WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Tidal W. McCoy has been sworn in as the assistant secretary of the Air Force for manpower, reserve affairs and installations by Secretary of the Air Force Verne Orr.

McCoy will oversee Air Force personnel plans, policies and programs; air reserve forces and operations of the service's installations worldwide.

A former assistant for national security affirs with Senator Jake Garn, McCoy is a 1967 graduate of the U.S. Military Academy, West Point, N.Y. After service as a field artillery officer, his assignments have included work with the Defense Intelligence Agency, National Security Agency, Central Intelligence Agency, the National Security Council and as staff assistant in the offices of five secretaries of defense.

Bill promises substantial raise

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — An increase in basic pay is a key feature in the Uniformed Services Pay and Benefits Act of 1981 as approved by the Senate Armed Services Committee.

The Senate bill would target raises in basic pay from 9 to 18 percent for officers and 7 to 22 percent for enlisted people. It would also increase the basic allowance for quarters by 17 percent for E-5's through E-9's and by 14.3 percent for all others.

The bill would provide a 30- to 35-percent increase in aviation career incentive pay for officers with six to 25 years of service, authorize the incentive pay for officers with more than 25 years of service who are below the grade of 0-7 and who perform operational flying duties and increase minimum enlisted flying pay to \$83.

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The bill must now be considered by the full Senate. Differences between the House- and Senate-approved bills would be resolved in conference. Other features of the Senate Armed Services Committee version include:

- Suspend the President's authority to reallocate 25 percent of the basic pay increase by

grade and years of service or into quarters or separate rations allowances.

- Terminate the present authority to pay members' travel allowances to home of record or separation or release from active duty if the travel is not actually taken.

- Authorize four days temporary lodging expenses for permanent-change-of-station moves not to exceed \$110 per day per family. This would include \$50 per day without dependents or \$37.90 per day for the member and \$25 per day for each dependent.

- Authorize advance payment of any applicable dependent travel, dislocation or evacuation allowances.

- Authorize exception to the 180-day storage limitation to protect members from personal liability for storage costs incurred because of duty requirements such as protracted deployments.

- Authorize reimbursement for travel from the old duty station to the port of vehicle embarkation and from the port of vehicle debarkation to the new permanent duty station.


- Authorize members serving consecutive

overseas tours at the same remote location to receive travel and transportation entitlements to their home of record or place of family residence between tours. If the member is denied leave for military necessity, the bill authorizes travel and transportation allowances after arrival at new duty station or after commencing in-place remote tour.

- Authorize funded commercial transportation, if government transportation is not available, for members and their dependents serving in austere overseas locations to a location offering respite from the adverse conditions. The authorization would be for one round trip during any continuous two-year tour and two round trips during any three-year tour.

- Provide round-trip travel entitlement in the event of serious illness, death or imminent death of a close relative. This would only be authorized if government transportation is not available and is only authorized to a stateside port of entry.

- Authorize travel and transportation for members on temporary duty to their permanent stations in the event of the serious illness, injury or death of a dependent.

HEART offers recipes for health

Editor's note: Reese's Health Evaluation and Risk Tabulation program offers these recipes for those interested in improving their diets.

Oriental Eating

Japanese and Chinese have almost no heart disease, and the reason is their diet. The typical Japanese diet emphasizes fish, vegetables, rice, and vegetable oils with very little animal fat. It is the perfect HEART-healthy diet.

Oriental foods are prepared different from western foods. They are first sliced or chopped into small pieces, and usually cooked very quickly right before serving. Special ingredients, like bean curd (tofu), ginger root, or Bok Choy, are available at Oriental groceries.

CHICKEN WITH GREEN PEPPERS (Serves four)

2 cups diced chicken meat (breasts and thighs of one 3 lb. chicken)
3 tsps. cornstarch
1 tsp. dry sherry
4 tbsps. vegetable oil
1 clove garlic, peeled and crushed
¹/₂ cup bamboo shoots, diced
¹/₂ cup water chestnuts, diced
2 medium green peppers, diced
TO PREPARE: Mix chicken meat with 1 tsp.

TO PREPARE: Mix chicken meat with 1 tsp. cornstarch and sherry. Set aside. Mix 2 tsps. cornstarch in 5 tbsps. cold water and set aside. Pour oil in hot pan and cook garlic and chicken meat, stirring, about 2 minutes. Add water chestnuts, bamboo shoots, stirring about one minute, then stir in green pepper. Stir cornstarch and water mixture and add, stirring until gravy thickens. Serve immediately.

electric pan. Add mushrooms and onion and cook until slightly limp. Add 1 tbsp. of the soy saucewater-sugar mixture and the celery and Bok Choy or spinach. Add a little more soy sauce mixture, stirring. Add cabbage, water chestnuts, and scallions. Cook, stirring, for 3-5 minutes, adding more soy mixture as needed to keep the vegetables moist. Add the bean sprouts and soy bean curd and heat through.

VARIATION: 1 lb. of chicken may be cut into thin slices, sprinkled with sherry, and added to hot oil with the mushrooms and onions.

1 tbsp. vegetable oil

¹/₂ cup dry white wine for cooking

TO PREPARE: Pound the veal slices lightly with a meat mallet or the edge of a heavy plate. Cover each veal slice with a slice of ham and sprinkle with sage. Roll up the slices and secure with wooden toothpicks.

Heat the vegetable oil in a non-stick skillet, then brown the veal rolls well on all sides. Pour in the wine, bringing it to a boil. Lower the heat and simmer until most of the wine is evaporated. When the wine has nearly evaporated, the rolls are ready to serve.

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GREEN SAUCE FOR SPAGHETTI (Serves four to six)

2 cups spinach leaves (washed, but not dried, and packed firmly)

¹/₂ cup fresh parsley leaves (washed, but not dried, and packed firmly)

- 2 garlic cloves
- ¹/₂ cup polyunsaturated margarine
- ¹/₄ cup olive oil
- ¹/₂ cup pine nuts
- ¹/₄ cup walnut meat
- ¹/₂ cup freshly grated Romano cheese
- ¹/₂ cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 tsp. dried basil

TO PREPARE: Combine all ingredients in a blender. Blend on high speed until mixture is almost pureed, but still has flecks of spinach and parsley. If too thick, add a small amount of water.

Italian Specialties

Along with the Japanese, people who eat Mediterranean-style diets have the least heart disease in the world. This is because, for example, Italians eat lots of pasta and olive oil, but very little meat and butter. When the Italians do eat meat, it is usually veal or fish, which are very low in saturated fat.

These recipes are characteristic of Italian cuisine — flavorful, unusual, and healthful.

HAM AND VEAL ROLLS (SALTIMBOCCA) (Serves four)

1 lb. lean veal round, cut into 8 even slices 8 slices cooked or boiled ham, thinly sliced ¹/₂ tsp. crumbled leaf sage heat from the spaghetti warms the sauce.

WHITE CLAM SAUCE (Serves four to six) ¹/4 cup polyunsaturated margarine 1 clove garlic, minced 2 tbsps. flour 2 cups clam juice ¹/4 cup chopped parsley freshly ground fresh pepper, to taste

1¹/₂ tsps. dried thyme 2 cups minced clams, fresh or canned

TO PREPARE: In a saucepan, cook the garlic in the margarine for 1 minute over moderate heat. With a wire whisk, stir in the flour and clam juice.

Add the parsley, pepper and thyme; simmer gently for 10 minutes. Add minced clams and heat through. Serve over linguini or spaghetti.

President proclaims POW/MIA observance

WASHINGTON (AFNS)-President Ronald Reagan has proclaimed July 17 as National POW/MIA Recognition Day.

"Throughout American history our prisoners of war have been called upon to make uncommon sacrifices," the President said. "In fulfilling their duty as citizens of the United States they have defended American ideals while suffering unimaginable indignities under the absolute control of the enemy."


He urged all Americans to join in honoring those who made the uncommon sacrifice of being held captive in war. "Honor, as well, their lvoed ones who have also

suffered valiantly and patiently." President Reagan said.

He said, "The pain and bitterness of war endure for their families, relatives and friends-and for all of us."

During this century, more than 140,000 Americans were taken prisoner during wars, with some 17,000 dying in captivity. Some 700 Americans were taken prisoner during the Vietnam War and more than 100 died while imprisoned. Of that 700, more than 350 were Air Force people.

The president stated that the search for answers about the fate of POWs and MIAs will continue.



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'When two vehicles reach an intersection at the same time, the one on the right has the right of way." Right then I know that he and I are not talking the same language. He hasn't learned the basic principle of the right of way law. Strange that with all the discussion about it so few people take the time to read the law. Let's start reading it together. My copy goes like this. "When two vehicles enter an interesction from different highways at the same time, the driveof the vehicle on the left shall yield the right of way to the vehicle on the right." That's quite different from what most people say. In one case the law says the one on the left shall yield and in the other the driver says the right has the right of way. Let's get this one point firmly imbedded between our ears. The Law Never Gives The Right of Way to Anyone. The law only says who shall vield and places a penalty on the driver who fails to do so. You may have him arrested-if you are still alive after the crash-but don't make the silly mistake of thinking the law has given you the right of way.

There is another little joke about this law that many don't suspect until it is too late. If you have a crash and there is a dispute over responsibility for the accident do you think the judge or jury will decide it on the basis of whom the law said should yield? Oh, no! It will be decided according to the "doctrine of the last clear chance." In other words, that driver is responsible who, in the opinion of the court, had the last clear chance to avoid the ac-

The only person who can give you the right of way is the other driver. Until he does so you haven't got it. I have read dozens and dozens of accident reports which start with, "I had the right of way," and I've seen several near fights between drives involved in accidents in which each driver claimed he had the right of way.

When you come to think of it, its rather plan to see, isn't it, that neither one had the right of way, for, if either one had, there would have been no accident. You can mark this down as truth: In every case of vehicle collision neither driver *had* the right of way, although one or both may claim it. With this knowledge of right of way a new light cident and failed to do so. How do you feel about right of way now?

There is only one safe rule to determine when the other fellow should yield. Assume that he has the right of way and yield to him unless you are sure that he is yielding it to you.

Another mistaken belief about the right of way law is that on a preferential street or road you have the right of way over all entering traffic. Here, again, it is well to read the law which says:

"The driver of a vehicle shall stop as required by this act at the entrance to a through highway and shall yield the right of way to other vehicles which have entered the intersection from said through highway or which are approaching so closely on said highway as to constitute an immediate hazard, but said driver having so yielded may proceed and the drivers of all other vehicles approaching the intersection on said through highway shall yield the right of way to the vehicle so proceeding into or across the through highway."

This may cramp your style just a bit. It definitely puts part of the burden for safe operation on you. If you want to avoid accidents—and who doesn't—then you must be prepared at all times to yield even when it's your turn. Then, when you are safely through the intersection, and only then, can you say, "I had the right of way."



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

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
