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So what is it that makes an already busy airman give up his or her time to become an ambassador for the Air Force? Perhaps Strategic Air Command summed it up best when it began using the phrase "Professional Results In Daily Endeavor, PRIDE."

PRIDE in the service they represent, PRIDE in their comrades whose funerals they travel hundreds of miles to attend and PRIDE in the country they honor at dozens of parades and retreat ceremonies each year. But, more than that, it is PRIDE in themselves as professional performers.

Other benefits of being an honor guard member include basic allowance for subsistence (which doesn't benefit those who are married), relief from certain additional details and the wing commander's endorsement on performance reports. It's easy enough to see that these benefits alone don't make up for the time and effort put into the additional duty.

Second Lt. Kevin D. Illsley, coordinator for the honor guard, explained a system of recognition for team members. Aiguillettes, or shoulder ropes, in differing colors are given to members corresponding to the number of details or the number of years they have belonged to the honor guard.

Beginners wear a solid white aiguillette, which is changed to a braided blue and white rope after completion of the 10th detail or first year. After two years or twenty details a blue

Village residents fail to heed sirens

Here's a little weather quiz.

If you hear a three-to-five minute steady tone on the base siren it means:

- A. Somebody set their coffee cup down on the button.
- B. A steamboat is docking on the reclamation lake.
- C. 'It is an invitation to go outside and look at the funny cloud formations.
- D. None of the above.

If you picked answers A-C, and you liked the Wizard of Oz, you're in luck, because you may be the next visitor to Munchkinland.

A three-to-five minute steady tone is an indication that a tornado has been sighted in the vicinity of the base. When the sirens went off last week however, it may as well have been a steamboat docking, because several base housing residents turned out to see it. The proper response would have been to take cover and wait for the all-clear.

Although the "tornado season" generally runs from late spring through early summer, the South Plains have been victim of the vicious storms at all times of year, and residents should be ready for them year round. The tornado is the most common weather-connected disaster. The violent, whirling winds have been reported in all fifty states (witness the recent Denver tornadoes, an area historically free from such disasters) but are most common in the mid-and southwest.

The U.S. Weather Bureau has designated two stages of warnings for tornadoes. The first is a tornado watch, which means meterological conditions are right for the formation of the storms. Local television and radio stations will broadcast instructions periodically when a watch is in progress. It is a good idea to keep a battery-operated radio handy, since the violent weather associated with the twisters often knocks out electrical power.

A tornado warning is the second stage. This means take cover immediately, a tornado has been sighted in the area. Go immediately to a designated shelter area, usually an interior hallway on a lower floor. Avoid structures with wide, free-span roofs.

If caught outside, move away from the tornado at right angles. If there is no time, take cover in the nearest ditch or depression.

Rmember, if you are caught unawares in a tornado, there isn't always a witch handy to break your fall.

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

First, I want to say that I am glad to know how many Reese personnel have become more aware of the importance of water conservation.


We are beginning to use our water more efficiently and, whenever possible, it is always best to irrigate an area and water it thoroughly, not sprinkle it daily. It is even better when this can be done at night to reduce the evaporation process. We have been using this technique recently and we are beginning to see the savings.

We do most of our heavy watering at night. This virtually eliminates any evaporation and allows sufficient time for the water to thoroughly saturate the area being watered. Occasionally there may be some run off.

It must be pointed out however that the water that collects in the swale is far less than that which would evaporate if we watered for the same length of time during the day. Also, any runoff from the base is then used again by pumping it out of the lake and irrigating the golf course. Your concern is appreciated and I ask all Reese personnel to keep up the good work in conserving water.

A CARE LINE CALLER from the fire department wanted to know if wear of the corafam shoe was authorized while wearing the utility uniform. In AFR 35-10, 2-2 Col 'C', it states that the utility uniform shoe will be laced with plain toe or plain capped toe, smooth cowhide leather or scotch grain leather. Since corafams are not leather, they do not qualify for wear with fatigues.



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



CHAMPUS amends definition

The Department of Defense has amended the definition of medical emergency in the CHAM-PUS regulation to include

emergency maternity inpatient care.

This action corrects a "catch 22" situation which has prevented some eligible women from obtaining CHAMPUS inpatient maternity coverage for emergencies associated with their pregnancies.

John H. Moxley III, M.D., Assistant Secretary of Defense (Health Affairs) explained that through an oversight, the current **CHAMPUS** definition of medical emergency omitted any reference to maternity care. The amendment clarifies CHAMPUS policy on this point and establishes that a nonavailability statement is not required for maternity-related inpatient care when the care meets the definition of a medical emergency.

Dr. Moxley stated, "As with any other emergency, in the case she believes could qualify as an emergency should resubmit the claim(s). Such claims should be sent to the CHAMPUS Fiscal Intermediary serving the area where the admission occurred, with a request that the case be reopened and reviewed.

Due to the retroactive nature of this policy clarification, the filing deadline on such claims is extended to 31 December 1981. The deadline on claims for care received in 1981 is 31 December 1982.

When filing a CHAMPUS claim for emergency care (whether maternity or other) beneficiaries are advised to -

• provide as much detail as possible about the circumstances of the emergency and

• obtain a statement from the attending physician telling why immediate hospitalization was re-

of pregnancy a medical emergen cy must involve a sudden and unexpected medical complication which puts the mother, or baby, or both, at risk."

Examples of medical emergencies related to pregnancy include, but are not limited to, hemorrhage, ruptured membrane with prolapsed cord, shock, unconsciousness, heart attack, stroke and injury (as from an automobile accident). Pain alone would not qualify a maternity case as an emergency, nor would insipient birth after the 34th week of gestation unless an otherwise qualifying medical complication is present.

The policy clarification concerning emergency maternity admissions is retroactive to 1 June 1977, the date the current regulation was implemented. Therefore, any beneficiary who has been denied CHAMPUS benefits for a maternity admission which occurred during this period and which ty.

quired and why the patient could not be transported to the nearest Uniformed Service hospital. If the emergency involves a maternity case, the physician's statement must include a certification that he/she had not been seeing the patient during her pregnancy.

Falsifying information on a claim form (such as a fraudulent residence address) in order to circumvent the 40-mile rule applicable to nonavailability statements not involving an emergency is considered to be fraud. Such actions will, at a minimum, result in the government recovering any payments made on such a claim.




In fact, registration for the 1981-82 school year for Reese students is Monday from 8:30-11:30 a.m. The first full day of school will be Wednesday.

Bus 11 will turn right on Andrews off War Highway and proceed to Yount, where it will turn right. From there it will go to Harmon and turn left, continuing to Mitchell and turning right. Bus 11 will then return to War Highway.

Bus 16 will turn right on Mitchell from War Highway, then right again on McGuire. It will travel down McGuire to 4th St. and proceed to the school.





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

Under the budget proposal, 101 aircraft will be added to the active inventory, bringing the total to 6,479 planes. Most of the additions would be F-15 and F-16 fighters and A-10 attack aircraft.

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The flying hour program would increase by 113,000 hours. Basic flight training hours and tactical fighter activities would benefit most from the increase.

"If inflation does not significantly exceed the rates reflected in the budget, we will achieve important improvements in readiness," General Murray told the subcommittee.

Senior NCOs need school record update

and senior master sergeants should update their education records well in advance before the Dec. 31 promotion board cutoff, remind Community College of the Air Force officials.

Persons who have completed an additional 30 semester hours of college study since their education records were last updated can increase their academic education level by one year. This includes credit earned through CCAF.

The college will issue transcripts on request for promotion records, but members are asked not to wait until the last minute to make that request.

Those individuals wishing to update their student records with additional military course completions or CLEP/DANTES examinations should forward them to CCAF by Nov. 1. New credits


(ATCNS) - Master sergeants reported before that date will be posted to CCAF transcripts so that individuals' personnel records can be updated before the Dec. 31 cutoff date.

Most Air Force course completions are automatically fed into the CCAF computer banks, but CCAF internship credit for onthe-job training can be awarded only to registered students.

The college awards credit for internship based on successful progression to each skill level. Four semester hours can be earned for each skill upgrade completed. Registration requires just a trip to the local education services center.

Nevertheless, many NCOs have not taken advantage of this benefit, college officials reported. About 48 percent of eligible master sergeants and 33 percent of the E-8s remain unregistered with CCAF.


