

Ellis calls for arms balance

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - Correcting the nation's strategic imbalance with the Soviet Union must be a top priority in the years ahead, Gen. Richard H. Ellis told the House Armed Service's Research and Development Subcommittee here.

The commander in chief of Strategic Air Command told the subcommittee, "Years of indecision, cancellations and delays involving strategic force modernization have led to a serious strategic imbalance between the United States and the Soviet

General Ellis, who is also director of the Joint Strategic Target Planning Staff and the Joint Strategic Connectivity Staff, said the United States has depended on a triad of landand sea-launched ballistic missiles and manned penetrating bombers as the basis for strategic deterrence.

"Properly balanced and modernized, the triad poses insurmountable problems to an aggressor. However, the central systems of the triad, initially deployed in the 1950s and 1960s, are becoming non-competitive. The built-in compensation factor to offset temporary weaknesses in the individual elements is approaching maximum elasticity."

In the meantime, these weaknesses could be overcome, he said. National policy requires that U.S. nuclear forces be capable of riding out an initial attack with sufficient surviving firepower to retaliate.

"The day is rapidly approaching when a significant percentage of our silo-based intercontinental ballistic missile force will be unable to survive such an attack," he warned.

The general said the Air Force needs to deploy the M-X in a mobile-basing configuration to secure unquestionable credibility and long operational life.

"For more than a quarter century, the B-52 has been the mainstay of the bomber force. However, time and technology have passed it by. We must design, develop and deploy a follow-on strategic penetrator.

"The most pressing requirement is to prepare for the long term - 1990 and beyond. We should start now to develop an advanced strategic penetrator with the earliest possible initial operational capability.

"If the Air Force could field a penetrator that embraces new technologies by the mid 1980s, a single bomber would suffice. However, those responsible for the Air Force's technological programming say that a sound planning date for the first operational squadron of such penetrators is 1990. SAC sees no other workable alternative than to acquire a near-term penetrator for the 1980s while we continue to push ahead with the development of an advanced strategic penetrator."

Looking at the aerial refueling tanker fleet, he called it "stretched to the limit."


place - even by 20th century standards He was something special to watch.

Allen claims resurgence of pride

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Gen. Lew Allen Jr., Air Force Chief of Staff, has cited the resurgence of national pride, patriotism and personal commitment of Air Force members in a letter to Air Force commanders.

"Recent weeks have brought a renewed sense of respect and appreciation among Americans for those who serve their country as members of the armed forces. This resurgence of national pride and patriotism should serve to remind us all that the Air Force is a unique in-

stitution and our people hold high ideals that set us apart from others," General Allen wrote.

"Ours is a profession based on common bonds of service to country, commitment to mission above self and an abiding sense of duty, honor and loyalty. History has proven that success in battle comes to those who unhestitatingly embrace these ideals, nurturing them with institutional pride and esprit de corps and skillfully passing them from seniors to juniors.

"I believe now is the time to strengthen our dedication to these ideas. Each officer and noncommissioned officer must live by them, in word and deed, so that those who follow in our footsteps may understand their importance and learn to cherish their place as cornerstones of our profession.

"Ensuring that all of our people adhere to the highest standards of personal discipline, appearance and performance is an important first step toward that objective," he stated.

General Allen wrote that he continues taking "great pride in the deep personal commitment Air Force people make to the preservation of those ideals which have made the Air Force second to none.

"Our future is bright. Let's take this opportunity to rekindle our spirit and renew our dedication to the enduring ideals of our profession."

True events reflect judicial humor

The following dialogues are actual, verbatim testimonies as recorded in official courts-martial records of trial:

(Defense Counsel questions the accused.)

Defense Counsel: As a result of your observation of Private (Jones) on these occasions, did you form or do you have an opinion as to his character for violence?

Witness: Yes, sir.

Defense Counsel: And, what is that opinion? Witness: He's a thug.

Defense Counsel: Okay. Now, could you please tell the panel why you feel he's a thug.

Witness: Because after we had gotten into it at the dormitory, he came down to my duty section and shot me.

Military Judge: Now in conjunction with your enlistment in the Army, I'm sure that you had to take some examinations, entrance examinations, and things of that nature. And, I'm going to ask you whether or not the questions that you answered on this examination, did you answer them using your own brain power?

Accused: Sir, some of them I did. A whole lot of them I just guessed at.

Trial Counsel: Was the accused rational when he was talking to you that evening?

Witness: No, sir.

Trial Counsel: What was he?

Witness: Everybody, you know, was just normal, no one was rational.

Military Judge: Are both counsel aware that one of the court members was the accused in

this very courtroom just a few months ago?

(Military judge trying to explain to the accused what "suspended" punishment is.)

Military Judge: Do you understand what "suspend" means?

Accused: Yes, your honor.

Military Judge: What does that mean?

Accused: Set aside for a period of time until I might do something wrong.

Military Judge: Literally, "suspend" means to hang, hang over. If he agreed to suspend any part of your sentence, he had agreed to have it hanging over your head. You would not be required to serve the punishment as long as you are on good behavior. However, if you engage in certain types of misconduct then what would happen?

Accused: I would be hanged, your honor.

(Military judge questioning a court member.)

Military Judge: What were you doing, Captain (Doe), during the time that Lieutenant (Smith) was at that particular copier, what were you doing?

Court Member: I was cheating the coffee fund by putting in a nickel instead of a dime and getting a cup of coffee and talking to Major (Jones).

Trial Counsel: Well, what were you doing at the time you saw your own blood?

Witness: I was punching Sergeant (Johnson) in the face.

Cholesterol and high blood pressure are linked with age and can make a person a high risk for heart disease.

The Soviets spend more for military equipment, he said. For example, they have produced two and a half times more intercontinental ballistic missiles than the United States, twice as many submarine-launched ballistic missiles and three times more

"In the area of aircraft production, the Soviets' investment has had a direct, visible and highly adverse effect on the military balance. The Soviets produced more than two times as many tactical aircraft as the United States during the decade of the 70s. Their continued high-production rates of modernized aircraft confirms their dedication to overall numerical superiority," the general said.

The technological lead that we have been relying on to offset numerical advantages is diminishing because the Soviets are fielding systems of increasing quality and sophistication, General Burke stated.

He explained that the Soviets are developing a look-down, shoot-down capability for counterair missions. Their fighters are already equipped with radar-guided missiles similar to U.S. AIM-7s.






