# July pay raise chance dims

(ATCNS) — Prospects for a 5.3 percent July military pay raise appear dim in the wake of recent recommendations by the House of Representatives' Subcommittee on Military Personnel and Compensation.

The subcommittee reported out its version of the Armed Forces Pay Act of 1981 to the full House Armed Services Committee May 1. While the bill does feature a 14.3 percent across-theboard pay increase for all uniformed services personnel effective Oct. 1, there is no provision for a July pay raise. Said subcommittee chairman Rep. Bill Nichols, D-Ala., "Clearly, an increase earlier in the year would be more desirable from the point of view of some service members, but the specification of this larger increase in October will set a number of minds at ease."

The Department of Defense had recommended earlier to Congress that service members be granted a 5.3 percent raise in July, followed by a 9.1 percent increase in October.

According to the subcommittee, it faced

parliamentary obstacles in terms of a pay increase effective before Oct. 1, and felt progress on such a bill could be delayed, and possibly prevented, as a result of those obstacles.

While subcommittee action on the pay bill is now complete, it still must be considered by the full committee and passed by the House before it is referred to the Senate Armed Services Committee. Any differences between the House and Senate versions will have to be resolved in conference.

# Hospital commander explains services

The week of May 10 through 16 is National Hospital Week.

The theme this year is "Looking Well Into The Future". Your hospital is providing medical services to all its beneficiaries today with a view toward tomorrow's health care needs. But how are we providing this quality health care for our beneficiaries?

First the medical service of the Air Force is divided into five corps. The Medical Corps (physicians), Dental Corps (dentists), Nurse Corps (nurses), Medical Service Corps (health care administrators), and Biomedical Science Corps (this includes other professional personnel such as physician assistants, pharmacy officer, laboratory officer, clinical psychologist, social worker, veterinarian, and bioenvironmental engineer, etc.). These corps consist of all the medical officer personnel.

Each corp has a compliment of enlisted personnel supporting the officers. For example; the physicians and nurses are complimented with medical service technicians and the dentist with dental -technicians. All these medical professionals combine to form a health care team that provides the best quality health care available to all flying students, flying personnel, nonrated personnel, and eligible dependents. The retirees and their dependents are afforded health care to the extent resources permit.

The hospital's mission does not stop with just providing medical care. Our physiological training unit provides excellent support to the wing flying mission with its altitude chamber, parasailing and other training for the physiological effects of flight.

The veterinary section ensures that all food products purchased from the commissary meet Air Force standards and that all dining facilities on base are operating in a healthful environment in preparing the best quality food for consumption.

The environmental health section is ensuring that the working environment meets standards for health and safety. This summer environmental health personnel will ensure base swimming pools are environmentally safe for summer enjoyment.

In order to look into our hospital's future, we must look at what has happened at the Reese AFB hospital in the most recent past. An obstetrics and gynecology test program was initiated at this hospital in January 1980. This OB/GYN program is conducted by the OB/GYN Department of Texas Tech University School of Medicine as a satellite to their resident training program. The test program is financed through the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the uniformed services under a contractual agreement.

The OB/GYN Clinic, pre and post natal care services, and the majority of deliveries are accomplished at this medical facility. A total of 6,121 GYN examinations; 2,447 OB examinations; and 175 births were recorded during calendar year 1980. This test program is one of the major factors contributing to our increase in inpatient workload which has enabled your hospital to be designated a 20-bed facility as of Jan. 1, 1981.

Next week we will begin the Family Empanellment System for active duty personnel and their dependents within our primary care clinic. This program will provide a family health care team for all our active duty personnel and their dependents.

Your hospital is working hard to build a healthy future for you and your family. Each of us has a part in providing that future by learning what we can do to keep ourselves "health wise". Remember, predicting the future is risky; but planning for it makes sense.

# JAG offers accident options

Sgt. Crunch works on the flight line and lives in Lubbock. Each day he travels home from work along a route which takes him by the intersection of 4th Street and Loop 289.

One day while the sergeant was proceeding through that intersection with the signal when Mr. Cook, a short-order hamburger maker from one of the nearby restaurants, ran the red light (on the loop's access road) and slammed broadside into Sergeant Crunch's new Datsun 280ZX. The policeman on the scene cited Mr. Cook as being wrong. The following week, Sergeant Crunch paid a \$3,500.00 bil to have his car repaired and visited Mr. Cook at work. After presenting the repair bill to Mr. Cook, the Sergeant demanded payment by the close of the week. The reply was, "Good luck, Sarge; I've got no insurance and you'll be waiting until retirement to get money from me."

Without hiring an attorney and going to court with a lawsuit, does the good Sergeant have any remedy at all?

#### Yes.

As common sense might suggest, Sergeant Crunch should seek

assistance through the Texas Department of Public Safety. Under Texas law, the department can take action which should have the effect of pressuring Mr. Cook into being more cooperative. The DPS has the authority to suspend the driver's license of uninsured motorists where: (a) the accident occurs on a public road, (b) an on-the-scene investigation is conducted by a police officer with a report being filed, (c) the liability for the accident is clear and falls upon the uninsured motorist, and (d) the damages sustained exceed \$250.00.

In a case such as this, where these criteria have been met, a complaint from Sergeant Crunch will result in the uninsured motorist being notified of an intended suspension of his drivers license by DPS.

Of course Mr. Cook will be afforded an opportunity to present matters on his behalf at a hearing if he desires; but, inaction or a finding by the hearing officer against Mr. Cook will result in the license being taken by the state.

Mr. Cook can avoid losing his drivers license only by doing one of the following which will be of benefit to Sergeant Crunch: (1) provide the state with a written release from Sergeant Crunch for the \$3,500.00, (2) make satisfactory arrangements to repay the loss in installments, or (3) post a bond for the amount of the damage with the DPS.

Should Mr. Cook fail to cooperate, Sergeant Crunch can take pleasure in watching the hamburger maker walk or take the bus to work (and everywhere else). Further, recovery can be had by Sergeant Crunch through his own insurance company unless he exercised the option to refuse in writing uninsured motorist coverage, or had no collision coverage.

**\*\*A CARE** Line caller wanted to know how civilians could be given eight hours leave for giving blood without them taking administrative leave. The caller stated he thought the blood program was justified, but should be conducted on a volunteer basis. I'd like to clear up two points. First, the program was voluntary. Only 21 civilians actually donated blood. The remaining 350 were military donors. Secondly, all 21 civilians will be charged administrative leave. Existing regulations authorize up to four hours of excused or administrative leave for civilian blood donors. This also provides an option for the wing commander to grant additional leave in situations involving civic activities which the Air Force is interested in promoting within the community and for emergency conditions. This donor program was designed to increase community relations while providing the South Plains Blood Service a needed blood supply. Past commanders have authorized the national anthem not to be used during the Saturday children's matinee because the children did not respond to the anthem.

# **DEERS** reduces misuse of military's health care

The Defense Enrollment dividual will be treated anyway. Eligiblity Reporting System is scheduled to get underway at Reese in mid-June. Beginning with an initial enrollment period, DEERS is designed to reduce the misuse of the health care system.

According to Department of Defense officials, abuse of the system, as much as \$60 million per year, occurs when persons who were once eligible for medical care fail to return their identification cards to military officials when their eligibility is terminated.

These individuals continue to receive medical services and other benefits to which they are not entitled. Fraud occurs when someone else uses an identification card that has been altered or obtained illegally.

When military people or dependents seek medical services in the future from a military health facility under the DEERS system, their eligibility may be checked through a telephone/terfashion that credit card com- information. It is those inpanies validate accounts.



Since the early 1920s, when the first Air Force officers wives' club was organized, greater emphasis was placed on welfare proiects.


Along with the noncommissioned wives club and moral, welfare and recreation, times have changed and assistance to Air Force families has improved.
