

County Wheat Produced Less Than 1924 Record

Failure of late wheat to turn out the heavy production average set earlier in the season by the early crop caused Floyd County to fall below the 2,000,000 bushel mark that was anticipated this Official statistics show that Floydada sent out 530 cars during the T926 season and the entire county produced an approximated total of 1,543,900 bushels. The entire county shipped out to markets 1,038 carloads, averaging 1,-400 bushels each.

1924 Record Stands The 1924 report of the U.S. federal census, covering all of the wheat produced in the county regardless of where it was shipped, credited Floyd County with 1,879,899, a state record. The crop this year fell short of the record mark by 336,699 bushels, the

statistics show. At times during the harvesting season an active shortage of shipping cars was experienced but this situation was attributed largely to the fact that few farmers had granaries sufficient to



THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FLOYDADA: That the report or statement of the City Engineer filed with the City Council, describing the abutting property and giving the names of property owners and number of front feet and the cost of improvement chargeable against each abutting property and its owner, having been duly examined, is hereby approved. That the City Council does hereby determine to assess the entire cost of curbs, and threefourths of the cost of all other improvements, against the owners of the property abutting thereon, and against their property, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, Revised Statutes of Texas of 1911, and the Ordinance of the City of Floydada, That the said assessment shall be made after the notice to such property owners and all interested persons and the hearing mentioned and that the said portion of the said cost of improvements to be assessed against such property owners and their property shall be in accordance with the Front Foot Rule or Plan in the proportion that the frontage of the property of each owner bears to the whole frontage of the property to be improved; provided, that after such hearing, if such plan of apportionment be found to be not just and equitable in particular instances, the City Council shall so apportion all said cost as to produce a substantial equality between all such property owners abutting on said portion of said street, having in view the enhanced value of that property and the benefits derived from such improvements and the burdens imposed upon them by such assessment, and that in no event shall any assessment be made against any owner or his property in excess of the enhanced value of such property by reason of such improvement. That the proportionate cost of such improvement which is contemplated to be assessed against such owners and their properties shall become due and payable as follows:

One-sixth payable within thirty days after completion and acceptance by City of Floydada, Texas; one-sixth payable one year after said date; one-sixth payable two years after said date; one-sixth payable three years after said date; one-sixth payable four years after said date; one-sixth payable five years from said date, together with interest from said date at the rate of 7 per cent per annum, and reasonable attorney's fees and all costs of collection in case of default. That the total proportionate part of such improvement which is contemplated to be assessed against such owners and their respective properties and the names of the owners of property abutting upon said street aforesaid, properties to be improved, and the description of that property and the several amounts proposed and the description of that property and the several amounts proposed to be assessed against them respectively for paving and for curb and gutter, and the grand total thereof, which said sum does not and shall not in any event exceed three-fourths of the total cost of said improvements, except curbs, is as fol-

That after the conclusion of the hearing above mentioned such sum or sums as may be determined by the City Council to be payable by said property owners shall be assessed against them respectively, and against their respective properties, by ordinance or ordinances, in the manner prescribed by the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, Revised Statutes of Texas of 1911, and the Ordinances of the City of Floydada.

That the City Secretary of the City of Floydada is hereby directed to give notice to said property owners, their agents or attorneys, and to all interested persons, of said hearing, as prescribed by the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, Revised Statutes of Texas of 1911, and the Ordinances of the City of Floydada, by publishing said notice three times in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Floydada, the first of said publications to be made at least ten days before the date set for said hearing. Said City Secretary may also mail a copy of said notice by registered letter to each of said property owners, if known or their agents or attorneys, if known, said letters to be deposited in a post office in the City of Floydada at least ten days before the date set for hearing. However, said notice by registered letter shall be cumulative only, and notice by publication shall be full, due and proper notice of said hearing. It shall not be necessary to the validity of said notice of hearing to name any property owner abutting on said street, and the fact that any such property owner or owners are incorrectly named or not named at all shall in no wise effect the validity of the assessment against said property nor the personal liability against the real and true owner or owners of said property. No errors or omissions in the descriptions of the properties abutting on said street shall in any wise invalidate said assessment, but it shall be the duty of such property owner or owners whose property is incorrectly described to furnish a proper description at the hearing or hearings provided for. No error or omission of any character in the proceedings shall invalidate any assessment or any certificate issued in evidence thereof.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FLOYDADA: That the fact that the improvement of the street herein named is being delayed pending the taking effect of this ordinance, and that the conditions of said portion of said street endangers the public health, safety and property and creates an urgent public necessity for the immediate preservation of the public peace, property, health and safety, requiring that the rules providing that no ordinance shall be passed on the day on which it shall be introduced, and providing that no or-dinance shall become effective until ten days after the date of its last publication, and requiring that said ordinance be published once a week for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper published in the City of Floydada, be and the same are each hereby suspended, and that this ordinance shall be and is hereby passed as an emergency measure, and shall take effect and be in force from and after

The committee named to take the matter up with the commissioners was composed of C. R. Houston, Fred Bell and Ed Bishop. These with T. S. Stevenson and Lon M. Davis conferred with the commissioners on the condition and got their assent to put the road in better condition

Have Big Problem
Although the condition of the road from Floydada to the Briscoe County line was discussed freely and no effort made to minimize the fact that it was in bad condition, at a conference of the committee and several business men called in one day last week, it was pointed out that the commissioners have a big problem in the maintainence of their roads. This is particularly true in One, Three and Two. One and Iwo have very heavy mileage-more mileage it was freely declared, than their funds can posibly care for properly. In Three the demand made on the funds of Commissioner Wood on the caprock roads are very heavy. In this way it comes about that the roads on which the loudest complaint is made are sometimes given attention to the detriment of other roads. In the instance of the Silverton Road, this condition was aggravated by the fact that the possibility of being able to turn the road over to the highway department has been discussed and predicted in some quarters, and this the commissioners had hoped for, delaying repair work longer than they would have oth-

While some complaint was made, the committee members stated, by some business men who felt that a request for a donation to repair or maintain a cardinal road in passable condition, was inreasonable, the idea prevailed business expediency required the raisng of the fund regardless of other considerations.
