## Antelope Teacher Dies Suddenly Wed. Morning

W. N. Benson, 60, Teacher-Author-Lawyer, Succumbs to Strange Illness Wednesday.

W. N. Benson, 60, teacher and principal of the Antelope school, died suddenly last Wednesday morning at his home near the Antelope school. Some two weeks ago a growth started on his neck and grew quite painful during the past week, resulting in serious sickness last Tuesday and his death Wednesday morning. The cause of the growth was unknown by attending physicians.

Mr. Benson was a man of high intellectual standing, having secured a B. A. degree from one of the largest colleges in Alabama. He was a native of Alabama, born May 1, 1866. After completing his college course, he taught in college for a number of years. He was admitted to the bar and spent some ten years practicing law in Alabama, Texas, and New Mexico. He is also the author of several books.

This was Mr. Benson's first year as a teacher in Floyd County. He came to Floyd County from his home in Bronco, Texas. He taught school in Hale County for the previous two years.

Besides his wife, who is also a teacher at the Antelope school, Mr. Benson saves five children, four sons and one daughter. The daughter is Mrs. H. A. Yynn, of Dodsonville, Texas. The sons are: Jessie A. Benson, of Bronco, Texas, Alvin, of Mangum, Okla.; W. A. Benson, of Colmore, New Mexico; and C. A. Benson, member of the staff of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram at Fort Worth.

Funeral arrangements were incomplete this morning, no arrangements being made until all of the children arrive. Interment will probably be made near Lovern, New Mexico, F. C. Harmon, funeral director, stated this morning.

## Closing Week Of Court Opens Monday Morning

District Judge Clements Returns To Bench Here After Week In Dalhart District.

With the close of the spring term of District Court approaching, only one major case remains for disposal on the court docket. This is the damage suit of Mrs. Tennie Foster, against Texas Utilities Company in which \$20,000 actual and \$5,000 exemplary damages are being asked for the death of T. J. Foster, her deceased husband. Mr. Foster was killed when a bolt of electricity passed through his body and he fell fifteen feet into a wagon from a telephone pole at the northwest corner of Floydada early in January. He was making repairs on a rural telephone line at the time, accompanied by W. C. Mooney, who will be one of the principal witnesses as to the actual occurrences at the time of the fatal accident.

Judge Clements returned to his court here Monday morning, after having exchanged benches with Judge Tatum of the Dalhart District for a week. No court is being held today, but the cases of H. A. and Vergil Stevens, passed last week on account of failure of out-of-county witnesses to appear, will be taken up in the morning. These men are charged with the theft of turkeys.

Tuesday Clarence Miller was assessed a penalty of one year in the penitentiary by a jury on a charge of transporting liquor. The defendant has asked for a new trial. Wednesday John Matthews was acquitted by a jury on a similar charge.

Monday the three Coleman County youths charged with theft of a car were given suspended sentences by a jury, the two younger two years each in the reformatory and the older five years in the state penitentiary. The father of two of the boys was here and expressed his appreciation of the consideration given by the court and jury to the youthful offenders.

## Quannah Route Contracts Will Be Let By April 7

In Texas Interviews, Sommer Says Construction On Line Will Be Started Early In May.

In a statement issued at Quannah last week, and reiterated in Dallas and Fort Worth, Chas. H. Sommer, president of the Quannah, Acme & Pacific Railway Company, said that invitations were out to contractors for bids and that contracts for the construction of the Floydada Extension of the Frisco subsidiary would be let not later than April 7.

Successful bidders, he continued, will be required to start actual construction work not later than thirty days after their bids are in.

This news of activity on the part of the railway company follows assurance given the local Chamber of Commerce Railway Committee ten days ago that bids would be asked for at once and work started as soon thereafter as possible.

Approximately \$1,250,000 will be spent on the extension, which will cover all costs including the comparatively easy ascent of the caprock west of Roaring Springs.

## To Apply For Charter For Boy Scout Troop

Scout Council Selects Hill As President.—Hope For Visit of District Executive.

The Local Council of Boy Scouts of America held its first meeting Saturday morning with councilman Lon Davis as host. Every member was present. The committee, or council, is composed of J. C. Wester, Lon Davis, George Linder, F. L. Davis, and W. R. Hill, and was recently named by the Floydada Luncheon Club which is sponsoring scouting in this community. W. R. Hill was chosen President and F. L. Davis Secy.-Treas. of the council. The Court of Honor chosen is constituted as follows: J. C. Gilliam, Judge, with Ben Hardy and Jeff D. Ayres the other members.

It was unanimously voted to apply for a charter, and to proceed with organizing the Troops. The scouting here will be under the supervision of the South Plains Area Council of Boy Scouts. The Area Executive is located at Lubbock.

The selection of Scoutmasters, Asst. Masters, Troop Committees, and the official training of the same will proceed as rapidly as possible. It is regarded as very important that the scouting standards be followed in all particulars.

Other troops are being planned in the county, and these will doubtless be associated with the council here, or a Floyd County Area Council constituted.

The organization here is working confidently toward having Ninth District Executive Fitch, of Houston, visit us in the near future. Mr. Fitch is the ranking Scout Executive in the Area Executive at Lubbock is planned. All Executives are trained and salaried men, and are experts in Scouting.

A very important part of the scout organization is the training of leaders by executives who are trained experts. It is practically assured that scouting will be in full-swing here by early summer when it has its best time of the year.

## Royal Sold By Lowry To T. L. Kennedy Monday

Sale of the Royal Theatre to Tom L. Kennedy, of Matador, who has also just recently acquired the Olympic Theatre from P. W. Cloud, was announced Monday by R. H. Lowry, who opened the new picture show and play house here late last summer at the southeast corner of Main and California Streets.

The change of ownership became effective Monday, the new owner assuming charge of the show for the Monday night program. Mr. Lowry and family will return to Lubbock this week. For the immediate present his plans are indefinite, he said.

The purchase of the Royal, which is one of the best equipped shows in this territory, makes the third in the string of shows now owned by Mr. Kennedy. For eleven years he has owned and operated the show at Matador. He acquired the Olympic six weeks ago.

Both shows will continue to be operated, according to Mr. Kennedy, who is planning some high class entertainment for patrons of his three picture houses this spring and summer.

## Cotton Sells For 12½¢ On Market This Week

The government's latest ginning report last week found several hundred bales of cotton still in the hands of farmers, with the result that the higher prices are going to bring material returns in several instances.

Among the farmers who have already benefited from the higher price levels is G. L. Snodgrass, of Harmony, who finished ginning nine bales of stored lint cotton at the A. V. Haynes Gin Wednesday and put it on the market, O. B. Olson, local buyer, got the cotton at 12½ cents per pound.

The cotton was snags that Mr. Snodgrass stored on his farm last fall when the rush was on to save lost time at the gins and wait for a market that would better justify selling.

## 2 Names Petitioned In Pre. 2 For Co. Trustee

Balloting For County And District Trustees Will Be Held On April 2.

County Judge Wm. McGehee has ordered elections for school trustees in every common school district in Floyd County and in Lockney Independent school district, the date set by the statute for the election being Saturday, April 2. In addition to the vote for district trustees, voters in Commissioners Precinct Nos. One and Two, not residing within the boundaries of an independent district, will also be called upon to select a county trustee from each precinct for the county school board.

In Precinct One, in which Judge J. W. Howard is the trustee whose term expires, no petition has been made to the county judge for any names to appear on the ticket. But in Precinct No. Two, two names have been petitioned by voters for places on the ticket. The men whose names have been petitioned on the ticket are Bert Bobbitt, of Lone Star, and J. F. Dollar of Irick. Their names will appear on the ballot. L. B. Maxey, trustee-at-large, is a hold-over as are W. N. Jones in Precinct Four and J. H. Upton in Precinct Three.

In Lockney Independent District the names of Tom Cope, E. E. Dyer, T. H. Stewart and E. D. Teuton, will appear on the ticket, by petition. In Lone Star the names of Robt. Smith and G. B. Johnston have been petitioned on the school district ballot, and at Center the names of J. E. Green, C. O. Spence and T. J. Gill.

Tuesday was the last day for petitions for names to appear on the ballots to be legally presented.

## Mayor Proclaims Clean Up Week April 3 To 9

Urges Thorough Laundering For All Premises To Clear Away Winter's Debris.

A proclamation issued this week by Mayor F. P. Henry sets the first week in April as "Clean Up Week," adopting the suggestion of Governor Dan Moody and the State Health Department, who have urged in proclamations and statements the need for all cities and towns in the state to clear away the debris of the winter season and prepare to enter the spring with clean premises.

To promote better health conditions, prevent diseases and brighten the civic appearances in the community, are the principal objectives outlined by the mayor and the governor in their respective proclamations, and the mayor sets out that in order for this community to retain its high reputation for cleanly and slightly conditions it will be necessary for much work to be done. The winter's accumulations of trash, in addition to presenting a health hazard also invite fires and conflagrations, he points out, and declares all the arguments favor a prompt and early "Clean Up," rather than delay until later in the year.

The city will have available trucks and wagons sufficient to meet the demands, Thursday having been set as the last day on which the clean up should have been completed when the trucks make the round of the entire city and haul off rubbish which cannot be burned.

## Featherston Cattle Are Sold; Delivery April 1

\$23,000 Worth of Cows, Heifers And Steers Go To Three Buyers At Early Date.

While Chas. H. Featherston, owner of the Echols plains ranch in east Floyd County, is recovering from severe injuries in a San Antonio Hospital, Roy L. Snodgrass, local Dodge dealer, has been pinch hitting for him as a cattle salesman, and has made such a good job of it that Mr. Featherston is going to be out of the cattle business, temporarily at least, after April 1.

\$23,065 worth of cows, heifers and steers were sold to three buyers for Mr. Featherston the first three days of last week for delivery April 1, part of them to go on feed here and at Lubbock and part of them to north plains pastures. Of the steers E. F. Stovall purchased 120 head and will put them on feed here. Dawson and McWhorter, of Lubbock and Dalhart, bought 163 head of cows and yearlings, the yearlings to be put on feed at Lubbock and the cows to go to Dalhart. Roy Williams, of Amarillo, is the third buyer. He gets 130 head of cows and 112 heifers. All deliveries will be made in Floydada on April 1.

Mr. Featherston whose home is at Wichita Falls, was injured more than two weeks ago in a polo game at Fort Sam Houston. His shoulder was crushed in a serious spill in a game between the Wichita Falls civilian team and an army team. He will be weeks recovering. In the same series of games Horace Robbins, also of Wichita Falls, sustained a broken leg. Robbins has visited Floydada and has a number of friends here.

## C. Of C. Carnival Date Changed Until April

A home talent carnival, under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce, which was planned for Friday night, March 25, has been postponed until a later date in April. It was announced this week by Frank Moore, head of the carnival committee. The exact date of the carnival will be held will be announced later, it was stated.

The plan of the home talent carnival was originated for the purpose of raising funds to take the Floydada Band to Wichita Falls to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention this spring. It is planned to have the carnival on the square and to be carried out like a regular carnival, all amusements and attractions to be furnished by local organizations. If the present plans are carried out, the carnival will be one of the most amusing events of the month and will raise a large fund for a good cause.

## Construction Under Way For Petersburg Church

The foundation for a new \$3000.00 stucco building for the Church of Christ at Petersburg was laid last week and the construction is now under way. The church will have four class rooms, a main auditorium, with a seating capacity of about 250. The style will be on the order of the Floydada church, said Ira L. Sanders, who divides his time as minister between the two churches.

Plans are to have the church completed by the fourth Sunday in April, when Mr. Sanders will begin a meeting, assisted by D. R. Badgett, of Plainview, who will conduct the song service.

## Gas Contract Extension Given McMahan By City

Council Feel Sure That Financial Difficulties of Gas Men Ironed Out.

Increasing optimism over the prospect for natural gas for Floydada before winter arrives is noted generally among business men and city officials. Information which they gain through business channels is that the company, composed of J. W. McMahan and associates, is now solidly financed, and although some delay may arise in getting such a big proposition under headway, when all legal details are through the construction may be expected to be rushed.

With this in mind the council Friday of last week granted an extension of ninety days for the beginning of actual construction of pipeline and distribution system in Floydada. Time on the extension began running on March 18. This was the first day that a quorum of the council had been at home in nearly three weeks. The council was unanimous in passing the order granting the extension.

The actual words of the paragraph setting out the conditions of the extension of time are that J. W. McMahan and associates are "here granted ninety days from this date within which to commence in good faith actual construction of the main pipe line and distributing system for the furnishing of gas to the City of Floydada, provided that when said work is commenced it shall proceed with reasonable diligence until completed."

Mayor F. P. Henry said Friday afternoon that there was every reasonable assurance of proper financing of the organization's big undertaking that will bring natural gas from the panhandle fields to nearly a score of south plains towns.

## Will Add Third Story To Commercial Hotel

Daily Announces Plan To Add Twenty Rooms To Capacity Of Local Hostelry.

Probability that he will add a third story to the Commercial Hotel, plans for which he is now making to be matured early this spring and summer, was announced this week by W. P. Daily, proprietor of the hostelry.

"While I haven't let any contracts yet, the plans for the addition of a building are being matured, and I am unforseen mishaps the third story will be added this late spring and summer," Mr. Daily said.

The addition being planned, will be modern in every respect, Mr. Daily declared. The rooms, about twenty in number, are to have hot and cold water, with a bath for each room. Possibly a portion of the third floor will have apartments, he said. The plans for the addition include changing the roof. Stucco and plaster finish for protection against fire, similar to the finish on the present building will be used.

Both members of the firm are said to have extensive experience in electrical and radio work. They will use an extensive and up-to-date stock according to plans. The members of the firm are cousins.

**14 YEARS AGO IN FLOYD COUNTY**

News items taken from the Floyd County Hesperian files published in Floydada fourteen years ago.

**ISSUE OF APRIL 3, 1913.**

Taking the vote for marshal as a criterion there were 108 votes cast in the city election which was held Tuesday. In the race for mayor there were no announced candidates, Judge W. T. Montgomery, the present incumbent, who has had the office since the beginning of the incorporation was a receptive candidate and was easily elected. The entire aldermanic board was re-elected as follows: A. D. White; J. S. Pool, S. E. Duncan, Dr. R. A. Childers, and E. C. Henry. Pat H. Flynn was an easy winner over two opponents, T. H. Edwards and S. E. Thurmon in the race for marshal.

Last Tuesday, April 1, 1913, the stockholders of the White Drug Co., incorporated, sold their drugs and fixtures to J. W. McCarty and Mr. McCarty has taken charge in his own name. He had been running the store for the company for a month previous.

Extract from sale bill dated 1846 in the state of Missouri. "The undersigned will sell Sept. 29, 1846, at public outcry, the following to-wit: Nine yoke of oxcn with yoke and chain; two wagons with beds; three nigger wonches four nigger bucks, three nigger boys, two prairie plows, twenty steel traps, spinning wheel, three fox hounds, lots of coon milk and skunk skins and lots of other articles; an agwine to California."

Last Wednesday, April 2, 1913, the "Leans" and "Fats", local organizations of the obese and the gaunt, played a game of baseball, in which the fats were beaten after winning the game—so they say. At the close of the eighth inning the fats held the lead, 16 to 12, but in the ninth the leans ran the score up to 19 to 16. Time: 2 hours 50 minutes. As a result of the game both teams are in bed today pending recovery.

#### CROP REPORT CHANGES WILL BE MADE BY U. S. DEPARTMENT

Washington, D. C., March 15.—The following changes in time and dates of the Government crop reports have been announced by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, United States Department of Agriculture.

Reports on grain crops dated March 18, April 8 and August 10 will be released at 3 p. m. instead of 2 p. m. on those dates.

The report on acreage of corn and other crops, except cotton, scheduled for July 9, will be released on July 11.

A cotton report on July 9 will give figures on the acreage of cotton in cultivation as of July 1.

Cotton reports on September 8 and December 8 will include estimates of acreage of cotton abandoned since July 1, and cotton reports on July 6, September 23, and October 25 will be eliminated.

#### Two Districts Complete Scholastic Enumeration

Two school districts in the county had completed scholastic enumeration last mid-week and turned their records into the county superintendent's office. They were Providence and Pleasant Valley.

Scholastic enumeration is going on all over the county, including Floydada and Lockney Independent School Districts. The enumeration is to be completed by April 1.

Following are some of the things in connection with the enumeration which County Superintendent Price Scott is stressing:

Be sure to get month, day, and year of each child's birth.

Do not take any child who is 7 years old after Sept. 1, 1927.

Do not take any child who is 18 years old before September 1, 1927.

Each parent or guardian must sign the enumeration cards of their own children.

The census enumerator must also sign the card for each child, or group of children.

If you do not have a yellow card for colored children, be sure to mark their card colored.

Enumerate all children residing within your district up to and including April 1, 1927.

The scholastic census report is very important. Be as accurate in every detail as you possibly can.

All married boys and girls within the scholastic age should be enumerated.

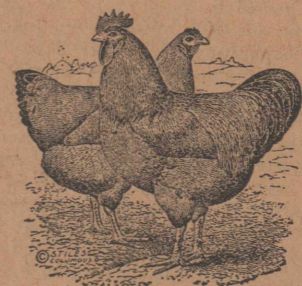

#### CODE RESTRICTIONS RAISED ON DAY AND NIGHT LETTERS

Mrs. McAdams, manager of the Floydada office of Western Union Telegraph Company, last week announced that the company has removed the code restrictions from day and night letters, effective immediately. The announcement was made following receipt of advices from the office of President Carlton, in which he says:

"The outstanding achievement of fifty years in the field of telegraph traffic regulation was the inauguration of the night letter service in 1910. From the standpoint of the telegraph companies the direct effect of this innovation was to increase the volume of messages by more than 15 percent, thus utilization was made of the idle facilities of an existing system and the public was given a valuable service at materially reduced rates. This service, which was adapted to many classes of semiurgent business communications hitherto sent by mail, was somewhat limited in its application by the restriction against code which is now admitted in night letters and day letters in the United States.

"Because of the increased use of these telegraph service has speeded up business correspondence by many hours; they have contributed in no small degree to the prosperity of American business and to the American reputation for speed and efficiency."

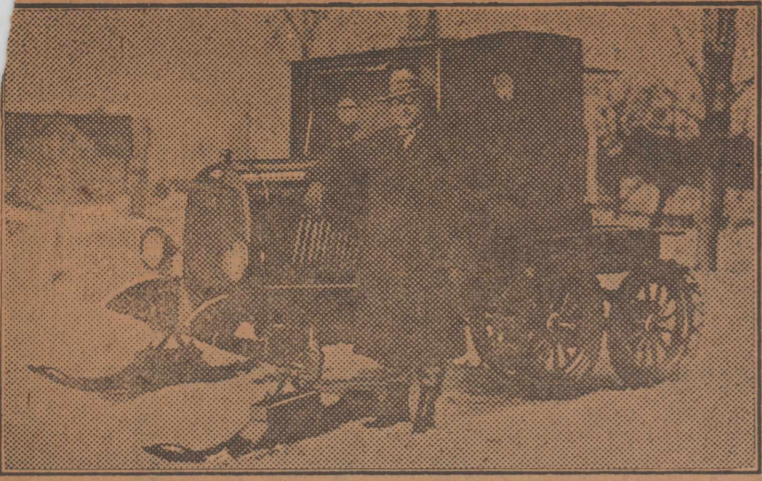

### AVERAGE TELEPHONE CALL TAKES UNDER FOUR SECONDS

Many telephone subscribers think that an unnecessarily long time is taken by the operator in answering a telephone call after the receiver is removed from the hook, but the average interval of time consumed in answering more than 70,000,000 calls a day is 3.7 seconds, or less time than it takes to count four.

Short as this interval is, it must be remembered that it is an average speed and that many calls are answered in even less time. Check-ups by the Telephone Company show that about 3 per cent of the answers are over 100 seconds, and only 1 call out of 1,000 is over 20 seconds.

Then, again, the time consumed after the call is answered and until the connection with the telephone desired is completed is apt to be over-estimated. Figures show that the average time to complete a call from one office to another from the time the caller takes the receiver off the hook is a little under 30 seconds, of which the operator takes about 3 1/2 seconds to answer, about 4 seconds to receive and acknowledge the number, 2 seconds to obtain access to the call circuit, 4 seconds to pass the number to the distant office to get a line assignment, and about 1 1/2 seconds to complete. The ringing is mechanical and the distant operator takes about 2 seconds more to insert the plug and start the ringing. On the other hand, the subscriber at the other end of the line averages 11 seconds in answering the bell, making a total elapsed time of 28 seconds average from the time a subscriber starts to make a call until the party called answers.

Another factor in business calls which extends this time is where the calling party makes the call through a private branch exchange. This adds from 10 to 20 seconds in the elapsed time. In large centers, from 17 to 28 per cent of all telephone calls come through branch exchanges.

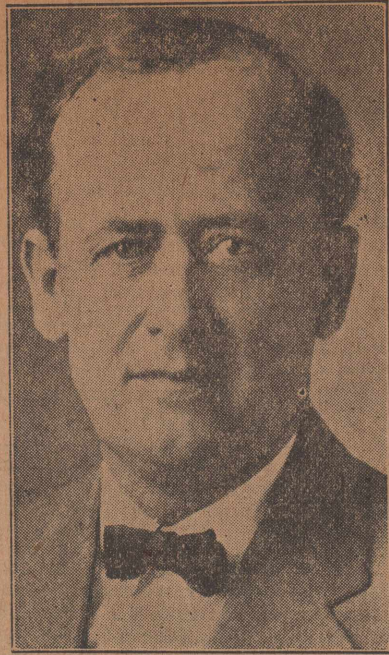

### Poultry Raisers Learn More Of Culling Hens

Between fifty and seventy-five interested poultry raisers of Floyd County attended the poultry demonstration held at the R. P. King place last Friday evening. J. L. Myers of Hale County was in charge of the meeting, which began at 2 o'clock and continued until 4. Culling of poultry was the principal subject discussed. Mr. Myers was equipped with a chart which he used to illustrate the many important features in culling poultry and selection of show birds.

During the morning Mr. Myers visited the Williams poultry farm one half mile east of Floydada and also the flock of white leghorns belonging to Alpha King. On account of the lack of time it was not possible for him to cull the flocks that he visited. Through the courtesy of the Plainview Board of City Development Mr. Myers was allowed to spend the entire day in Floydada his trip here being arranged for by the Floyd County Poultry Association.

### STATE-WIDE CLEAN-UP WEEK SET FOR WEEK APRIL 3 TO 9

The annual state-wide clean-up campaign sponsored by the state board of health has been announced for the week April 3rd to 9th, by Dr. J. C. Anderson, state health officer. "Campaigns of this nature in the past have shown unusually good results, some 250 municipalities co-operating last year with the board in this work," he stated.

"Owing to the prevalence of small-pox and the large number of deaths occurring from preventable diseases, it is highly desirable that individuals and communities take time for a complete health appraisal. The increase in the average life expectancy during the last decade has been some 12 or 15 years, and this has been due in a large degree to improved sanitary conditions. Universal application of present scientific knowledge would also undoubtedly increase the average span of life another 12 or 15 years."

"Special attention should be given to those conditions affecting health, such as sewage, water supplies, garbage and milk sanitation. Each of these vitally effect the health of the state, and every town should make special efforts to clean up their town during this state-wide clean-up campaign," Dr. Anderson stated.

### YEAR RECORD HERE EQUALS FIVE YEARS IN HUNT CO.

R. L. Ewing, who was in Floydada Tuesday on business from Amarillo tells of a record made farming in Floyd County by J. T. Wolford. Mr. Wolford lives on one of the Ewing farms twenty miles southeast of Floydada.

During the year 1926 Mr. Wolford produced 84 bales of cotton on the farm he is handling, and an abundance of feedstuff, which he compares with a record of eighty-one bales he raised in five years of farming in Hunt County on \$250 land. His feed crop here in one year considerably exceeded his entire feed crop for five years in Hunt, he declares, and the work and expense incident to making the crop here did not exceed the work and expense of any of the single crops Mr. Wolford handled in Hunt.

Mr. Ewing thinks this is a record worth mentioning. The land Mr. Wolford farmed here is \$50 land, or valued at approximately one-fifth of the Hunt County farm land.

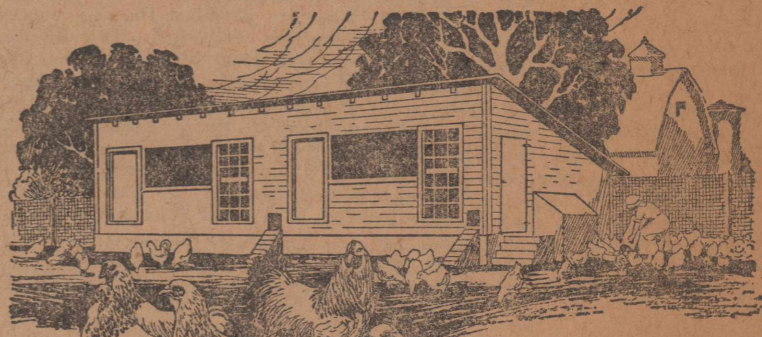

### Wheat And Fruit Damage Severe, Raisers Report

Thermometer Drops to 19 Degrees Above Zero And Early Crops Suffer.

A cold wave that sent the thermometer tumbling to nineteen degrees above zero Saturday night and considerably below the freezing point again Sunday night, is believed to have done material damage to September planted wheat and to have killed a large per centage of the fruit crop in this section of the state.

The lower temperature came in on the wings of a norther accompanied by clouds but little moisture, and the temperature Sunday reached to within four degrees of the past winter's coldest morning.

Reports from grain growers over the county indicate their belief that much damage was done to early-planted wheat, some of which had grown very rank and had begun jointing. The extent of this damage is problematical, and will not be estimable until after the grain begins heading, according to the best information The Hesperian can gather. Not all of the wheat was early enough to be injured by any means, but an extensive acreage was early and may have been affected by the cold.

That a large per cent of the fruit crop, especially of peaches, was injured, is certain. Late blooming varieties of fruits are still safe for the present.
