

Even the disciples of Jesus backed away from this idea. "If the relationship of the man with his wife is like this, it is better not to marry (Matthew 19:10). Again, Jesus has a different thought. Why divorce for any cause? "Because of your hardness of heart" (Matthew 19:8). Marriage takes big hearts.
