

Abuse Prevention Month Opens

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month. On April 5, 2001, CASA 69, Inc. will host its second Light Vigil as part of a state and national movement to increase awareness for abused and neglected children. The Vigil will be held at the Dallam, Moore and Sherman County Courthouses and will begin at 6:00 p.m.

During the Vigil, carious city and county officials will speak in honor of the abused and neglected children in our area and area school children representatives will be present to participate. CASA 69 Board President, Beth Moore, said "The April 5 Vigil will be an opportunity to thank the dedicated people who have given their time and support to our organization. More importantly, this event, by bringing about awareness and education, would muster support for individuals to become trained volunteers for their county. I encourage everyone to come out with their family." Every year in Dallam, Hartley. Moore and Sherman Counties, the lives of more than 60 abused and neglected children are placed in limbo as they wait for the courts to determine their fate. CASA volunteers are appointed by judges to thoroughly research the specific needs of each child's case, and to advocate in court for the child's best interests. They give their time to assure these children can reach safe, lasting homes where they can thrive. Since its inception in 1986, CASA 69, Inc. has advocated for more than 396 children. National evaluations of CASA/GAL programs indicate cases are resolved faster when children have a CASA/GAL volunteer. In turn, children spend less time in foster care saving taxpayers millions of dollars each year. CASA 69, Inc. is a member of Texas CASA and the National Court Appointed Special Advocate Association. There are more than 840 programs in 49 states that advocate for abused and neglected children. 





6 large eggs

- ¹/₃ cup chopped drained Lindsay[®] Stuffed **Manzanilla** Olives
- 2 tablespoons light
- mayonnaise 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- ¹/₄ teaspoon hot pepper sauce Paprika (optional)

Cook eggs in barely simhard boiled, about 11 minutes. Drain; let stand in a pan of cold water until no longer warm. (Eggs may be prepared and refrigerated up to two days before serving.)

Peel eggs; cut in half length-

wise. Carefully remove the yolks, keeping whites intact. Crumble yolks into a bowl; add olives, mayonnaise, mustard and pepper sauce; mix well. Spoon mixture into egg whites. Arrange on a serving platter; sprinkle with paprika if desired. Makes 12 servings.

Tip: Leftover deviled eggs may be chopped in a food processor and served as a sandwich filling.

Looking for additional ways to incorporate olives into recipes? Here are a few suggestions using Lindsay Black Ripe Olives:

• Mix halved olives into your favorite spaghetti sauce and serve over broiled or pan fried readymade polenta.

• Stuff an olive into each meatball before cooking for an exciting variation of spaghetti and meatballs. Your guests may be pleasantly surprised.

• Marinate grilled black olives in a favorite vinaigrette (blended with half tsp. of red pepper flakes) and serve with grilled meat.





Pop Goes The Bunny: Tasty, Colorful Treats

(NAPS)-Adding fun to the Easter holidays can be as easy as a hop, skip and a jump with crispy, chocolatey pops that look like bunnies. This recipe from Creative Cook's Kitchen requires no baking, so children can take part in the preparation and decoration.

> **Easter-Bunny Pops** Makes 1 dozen pops

For the Pops:

 $\frac{1}{4} \exp{(\frac{1}{2} \operatorname{stick})}$ butter or margarine 1 bag (10 ounces) marshmallows 6 cups crisp rice cereal

For the Decorations:

- 1 package (12 ounces) white chocolate chips 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- Mini candy-coated chocolates 2 lengths red licorice laces
- (from a 4-ounce package), cut into 1¹/₂-inch pieces **Assorted small candies** 1 cúp prepared vanilla frosting Blue, green, red and yellow food colorings

Special aids:

- Jelly-roll pan
- 3" oval cookie cutter
- 3" bunny-shaped cookie cutter 12 wooden craft sticks or
- lollipop sticks **Small offset spatula** Small resealable plastic bags
- 12 lengths (3" each) narrow ribbon

1. Spray a jelly-roll pan with vegetable cooking spray. In a large saucepan, heat butter and marshmallows over medium-low heat, stirring until melted, about 4 minutes. Remove the pan from heat; stir in cereal.

2. Spoon mixture into the prepared pan. Using your hands, press to make level; cool completely. Using an oval cookie cutter, cut out six ovals. Using a bunny-shaped cookie cutter, cut out six bunny shapes.

3. Place cutouts on sheets of waxed paper. Holding the

4. In a medium microwavesafe bowl, heat white chocolate chips and oil on Medium, stirring at 1-minute intervals, until smooth, about 3 minutes. Using a small offset spatula, spread 1 side of each pop with melted chocolate.


5. For Easter-bunny pops, press mini candy-coated chocolates into pops for eyes and nose. Press 6 red licorice lace pieces into each pop for whiskers.

6. For Easter-egg pops, press assorted small candies into pops as desired. Set aside pops until chocolate is set, about 30 minutes

7. Divide frosting among 4 small bowls. Using food colorings, tint frostings blue, green, pink and yellow. Spoon frostings into separate resealable plastic bags; snip off one corner of each bag. Pipe pink frosting onto Easter-bunny pops for ears and mouths. Pipe remaining frostings onto Easter-egg pops as desired.







If people are married more than once, which spouse will they have in heaven? Some religious lawyers asked Jesus this kind of question. They wanted to trip up the Master. Jesus turned the tables on them. "You are mistaken, not understanding the Scriptures nor the power of God. For in the resurrection they neither marry nor are given in marriage, but are like angels in heaven" (Matthew 22:29-30. Jesus tells us the Scriptures teach the resurrection of the dead. Jesus also maintains His Father has power to raise the dead. In addition, He says life in the resurrection world is not at all like this life. Marriage is something for this life. There will be no marriage in the resurrected state. The reason is simple. Marital love is meant to picture the love Christ has for His church. "Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ also loved the church and gave Himself up for her" (Ephesians 5:25). The "Marriage supper of the Lamb" signifies the end of life as we know it (Revelation 19:9). When we enjoy the reality, life with God in eternity, we no longer need the picture. For this reason, Jesus likens life in the resurrected state to that of the angels. They live in bliss. They gladly serve God. So too, the great object of our affections will be the Creator, God alone.

•When choosing a site for the garden select an area with good drainage. Also, remember a steep slope is difficult to plant and care for. Plus, water running down the slope can carry away nutrients.

•A successful vegetable garden needs a location that gets at least five hours of sunlight each day. Be sure to choose plants that are right for the climate of your region.

• Different kinds of plants need different amounts of room to grow well, so it's a good idea to sketch out your plan for the garden.

• To save space in a vegetable garden, you can grow spreading vine plants, such as tomatoes, on stakes or other supports.

• To get the most out of your available space, consider planting vegetables in succession. For example, after harvesting early onions, cabbages and peas, plant beans, eggplants and peppers in the same location.







What may be more significant is the rapid acceptance of e-mail in our daily lives. For example, only 26 percent believed that sending condolences via e-mail was downright rude. Nearly three out of four of those polled found it appropriate or acceptable to send a thank-you note via e-mail, with 76 percent saying it was all right to invite someone to a party that way. There are limits to the use of e-mail. Discussing personal rela-

tionships is frowned upon, as is asking for forgiveness. Workplace gaffes included making personal long distance phone calls from work, putting

someone on speakerphone without telling him or her, forwarding personal e-mail without asking permission, shopping on the Internet while at work and planning personal trips from the office.
