# Vice president visits Reese

The Vice President of the United States, George H. Bush, will be visiting Lubbock Nov. 13 to address the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce's annual membership banquet.

He is tentatively scheduled to arrive at Reese aboard Air Force II in the 4-5 p.m. time frame. A formal welcoming is scheduled to take place immediately upon his arrival in front of base operations, building 79.

Formal greeting ceremonies will include a VIP

welcoming party made up of Gen. Thomas M. Ryan, commander of Air Training Command; Col. Monte Montgomery, Lubbock Mayor Bill McAlister, Chamber of Commerce president Joe Horkey and other civilian dignitaries.

Music for the occasion will be provided by the U.S. Air Force's "Band of the West" from Lackland AFB, Texas. The Reese Honor Guard will also participate in the welcoming ceremony.

All Reese personnel and their dependents who wish to welcome Mr. Bush as he arrives may do so

by joining in the official welcoming ceremonies in front of base ops. Small American flags will be made available to spectators at base ops.

The Vice President will leave Reese shortly after the welcoming ceremonies end to attend several functions in downtown Lubbock. As his official party departs the base, they are scheduled to pass through a cordon of Reese personnel in duty uniforms. These personnel will be holding state flags, and Reese squadron guidons and campaign flags.

# Credit card could protect consumer

Using a credit card to pay for auto repairs can protect you from losing money on faulty or unnecessary repairs.

Suppose you take your car to a mechanic because of a noise in the power steering. The shop does a rack-and-pinion overhaul. You pay the bill, \$180, with your credit card. The next day the noise is back. Another mechanic looks at your car and finds that the real problem lies with the power steering pump. That will cost another \$125

If you had paid the bill in cash or by check and had run into trouble negotiating a fair price adjustment with the repair shop, you would be in trouble. Your cash would be gone, or it would be too late to stop payment on a check. You would have to sue to recover losses.

Payment with a credit card can not only give you extra time but it is an effective tool for negotiating with the repair shop.

Federal law says that if you have a problem with goods or services purchased with a credit card, you have the same legal rights against the credit card issuer as you have against the repair shop. If you have the right under state law to withhold payment from the repair shop for sloppy or incorrect repairs, you also have the right to refuse to pay the credit card company.

The credit card company cannot charge an interest or penalty fee. You may withhold payment only for the amount in question at the time you first notified the repair shop of the dispute.

To exercise this right, you must first try to correct the problem with the repair shop. Also, unless the card issuer owns or operates the repair shop, (This might be true if your car is repaired at a gas station and you used a gas credit card) two other conditions must be met. The shop must be in your home state or, if not in your state, within 100 miles of your current address. The cost of repairs must exceed \$50.

Should you decide not to pay, send a letter by certified mail with a return receipt requested to the credit card company and to the repair shop. Include the date of repair, the credit card and account number used, why the service was unsatisfactory, and what you want in settlement of the dispute.

An incident like this might sway the credit card company or the repair shop to make a "bad mark"

on your credit record. The Fair Credit Reporting Act allows you to obtain information on your credit file and to challenge any part of your record that you feel is incorrect. Disputed information must be reinvestigated by the credit

If reinvestigation doesn't clarify questionable information, you still have the right to have your side of the story added to your file. If you file a dispute statement with the credit bureau, make sure it says that the dispute was a "good-faith exercise of your rights under the Consumer Credit Protection Act."

Under the Equal Credit Opportunity Act, your credit card account cannot be closed, nor can you be denied further credit because you exercised your credit rights.

If in doubt about your credit rights or how to proceed without endangering your credit record, see your legal assistance office.

# SPs push vehicle deregistration

How about a travelling traffic ticket to go along with your travel pay when you have a permanent change of station? It's very easy. Simply fail to deregister your privately owned vehicles at pass and registration.

Most military people and civilian employees on base know they are required to register their POVs at pass and registration to enter the base. Although we don't have much of a problem with registration of vehicles, deregistration has become a nightmare. People are going PCS, selling, trading or salvaging vehicles and failing to deregister them as required.

Those going PCS stateside are required to remove the Reese AFB portion of the decal and

surrender it to pass and registration. Those going PCS overseas are required to turn in both the Reese AFB decal and the DOD registered vehicle decal. Failure to follow these requirements will result in a traffic ticket being forwarded to your gaining commander.

When you sell, trade, or salvage a vehicle, both decals must be turned in to pass and registration. The same applies if you replace the vehicle's bumper. If you fail to do so, you will not be allowed to register any other vehicles and will be issued a ticket.

If you feel the requirement to personally turn in the decals of a vehicle you sell or trade is a bit ridiculous, ask yourself this question, "Do I want someone driving around in a vehicle with decals that can be traced to me?"

Civilian employees are required to turn in both decals when retiring or terminating employment. Tickets can be issued if this is not done. Military personnel retiring and remaining in the local area could be allowed to retain their vehicle decals. They should clear through pass and registration so their registration records can be updated and a decision made on retention of decals. Decisions are based on individual circumstances. Those retiring and leaving the local area must turn in all vehicle decals.

Also, any change in vehicle license plate numbers, vehicle description, or organization of assignment must be reported to pass and registration. Questions pertaining to vehicle registration or deregistration should be directed to pass and registration in building T-1, Ext. 3742.

One night while driving home, you observe a disturbance in the street ahead. Upon nearing the disturbance, you observe a mass of people milling about, a cascade of flashing lights, sirens wailing in the night, and medical personnel scurrying around.

As you draw nearer to the disturbance, you observe a stopped automobile with a slightly familiar bicycle laying underneath it. Taking a brief glance, you do not recognize the bicycle. Hoping that no one was seriously injured, you continue on your way to your quarters. Upon arriving at your quarters, you see a Security Police Officer talking to your babysitter. Then it hits you! The bicycle belongs to your child.

This could be the scene if you do not practice bicycle safety. It is each parent's responsibility to insure that their children are aware of bicycle safety before they are allowed to ride their bicycles.

Two of the major concerns pertaining to bicycle safety are the use of required safety equipment and obeying the rules of the road. A wing regulation tells us, "Every person riding a bicycle upon a roadway or parking lot shall be subject to all the rules of the road applicable to a driver of a motor vehicle..." This

the same rules of the road as a motor vehicle operator and are subject to the same consequences if they violate the law.

Pertaining to safety equipment, means that bicycle riders must obey from a distance of at least 500 feet to the front and with a red reflector on the rear which shall be visible from 300 feet to the rear...' In addition to the lights, no person shall operate a bicycle unless it is equipped with a bell or other device capable of giving a signal audible for a distance of at least 100 feet. Remember, parents, protect your children! Don't ride bicycles or allow your children to unless you both know the consequences. Should you desire additional information concerning bicycle equipment or bicycle safety, contact the

Our goal remains the same as during previous years - to make his a fatality free holiday. This goal can be achieved only with the 100% dedication of 100% of the people.

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

Some of the most common misuses are: personnel with meal cards are purchasing food for other personnel on separate rations, food has been taken out of the facility and stockpiled in personal rooms or given to others, some are eating food in line and not paying for it, personnel not on duty have been eating at midnight meals and personnel are not wearing uniforms during the midnight meal. In addition, personnel using the facility are to show proper identification and to dress properly in accordance with current directives.

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# VHA rates change

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -Fiscal 1982 variable housing Can I receive VHA? allowance rates were included in were increased while others were reduced or remained unchanged. The following questions and answers may help members understand the new rates.

Question: What is the variable housing allowance?

Answer: The variable housing allowance is authorized to help members entitled to basic allowance for quarters defray housing costs if government quarters are not assigned. This applies when the military member is assigned in the United States - excluding Alaska and Hawaii - where the average housing costs exceed the allowance by at least 15 percent or when the member is on an unaccompanied overseas tour and the family resides in a stateside location where the average housing cost exceeds the allowance by at least 15 percent.

Q: How are the rates determined for VHA?

A: They are based on a statistical survey of housing costs conducted by the Department of Defense. They are in effect for one year.

Q: Will VHA go up in the future?

A: Not necessarilym Housing costs will be determined by surveys and VHA rates adjusted annually. VHA rates will depend on local housing costs as well as quarters allowance raises.

Q: Why isn't my VHA plus my housing allowance enough to cover my rent, utilities and maintenance costs?

A: VHA isn't intended to completely make up the difference between housing costs and quarters allowance. VHA is only authorized where costs exceed 115 percent of the quarters allowance. It's based on a comparison of average quarters allowances and average cost. If your housing expenses are above the average for your grade at your location, you'll see the bigger difference between your costs and your allowance.

Q: Is VHA taxable?

A: No.

Q: Why do certain grades at some stations get no VHA?

A: If one or more grades receive no VHA, this means the average total housing costs determined for those grades at that location did not exceed 115 percent of their average quarters allowance.

Q: Why doesn't everyone at the same duty location receive the same VHA rate?

A: To determine VHA, average housing costs are compared to average quarters allowances for each grade at each location. Since the quarters allowance is different for each grade, the amount of the VHA will be different.

Q: I am single and living off-

base in a stateside high-cost area.

A: Yes, if you are entitled to Oct. 30 pay checks. Some rates the quarters allowance. The VHA is payable to all personnel receiving quarters allowance who have duty in a high-cost area.

> Q: My wife and I are both in the Air Force and drawing BAQ. How is the VHA paid to us?

A: Each of you will receive VHA in your own right. If you are at different duty locations, each of you will be paid VHA based on your own duty location.

Q: Can two members receive different VHA rates if both members receive quarters allowance at the with-dependents rate, are the same grade and are living in the same military housing area?

A: Yes. VHA is determined by duty location, not place of residence, so the members could receive different VHA rates if they work at different duty locations.

Q: As a recruiter, I am not assigned to a base but work in a local community. My records show I am assigned to Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, with a duty assignment of San Francisco. What VHA rate do I receive?

A: Where you work, not the location of your parent organization, determines your VHA rate. Therefore, you would receive the San Francisco rate and not the rate at Wright-Patterson AFB.

Q: I have three categories of dependents: wife and children, dependent parents and children of a previous marriage in the exspouse's custody. I am stationed overseas; all my dependents reside stateside. Can I receive more than one VHA?

A: No.

Q: A member on an unaccompanied tour overseas must designate the location in which the VHA is to be paid if dependents reside in different locations. Would any particular dependent determine the primary location?

A: No. The joint travel regulation does not designate any particular dependent.

Q: I am stationed overseas and my dependents, who are stateside in a high-cost area, receive the VHA. What happens if they move?

A: When the dependents move to join you or to another military housing area, you must notify the accounting and finance office to stop or modify the VHA. If you don't, you could be in debt for overpayment when VHA is finally stopped or modified. If they join you VHA terminates the day prior to the day either a child or spouse arrives at the overseas location if either remains there for more than 30 days:

Q: I am going on a permanentchange-of-station move and I am living off-base with my dependents. When does my VHA change?

A: It stops the day prior to your arrival at your new duty assignment and your new VHA begins the day you report at the new duty station.

Q: I am receiving quarters allowance and live in inadequate government quarters with a portion of my allowance deducted from my pay. Do I get VHA?

A: No. VHA is not applicable to persons living in inadequate government quarters.

Q: I am living in government family quarters with my second family but I have to spend a portion of my pay to support my first family who reside in a high-cost area. Do I get VHA?


A: No. Since you do not draw BAQ while living in government family quarters, you are not eligible for VHA.

Q: How do I ensure that the VHA I receive is the correct amount?

A: Your VHA is based on your stateside duty zip code or the residence zip of your dependents, if you are in an overseas unaccompanied tour. If you suspect your VHA is incorrect, have the finance office check your records.

Q: If I have other questions, whom should I call?

A: Your local finance office. If they can't help, call the VHA Hotline, Autovon 221-0345/0346 or commercial 202-325-0345/0346.





# Federal employees top private sector benefits

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -Federal and private employee benefits were compared in a study by the Office of Personnel Management that found the federal benefit package to be 4.7 percent ahead of average nonfederal benefits as of October

Most of the advantages were seen in retirement benefits federal retirement benefits total 28.2 percent of pay - the amount the employer pays into a fund to finance the benefits, including employee contribution. Private retirement benefits, including Social Security, total 16.7 peroffer such a package.

In other areas, private-sector employees tended to have more advantages, the study showed. Private firms paid a larger share of the premium cost for life insurance. Benefits represented .5 percent for private-sector employees, while federal employee life insurance benefits were .3 percent.

Private-sector employers paid worker totaled only .3 percent.

#### **Enrollment reaches midpoint**

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - As have been enrolled since the prothe Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System turns two years old, DEERS officials said program implementation is about half complete.

DEERS is a Department of Defense-wide centralized data base to confirm eligibility for health care. Benefits are proved to military active-duty members, retirees, dependents and sur-

More than four million sponsors and two million dependents gram began.

Enrollment is accomplished in 90-day phases. Active-duty members and those entitled to retirement pay are automatically enrolled by their service. During the enrollment phase they enroll their dependents. Survivors not receiving annuities and their dependents must also enroll.

After the enrollment period local military medical agencies begin to check DEERS eligibility.

Until implementation is com-

plete, no one will be denied treatment at military hospitals or clinics solely because his or her name doesn't appear in the system. Those later proven ineligible may be billed for services or legal action taken.

DEERS enrollment is becoming a part of the in- and outprocessing at all military bases. Active-duty members or retirees who move to an area where DEERS has been implemented should check with the personnel office to enrolled their dependents.

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


