Things To Remember about Respecting The American Flag

By Gaynelle Riffe (taken from many sources through Scouting years

The flag may be displayed everyday, especially on national and state holidays. On Memorial Day, the flag should be hoisted to full staff and then returned to half staff until noon.

The flag must hang free either on a staff or to hang down from a rope across a street or to hang down from a rope across a street or on a

The flat is flown from sunup until sunset or properly lighted at night. (The flag should not fly in the dark).

When displayed either horizontally or vertically on a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flag's own right, the observer's left. In a window, the union should be to the street observers left. When flown over a street, the union will face the north or east. The union displayed down is a signal of dire distress.

No flag or pennant shall be flown above the American Flag or placed to the right of the American Flag. It should never be dipped to any person or thing but should remain tall.

During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the flag or when the flag is passing in a parade or in a review, all persons present should face the flag, stand at attention and salute. Those present in uniform should render the military salute, when not in uniform, men should remove their hat with the right hand, holding it over the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Men without hats and women and children should salute by placing the right hand over the heart. The salute to the flag in a moving column should be rendered at the moment the flag passes.

When the national anthem is played and the flag is not displayed, all present should stand and face toward the music. Those in uniform should salute at the first note of the anthem, retaining this position until the last note. All others should stand at attention, men removing the headdress. When the flag is displayed, all present should face the flag

When the flag is so worn or soiled that it is no longer suitable for display, it should be destroyed in a dignified manner, preferably by

If you are not able to fly your flag every day. Think about flying it on holidays and on the 11th day of each month as a remembrance of why we are not at peace.



As all of America struggles to grasp the consequences of the terrorist attacks in Washington, D.C. and New York, the president of the Sherman County Farm Bureau says America's ability to produce food is a blessing much of the world cannot hope to match.

"We do not know what lies ahead," said George Bonds, president of the Sherman County Farm Bureau. "We do know, however, that America will feed its people, or feed an army on the

Bonds said the American people can take comfort in the knowledge of a safe and secure food supply.

"Historically, America's ability to produce the tools of war, including food, has played a role in the victories over the enemies of freedom, and the farmers and ranchers of America are ready to do our part again," Bonds said.

From a food perspective, this is a time of great plenty in the United States. There is so much, in fact, that agricultural prices have been very low for some time, leaving much of American agriculture in dire economic

"If the need for food production increases, agriculture can gear up for it, even to the point of bringing other land into production," Bonds said.



October 31, commonly known as Halloween, is Reformation Day. In 1517 a German religious monk, Martin Luther, posted ninety-five statements on a church door in Wittenberg, Germany. In those days church doors were used as bulletin boards. Martin Luther launched a great debate. He sparked what historians call the Protestant Reformation. 
