

Reese places sixth in AFAF race

With the final results of the 1981 Air Force Assistance Fund drive in, Reese ended up sixth out of the 15 Air Training Command installations, netting a total of 182 percent of goal with a total of \$20,223.74.

Air Training Command members donated more than \$607,000 to the campaign, shattering the previous command record set only one year ago.

This year's mark represented 200

percent of ATC's 1981 campaign goal of \$304,030 and exceeded last year's record donations by almost \$150,000. In 1980, ATC people contributed \$462,859 to AFAF.

Command personnel officials termed this year's drive, which ran from March 2 through April 3, the most successful one ever. They pointed to the fact that every base in ATC exceeded their individual campaign goals.

Lackland AFB, Texas, and Chanute AFB, Ill., were in a virtual tie for the command percentage lead with 321 and 320 percent, respectively. Personnel officials hesitated to declare Lackland the command leader since some late donations will continue to trickle in through April 24.

Lackland was, however, the undisputed leader in dollars donated with \$118,884 collected through

April 13. Air University, headquartered at ATC's Maxwell AFB, Ala., was a distant second at \$73,514.

Three other ATC bases broke the 200 percent mark during this year's campaign: Goodfellow AFB, Texas, 262 percent; Lowry AFB, Colo., 256 percent; and Keesler AFB, Miss., 229 percent.

AFAF donations are used to support the Air Force Aid Society, Air Force Village and the Air Force Widows and Dependents Home.

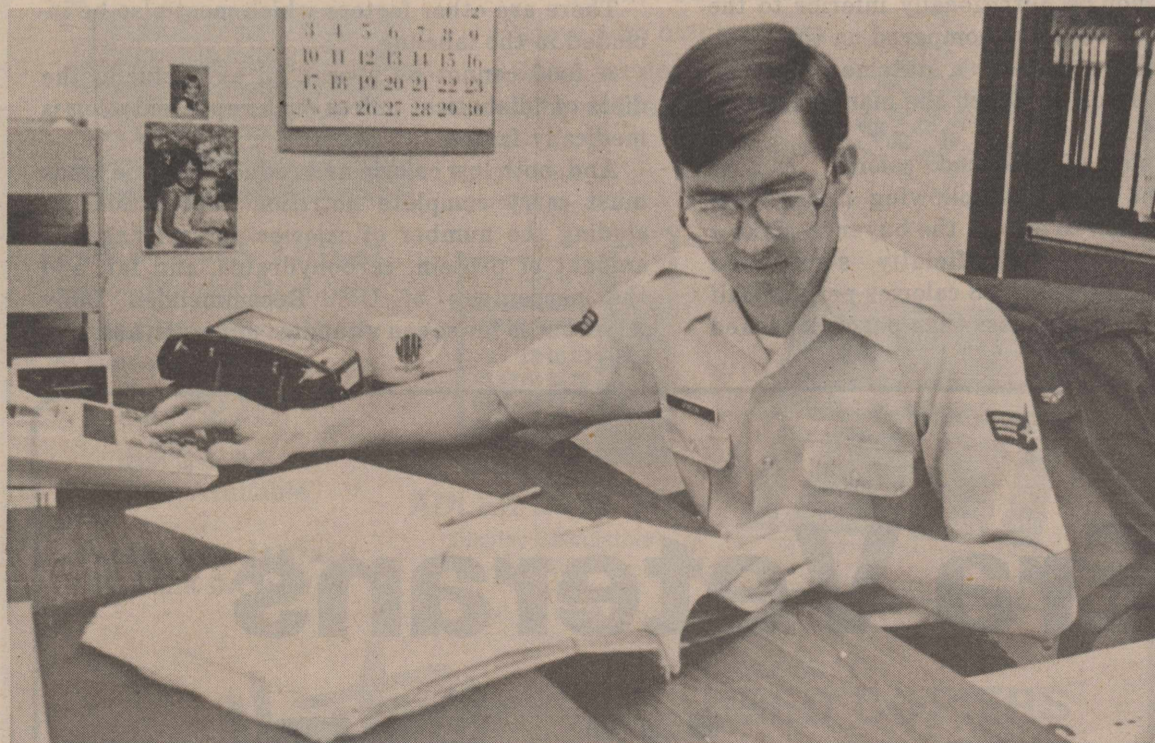
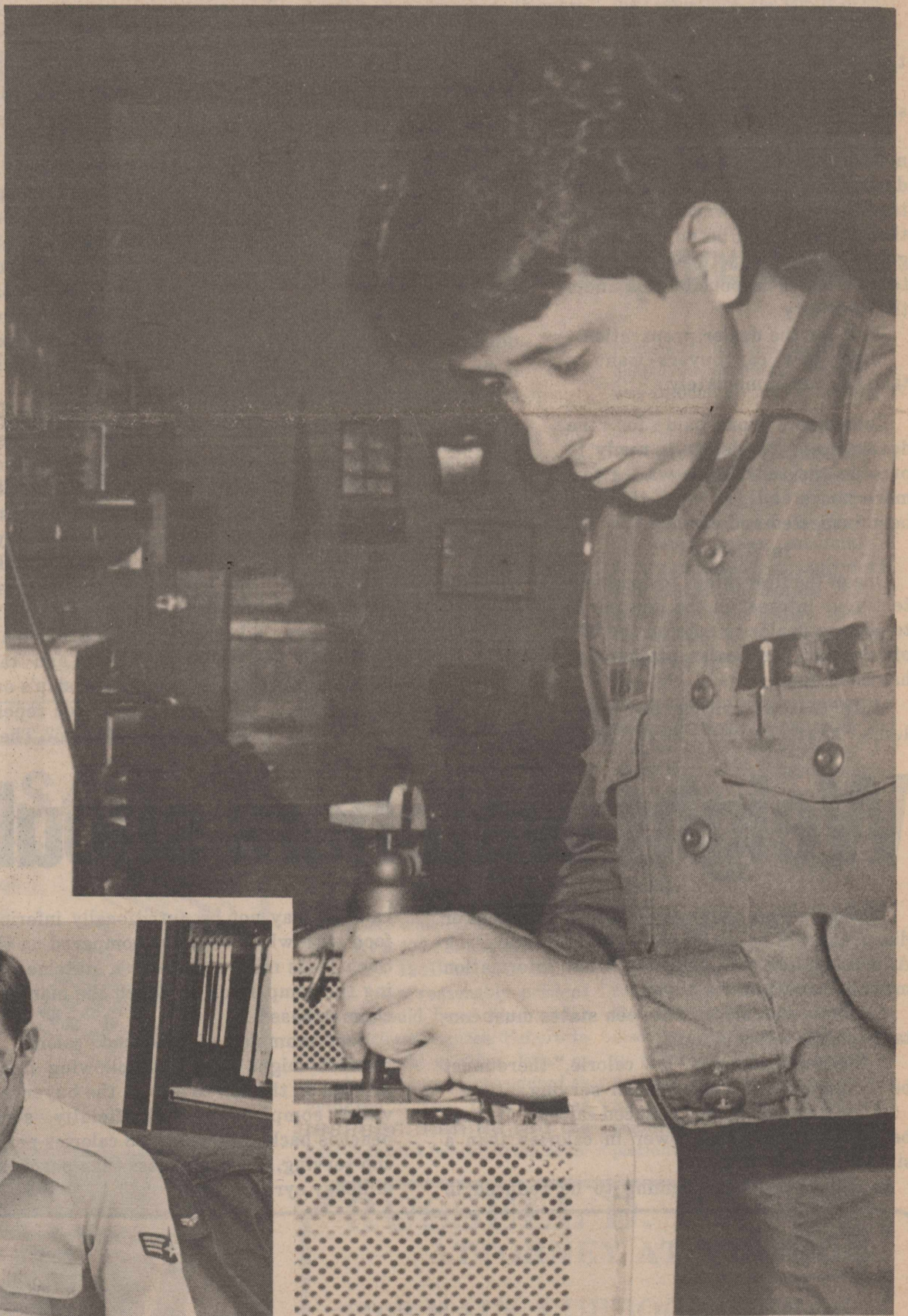
A1C Vela is a ground radio repairman assigned to the radio maintenance section. He is largely responsible for the excellent operational rate of the 150 end items he maintains.

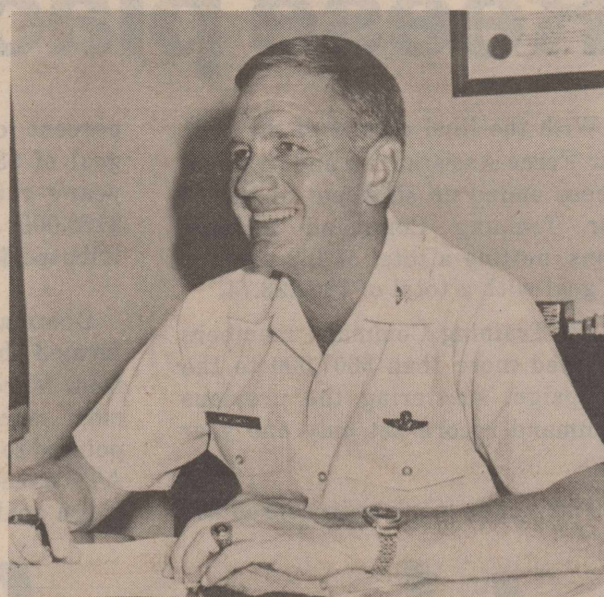

New cars can mean new problems

The new car is yours, along with the payments and pleasure.

You have rights as well as responsibilities under the warranty.

If you take the responsibility for meeting all the maintenance standards required by the manufacturer during the warranty period, then there should be no problem in getting the manufacturer and dealer to meet their responsibilities under the warranty.

Wait for the dealer preparation.

Many new car buyers want to take the car immediately.

Remember, you paid for the dealer prep, the dealer is ready to provide the service, so wait a few more hours and get a car that has been inspected and cleaned.

In Writing

One of the first things to do to protect your interest in the new car is to get the dealer to note on the bill-of-sale that the dealer preparation has been done.

With that in writing, any problems that should have been

remedied by the dealer prep will be placed where they belong — in the dealer's lap.

The modern American car has thousands of mechanical and electronic parts that can go wrong. So there will be times when you have to face the fact that the car needs repairs.

Do It Now

Repair and maintenance problems don't "work themselves out."

They don't get better by themselves with time. If neglected, they get worse and may develop into major problems.

So, when a problem occurs, take the car in immediately.

As a new-car owner you may be told, "Wait for the next regular checkup; we'll fix it then." Don't be put off. The problem could get worse suddenly, leaving you stranded along the road. It could get serious enough to cause an accident.

You have a warranty — use it to the fullest.

Whenever work is done on your car, get itemized receipts for every part replaced, every lube job, every oil change. Do this and you'll be able to prove you lived up to your end of the warranty.

Even though there is no charge for work done under warranty, get itemized receipts.

Then, if your problem is a recurring one, comparison of your bills and work orders will warn you that the same non-fix has been charged again, either to you or the manufacturer.

Above all, be persistent in solving any problems that come up. While your car is still under warranty, strive to get it in A-1 condition.

You have rights under the warranty given you when you bought the car — make certain that you get all that is coming to you.

If You Complain

If problems still persist, try to sit down and talk it over with the dealership's owner. Most businesses count on repeat sales.

No go? Then take it up with the

manufacturer. Many car manufacturers have toll-free numbers to handle complaints. If your manufacturer doesn't, then send a registered letter off to the president or the company.

Still no luck? Then get your county or city consumer protection office into the act.

Try AUTOCAP

AUTOCAPS (Automotive Consumer Action Panels) are complaint-handling groups which have been organized by State or local automobile dealers associations. Some of them settle disputes by using panels which have both consumer members and industry members; other use a single mediator or an industry committee to work out a solution.

If your problem involves the safety of your automobile, make copies of all the correspondence and work order receipts and send the bundle to: National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, U.S. Department of Transportation, 400 Seventh St. SW, Washington DC 20590.

Weight watchers should watch labels

Watching your weight by eating low calories or diet foods will be easier since the Food and Drug Administration told industry what information must be provided the buyer.

All foods distributed between states must contain specific information.

If the item is labeled "low calorie," there must be no more than 40 calories per serving.

If the item is labeled "reduced calorie," it must be at least one third lower in calories than a similar regular item.

In addition, foods claiming to be reduced in

calories may not be nutritionally inferior to the food with which they are compared on the label. Such foods must also carry a statement describing the comparison on which the manufacturer's claim is based.

For example, a "reduced calorie" can of peaches might have the following information printed on the can to permit the buyer to make a valid comparison: "Artificially sweetened peaches packed in water, 38 calories per one-half cup serving, 62 percent less than peaches packed in heavy syrup."

There are other factors which must also be included in the labeling.

A food cannot be presented as useful in the diets of "diabetics" unless such representation is medically factual.

And, both low calorie and reduced calorie foods must carry complete nutrition information, including the number of calories per serving, the amount of protein, carbohydrates, and fat, and the percentage of U.S. Recommended Daily Allowances for seven vitamins, minerals, and protein.

**** The first of three CARE Lines this week concerns shift workers who are required to eat at their duty station. The caller wanted to know if two meats could be provided in box meals**

from the dining hall since these workers can't go back for seconds. All you've got to do is order two meals on the same request — one full meal and one with only meat. This will ensure the integrity of the food service accounting system and will allow for distinguishment between a normal meal and seconds.

**** Another caller wants to know if more emphasis can be put on educating base personnel about not parking in reserved carpool slots. Unit commanders must become involved in informing their personnel of these special slots and encourage their people to participate. The Security Police will ticket violators if a complaint is made by the persons who are assigned slots. Security Police will respond as soon as possible, but sometimes they are engaged in a higher priority call. If you observe someone parking in one of these slots, remind the individual of his violation**

yourself. That's all it may take. If not, there is always the above procedure.

**** There is a problem in base housing with youth walking through newly seeded yards, according to two CARE Line callers. In addition to tramping down grass where residents are trying to get it to grow, the kids are also littering the yards. The kids appear to be teenagers on their way to and from the Youth Center. The Security Police cannot put a special patrol in this area during high peak times because of a shortage of personnel. I urge parents to tell their teenagers to use the sidewalks and not to throw trash in yards. Parents are responsible for their children's behavior and if a child is identified violating base housing regulations, the family of that child can be required to move out of base housing. The cooperation of all parents in solving this problem is essential.**

Air Force increases individual responsibility

It's 10 O'Clock—Do You Know Where Your Government Property Is?

Although the familiar TV message normally addresses parents' responsibility for their children, it could be readily applied to the responsibility each of us will have for government property beginning May 1, 1981. That's the day the Air Force begins testing revised standards for financial responsibility for lost, damaged, or destroyed Air Force property.

Under the new system, Air Force members and civilian employees will be required to pay up to one month's base pay (before taxes) for property which is lost, damaged, or destroyed due to their negligence, willful misconduct, or deliberate unauthorized use. The key here is **negligence** which is defined in the draft AFR 177-111 (distributed in February, 1981) as: "The failure to act as a reasonably prudent person would have acted under similar circumstances. Failure to comply with existing laws or regulations may be considered as evidence." The term "gross negligence", which has been the past standard for requiring reim-

bursement for lost, damaged, or destroyed property, and which was difficult to prove, no longer exists.

The test is presently scheduled to be conducted for one year. During that time, a substantial amount of data concerning manhours spent, amounts of money collected from individuals, and effects on morale will be gathered to determine whether the test will become a permanent regulation or we will return to the old standard of "gross" negligence. In either event, a recent Air Force Accounting and Finance Center letter states: "All collection actions taken during the test are legal and binding even though the Air Force should decide after the test not to adopt the new policy on negligence and liability."

As soon as you discover that government property has been lost, destroyed, or damaged, you should contact her for guidance in complying with the draft AFR 177-111 and completion of the DD Form 200 (Test).

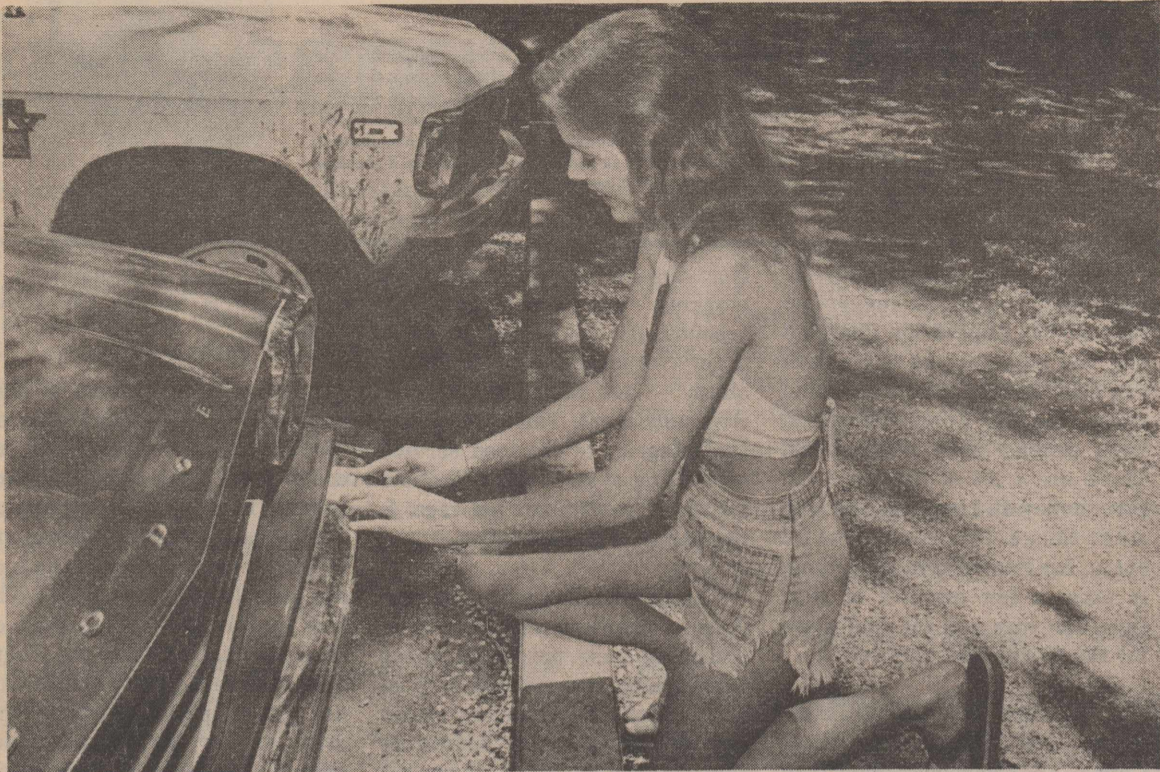

Drivers must get new auto decals

Approximately 4,000 Reese vehicles must be converted to the new Department of Defense registration decal by May 15.

According to Security Police officials, the mass registration drive will begin Wednesday with the registration of vehicles belonging to people in the 64th Field Maintenance Squadron. A different unit is scheduled for the conversion program each duty day through May 15, ending with the Army Air Force Exchange Service.

Personnel assigned to the smaller tenant units on base will not be scheduled for specific days. Instead, people in these units will have until May 31 to stop by pass and ID and pick up the new sticker.

To make the conversion easier for base personnel, pass and ID officials will set up shop in the squadron areas on the assigned days. Only Air Base Group, base motor pool and AAFES personnel will be required to go to pass an ID.

No paperwork is required by vehicle owners for the conversion. Pass and ID already has the

vehicle information needed for the change.

The schedule dates, units and times are: Wednesday, **FMS** (8 a.m. to 4 p.m.); Thursday, **64th Organizational Maintenance** (7:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.); April 29, **1958th Communications Squadron** (9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.); April 30, **Supply Squadron** (8 a.m. to 4 p.m.); May 1, **Group** (8 a.m. to 4 p.m.); May 4, **3500th Resource Management Squadron** (8 a.m. to 4 p.m.); May 5, **Civil Engineers** (8 a.m. to 4 p.m.); May 6, **Hospital** (8 a.m. to 4 p.m.); and May 7 and 8, **64th Student Squadron** (8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and 8 a.m. to noon respectively)

Rounding out the schedule are: May 11 **54th Flying Training Squadron** (8 a.m. to 4 p.m.); May 12, **35th Flying Training Squadron** (8 a.m. to 4 p.m.); May 13, **Operations** (8 a.m. to noon); May 13, **base motor pool** (1 to 4 p.m.); and **AAFES** (variable times).

Personnel needing the new Department of Defense stickers should contact their squadron orderly rooms to find out where the pass and ID workers will set up in their units.

CHAMPUS modifies therapy definitions

Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services has revised its definitions of conjoint therapy and collateral visits and removed the limit of four sessions per episode-of-care. This change is retroactive to Oct. 1, 1980.

"The revised guidelines bring the program into conformity with current practice," states John H. Moxley III, M.D., Assistant Secretary of Defense (Health Affairs). "Conjoint therapy and collateral visits continue, however, to be subject to program review requirements and limitations imposed on psychotherapeutic services generally," he said.

Conjoint therapy is a collective term used to indicate a category of psychotherapies where individuals, other than the therapist and the patient, are in the treatment session at the same time—i.e., one or more family members. Conjoint therapy is a form of group therapy and includes marital therapy and family therapy.

Any beneficiary who had either conjoint therapy or collateral visits rendered after Oct. 1, 1980 and which were denied because the number of sessions exceeded four should resubmit the claim for consideration.

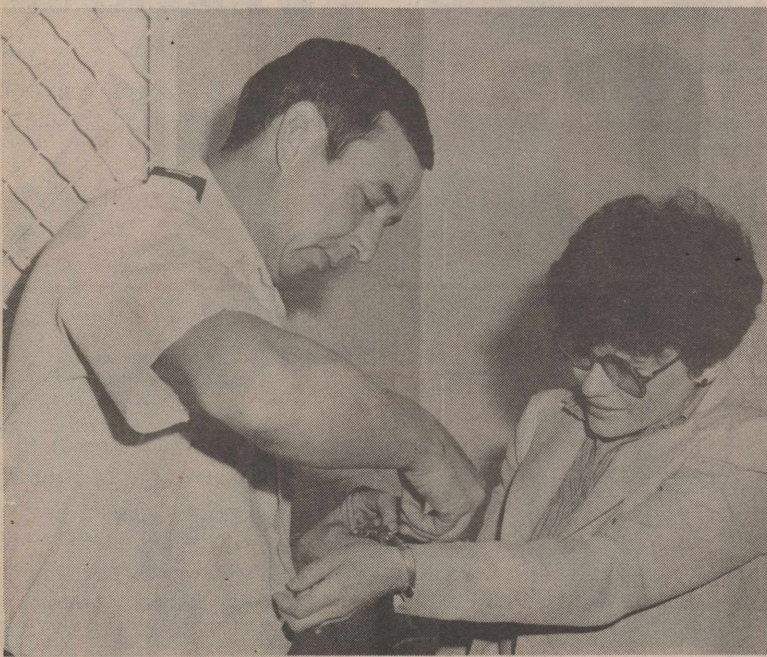
The 19th in a series of annual joint exercises, Solid Shield '81 will emphasize command and control of military forces in a simulated combat environment.

Physiology draws crowd

Despite rainy, cold weather last week a large number of visitors turned out to see the survival open house held at Aerospace Physiology. The program was designed to show the tremendous variety of equipment that could be constructed by an aircrewman forced to parachute from his aircraft.

Besides a large six-man tepee made from canopy material, the exhibit included items to protect the airman. There was a large

sleeping bag made with a parachute canopy stuffed with dry grass, clothing and shoes made from the parachute back pack and even sun glasses fabricated from strap webbing. Also included were a sampling of ways to secure food by netting fish in improvised nets and snares for animals.

For survivors who need to travel to a safe area, the unit built a pack strap and cover material to hold gear. This travel

pack also contained handwoven rope with a breaking strength of over 1,000 pounds which could be used to negotiate steep terrain. Signalling materials for attracting search aircraft were also included in the gear.

The entire display was created from materials salvaged from only one parachute. For those interested in more information about the survival program at Reese, contact Capt. David Eiband at Ext. 3392.

PCS entitlements expand

(ATCNS)—Recent changes in permanent change of station entitlements have Air Training Command finance and transportation officials busy counseling members on how to make their PCS moves more cost effective.

Reimbursement Options

James F. Richardson, travel specialist, Headquarters ATC accounting and finance directorate, said one of the changes is the new reimbursement options for service members using mixed modes of travel during PCS.

This initiative follows the implementation of the monetary allowance in lieu of transportation plus per diem PCS entitlement. Both were approved by the Department of Defense Per Diem Travel and Transportation Committee.

Using a mixed mode of travel involves travel partly at government expense and partly at the member's personal expense. Formerly, when a member used a mixed mode of transportation, he or she would be reimbursed a mileage allowance for the entire distance traveled, but only after the cost of the government travel request had been reclaimed.

Depending on the situation, Richardson said this provision caused some members to pay excess "out of pocket" costs. In some cases he said members were even indebted to the government. Under the change, members may elect to receive the cost of the travel request or be reimbursed MALT plus per diem.

MALT

MALT, which became effective

April 1, will reimburse active duty service persons 7 cents a mile plus a flat \$35 per day per diem rate during a PCS move. This replaced the 18½ cents mileage allowance without per diem that had been approved.

Richardson stressed that ATC members with upcoming PCS moves should check with their local transportation and finance offices before planning their move.

He said it's also important to remember that mileage rates for family members are not affected by MALT. Those rates remain the same. For spouses and children over 12, the rate is 7 cents a mile. For children between 2 and 12, the rate is 3½ cents a mile.

Choice of transport

Harold D. Syvertson, traffic management specialist, HQ ATC traffic management division, said that ATC members continue to have the option of electing government travel or commercial transportation at their own expense.

Those choosing commercial transportation at their personal expense may elect to be reimbursed one of the following ways:

*MALT plus per diem, 7 cents a mile plus a flat per diem rate of \$35 a day, or

*Actual cost of transportation plus per diem of \$50 a day (per diem subject to normal deductions).

Travel time

Richardson emphasized that travel time is a big factor under

MALT. For example, if a sergeant receives orders to make a 1,500 mile PCS move and is authorized five days travel time the sergeant would receive \$280. To compute this, multiply 7 cents times 1,500 miles plus \$35 times five which equals \$280.

However, if the sergeant completed travel a day earlier, the reimbursement would be \$245 or \$35 less. Computed the old way, with the 18½ cents mileage allowance, the sergeant would have received \$277.50, regardless of travel time.

Using MALT, ATC members will only be reimbursed for the actual travel time used that does not exceed the maximum travel time authorized.

Richardson said ATC members need to understand that the day of arrival at the new duty station counts as a day of duty regardless of arrival time.

Advance pay

Persons planning to draw advance travel pay should give special consideration to their travel time. Those anticipating the use of fewer travel days than those authorized should draw their advance travel pay only for the days they will actually use.

"If you sign in early at your new duty station the finance office will be required to collect the portion of the per diem that your travel voucher indicates you were authorized but did not use," said the finance travel specialist.

Persons separating from service or retiring may also receive advance PCS travel funds under the MALT system.

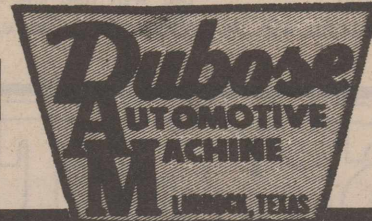
