A Prophecy Fulfilled

"Strike the shepherd that the sheep may be scattered" (Zechariah 13:7). These are words spoken about Christ over 500 years before His birth. How is this possible? These words were spoken by a true prophet of God. They are therefore words of God. They were explicitly fulfilled. The night before the crucifixion, Jesus said to His disciples, "You will all fall away because of Me this night, for it is written, 'I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep of the flock will be scattered" (Matthew 26:31). This is exactly what happened. Judas took a group of soldiers out to the Garden of Gethsemane to arrest lesus. "And they loid heads on this and saised this". Jesus. "And they laid hands on Him and seized Him" (Mark 14:46). In the scuffle, one of the disciples "drew his sword and struck the slave of the high priest, and cut off his ear" (Mark 14:47). When Jesus did not resist and was taken, the disciples "all left Him and fled" (Mark 14:50). So it was that these words spoken about Jesus over 500 years beforehand were fulfilled in intimate detail. This is wonderful evidence concerning the truth of the Bible. It is confirmation that the Bible is the Word of God. Only God could give us words that are infallibly fulfilled. Therefore, they are words, "to which you do well to pay attention" (2 Peter 1:19).



Additional Transportation Enhancement Projects Funded

State officials approved \$1,934,274 for the Stratford Main Street project today. The project is one of 10 transportation enhancement projects totaling nearly \$12 million selected by the Texas Transportation Commission, during its monthly meeting. Last month, the Commission approved more than \$143 million for transportation enhancement projects.

The Statewide Transportation Enhancement Program funds non-traditional transportation projects such as those involving bicycle and pedestrian facilities, landscaping and scenic beautification, historical preservation and environmental mitigation.

All the approved projects were selected from 315 eligible projects, totaling more than \$500 million, nominated last year by local authorities across the state. Projects are evaluated for quality, transportation value and benefits.

Enhancement projects are eligible for federal reimbursement of up to 80 percent of allowable costs, Enhancement projects are eligible for federal reimbursement of up to 80 percent of allowable costs, which includes planning, design, environmental mitigation, property acquisition, construction and administrative expenses. Preliminary project work must be authorized in advance by the Federal Highway Administration for eligible cost reimbursement.

January 30, 2002 and continuing are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Dalhart, TX, Hunter M. Lathem said today.

Dallam and Sherman Counties are two of 8 in Texas recently named by President George W. Bush eligible for loans to cover part of actual physical and production losses resulting from the severe ice storm.

Mr. Lathem said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 per cent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Mr. Lathem said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until October 1, 2002, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr. Lathem said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. and to farming citizens partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Dalhart is open from 8-4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Set aside about ¹/₄ cup dates for bunny's eyes. Knead remaining dates into dough, if desired. Divide dough into 10 equal pieces. Roll each to 24inch rope. Divide each rope into 1 (13-inch), 1 (6-inch), 2 (2inch), and 1 (1-inch) strips. Coil 13-inch strip to make body; coil 6-inch strip to make head. Attach head to body; pinch to seal. Shape 2 (2-inch) strips into ears and remaining 1-inch strip into tail. Attach to body and head. Place on 2 greased baking sheets. Cover; let rise in warm, draft-free place until doubled in size, about 1 hour.

Bake at 375°F for 15 to 20 minutes or until done. Remove from pans; cool on wire racks. **Drizzle with Powdered Sugar** Glaze. Insert reserved date pieces for eyes.

Powdered Sugar Glaze: Combine 1 cup powdered sugar, sifted; 2 tablespoons milk; and ½ teaspoon vanilla extract. Stir until smooth.


