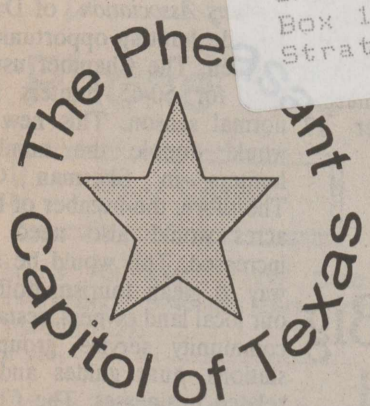


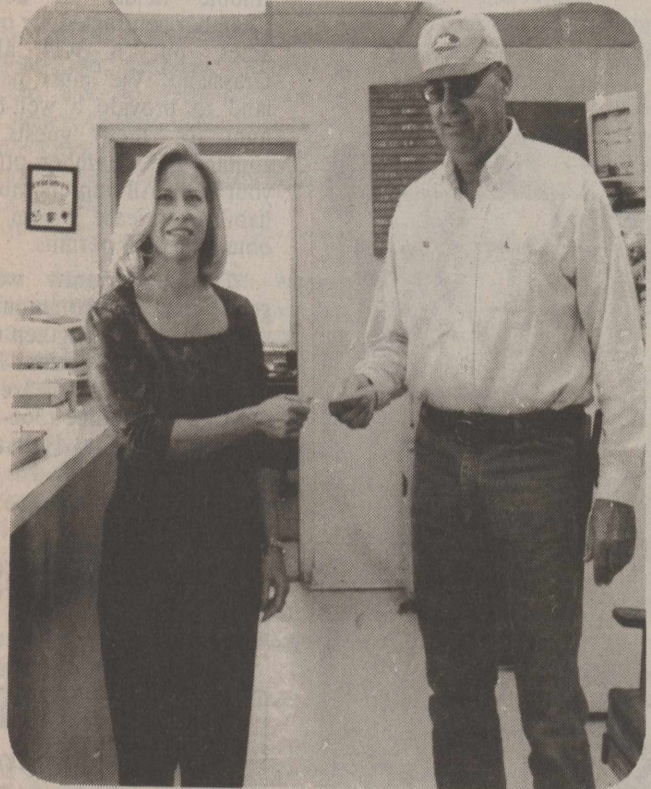

Lorie Vincent, Executive Director of the High Ground of Texas, received the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission's (PRPC) Goodwin Regional Public Administrator Award. The award was given at the organization's annual meeting and banquet held on Thursday, September 27, 2001, at the West Texas A&M University Hazel Kelly Wilson Banquet Hall in Canyon.

The award was established nine years ago by the PRPC to recognize a Panhandle area public servant for his or her contributions to our region. The award is named in memory of the late Beelee K. Goodwin, former City Manager of the City of Friona. Mr. Goodwin provided regional leadership in the public administration field for a number of years and was a fine example of a dedicated public servant.

More than 200 area local elected officials were present at the banquet where Randall County Commissioner Skip Huskey presented Vincent the award and informed the audience of her accomplishments. Huskey said, "The recipient of this year's award is a native of Dalhart. Our recipient is a graduate of Dalhart High School, Schreiner College and West Texas State University. She holds a BBA in accounting and is a certified economic developer. She developed and implemented a highly successful rural economic development program as the executive director of the Sherman County development committee, inc. in Stratford. During her seven-year tenure in that position, her program received the 1998 award of excellence in economic development from the Texas economic development council. The Sherman County program was also highlighted in the wall street journal as the premier economic development program for rural communities in Texas."

"In 1999, our recipient accepted the position as the first Executive Director of the High Ground of Texas, a position she currently holds. The High Ground is a regional coalition of over 50 communities and organizations involved in the economic development of a 54-county area in the Panhandle and South Plains. She currently serves on the

board of directors of the Texas Economic Development Council and the Panhandle Workforce Development Board. She has served as chair of the rural advisory committee for the Texas Department of Economic Development and as secretary for the PRPC's Regional Development Corporation.

"Our recipient was named in the "Who's Who in Texas economic development by Outlook Texas Magazine 2000 and 2001. She was named Stratford business person of the year in 1998, the district 9 business and professional women's young careerist in 1997, Dumas BPW woman of the year in 1998, and received a distinguished service award nomination from

the Amarillo women's Forum in 1999. She is a member of the Texas Leadership class of 1997"

Huskey closed his remarks saying, "The Goodwin Public Administrator Award is presented to an outstanding Panhandle public administrator and leader- Lorie Vincent."

## Things To Remember about Respecting The American Flag

By Gaynelle Riffe (taken from many sources through Scouting years)

The flag may be displayed everyday, especially on national and state holidays. On Memorial Day, the flag should be hoisted to full staff and then returned to half staff until noon.

The flag must hang free either on a staff or to hang down from a rope across a street or to hang down from a rope across a street or on a wall.

The flat is flown from sunup until sunset or properly lighted at night. (The flag should not fly in the dark.)

When displayed either horizontally or vertically on a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flag's own right, the observer's left. In a window, the union should be to the street observers left. When flown over a street, the union will face the north or east. The union displayed down is a signal of dire distress.

No flag or pennant shall be flown above the American Flag or placed to the right of the American Flag. It should never be dipped to any person or thing but should remain tall.

During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the flag or when the flag is passing in a parade or in a review, all persons present should face the flag, stand at attention and salute. Those present in uniform should render the military salute, when not in uniform, men should remove their hat with the right hand, holding it over the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Men without hats and women and children should salute by placing the right hand over the heart. The salute to the flag in a moving column should be rendered at the moment the flag passes.

When the national anthem is played and the flag is not displayed, all present should stand and face toward the music. Those in uniform should salute at the first note of the anthem, retaining this position until the last note. All others should stand at attention, men removing the headdress. When the flag is displayed, all present should face the flag and salute.

When the flag is so worn or soiled that it is no longer suitable for display, it should be destroyed in a dignified manner, preferably by burning.

If you are not able to fly your flag every day. Think about flying it on holidays and on the 11th day of each month as a remembrance of why we are not at peace.

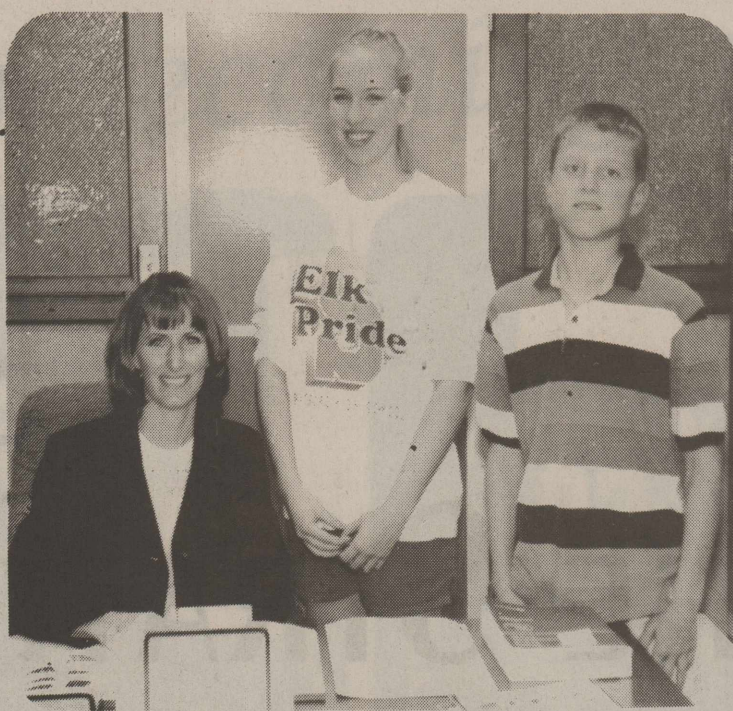
On Saturday, October 20th all

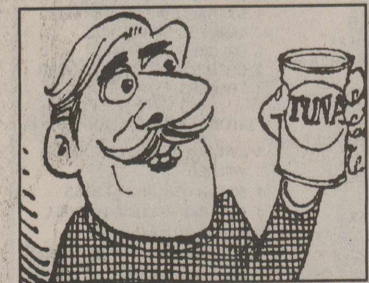
"We do not know what lies ahead," said George Bonds, president of the Sherman County Farm Bureau. "We do know, however, that America will feed its people, or feed an army on the move."

Bonds said the American people can take comfort in the knowledge of a safe and secure food supply.

"Historically, America's ability to produce the tools of war, including food, has played a role in the victories over the enemies of freedom, and the farmers and ranchers of America are ready to do our part again," Bonds said.

From a food perspective, this is a time of great plenty in the United States. There is so much, in fact, that agricultural prices have been very low for some time, leaving much of American agriculture in dire economic straits.

"If the need for food production increases, agriculture can gear up for it, even to the point of bringing other land into production," Bonds said.

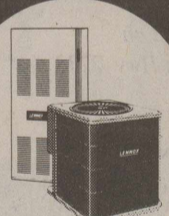

## Speech Team Competes In Pampa Speech Tournament

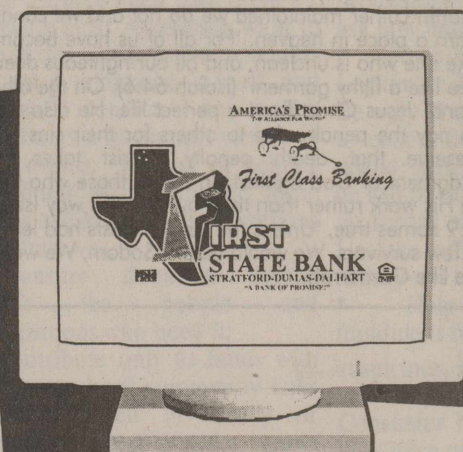

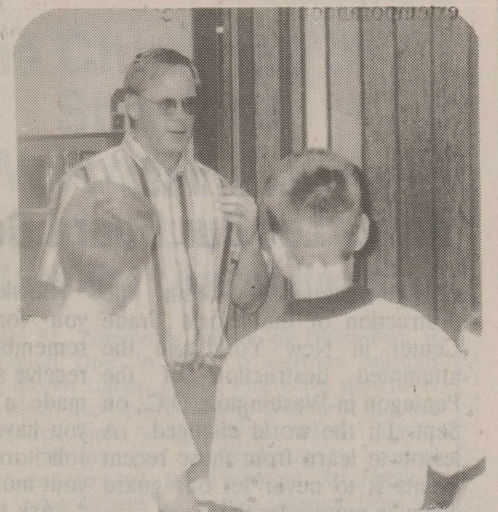

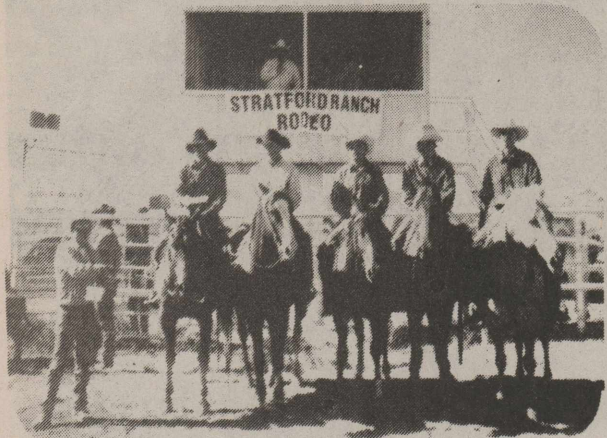

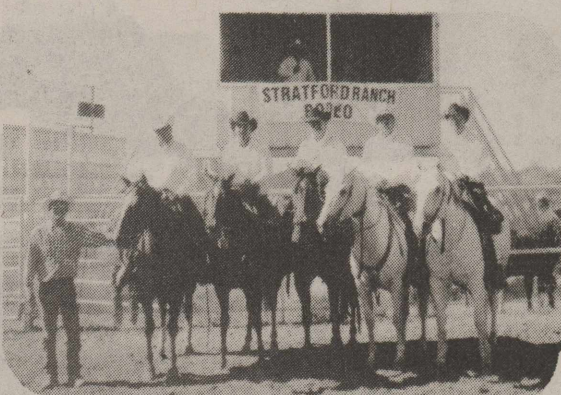

## Lesson Learned: Never Let Our Guard Down!

College Station: With the destruction of the World Trade Center in New York and the attempted destruction of the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., on Sept. 11, the world changed. A lesson to learn from these recent events is to never let our guard down, in more ways than one. Although Americans as a whole are pulling together to recover and rebuild from this tragedy, con artists don't let an opportunity to make a quick buck pass them by. Knowing most Americans want to help in any way possible, schemers are using telephone, e-mail, and personal contacts to solicit contributions to support victims of these events. Instead of helping the victims of this tragedy, these thieves are keeping the donations for themselves. To ensure donation dollars benefit the people and organizations who need it: \* Contribute only to funds with well-known local community links or funds listed in locally or nationally recognized news sources. Never send money or give credit card numbers to a charity which contacts you by telephone unless you personally know it. \* Ask for written information, including the charity's name, address, and telephone number, and proof that contributions are tax deductible. Tax-exempt organizations don't have to pay taxes, but the organization's tax-exempt status doesn't mean donations are tax deductible. If deductibility is important, ask for a receipt showing the amount of your contribution and stating it is tax deductible. \* Ask for the name and telephone number of the charity the donations are being solicited for. If the caller refuses, hang up. Call the charity which was named. Find out if the organization is aware of the solicitation and if they have authorized the use of their name. \* Watch out for similar-sounding names. Some phony charities use names that closely resemble those of respected, legitimate organizations, such as a police or fire department organization.

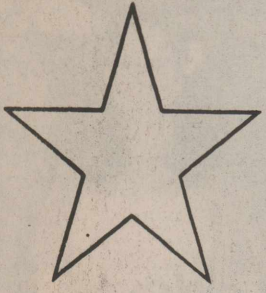
\* Be skeptical if someone thanks you for a pledge you don't remember making, or if you receive an invoice claiming you've made a pledge when you know you haven't. Some unscrupulous solicitors use this approach to get your money. \* Ask how your donating will be distributed. How much will go to the cause you want to support, and how much will cover the charity's administrative costs? If a professional fund-raiser is used, ask how much it will keep. \* Refuse high pressure appeals. Legitimate fun-raisers won't push. Be wary of offers to send a courier to collect donations immediately. Avoid cash donations which can be lost or stolen. For security and tax record purposes, pay by check. Use the official full name of the charity-not initials-on your check. \* Help find and expose fraudulent fund raisers. If you are suspicious, call the sheriff's office and use the Web page of the Consumer Protection Division of the Office of the Attorney General at <http://www.oag.state.tx.us/> For a list of legitimate agencies accepting donations, visit the Web site <http://dailynews.yahoo.com/fc/US/Emergency Information/>.

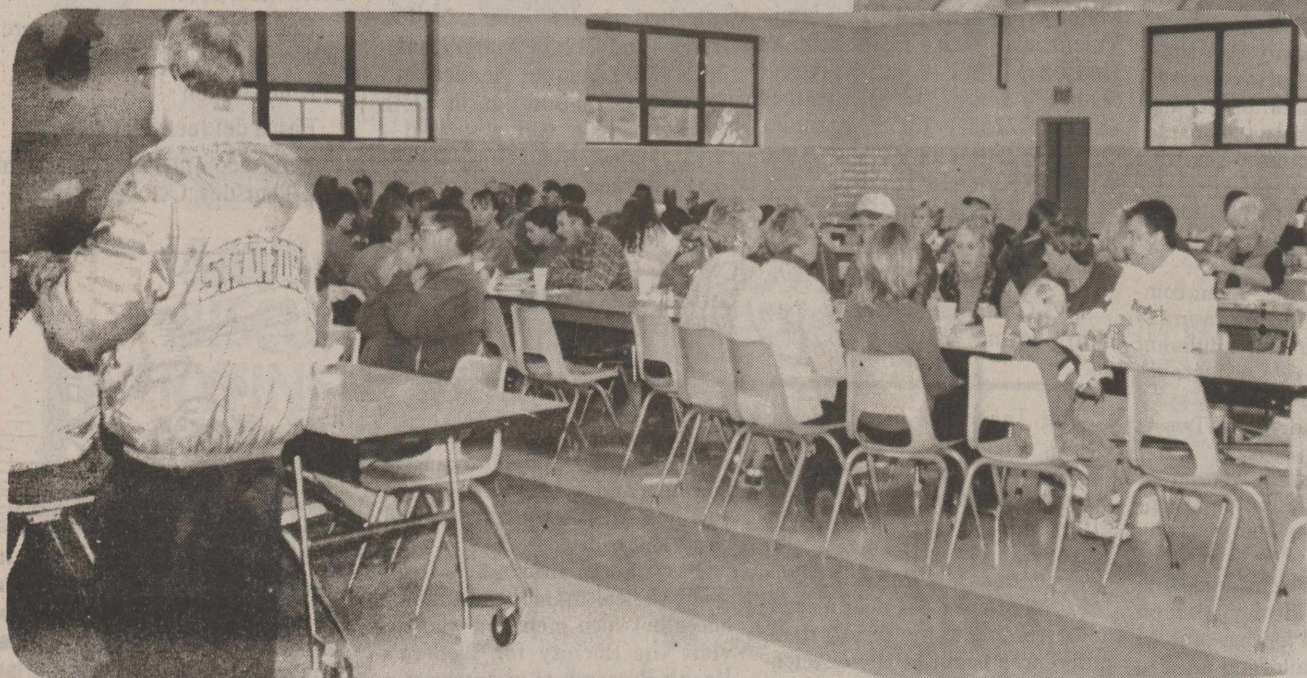
