## No tuition

## Congress plans school cuts

Reese parents who are concerned over proposed cuts in impact-aid payments to public schools can rest easy, according to Lubbock and Frenship Independent 'School District officials.

Impact-aid payments are federal funds historically channeled to schools with high concentrations of military dependents. Cutbacks in these funds are a portion of the Reagan economic package and have led some school districts to propose tuition charges to military families to offset the loss.
A proposal before Congress would end impact-aid payments to school districts where less than 20 percent of the enrollment is made up of service members' children. The proposal would also stop impact aid to school districts for children of service members who live in the civilian community.
J. Weldon Bennett, superintendent of schools for Frenship (where dependents of Reese Village residents attend school), assured a Roundup reporter that there were no plans to charge tuition for military dependents. He went on to express his assurance that "the money will come from somewhere."
Ronnie Gooch, assistant superintendent for business affairs for the Lubbock Independent School District, stated, "there are no plans to charge tuition for students that live inside our school district."

These reassurances came on the heels of a statement from Secretary, of Defense Caspar Weinberger assuring, "No soldier, sailor, airman or marine will be forced to pay tuition for the public school education of his or her dependents."
School districts where children of service members who live and work on an installation make up more than 20 percent of the enrollment will continue to receive impact aid at 90 percent of Fiscal 1981's level.
Assuring all military members that the matter had his close personal attention, Secretary Weinberger said, "The administration will use all available legal steps to prevent the imposition of tuition charges on military members for the public school education of their dependents. We are confident of the strength of our position.'
Action by states, counties or school districts affected by the proposed impact-aid cuts "is completely unwarranted and the Department of Defense will take every possible measure to prevent it," the secretary said.
The Department of Defense estimates that some 480,000 children receive impact-aid payments. Of these, about 150,000 children live on military installations in communities where they make up less than 20 percent of the school district enrollment. The remaining 330,000 children live and attend school in the civilian community.
An estimated 3,000 school districts could lose impact aid.

# JAG explains gambling laws

SSgt. S. Lawrence Friedman NCOIC, preventive law division Editor's note: This fictitious case is presented to famliarize readers with the Texas Penal Code provisions relating to gambling.

Captain Shiny Shekel would rather play poker than eat, drink, or chase pretty ladies. His enthusiasm impelled him to join a "friendly" game in a neighbor's house last Saturday night, and before he finally called it quits at 3 a.m., he cleaned out the opposition to the tune of $\$ 400$. One of the heaviest losers is now not so friendly and threatening to file a criminal complaint against
him for being "a professional gambler," unless he gives back the money.

You be the judge!
Did Shiny commit a criminal offense when he pocketed those greenbacks?
Section 47.02 of the Penal Code specifies that a person commits an offense if he plays and bets for money or other thing of value at any game played with cards, dice or balls; however, it is a defense to prosecution under this section that (1) the gambling occurred in a private place, (2) no person received any economic benefit other than personal earnings, and (3) except for the advantage of skill or luck, the risks
of losing and the chances of winning were the same for all participants. In short, the Penal Code outlaws all forms of gambling, including the friendly neighborhood poker game; but then it sets up a conditional defense for the "social gambler," which makes it obvious that it's aimed principally at the commercial gambler who exploits human weakness and attracts organized crime.
However, the conditions attached to the defense create a number of not-so-obvious pitfalls for the unwary or uninformed social gambler.
First, if one party gets a special cut from each pot or charges for the privilege of using his home, none of
the participants can rely on the defense.

Secondly, no matter how unob trusive the game may seem, if it is conducted in a club or other location that is only nominally private in the sense that it is generally accessible to the public, the defense is not available.
Thirdly, if a game ensures a percentage to the house or banker, regardless of the luck or skill involved, it is not a "friendly" game to which the defense applies. However, the presence and participation of a superior player, or even a professional one, who relies on skill and luck, does not reduce the defense.

## Wants to quit

 Dear HEART advises smokerEditor's Note: The Dear HEART Column will appear here from time to time. It consists of answers to questions which reflect a representative sample of those typically asked by readers.

## Dear HEART:

I am a real cigarette addict. Is there any systematic way to quit smoking? Should I try to quit all at once or should I try to cut back my cigarettes over a period of time? How do I stop myself from falling back into my old habits?

## Dear Reader:

Nicotine is not addictive, in the sense that heroin and alcohol can be. You may be surprised at the success you have in just quitting "cold turkey". However, for some people, quitting abruptly may not be the technique to use. Here's a system for retraining your body that works for almost everyone who really wants to quit.
In the first week, keep track of your cigarettes. Each day, take a sheet of plain paper. Divide it into 3 columns. In one column, rate the importance of the cigarette on a scale of 1 to 5 . For example, if you desperately needed the smoke, write " 1 ". If

you could have skipped it without too much trouble, write " 5 ". Most will fall in between. Wrap this paper around your pack with an elastic band and list each cigarette as you smoke it. At the end of the week, study the sheets and work out a plan in writing for cutting out some of the daily cigarettes in Week Two.

In Week Two, as you start cutting out some cigarettes, you'll find out what works best for you
as a substitute such as chewing gum, taking a brief walk, or eating an apple. Look at your watch and you'll find that the desire for the cigarette seldom lasts more than five minutes. Continue to keep track of the cigarettes smoked. Also this week, switch your brand twice to brands lower in tar and nicotine. Work out a plan for tapering off seriously next week, and put the plan in writing.
In Week Three, start cutting out one or more additional cigarettes each day. By this time it should not be hard. You know why you smoke, and what alternative will work for you. You'll start to feel your body learning new, non-smoking habits ... a very exhilirating feeling! Towards the end of Week Three, decide when your first day without cigarettes will be. Plan an appropriate reward for the first non-smoking day. This could be something very simple, like a ride on a friend's boat, or your choice of television programs for a whole evening. The important thing is that you don't get the reward if you don't earn it.
One day during Week Four, you'll quit. Since the next few days present a big challenge, plan to reward yourself for each of the next seven days that you don't smoke.

How many times have you heard the expressions, "It's just a routine job", or "We've done this job this way forever"? Countless, I'm sure.
Recently a simple task that had been done a certain way for almost four years resulted in a fatality to an Air Force member. He was performing a routine clean-up of a marked area that contained high voltage equipment. He had the only key to the area, was not qualified to be in the area and ignored the hazard markers. No one thought that a simple sweeping operation would be a problem. The problem was no one thought!
Apparently, the worker became distracted by a wasp and came in contact with a 13,000 volt power line.
The tragedy of this incident is that this life could and should not have been lost. The worker as well as his supervisors failed o stop, think and adhere to proper warnings and procedures.
Don't take anything for granted. The most simple, routine tasks can be just as disastrous as the most complex, hazardous job around.

$\square$ Retirement orders (DD Form 214)
$\square$ Marriage certificate
$\square$ Birth certificates for children
$\square$ Death certificate for deceased sponsor
Certified copy of court order for adoption
$\square$ Final divorce order or decree
$\square$ Copy of Court Order establishing paternity (illegitimate children)
$\square$ Statement from licensed physician or medical officer in dicating physical handicap and period of incapacity (dependent children older than age 21 who are incapacitated). If Navy or USMC dependent then parent service letter of authorization is required.
$\square$ Certificate of ineligiblity for Social Security from the Social Security Administration (dependents age 65 or older who are ineligible for Social Security).
$\square$ DD Form 1300, Report of Casualty - required for widows and surviving children.
$\square$ Certificate of enrollment from school registrar for depen dent children age 21 or older.
$\square$ ID Card number and expiration date (for each dependent). Dependents do not have to accompany the sponsor when he/she enrolls them in DEERS.

## CPR course set for weekend

"Sudden death."
It strikes in the form of heart attack, drowning, automobile accident, electric shock and a hundred other ways. By the time emergency personnel can reach those endangered by "sudden death" it is often too late. It's too late for approximately 350,000 Americans each year
But that figure can be reduced. According to Capt. Dave Fintel, Reese cardiopulmonary resuscita tion coordinator, CPR techniques, administered to the victim within 60 seconds, can substantially reduce the number of fatalities from "sudden death.
For the protection of each
family here," said Captain Fintel "it's vital that at least one person in the family is trained in CPR."
CPR training here is conducted in accordance with the national standards developed by the American Heart Association and the Red Cross.
Basic CPR instruction runs from 12-16 hours. Some of the information covered during CPR training includes: introduction to CPR, heart and lung anatomy and function, heart attacks, risk factors, measures to prevent heart attacks and what to do when a heart attack occurs.
The course also features train ing in one-person CPR, two
person CPR, clearing obstructed airway, how to handle a conscious or unconscious victim and CPR for infants.
There are several options available to Reese personnel interested in enrolling in a certified CPR course. The two main points of contact are the Lubbock chapters of the American Heart Association and the Reart Association and the Red Cross Basic and refresher courses are Reese, however thersonnel on Reese, however, the courses are filled rapidly by those having duty requirements that call for CPR training.

What we need at Reese to provide more CPR courses for the
ntire family are more instruc tors," said Captain Fintel. "If we can get enough certified instructors we will be able to expand our CPR program on base."

To become an instructor, in dividuals must complete both the basic CPR course within the last year and attend a recognized in structor course. An instructo course is being offered here Saturday and Sunday.

To enroll in the instructor program Reese personnel should contact the unit training NCO. For more information about the course, contact Captain Fintel or SSgt. Fred Pepper at Ext. 3186.

## MX cancels 'shoot or lose' option

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas decade and the increasing (AFNS) - The M-X is designed to vulnerability of America's 1,054 ensure the United States never land-based intercontinental faces a "shoot or lose" choice in a nuclear confrontation, Brig. Gen. James P. McCarthy, Air Force special assistant for $\mathrm{M}-\mathrm{X}$ matters, told reporters here.
"What we're looking for is confidence in our own military forces so we can back away and recognize in a crisis situation that even if an adversary were foolish enough to launch an attack on this country, that we still have sufficient time to respond in a rational way, doing so to minimize our damage and avoid further escalation,' the general said.

He said the major reasons for having the M-X are the Soviet
arms buildup over the past
ballistic missiles.
"The current M-X program of 4,600 shelters and 200 missiles is designed to meet the projected Soviet threat. If that threat does not materialize, then obviously we could scale it down. If the threat grows, then we would res threat grows, then we would res pond. And M-X multiple protec tion shelters are one of those
responses." responses.
Present plans call for deploying the M-X ballistic missile system in Utah/Nevada and possibly New Mexico/Texas. Construction should begin in 1982 and the system be completed as planned in 1989.
Asked about alternatives to
the M-X, General McCarthy said the Air Force has studied 35 different systems over the past 20 years and the $M-X$ was selected as the best answer to America's projected needs.
"The thing is that they (the other systems) have some drawbacks. In many cases the drawback is simply cost."
He said the M-X basing system is the most inexpensive, most accurate system that could be produced.
Responding to questions on the wisdom of waiting until after an attack before reacting, the general said that as a system that can survive a first strike, the M-X allows the United States to M -X a "shoot or lose" situation.
