Where several counties agree to cooperate in the program, a central headquarters is set up with a library of at least 4,000 volumes. The Rural Library Service furnishes a bookmobile, librarian, and assistant and schedules regular visits to all towns in the co-operating counties. Through this in recognition of his service to cooperative program, library ser-vice is available throughout the entire area of counties joining in the program.

Only expense to the counties is provision of central headquarters for the library and bookmobile, and necessary utilities required for the building or offices used. The demonstration program is set up for one year. At the expiration of that time, counties in the program will be assisted in seting up a continuing service at their own expense, if desired, with the Rural Library Service cooperating in providing books.






