

Texas Trunk System Proposed Route Additions

An additional 506 miles to the Texas Highway Trunk System were approved today by the Texas Transportation Commission during its monthly meeting.

With additional mileage, the Texas Highway Trunk System is a 10,500-mile planned rural network of a four-lane divided highway system that includes and compliments the Interstate System.

The added mileage includes:

- U.S. 54 from New Mexico state line to Oklahoma state line

- U.S. 62 from U.S. 83 to Oklahoma state line

- U.S. 285 from New Mexico

state line to I-20 - U.S. 79 from Henderson to

the Louisiana state line

- S.H. 103/S.H 21 from Lufkin

to Louisiana state line - U.S. 281 from San Antonio to

Stephenville

U.S. 67/385 from Fort

- SH 31 from Tyler to

Longview Of the 506 miles added to the trunk system, 384 miles, which are currently two-lane roads, would

need to be upgraded to four-lane divided. Each year, the Texas Department of Transportation spends nearly \$150 million to upgrade segments of the trunk system from 2-lane to 4-lane

roadways. Approximately 3,900 miles of the trunk system need to be expanded from two-lanes, which will cost nearly \$6 billion.




The approved route, Midland, Lamesa, Lubbock, Colorado, Amarillo, and Dumas.

In Texas, the final route will serve the Texas/Mexico border, West Texas and the Panhandle.

"This route is an investment in our future," said John W. Johnson, to Del Rio Texas transportation commissioner. "It has a regional Angelo impact to the state's infrastructure and has the potential to serve as a crucial trade corridor for Texas and the rest of the country. I applaud the communities along the corridor for their strong local support of the route."

While no funding has been set Lubbock for construction, development plans include upgrading the existing route to a four-lane divided highway. The estimated cost for these improvements is approximately \$1.2 billion.

The Ports to Plains Corridor, which is designated as a high priority corridor under the current federal legislation, will link the
