Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing a breast self-exam each month.

Participants will receive a low-cost screening mammogram. Each

woman screened will receive a breast health risk appraisal and individual instruction by a registered nurse in breast self-examination. Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for Texas residents who qualify for assistance. All exams are done by appointment only. County Treasures Discovered

One of Barbara Haile's 7th grade English classes had the opportunity to go the Depot museum and write newspaper articles for some of the exhibits that are on display. Here is what the students have discovered

A typical teenage room these days would probably have a TV, stereo, some posters on the wall, and some clothes all over the floor (that should go in the closet). The room just described is nothing like the display at the Sherman County Depot Museum. The bedroom at the museum is very typical...for the early 1900's. Most rooms were not very big, so this means it could not hold very many things. This room consists mainly of: a dresser with a mirror, a twin size bed, a trunk for storing things, a rocking chair, some clothes, a few pictures, some shelves, a rug, and a few quilts. The bathroom facilities are actually located in the bedroom because there were no actual bathrooms. What they did use for the bathroom was a chamber pot. The early people would use this then slide it under the bed (there were not closets) and then wash their hands in the wash basin on the dresser.

Many people have contributed items for this room. Some of which are: the Doyal family, the dress belonged to them, Newt Crabtree's mother pulled enough cotton to earn enough money for the trunk, Genevieve Wilson and Bonnie Borth furnished the quilts, excluding the yo-yo quilt on the bed, (it was a gift from the Marvin Harrison family, but it was made by Mrs. Bertie Massie), the old rag rug is from Oline Caraway, and finally the pitcher was given by Bill Ross.

As you can see rooms have changed a lot. Today you don't have to wind up a clock every morning and every night, women don't have to lace up 18 pairs of grommets and hooks on their boots each morning, sleep in a night cap, wear a hat every day (boy or girl-and finally, we have running water so we don't have to wash our face with water from a bowl.

Come see the display and think about how lucky we are to live in 2001!

"Dust Bowl" was a term born in the hard times from the people who lived in the drought-stricken region during the Great depression. The term was first used in a dispatch from Robert Geiger, an AP Correspondent in Guymon, and within a few short hours the term was used all over the nation. The "Dust Bowl Days" were also known as the "Dirty Thirties". The decade was full of extreme: Blizzards, tornadoes, floods, Droughts, and dirt storms. 1930 was dry, but most of the farmers made a wheat crop. In 1931 the wheat crop was considered a bumper crop with over 12,000,000 bushels of wheat. Wheat was everywhere, in the elevators, on the ground, and in the road. The wheat supply forced the price down from sixty-eight cents bushels in July 1930 to twenty-five cents bushels in July 1931. Many farmers went broke and others abandoned their fields.

The Depot Museum has more information about life during the Dust Bowl. Go and see them soon.

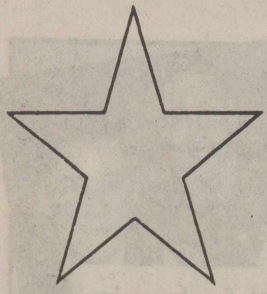

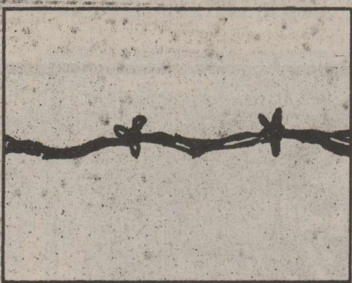
