

NEW WATER WELL EQUIPMENT **Instructed Verdict In** TO ARRIVE IN CITY APRIL 10

Promise of shipment and immediate installation of machinery and equip ment for the new city water well on April 1 was received in a telegram by Burl Bedford city secretary, this week from D. L. McDonald of Hereford, contractor for the well.

The equipment will include pump, motor and other machinery, while a pump house will be built and water from the new well turned into the city mains shortly after the equipment is installed. OVER-OPTIMISM

An over-optimistic attitude is as bad as an over-pessimistic outlook in business affairs.

Business conditions and crop prospects were never more promising in Floyd County than at this time. Some have maintained that the outlook was never worse than last summer and fall.

Over-pessimism carried many busi-ness houses and farmers to the extremes in reducing the pattern for their 1926 programs. Happy conditions now may cause some enterprises to try to cover too much territory. It is the saetdy, well-planned busi-

ness-whether a farm, retail store or whatnot-that eventually wins. All business is a gamble, but when we tempt the laws of choice and chance, addition, we get too many odds against us.

A BAD HABIT

As a country in which to conduct a business of any kind, the worst drawback to all portions of West Texas, is the habit we have grown into of "getting on the hilltops" when conditions are fair or good, and "way down in the valley" when the outlook is not so promising.

We may say now, with all reasonable certainty that this section will see a boom within the next two or three years—possibly five. This prediction is based on a regularity with which the pendulum swings backward and forward. We may say now that mar-ket and crop conditions will likely improve because both have been unfavorable in some respects for four years. The man who will make money out of these favorable conditions as they swing around is the man who vs "an even keel" when the pros-

s are not so bright and conditions c so favorable.

GOOD PLANTING SEASON

FARMER'S PART IN RURAL ELEC. TRIFICATION

Discussing the part farmers must play in bringing electricity to the rural districts, Owen D. Young recently said: "The farmers should insist upon a study of electrification by their agricultural schools and colleges, by their farm organizations and require a con-stant and unending publicity of the results of such studies through their farm journals.

"They should welcome study by power companies and manufacturing companies, and should co-operate with them to work out practical plants to get effective results. In each community they should endeavor to develop a universal sentiment in favor of a power supply and general agreement to take service in order that right of ways may be economically obtained, and cost of service distributed among largest possible numbers of costomers.

'The one point I want to make to the farmer is that manufacturing companies may produce devices, electrie power companies may bring electricity to his door, but the question remains with the farmer whether he will put to work. It is he who must say whether or not electricity is to be used in agriculture."





Due to some confusion, two classes had programs prepared for Monday morning of this week; the freshmen had invited Rev. F. L. Davis to speak on the program. As he does not visit the school often he was requested to speak.







1. Every license the Highway department is authorized to issue expires December 31st of the year for which such license is issued.

2. A new license should be applied for as near January 1st as possible in order to avoid penalty.

3. The use of a home-made license

plate is not permitted. 4. Application should be made to the County Tax Collector for a duplicate plate to replace a lost one.

5. A motor vehicle may not be operated with any license plates other than the ones originally issued for same. 6. Transfer of registration plates

from one machine to another is illegal and will get you in trouble.

Every motor vehicle must be registered in the name of the owner. 8. No motor vehicle of any kind can be operated over the highways unless strongly fortified and connected with registered for the current year.


