Jas. A. Isbells Arrive In U. S. From Baghdad

Col. and Mrs. James A. Isbell and son Jimmy, 13, arrived safely in the United States Wednesday morning. Relatives here learned they were in Baghdad, Iraq, when the government of that country was overthrown, and concern had been felt for the safety of the Isbells.

In a telephone call at 9 a. m. Wednesday, Mrs. Isbell told her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Pierson that the couple and their son had just landed at international airport in New York City after a flight from Rome.

Mrs. Isbell added that she and her husband and son expected to be in Haskell within four or five days. However, they will go first to Walter Reed Hospital in Washington for a check-up before coming home, Mrs. Isbell stated.

Col. Isbell has been stationed in Baghdad for about two years as an Air Force advisor, and was accompanied to that country by his wife and son.

Col. Isbell's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Isbell, and a sister, Mrs. Bob Sego, also live in Haskell.

Watch for Rabid Animals, County Agent Warns

Warning that an outbreak of rabies among domestic animals and pets could occur in this section was sounded this week, after a milk cow owned by a Haskell farmer was found to have rabies.

County Agent F. W. Martin said that a definite diagnosis of rabies had been made in the death of a milk cow belonging to Henry Druzesdow, Jr., who lives one and one-half miles southwest of Haskell.

The animal became ill about 10 days ago, and Dr. David Ballard, Stamford veterinarian, said rabies symptoms were indicated. Throat muscles of the animal became paralyzed to the extent that it could neither eat nor drink, necessitating that it be killed. Samples sent to the State Health Department in Austin resulted in a positive diagnosis of rabies, the county agent said.

As a precaution, Mr. and Mrs. Druzesdow and their two children, ten and five years old, are taking rabies shots as a preventive measure against possible infection. County Agent Martin said.

Party Loyalty Is Keynote of Precinct Conventions Saturday

One hundred per cent loyalty to the Democratic Party was the keynote of precinct conventions held in Haskell County voting boxes Saturday afternoon.

No opposition developed to identical resolutions introduced in each precinct convention requiring all delegates to the county convention to be pledged to support and work for the election of all nominees of the Democratic Party.

Chas. M. Conner, chairman of the county Democratic executive committee, said that the party loyalty resolution had been adopted in all precincts reporting, including all of the county's largest voting boxes, at Haskell, Rule, Rochester and Weiner.

Other resolutions adopted included: 1. Opposing any change in the allocation of the State gasoline tax now earmarked for F-M roads.

2. Opposing any change in the election laws abolishing precinct conventions in their present form as suggested by Gov. Daniel.

3. Declaring it mandatory that persons selected in Senatorial District caucuses be named as rightful members of the State Democratic Executive Committee.

Delegates to the county convention to be held Saturday were elected at the precinct meetings, with delegations from a majority of the precincts to vote as a unit.

Rev. Barker Is Guest Speaker At Rotary Meet

County Clerk Horace Oneal was re-elected, polling 2,070 votes while his opponent, A. M. Turner received 1,092.

Horse racing was the main feature of interest each afternoon during the Reunion. In a bronc busting contest on the second day, the first prize was awarded to Frank Rhoads, second to Frank Owen, and third to Dave Matthews.

The cutting, tying, and roping contests were held on the third day. S. L. Graves, better known as Picnic Sam of the 8 Ranch in King County cut out eight yearlings from the herd to win first prize. He rode "Hub," a horse about 20 years old. Bailey Brown of Kent County won second prize, and S. S. Cummings of Haskell third.

The Haskell man's name was drawn for the award of a 1938 model Chevrolet station wagon given away at the convention, held in Fort Worth.

"Only time in our lives we've been lucky enough to win anything," the Conners chorused

over their new car. Charlie drove their shiny new vehicle home, while the Mrs. and grandson came back in the family car.

Charlie is county Demo chairman, and he admitted he had a few misgivings about how his story of winning the new car would sound to some of the more staunch "anti-Cowboy Bill" Demos who might suspect that a little political trickery was involved.

Reminds us of Ab Hutchens' classic remark about Charlie several years ago. Hutchens and Conner have been friends since World War I days.

Someone made the remark that Conner was a good farmer. "Good farmer my eye," Ab drawled. "The Lord took an obligation to look after the ignorant and the Irish, and Charlie qualifies on both counts," he declared.

Dr. J. G. Rutherford of Stamford was reminiscing about

old times last week while visiting friends in Haskell. Now a retired dentist, he was the first official court reporter of the 39th Judicial District, back in 1902. He was a dentist then, too. While not taking testimony in court, Dr. Rutherford practiced dentistry. "I stayed at the Wright House when in Haskell, and Mrs. Theo Wright would let me set up my equipment in a spare room," he recalled. If the room wasn't needed for a guest, there was no charge. Patients would sometimes come into the courtroom while a case was in progress, knowing they wouldn't see the dentist until he finished taking evidence. "I could spot a prospective patient as soon as they came in the courtroom, and knew that I had a job as quickly as I could get to it," he said. The 39th District extended from Throckmorton in those days. Dr. R. recalled. He remembered one family who were always stealing something. Where the court term, Haskell, Throckmorton, Mont, Benjamin, would be across the old man or one of them. "They'd steal anything on a plow, wire to pasture, or even a pole," the pioneer porter declared. "In an instance where their reputation, I'd more than a short-tenance," he added. Inspiration of the Girls was Mrs. Ann Bloomer, 19th century advocate of abolition, and women's rights.

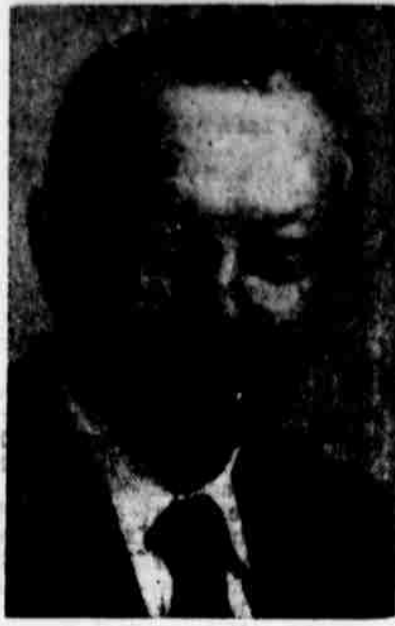

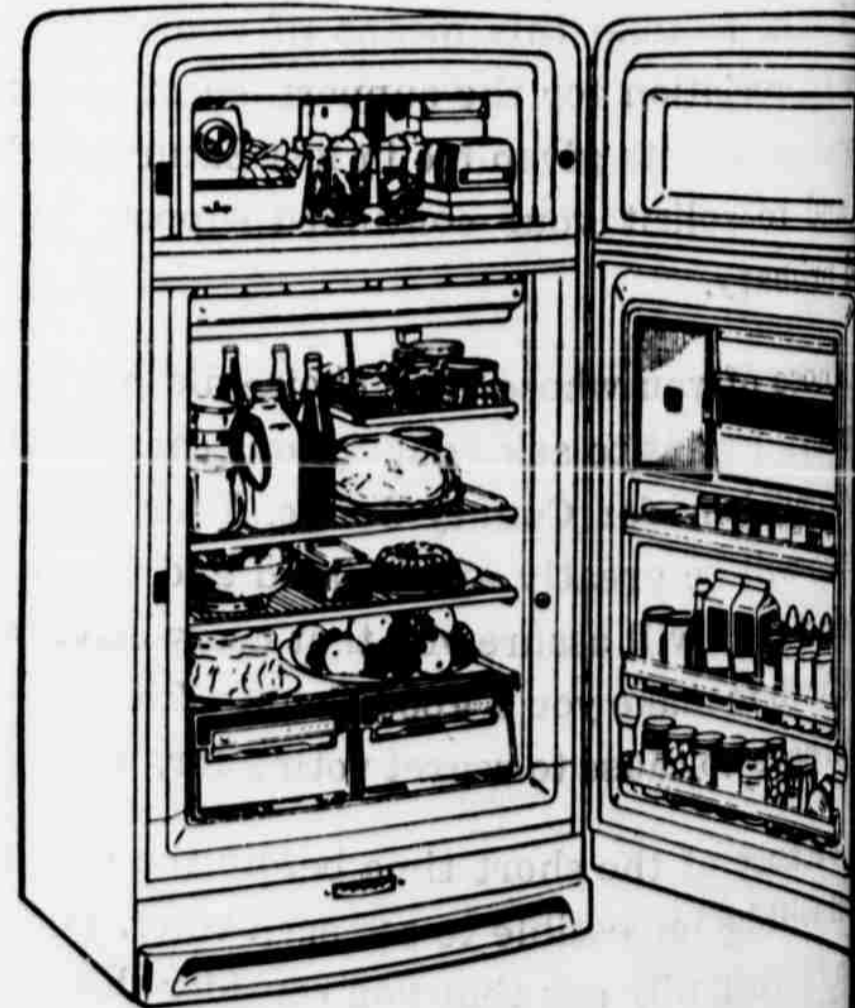

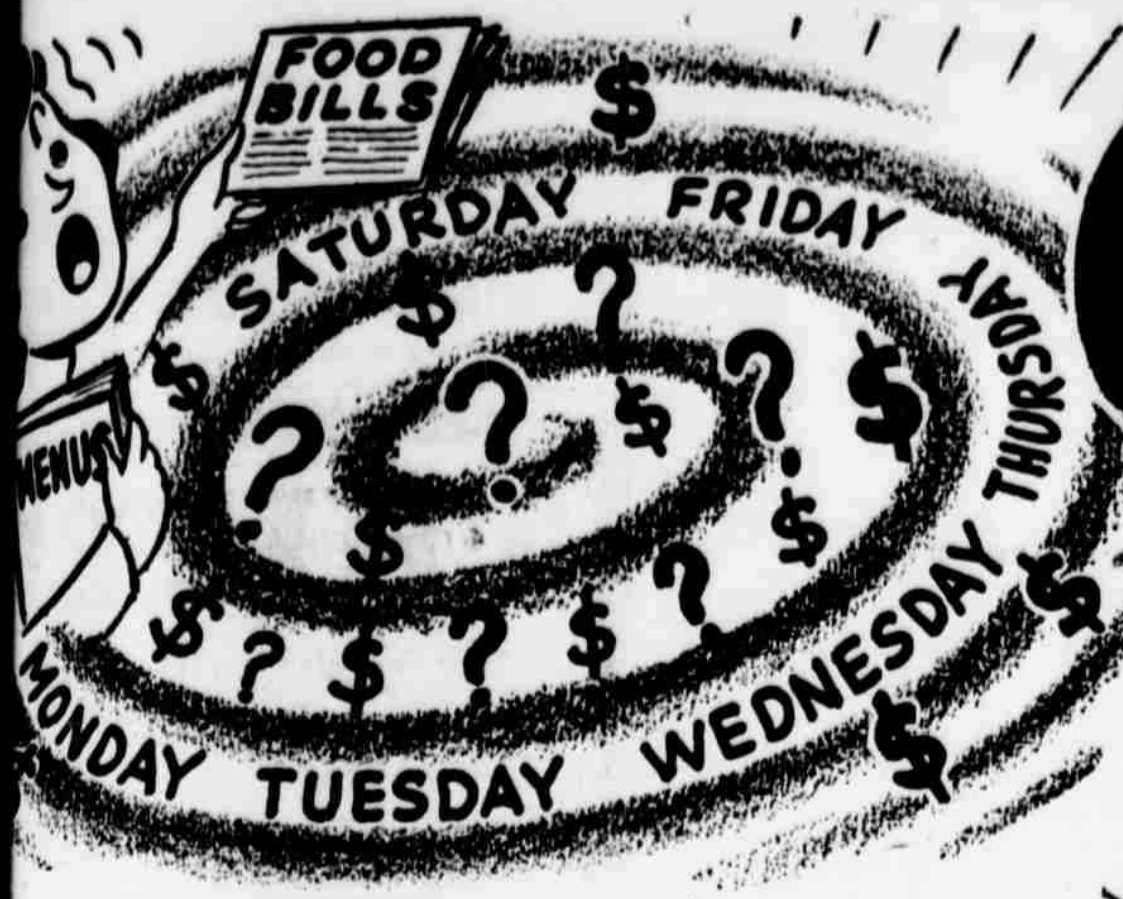

Cattle Supply Up, Prices Show Weakness

BY TED GOULDY

The cattle trade at Ft. Worth Monday reflected the weaker market on fed steers and heifers which developed at Northern markets along with increased cattle supplies. The 12 major markets Monday reported more than 20% increase in cattle and calves and at Northern points, these were mostly fed cattle. The trade again displayed its sensitivity to the supply situation and fed cattle closed lower everywhere.

At Fort Worth a few choice yearling heifers topped at \$28, but the rank and file fed steers were 50c lower and some bids were \$1 off as packers displayed faint urgency. Their lack of interest was credited to expectations of lower priced beef from their cornbelt plants, as well as from good supplies of fat cattle shipped direct to their plants.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings cashed at \$23.50 to \$26.50 and a few fancy fat yearlings and heifers drew \$27 to \$28. Common and medium slaughter steers and yearlings cashed at \$18 to \$23.50. Mature steers ranged from \$26.50 downward.

Fat cows ranged mostly from \$17 to \$20 with a few to \$20.50 and \$21. Cannors and cutters drew \$11 to \$17. Bulls sold from \$17 to \$22.

Good and choice slaughter calves ranged from \$23.50 to \$24.50, and common and medium sorts sold at \$17 to \$23.50. Culls sold at \$14 to \$17. Good and choice stocker steer calves ranged from \$30 to \$33 and heifer calves cashed at \$29 downward. Stocker steer yearlings of good kinds sold from \$27 downward and feeder cattle cashed at \$22 to \$26.

Hogs were steady at Fort Worth Monday as choice butchers again topped at \$23.25. Medium to good butchers sold from \$22 to \$22.75. Sows cashed at \$18 to \$21 and pigs drew \$21 to \$22. Stags cashed at \$12 to \$15 and boars sold from \$10 to \$12.

Dove Season Opens Sept. 1, Deer Nov. 16

Austin—Basic hunting regulations in Texas have been set by the Game and Fish Commission for the 1958 fall season. In general they will be very much the same as last season, according to the executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The regulations were approved by the Commission last week from recommendations made by biologists after they had studied conditions throughout the state, particularly in areas where regulatory authority has been granted to the Commission.

The hunting season will begin Sept. 1 for doves in the North zone. The season will extend through Oct. 20. In the South zone the season will be Oct. 1 through Nov. 19, except in the counties of the Rio Grande valley where it will be legal to shoot mourning doves for the two-day open white-winged dove season. There the season will end Nov. 17 inclusive.

Dove hunters also get another break. The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service has authorized the possession of 20 mourning doves, after the first day. The daily bag will continue at 10.

The white-winged season begins at 2 p. m. daily on Sept. 14 and 16, only, and ends at sunset on each day of the two days. The bag limit is 10 per day and 10 in possession.

Deer hunters will find the white tailed season in the Edwards Plateau and South Texas areas open Nov. 16 to Dec. 31, inclusive.

Antelope seasons will be the same as last year, except that in the Trans-Pecos area three more days have been added. The dates are Oct. 1-3; 5-7 and 8-10 inclusive. The Panhandle dates for antelope are Oct. 14-16 and Oct. 17-19, covering two areas.

Quail season will remain from Dec. 1 to Jan. 16, except in a few counties where the season has been closed by the legislature. Quail season has been opened in Crockett county this year.

The turkey season will remain the same this season as last year.

A digest of the Game and Fish Laws now is being prepared and will be ready for distribution through license dealers, wardens, and sporting goods stores as soon as possible.

FROM YOUR COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

There are two new drugs on the market that manufacturers claim will control cattle grubs, screw worms, horn flies and ticks. One is in the form of bolus and is made by Dow Chemical Co. The trade name is roten. Only one treatment is required per year. Doseage is one bolus per 300 pounds of body weight. The bolus can be divided into smaller parts to take care of the weight of the animal. This bolus can be applied with a balling gun used to give other pills to cattle. Dip the bolus in mineral oil to prevent damage to the animal's throat. Cattle should have access to feed and water before and after treatment. Avoid residue of meat or milk. Do not treat after the last of October. Do not treat within sixty days of slaughter. Do not treat lactating dairy cows. Young dairy animals may be treated up to 60 days before lactation. The other drug is known as Co-Ral. This material is in the form of a spray. Directions for use of Troiene would also apply to Co-Ral. Experiments carried on at the Experiment Stations at Spur and Junction indicate that these materials give satisfactory results when properly applied. It should be applied in accordance with the directions of the manufacturer. According to figures given by local concerns, the price on these materials will run from 75c to \$1.00 per head for treatment. Aphids or honey dew on water melons, cantaloupes and

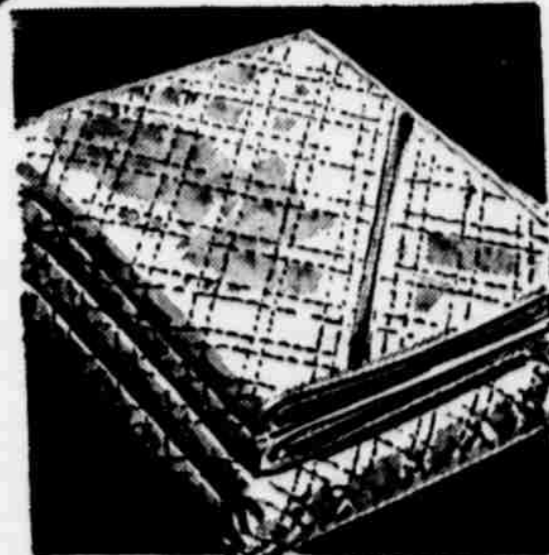
