have become a high risk individual since the first exam. Cholesterol and high blood pressure are linked with age and can make a person a high risk for heart disease.

**\*\* Another caller** wanted something done about cars parking in motorcycle parking slots behind Base Operations. The problem is that the slots are old and hard to identify because of faded, chipped markings. We're working on getting them remarked. If you observe cars in these slots again, contact the security police.

 "The addition of the new KC-10 will provide a much-needed increase to our refueling capability for conventional operations," he said.

General Ellis pointed out that the KC-10 is not a replacement for the KC-135 Stratotanker. He called the older aircraft "a national asset. But without modifications, it is reaching the end of its economical life.

"It is essential to re-engine the KC-135 fleet. Re-engining the fleet with modern, efficient turbofan engines would be equivalent to adding 300 tankers to our inventory."

General Ellis called attention to strategic connectivity or strategic command, control, communications and intelligence systems.

"The entire military capability

of this nation is bound together by a network of high-technology telecommunications systems. To satisfy national policy requirements and to realize the full potential of modernized strategic weapons systems, we must also make corresponding improvements to the ... systems that support them."

The main problem, General Ellis stressed, is with the system's management.

"Management responsibility for the various elements has been fragmented throughout the Department of Defense. If our strategic connectivity network is to effectively support national guidance, it is necessary to restructure the existing management organization."

General Ellis called on Congress to "see that among priorities, the most urgent relate to our nation's security."

# SPs plan bike-a-thon

Riders for the April 25 St. Jude Children's Research Hospital "Wheels for Life" Bike-A-Thon are now asking Lubbock and Reese personnel to back their efforts by pledging a contribution for each mile they ride.

"The money our riders earn will help continue St. Jude's life-saving study of childhood cancer that has become so important to children all over the world," said bike-a-thon Chairman, SSgt. Rudy Perez.

"We'll be showing that we care about children by helping this cause," Sergeant Perez said. "Please support your rider with a generous pledge, and then help them get the funds to us as soon as the ride is over.

"Each rider will be given a lap card when they register at

building 500 parking lot on Saturday," he said. "Every time they ride through the check point(s), we'll initial the card. At the end of the ride, we'll check it and sign it to show that the rider earned what the sponsor pledged." Riders will then return to the sponsors to collect the pledge.

"This year there will be four different age groups: Youngest age thru six years old (440 track), seven years old thru 12 years old (regular course), 13 years thru 17 years old (regular course), 18 years old and over (regular course).

Participants can use any type of tricycle, three-wheelers (hot wheels type) or 10 speed. Children ages six and seven have a choice of either the 440 track or regular course.

"We'll also be giving them a hospital bracelet saying 'I'm riding for Terry' to wear during the ride. I'm sure most of them will still be wearing them while they make their collections." Terry is a St. Jude patient who represents all victims of the illnesses under study at the research hospital.

The ride starts at building 500 parking lot at 10 a.m. and will be conducted by volunteers from the 64th Security Police Division. The event will end at 4 p.m. "If you have not been asked to sponsor a rider, please call 885-3614 or 885-3615 and we'll get one to call you," Sergeant Perez said. Riders can still obtain sponsor/registration forms at building 500 or the main gate.

# JAG relates legal actions

Twenty-one personnel received Article 15's in the month of March.

Four airmen were AWOL between four and seven days. Two were reduced to airmen basic the other two received suspended reduction to airmen basic. Total forfeiture was \$1,500; 120 days extra duty and restriction to base for 150 days.

One sergeant and one airman first class received suspended reduction in grade for failure to go. The airman first class had two specifications. Both forfeited a total of \$259 and were given 28 days extra duty.

Disorderly in station caused six airmen to forfeit a total of \$1,208 and given 88 days extra duty with 89 days restriction to base.

The use of marijuana caused four airmen to receive 56 days extra duty; forfeiture of \$439 and two of the airmen were reduced to airman basic and a senior airman was reduced to airman first class.

For larceny of government property worth \$150 a staff sergeant received suspended reduction in grade, a reprimand and 14 days extra duty.

Assault and battery and communicating a threat caused an airman first class to receive suspended reduction in grade, forfeiture of \$279 for two months, 30 days extra duty, and 14 days restriction to base.

An airman first class received vacation of suspended reduction

to airman; vacation of suspended forfeiture of \$179 for two months for being disrespectful to an NCO.

Failure to obey a lawful order, violating wing regulation by having a firearm in a POV, negligent damage to government property and unlawfully leaving the scene of a motor vehicle accident caused a sergeant to receive suspended reduction in grade, forfeiture of \$378 for two months and 30 days extra duty.

An airman first class was reduced to airman basic, forfeited \$200 for two months and was given 30 days extra duty for disobedience of superior commissioned officer for driving on base while privilege revoked.

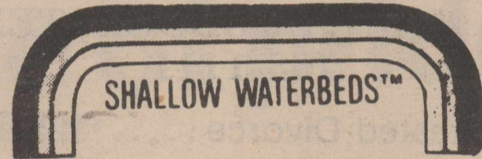

# Safety Wise

The first quarter of calendar year 81 is history. Unfortunately, it wasn't very safe for our people at Reese. We were lucky in that there were no fatalities, but luck was the major ingredient. Reese led the command (compared to similar bases) in the number of reportable ground mishaps with 26. The average for the 6 base comparison was 13.6. Most of our mishaps (19) happened while our people were off duty. These were equally divided in to the recreational, PMV and miscellaneous categories. The cost of our ground accidents was a whopping \$81,000, most of which was a result of two separate on duty incidents with aircraft. Twenty one of the reportables resulted in injuries and accounted for 103 days lost. Statistics is not my favorite topic but I do believe the previous paragraph shows that we are going in the wrong direction when it comes to protecting our people and equipment. In order to effectively turn the tide everyone will have to get on the safety band wagon. Don't let a hazardous situation go uncorrected because you think it is somebody else's responsibility. It's not; it's yours! We'll help you keep track of how successful the base is by periodically posting, on the main gate marquee, the number of days since the last reportable ground accident. Don't be the one to allow the chain to be broken.

## April rains exceed norm

The crazy weather season has arrived on the South Plains in full force, as evidenced by that St. Patrick's Day dust storm which turned everyone's green clothes to brown. **Invasion causes concern over state of readiness**

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — "The Soviet invasion of Afghanistan with large numbers of forces has caused us to re-examine our program priorities, especially within the areas of conventional warfare, mobility and

force projection," said Lt. Gen. Kelly H. Burke.

The deputy chief of staff for research, development and acquisition told the Senate Tactical Warfare Subcommittee that past planning for tactical- and

mobility-forces employment has focused primarily on a NATO engagement.

"However, with our increased concerns in the Persian Gulf area, it is clear that the demands on the Air Force, as well as the other services, have expanded significantly."

The Soviets spend more for military equipment, he said. For example, they have produced two and a half times more intercontinental ballistic missiles than the United States, twice as many submarine-launched ballistic missiles and three times more tanks.

"In the area of aircraft production, the Soviets' investment has had a direct, visible and highly adverse effect on the military balance. The Soviets produced more than two times as many tactical aircraft as the United States during the decade of the 70s. Their continued high-production rates of modernized aircraft confirms their dedication to overall numerical superiority," the general said.

"The technological lead that we have been relying on to offset numerical advantages is diminishing because the Soviets are fielding systems of increasing quality and sophistication," General Burke stated.

He explained that the Soviets are developing a look-down, shoot-down capability for counterair missions. Their fighters are already equipped with radar-guided missiles similar to U.S. AIM-7s.

# OTS seeks applicants

(ATCNS) — After limiting Officer Training School applications to rated and engineering slots for several months, Air Force Recruiting Service has resumed accepting applications from qualified active-duty members for technical and non-technical career areas.

Openings will be highly competitive since there are a limited number available, according to Recruiting Service officials. Applications are being accepted in the following areas: missile operations, space systems analyst,

weather, scientific, communications-electronics and computer systems.

An applicant must have a minimum of six hours in calculus to enter the communications-electronics field or nine hours of computer science for the computer systems field.

Air Force also has critical shortages in pilot, navigator and the engineering career fields, particularly in developmental engineering, civil engineering and communications-electronics engineering.

This year the Air Force is seeking the largest number of pilots and navigators since the inception of the All Volunteer Force, Recruiting Service officials said. Rated applications must be accompanied by an appropriate physical examination.

Active-duty Air Force personnel who have or are about to receive their baccalaureate degree and wish to apply for OTS should check with their consolidated base personnel office for further information and application procedures.

# Veterans receive increased benefits

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Veterans Administration educational benefits have been increased by 10 percent for veterans eligible under the "old" GI Bill, according to VA officials here. Dollar amounts depend on the number of hours enrolled in school, marital status, number of dependents and duty status.

The public law increasing the benefits was passed in October and increases were made in two steps — one in October and another in January. Also included

with the legislation were provisions calling for a reduction in the minimum contribution required for the Veterans Education Assistance Program. VEAP contributes two dollars for every dollar veterans put toward education. Eligible Air Force service members may contribute \$25 to \$100 a month toward VEAP.

The legislation also reduced VA payments for flight training by 33 percent. The VA can now pay only 60 percent of flight training costs.

# AFAS offers loans

The Air Force Aid Society offers two guaranteed student loan programs to assist Air Force members finance post-secondary education for themselves, their spouses and their children.

Minimum loan amount is \$500. Undergraduate students are eligible to borrow up to \$3,000 for each academic year. Graduate students may get up to \$5,000 for each academic year. The interest rate is limited to 9% per annum simple interest.

The federal government pays this interest while the student is in school, during the 6 month grace period afterwards and during authorized period of defer-

ment when repayment is not required. Thereafter, the students pays the interest and repays the loan. The minimum monthly payment is \$30. The exact repayment schedule and amount is determined between the student and Chase Manhattan Bank.

A limited supply of new applications for these programs have been received by personal affairs. AFAS national headquarters advises that eligible applicants should go ahead and apply early, and that the future of the guaranteed student loan program is not certain. Being in the program before it is changed may become very important to the participants.

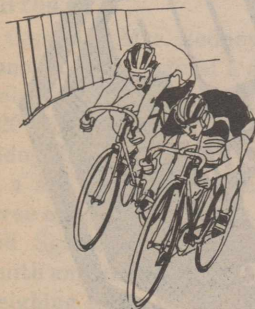
Other events in the near future include the command art contest in May, a tennis tournament in June, and men's and women's softball tournaments and the command chess tournament in July.
