

Weaver Quits JP Post, Own Named Successor

Merle Weaver, justice of the peace, was accepted at a hearing Friday and appointed Virgil A. Haskell, real estate dealer and Haskell resident to succeed him.

Mr. Weaver had been in the office for 14 years and had failed to file his motion for resignation. His resignation was filed by his wife, Mrs. Weaver, in connection with a special election scheduled for April 4. It was very little response would be given to the resignation.

One of three applicants for the office, and his name on a motion for resignation submitted by Leon Newton, secretary of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce, was accepted by the court. The resignation was accepted by the court on March 1, 1961, for a four-year term ending Dec. 31, 1964.

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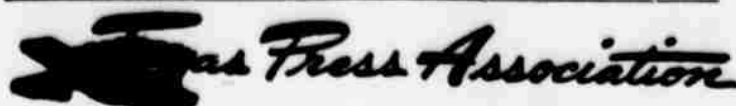

Court Opinion Should Settle Controversy

Now that the Civils Appeals Court at Eastland has upheld the validity of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, it is hoped that no further obstacles will be placed in the way of developing the project.

No criticism is due those who held an honest belief that the project had not been legally established and a water district created in accord with the law. They had a perfect right to seek a court ruling in the matter.

Since the higher court has rendered an opinion, and since a majority of the taxpayers in the four towns involved have endorsed the project in three separate elections, we do not see how further opposition to delay the program can be justified.

No one will dispute the need for developing a stable, dependable source of water for our town.

No one, especially The Free Press, will dispute the fact that a water program for our town will cost money, and that means more taxes.

However, a careful study of the Miller Creek program shows that its cost will be less than 10 cents a day for the average homeowner in Haskell. Although taxes in any form are never palatable, in such minute quantity as the above they should not be overly distasteful to any of us.

Also, since most, if not all, of the opposition to the Miller Creek project has stemmed from Haskell, there is a possibility that our town can lose rather than gain, by continuing efforts to block or delay the program.

During recent years, Haskell retail concerns have enjoyed steadily increasing business relations with the people of our neighboring towns including Rule, Munday and Goree, all members of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority. As a result, a close bond of community friendship has been built up between all the towns.

Because of this fact, and as the largest town in the Water Authority, Haskell has the larger responsibility of helping instead of hindering a program vitally needed by our neighbors as well as ourselves.

If we, as a community, take the position that we are unwilling to cooperate with neighboring communities in a matter of mutual need after pledging to do so, can we long expect—and deserve—their continued friendship?

When we lose their friendship there is a very definite likelihood that we'll also lose their continued patronage.

Spring Clean-Up Week

With Haskell's annual Spring Clean-Up only two weeks away, it is not a bit too early for home-owners and all civic minded citizens to make plans to cooperate wholeheartedly in the campaign.

60 YEARS AGO
MARCH 23, 1901

People, Places & Things

Snakes are on the prowl. This is the report sent in by game wardens and others who are outdoors a lot of the time.

Rattlesnakes and moccasins have been enjoying the spring sunshine for quite a while. Now coral snakes and copperheads are beginning to come out of hibernation.

V. A. Brown, new Justice of the Peace in Prec. 1, was well initiated on his first day in office Saturday.

Virgil had hardly opened his office when in came a Mexican with a traffic ticket. After a hurried study of his fee book to get his legal bearings, the JP imposed a fine of \$1 and costs, the minimum.

Two more traffic cases followed, with the new Justice still lenient and dishing out the minimum penalties to the violators.

His next "customers" had Virgil stumped momentarily. A young Negro couple, marriage license in hand, were seeking a "judge" to marry them.

Assured they were in the presence of a "marrying judge" there was a slight delay while Virgil found a book containing the marriage ritual. After locating the page and chapter the Justice conducted the solemn rites in the manner of a veteran.

In assembling material for the "Haskell County History" column on this page we reprint an item occasionally which draws the ire of readers. Just as sure as we re-publish the honor roll of Haskell grade school of 40 or 50 years ago, there'll be telephone calls thick and fast for a few days following, in which we receive a genteel dressing down.

Only this week, we noticed in the 1910 files that a popular Sunday pastime of Haskell young people was being criticized by adults because it permitted too much freedom of association between boys and girls.

Seems the youngsters would organize "excursions" to Stamford or Munday and a group of boys and girls would buy round trip tickets to these points. The Wichita Valley Railway operated four passenger trains daily through Haskell. This would permit the young people to make a train trip to the neighboring town and return the same day.

From today's viewpoint it seems these "excursions" were perfectly harmless, but 50 years ago they apparently were frowned upon by all except the most indulgent parents.

Trading point has extended way out into Dickens County. Mr. McCray, a ranchman of that county, was here this week buying a bill of ranch supplies. J. F. Jones gives notice that his gin and mill will not run again until April 6th.

The newspaper also revealed in the issue of 50 years ago this week that George Foster, rural mail carrier out of the Haskell post office, had purchased a motorcycle he planned to use in delivering mail to his rural patrons.

Considering the fact that roads in those days were designed entirely for horse-drawn vehicles, Foster must have experienced some rough riding in negotiating the deeply rutted roads, particularly during rainy weather.

The 1910 newspaper noted that Foster and Cliff Branham, another motorcycle enthusiast had rode their vehicles to Rule the previous Sunday, making the "run" back to Haskell in an hour and five minutes.

In those days motorcycles were considered a risky and dangerous means of transportation. It took a daredevil of the first water to ride one of the things, a man who didn't mind risking his life every second he was riding the two-wheeled, popping contraption.

Never will we forget the first "motordrome" we ever saw. It was one of the major attractions with a carnival which set up here for a week's stay in the summer of 1916.

It was located on the vacant lots which extended north from the old Haskell National Bank. The motordrome, a wooden, silo-like structure with a platform around the upper section for spectators, was located at the corner where the Gulf Station now stands.

When we saw our first motordrome performance, the hero worship previously reserved for Buffalo Bill and Casey Jones was immediately transferred to the helmeted and goggles rider who drove his motorcycle around and around the straight walls of the motordrome as the entire structure swayed and creaked with the strain.

The carnival barker operating the motordrome described the stunt man as "That steely-eyed daredevil from Paris, France, the world's only man who defies death and gravity—Capt. Henri Belo—the only living person who pilots a powerful motorcycle around the perpendicular walls you see here."

That spiel, and the accompanying roar of a motorcycle engine and smell of burning gasoline and oil, packed the motordrome at every performance. And for our money "Capt. Henri Belo" is still one of the world's most daring men!

Other excitement during the week's stay of that particular carnival included a killing which was bizarre in at least one respect—several witnesses saw the blaze of a pistol shot, but nobody saw the victim until his body was found more than 30 minutes later about a block from the scene.

Both participants were Neg-

ro men, the loser an employee of one of the carnival shows. Downtown streets were poorly lighted, and first knowledge of the shooting was when a pistol shot was heard just off the carnival midway, in the street at a point which would be in front of the present Texas Theatre.

Persons nearby saw the flash of the gun, and recognized the gunman as "Snaky George." After firing one shot, the Negro stuck the pistol in his belt and walked back to the carnival grounds.

The City Marshal and a Deputy Sheriff, hearing the shot, went to investigate and soon were told who did the shooting. But, no one had seen the person being shot at.

Officers soon found "Snaky George," who still had his pistol, an old-time 45. He readily admitted the shooting, and told officers the name of the carnival employee.

"Well, you must have missed him," the officers told the lanky Negro. "But we're going to have to take you to jail."

"Yassuh, I'll go to jail, 'cause I done killed that Negro," he told the officers, and went on. "You'll find him 'round here somewheres, and he'll be dead." "Snaky" declared.

Another educational and exciting place of interest was the D. B. & O. Institute, with 13 buildings, 28 teachers and 200 students. There lunch was served and a guide toured the building with the Scouts, telling them the cost of the institute was one and one-half million dollars. The buildings are modern and well equipped.

A visit to the Colorado river, Monument of Elizabeth Ney, Insane Asylum, State Teachers Association Building, the Governor's Mansion, Houston-Tillotson College and the Harlem Theatre was enjoyed very much. To climax their excitement, they attended the Scout-O-Rama which is a tremendous panorama of live demonstrations of Scouting crafts, skills, vocational interests, educational values and program features, including a carnival being held at the Municipal Auditorium lighted by blue stars.

They were accommodated by Mr. and Mrs. Jolly, a very distinguished Negro, who operates and owns Jolly Courts, a store and other real estate. Other reports were given by Principal Brembray and enjoyed by all.

In closing their reports, all boys and faculty members were grateful to Mr. C. Corley, Tom Barfield, Dr. T. Williams, Dr. Cadenhead and who made the trip possible. Especially said Kenneth Johnson, "We had such a wonderful time that I cannot tell all for I'm still excited and would like to say to Mr. Brembray, 'We love and thank you for such a marvelous trip.'" In closing his report, Earnest Franklin said, "I'd like to give special thanks to Mrs. Walker and Cubs of Den I for helping me to prepare for such a wonderful trip."

New Fertilizer Law Sponsored By Moffett

Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe has issued the following statement concerning the new fertilizer law, which he considers to be one of the first important bills passed at the current session of the Texas Legislature:

"A modernized and improved fertilizer law is needed in Texas," stated Senator Moffett. "The law passed many years ago made no reference to liquid fertilizers, which are widely used at this time. Other new and improved mixtures and brands of fertilizers have come on the market which are not mentioned in the old law. The use of fertilizers has expanded all over the state. Many farmers are now using fertilizers who have never used them before, and all farmers need to know the percentage of the various helpful elements contained in a bag of fertilizer."

"These factors indicate that a new law is needed. It is expected that the Governor will sign this bill and thereby place on the statute books of Texas a measure which will bring about proper control and regulation of the several kinds of fertilizer sold in Texas, with specific labeling as to the actual percentage of helpful elements in each container sold to the farmer or to other consumers for their lawns, flower beds and gardens."

"I am glad to have introduced and sponsored this bill through the Legislature, and will be ready to propose further changes if and when they are needed."

Senator Moffett Opposes Race Track Bill

In connection with proposed legislation which would permit race track gambling in Texas, the following statement has been released by Senator George Moffett, who represents this district in the State Senate.

"A persistent effort is being made at this session of the State Legislature to bring race track gambling back to Texas. It has been ousted from this state twice. However, the large profits which track operators hope to make if it is brought back to Texas, stimulate efforts to restore race track gambling in this state at almost every session of the Legislature."

"The proposal has been introduced this time by a member of the House of Representatives from San Antonio, who admits that he is a retired gambler. This proposal will very likely fail of passage, but it will probably be introduced again at future sessions."

"I have always voted against it and expect to continue to do so. It is obviously improper to pass a law to permit people at a race track to gamble from \$2.00 to \$2,000.00 on a horse race and at the same time make it illegal for people outside of the race track to gamble a few dollars in a dice game."

"However, the best reason for opposing legalized gambling at a race track, or anywhere else, is that it constitutes a step backward in the forward progress of civilization. It weakens the moral fiber of the people who participate and benefits no one. Texas is better off without it."

County Has One Rural Accident In February

The Highway Patrol investigated one rural accident in Haskell County during February, according to Sergeant Frank Jirek, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

There were no deaths nor injuries in the lone mishap, and property damage amounted to \$1,700.

This brings the accident toll for 1961 in this county to five persons injured, and property damage of \$3,580. There were no deaths.

"Defensive driving is one of the keys to traffic safety," Sgt. Jirek pointed out. "If all motorists were alert when driving and knew the tricks used by a professional driver, the number of monthly traffic accidents would drop sharply."

"For instance, if when passing other cars the motorist would watch closely the front wheels of the other car, he could see the other driver start a collision turn in time to take defensive action, possibly in time to prevent a tragedy," the sergeant explained.

Sgt. Jirek also pointed out that gusty March winds can cause accidents by making cars swerve unexpectedly at highway speeds. Motorists should be especially alert when making trips on windy days.

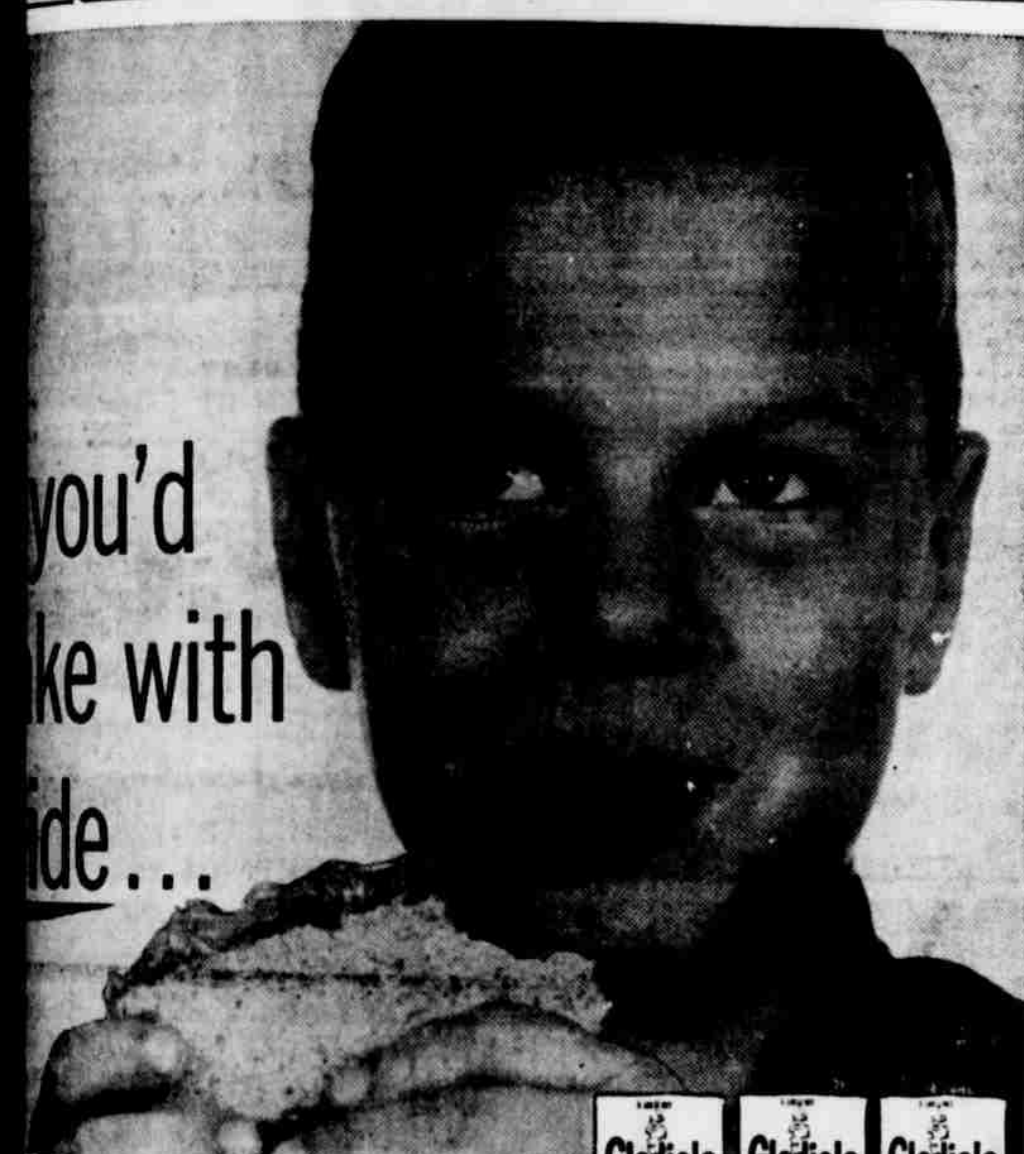
