#### A BIG COTTON CROP

From reliable private sources we get the information that the Texas cotton crop, if the present prospect matures, will run in excess of five and a half million bales, which means that the State of Texas will produce nearly half enough cotton to run the world for a year. This estimate gives the probable acreage to be gathered at 18,007,886 acres, which is a slight decrease from

If this be true and the situation develops as present indications are that it will, the cotton crop is not going to be as profitable this year as we had hoped. Of course, plenty of things can happen, but they are not likely to happen, and it would not be unwise to make plans in Floyd County on the basis of reasonably low prices. If better prices come, so much the better.

The wise manner in which Floyd County people have handled their business affairs, generally speaking, dur-ing the past two years especially, must be a source of gratification to every resident of the county. By diversifying their efforts and reducing expenses, Floyd County farmers and business men generally, actually arrived at June 15 and the opening of the wheat harvest September 1, 1925.

We must depend on this same wise procedure heading off an orgy of spending wheat profits against the prospect of a big cotton crop and a big price for the staple.

## SAVE THE MACHINERY

Everywhere is the hustle and bustle of the harvest. Everyone is directly and all are interested. The thoughts of the farmer are on getting his grain into the bins or to the elevator, and other matters are of minor concern.

But there is one thing that he might be thinking about at this time and this is the preparation of a storage room for his harvesting machinery, his combines, tractors, wagons and machines. Just a small portion of the monetary returns of this year's crop will defray the building expense of a shed that will house all of the implements.

Farm machinery that is left out in the weather to be soaked, rotted, rusted and warped by rains, snows and freezes is not going to be in first class condition for next year's business.
