In addition, the consultation you receive in our office could run up to \$100. per hour off-base. Finally, the free notary service provided by this office will save you the fee normally charged by notaries.

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# **DCR suggests SURE Pay**

This week I'd like to say a few words about the SURE-PAY program at Reese.

Currently, approximately 80 percent of all military and civilian personnel at Reese have joined the SURE-PAY program. With this percentage, the base currently ranks 12th and 9th in overall military and civilian SURE-PAY standings respectively among all ATC bases. SURE-PAY is doing something right when one considers that over 84 percent of all military personnel Air Force-wide are now signed up in the program.

Perhaps it's the secure feeling these people have knowing that the US Postal System does not get involved in delivering their paychecks. Every military payday will find at least two Reese personnel who were not paid on time because the mailman has failed to deliver their checks. In these cases, finance has to wait five days before they can issue substitute checks. How many people can wait an extra five days for their pay?

SURE-PAY personnel can also skip the long

payday lines in the credit unions and banks. They know their checks have already been deposited.

Perhaps most important of all, SURE-PAY people know that no matter where they are in the world on any given payday, their money will be waiting in their bank and not in their post office box. This may sound trivial to some; however, during the past several months, Reese personnel have been deployed on short notice to Bentwaters AFB, England, and O'Hare International Airport in Chicago. In both situations, members having SURE-PAY experienced far fewer pay problems than non SURE-PAY members.

There is absolutely no cost for you and the government will guarantee delivery of your paycheck to any bank of your choosing, anywhere in the United States — and it will be there on payday.

SURE-PAY has worked for me for over 23 years and I have never had a problem. I know it will work for you if you let it. Stop by the accounting and finance office and they will sign you up while you wait.

### Christmas parties Success requires discretion

Being hospitable entails much more than merely filling up your guest with food and beverages. It's a manner of communication feelings and good will. (Having a good time).

An even more important responsibility to your guest is to mix a little caution with any alcohol being served. Here are some simple do's and don'ts you may want to consider for your next party: Do serve snacks during the cocktail hour. Do have a variety of non-alcoholic drinks available.

Do serve the nonalcoholic drinks as dressed up as the mixed drinks.

Do label the alcohol and the non-alcoholic punches.

Do select a bartender you can trust.

Don't be upset if one of your guests is not drinking.

Don't encourage your guests to gulp their drinks.

Don't be a pusher.

Don't depend on alcohol to make your party a success.

Don't have the alcoholic drinks compete with the meal.

Don't let a drunk friend drive (take the keys/drive them/disable the car).

Please remember the do's and don'ts, and this last thought: A fun party is made up of good conversation, entertainment, food and refreshment. Don't get them out of balance.

## Winter driving requires extra caution

It's not news these days when you hear that traffic accidents increase in frequency at an alarming rate during the winter months.

It is news when we hear of educated people tuning out the fact that safe winter driving requires special techniques in regard to steering, stopping and seeing. Each year drivers are instructed to adjust their driving habits to compensate for winter driving hazards; only the most dedicated listen. The following messages are for those drivers not tuned in on proper winter driving techniques.

### **Be Prepared**

Get your car ready for winter before the cold

fronts move in. To most, this means more than just an oil change and antifreeze check. Include the following on your winter vehicle check: **Battery** - A battery needs full power to get you started on a cold day. Be sure terminals are clean, clamps tight, check to see if you need a charge.

Tires - Regular tires should have good tread. Don't mix radial winter tires with other types.

Brakes - Braking must be equal on each wheel to avoid skids. Have your brakes checked if a

brake grabs during braking operation. Exhast - Carbon monoxide is an odorless killer. Have your entire exhaust system checked for leaks. Never warm up the engine in a closed garage. Safety Gear - Store in your trunk—booster cables, shovel, tow strap, window scraper, flares, traction mat, sand or rock salt, and tire chains. Safe driving is mostly a matter of seeing something in time to take action to avoid danger.

#### See and Be Seen

Windshield, side and rear windows should be clear of ice and snow before you start out. Peephole driving is an invitation to disaster. Free wiper blades and clean snow from the hood. Clean headlights and taillights. At night, stop and clean headlights and taillights occasionally.

Run your heater and defroster a few minutes before you start out. Otherwise, sudden fogging of the glass will reduce visibility. In daytime, keep your headlights on in sleet, blowing snow, and fog. Use low beam, especially at night when there's more glare from bright lights.



### **Steer Steady on Ice and Snow**

Don't make abrupt changes in direction. Anticipate lane changes and turns, make them gradually. Remember, you need a lot of room to stop on wintry roads, so keep speed down and plenty of following distance in traffic.

Slow down well ahead of intersections; they're probably extra slick because of the polishing effect of stopping and starting. Warming trends can also lead to trouble. Ice is twice as slippery at 30 degrees as it is at zero degrees. When most of the road is clear, watch for ice patches in shady spots, such as underpasses and overpasses. If you hit one, hold the wheel steady and roll through. Jamming on the brakes will send you into a skid.





# Yuletide marks increase in shoplifting and fraud

"Give me the money, I'll buy it for you," is a familiar phrase says exchange service detective Rosemary Vasquez. It's the Yuletide season and, according to Army and Air Force Exchange Service officials, it's also a time when shoplifters seem to polish their stealing techinques.

Last year the exchange service reported over 10,000 cases of shoplifting and misuse of privileges, pointing out that the Christmas season brought with it a surge of the crimes. At Reese the figures were somewhat less, but, according to exchange manager Dan Arias, the most common of these crimes are children stealing candy.

The military sponsor should remember they are responsible for their dependents' actions ... at all times. Depending upon the situation, guilty dependents stand to have their exchange privileges suspended or possibly even revoked. They may also be subject to civil prosecution.

During 1981 there were only three cases of shoplifting reported at an average cost of about \$25, the most expensive being \$35. Both dollar amounts are well over the Air Force average of \$15.61. Manager Arias also commented that the exchange makes monthly reports and in the unobserved losses column the average here is about \$100. By unobserved losses, officials mean items like cigarettes being removed from their cartons and not paid for. Exchange service officials point out that these constant losses are prime factors in the soaring costs facing exchange patrons.

The Reese exchange is fighting its own war against shoplifting by employing the aid of exchange service detective Rosemary Vasquez. According to detective Vasquez, shoplifters are fairly easy to spot. "A lot of time people look suspicious by looking around a lot and staying in one particular place," said the detective.

She explained that for kleptomaniacs, stealing is just an obsession much like an illness, but for most it's just an expensive thrill.

Shoplifting and its close relative, fraud, can have serious consequences—"Give me the money, I'll buy it for you," according to Vasquez, once she hears those words and the culprits walk out of the store she can then detain them. With a witness present she then takes the offender into the exchange manager's office for questioning while awaiting the arrival of the security police.

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The military justice system provides two ways of dealing with active-duty shoplifters. Those who receive Article 15s can lose two stripes, half of their pay for two months, receive 30 days correctional custody, 45 days extra duty and 60 days base confinement.

In those instances when military officials choose to prosecute, the penalty can become much stiffer. For under \$50 a shoplifter convicted in a military court-martial can get a bad conduct discharge, six months at hard labor, lose two-thirds pay for six months and be reduced to airman basic.

Between \$50-\$100 will get the criminal a full year at hard labor, in addition to the other penalties listed. Over \$100 becomes grand larceny and the offender faces up to fi 'e years at hard labor, a dishonorable discharge and the other penalties.

In view of these penalties the potential shoplifter must make a simple decision: Is it worth it?

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

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

## **Travel experts recommend** making early holiday plans

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -Military members may find holiday airline reservations more dif- mont, TWA, Texas International, ficult to make because airlines reduced scheduled service by 23 percent Dec. 1, report Military Traffic Management Command officials. Coupling this with the high demand for furlough fares during the holiday season means domestic routes. military travelers need to make reservations as early as possible, furlough fare Nov. 16, due to a they say.

Nineteen airlines offer a 50-percent, reserved-seat discount fare to active-duty military during holiday travel. Now members. In addition, academy military members may take adcadets and former military members traveling within seven days after date of discharge are eligible for the discount. Some airlines offer a 25-percent discount.

Persons seeking discounts are reminded they must be traveling at their own expense on an authorized furlough, leave, pass or liberty or be a recently discharged veteran. Members may be required to show an ID card or separation papers to buy tickets.

Participating airlines are:

American, Air Florida, Braniff, U.S. Air, Empire, Aspen, Pied-Air Midwest, Continental, Ozark, Eastern, Republic, United, Altair, Northwest, Western and Delta. All these airlines, with the exception of Texas International, offer the special fare for all their

Pan American discontinued its major revision of its continental air-fare structure. TWA has lifted its previous blackout dates vantage of the TWA furlough fare any day during the holiday season.

Travelers are urged to check with the airlines early to ensure the lowest fare available and to shop around for the best rate. Airline fares are constantly changing to meet competition, the officials say.

Discount fares for bus travel are limited to selected points in the Eastern states and between Eastern and Midwestern states. No restrictions apply.

A rail-travel discount of 25 per-



cent is available year round. Military furlough fares don't apply to the Metroliner.

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
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


The final game of the week was also played by Supply, which eased past the 35th with a smooth win of 44-30.


forts were trashed by Stevenson, Robert Delisi and Jerol Mann, top scorers for Supply.

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
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
