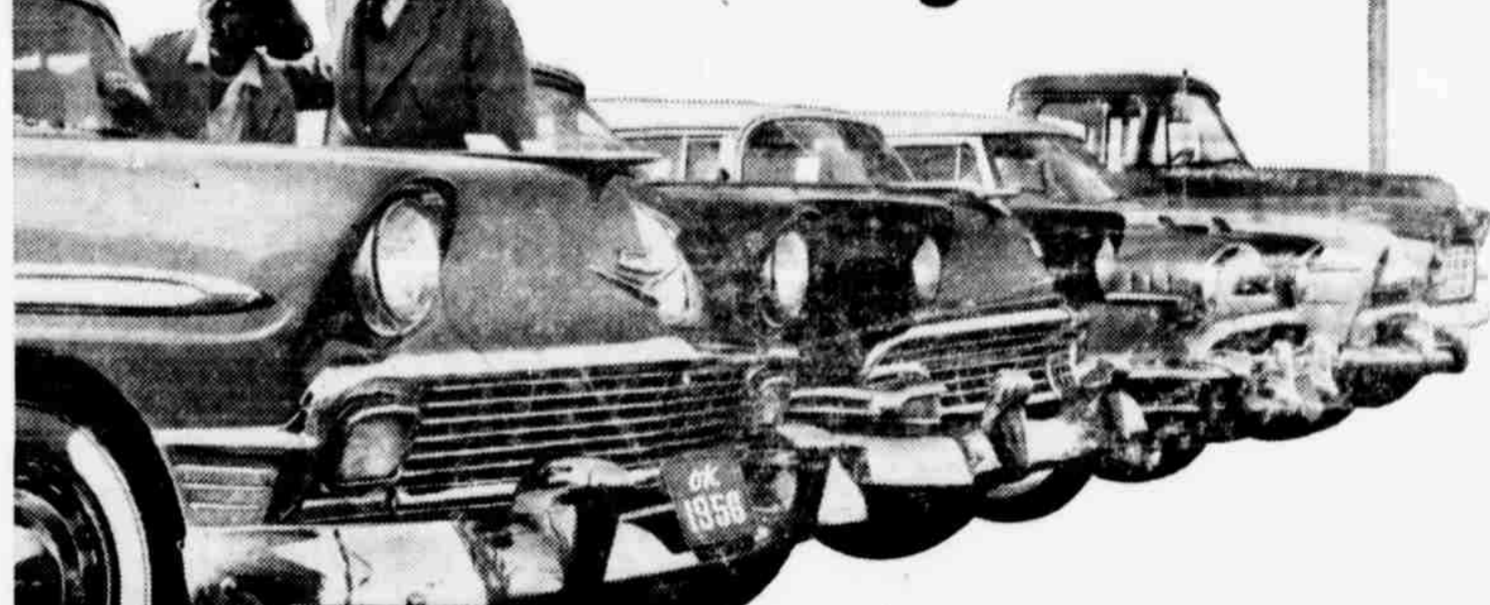

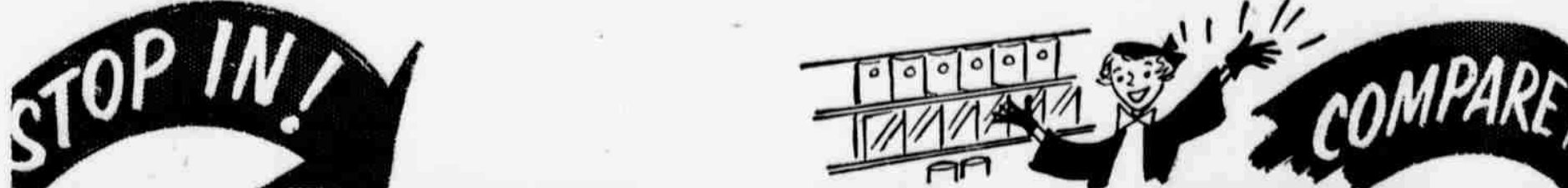

Overton says that producers who designate more acres than needed for fulfilling the Cotton Acreage Reserve Agreement may be adjusted by paying a nominal fee within 15 days of Notice of Excess Acreage. If not adjusted, the excess acreage will be treated as acreage reserve and no crop may be harvested from excess acreage. However, an approved cover crop may be planted on Acreage Reserve acreage for erosion control purposes.

Truck Is Handy Farm Vehicle, Survey Shows

With the need to keep farm costs down, many farmers are checking their records to see if their pickup trucks are paying their way. One-half to one-ton trucks cost an average of 11 cents per mile to operate, according to figures. Records on pickup trucks, kept by farmers in cooperation with University of Illinois researchers, showed trucks in use average five years of age and are driven 4,280 miles each year.

Gasoline, oil and repairs added up to 4.4 cents per mile. Depreciation an interest on investment cost 4.8 cents. Insurance and licensing averages 1.4 cents, and hidden costs for shelter and operator's maintenance labor equalled 1.1 cents. Mileage radically affects cost, according to the survey. Trucks operated 1,500 to 3,000 miles per year cost 17.4 cents per mile, while trucks operated 5,000 to 8,000 miles cost only 9.9 cents. This shows that fixed costs such as insurance, add up to expensive miles when trucks are used little. Any and all possible reasons for ownership should be considered when considering whether or not a truck is needed. Experience of a typical farmer who used a tractor as a pickup truck replacement showed cash operating costs for the small tractor came to 20¢ per hour. The 12 cents per mile the farmer was paying for his truck was more than his out-of-pocket costs for using the tractor on short trips and his car for longer trips. But a year later, the farmer still owned his truck. "It's just too convenient to do without," was his explanation.
