Air Force supports **14.3 raise**

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS)- The administration and the Air Force strongly support a 14.3 percent across-theboard pay increase for October such as the one recently approved by the House Armed Services Committee, according to Tidal W. McCoy, assistant secretary of the Air Force for manpower, reserve affairs and installations.

The House Committee measure was introduced by Rep. Bill Nichols (D-Ala) and is equivalent to the administration's original proposal of a 5.3-percent July "catch-up" raise followed by a 9.1-percent October raise.

Meanwhile, the Senate Armed Services Committee has approved a "targeted" pay package which among other points, provides for a 7-to 22-percent pay hike, depending on rank and years of service. The administration, however, favors the across-the-board raise with any targeting done through the President's current authority to reallocate up to 25 percent of the pay raise, Mr. McCoy said.

Talking about personnel matters concerning the Air Force, Mr. McCoy felt too many people in Washington approach a problem from a peacetime standpoint or a military-at-war standpoint.

Looking at the recent U.S. Supreme Court decision stating that employers have no obligation by law to change a work schedule to accommodate an employee in the guard or reserve, Mr. McCoy said it was significant that the narrow situation in that particular case made it atypical and so limited that it should not adversely affect the reserve program. If it is found to have wider implications, Mr. McCoy said he would make legislation addressing the matter a top priority. Speaking about increasing the number of women in the Air Force, Mr. McCoy said the Air Force presently operates on a type of "free-market economy. Women, like men, are treated on a first-come, firstserved basis.

Cadets view Air Force life

For the past few months Reese personnel have noticed many new faces wearing uniforms that seem to be out of 35-10.

The uniforms are well within regulation since the young troops wearing them are Air Force Academy cadets, participating in training programs known as Operation Non-Com and Operation Air Force.

The programs offer lower and upper classmen from the academy a chance to observe and participate in the world of an enlisted persons's work day.

For three weeks the cadets eat, live, sleep and, most important of all, work along with first term airmen and NCOs. So far in the past nine

weeks 31 cadets have had a chance to learn about the important mission and responsibility of enlisted personnel.

Cadet David T. Norton from Elyria, Ohio, had never experienced military life beyond the borders of the Academy. Norton, like many other cadets, feels the program helps to introduce the cadet to military life and has acquainted him with ideas of enlisted personnel.

As a future officer it is very important to know what enlisted personnel go through. "I feel the program has helped myself and other cadets to learn leadership from the other side."

Cadets are treated as noncommissioned personnel throughout the three week stay while they work side by side with the airmen.

"I have learned to listen and ask questions about the jobs and learn from the airmen. I feel when I become a second lieutenant I will have already established respect for enlisted personnel, no matter if they are first termers or have been in for 20 years. I feel I will be able to work along side them and learn as well as be in command."

Each cadet is sent to three squadrons during the three week stay. .

So far, Cadet Norton has completed training in the communications squadron and is presently working with jet engines in the field maintenance squadron. Next week he will be transferred to organizational maintenance, completing the final week of training.

Promotion system highlights DOPMA

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS)- One of the key features of grade changed to major with a May 4, 1981, date of rank.

changed to agree with the temporary grade and date of rank.

the Defense Officer Personnel Management Act is the single promotion system, which becomes effective Sept. 15, 1981. Although most reserve officers should note few changes in the promotion area, some actions are required to transition from the dual temporary and permanent systems to the new one.

Reserve officers serving in a temporary grade higher than their permanent grade will have their permanent grade and date of rank adjusted to coincide with their temporary grade and date of rank Sept. 15, 1981, or as soon thereafter as Senate confirmation is obtained.

For example, a temporary major with a May 4, 1981, date of rank holding the permanent grade of captain, will have his or her permanent

If the individual is a temporary major and holds the rank of permanent major under the Reserve Officer Personnel Act system, the permanent grade and date of rank will be adjusted to agree with the temporary grade and date of rank.

A temporary captain holding a ROPA permanent grade of major will continue to serve on active duty as a temporary captain and will continue to be eligible for active-duty promotion to major. This officer will still be able to retire in the grade of major, even if not selected for major on active duty.

Captains on the selection list for temporary major will assume the rank of major on the effective date of the promotion, and the permanent grade and date of rank will then be

Captains who have once failed selection for temporary major will meet the next scheduled major selection board. If they are not selected by that board, they will be retired-if eligible-separated or continued on active duty to meet Air Force needs.

Reserve captains once failed for promotion to permanent ROPA major will meet the next scheduled ROPA major board. If selected for permanent promotion by the second board, the officer will be continued on active duty and remain eligible for active-duty promotion.

However, the officer will not be eligible to retire in the higher reserve grade unless subsequently selected for active-duty promotion See page four

Entertainment is the first part of a three part series informing base personnel about all activities, services and sports available for dependents, airmen and officers. Look for it on page six.



Land investment requires caution

Home ownership can be an excellent way for service members to stay ahead in the financial race during periods of double-digit inflation. However, it can present problems, especially when it comes time to sell the home for a PCS move.

One serious problem involves investors who buy homes from departing service members by assuming the seller's obligations under the mortgage. Because he or she is often in a hurry to sell, the service member is inclined to ask for less equity than normal in order to close a deal quickly.

The only cash involved may be a small fee for drafting the assumption warranty deed. That deed is the only document in the transaction since the service member often neglects to negotiate a release under the mortgage or to take a second mortgage from the buyer.

If the buyer defaults under these circumstances, the service member remains liable to make payments under the terms of the mortgage and cannot automatically regain possession from the defaulting buyer.

In some cases, the investor-buyer is more interested in reselling the home for a quick profit than in assuming the seller's payments. The incentive to gamble for a quick profit is strong because the risk actually remains with the seller, rather than the investor, if the house fails to sell quickly.

The risk remains with the seller for several reasons. First, the seller remains liable under the mortgages to continue payments if the buyer defaults.

Second, the buyer has no investment in the property to lose upon default because no equity payment has been made to the seller.

Third, since it ordinarily takes five or six months after default before a mortgage is foreclosed, the buyer can continue efforts to resell the house during this period. In the meantime, of course, no payments are being made on the mortgage.

Finally, since the seller has often left town, he or she is often in no position to retake possession when the buyer defaults.

So what happens when the buyer defaults and the seller cannot resume payments? The mortgage company forecloses and the home is sold at public auction.

If the house is auctioned for less than the amount owed on the note, the seller is liable for the difference. Even if the house is sold for the amount of the note, the seller is still liable for any monthly payments in default, attorney's fees and expenses of the sale. This could easily run \$3,000 to \$4,000 on a \$50,000 home.

Persons considering selling their homes can avoid some problems by considering the following:

• Don't wait until the last minute to sell your home. Try to put it on the market six months before your departure date.

• If the buyer does not intend to live in the house, check his financial reliability and business record.

• If the buyer is assuming liability under your note instead of refinancing, try to get as much cash as possible for your equity.

• Try to get a release under the existing mortgage, or at least the right of re-entry upon default without suing for eviction.

• Have the transaction reviewed by an attorney before signing anything.

Home seller holds disadvantage

A desire for relief from the 8-to-5 treadmill and the humdrum of daily life, heightened by a nationwide fear of population explosion, is causing many consumers to join the "Great of backing up their claims. It is sometimes difficult for an individual interested in buying such land to know whether they're getting a good deal, or not.

It is always a good idea to view any land development in which you're contemplating making a roads, sewer lines, electricity, and water going to be installed? If the promises are about specific improvements, ask the developer to commit to a specific date by which the work will be completed and have that information incorporated into the contract.

land. But, that piece of paper is not a guarantee of the advertising claims made.

Finally, legitimate developers usually will allow you time to think over the purchase, investigate claims, and show the contract to your attorney. Don't succumb to high-pressure sales tactics when purchasing land. Be skeptical when someone urges you to buy immediately because "this property will never again be offered at this low price."

American Land Rush."

Aware that most of us inherited our pioneer ancestors' dream of a plot of land to call our own, where the grass is greener and the air is sweeter, many legitimate developers have had the vision to prepare places where those dreams can be purchased with a down payment. Texas can be proud of the many fine developers in this state who are providing for the increased recreational needs of our members with real quality developments tailored to fit a variety of desires and checkbooks.

But there also are those unscrupulous speculators who are advertising the stuff which dreams are made of, without any intention sizeable investment. If it's worth several thousand dollars of your money, it's worth the extra cash and time it would take to see it personally.

If you want to buy land for a home or as an investment, check the soundness of the deal. All land is not necessarily going to increase in value. Find out exactly what facilities are going to be part of the development. If a promoter says he's planning "a plush resort that will cater to every recreational interest," pin him down. Does that mean an 18-hole golf course, or just a putting green? Will the "beautiful free-form pool" promised be olympic sized, or will the finished product be a children's wading pond? Are

Also, check for resale value of the land. Is there already an established market for lots in that tract? Or, will the developer buy back your lot if you decide to sell later? Talk to longtime residents in the area for their view of the development. Ask to see the property report. Since passage of the Interstate Land Sales Act, developrs of tracts of more than 50 subdivided lots that are promoted as a unit must file a property report with the Department of Housing and Urban Development. This report gives the exact location of the land, clearly outlines the method of financing to be used, tells how much money is backing the project, and discloses whether or not the promoter actually has clear title to the

It's good to have a dream. It's even better to make your dream come true. But, be as certain as you can that it is a dream-not a nightmare.

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
