## Little New Evidence in Hobart-Miller Trial; State's Testimony Nearing Close

Crowds Jam District Court Room to Hear Testimony.—States Star Witnesses Wednesday.

This morning at ten o'clock little new evidence had been brought out that was not used in the trial of E. T. (Dusty) Miller and Mrs. Ruth Hobart at Amarillo in December, when they were on trial charged with the murder of E. W. Hobart, a traveling salesman, whose dead body was found near the Bivins Stadium by two little girls in July of last year. Hobart's death was due to gunshot wounds, Miller and Mrs. Hobart have been under \$10,000 bond each in the case, which was transferred for trial here after mistrial in December. At that time jurymen became ill just as the trial opened and before any ballots were taken by the jury.

Interest in the case locally and over the entire panhandle has been keen, Miller having been prominent as an attorney in Amarillo for years. Hobart was also widely known, having travelled over this territory for some time.

The case is proceeding much faster here than it did at Amarillo, where a week was consumed in obtaining a jury. The last juror was chosen in this trial Monday afternoon at 3:30 being obtained after 93 of the 100 special veniremen summoned had been examined. The jury is composed of the following:

J. W. Taylor, farmer near Flomot; C. B. Sims, farmer 3 miles east of Floydada; W. N. Paschall, Floydada, a carpenter; J. W. Conway, clerk in the Massie Wholesale Grocery; J. L. Elmore, farmer, of Starkey; Noah Smalley, grocer of Lockney; J. E. Dickey, grocer, Floydada; G. M. Tate, farmer, Aiken; A. S. Green, farmer, Floydada; J. C. Covington, farmer, Floydada; H. N. Porterfield, farmer, Floydada; Grady Hall, Clerk Harmon's Furniture Store, Floydada.

Examination of state witnesses began at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon. More than 60 witnesses had been examined when court adjourned yesterday afternoon and a score or more witnesses for the state are yet to be examined. To the 311 witnesses summoned before the opening of the trial was added some thirty witnesses summoned following its opening and for some of whom attachments have been issued. However, only 151 of these had made appearances at noon Wednesday, with practically no state witnesses present.

Star witnesses for the state were examined Wednesday. They were R. A. Starnes, former policeman on the Amarillo force, E. L. King, a farmer living 7 miles out from Amarillo, F. H. Holman, a warehouseman at Amarillo, C. M. Davis, ex-deputy sheriff and Less Whitaker, ex-sheriff.

The District Court room which accommodates 1200 people seated, has been crowded, with a hundred or more standing daily since the case opened. A half a dozen special officers are used to handle the crowds. No rangers are here, none having been requested of the adjutant general.

State Ranger Frank Hamer may be here today or tomorrow as a witness. He assisted officers of Amarillo in the investigations prior to the indictment of the defendants in the case.

Attorneys in the case for the defense are: E. A. Simpson, of Clarendon; C. B. Reeder, of Amarillo, and L. G. Mathews, of this city. The Council for the state includes Charles Clements, District Attorney of this district; Lloyd Fletcher, District Attorney of the Amarillo District and F. L. Oyler, of Iola, Kansas.

As indicating that the case is expected to consume the remainder of this week, presiding Judge Joiner dismissed the regular jury panel Monday until Monday of next week.

Rev. J. L. Henson and daughter, Margaret, are expected home sometime next week from Exeter, Calif., where they have been since they buried Mrs. Henson there Sunday of last week. Margaret's grandmother resides at Exeter.

Floyd County Chapter American Red Cross, Monday forwarded \$80 to be used for the relief of the tornado victims in Illinois and Indiana, in response to a broadcast appeal from St. Louis, the headquarters of the southern division of the organization, and authorizing soliciting funds for the purpose.

Judge F. P. Henry, County chairman, forwarded the money Monday noon, following a canvass made Mrs. E. L. Angus and Mrs. Lon M. is among residents of Floydada. ## Brother of Charlie Mickey Killed Saturday

One of First Settlers in Floyd County Killed on Duty in Pistol Duel at Clovis.

L. H. (Lew) Mickey, resident of Floyd County for three years from 1891 to 1894, and brother of Charlie Mickey, mercantile dealer and postmaster at Mickey, in this county, was killed Saturday morning at 2 o'clock in Clovis, while on duty as a special officer for the Santa Fe. He in turn killed Leslie Starr, an 18-year-old boy, also of Clovis. The boy died instantly, but Mr. Mickey lived for an hour or more and made a statement on his death bed at the hospital.

He was searching an east-bound freight on a telegraphic request from Mountair, N. Mex. for the boy, when he found him in an ice receptacle of a refrigerator car. Not expecting any resistance from the youth, he overlooked a 32 automatic the lad had strapped about his neck and was stooped over searching the boys legs and feet, when the boy shot him six times, his statement said. He shot the boy four times as he lay stretched out on the car, the last shot killing the boy instantly. Both were found a few minutes later by trainmen.

Besides his wife and two children, 4 and 6, Mr. Mickey is survived by several relatives in this county. Of these Charlie Mickey, of Mickey, is his brother, Mrs. Lizzie Schmidt of Lockney is a sister. The former, in company with R. R. and Elmer Mickey his sons, and nephews of the deceased left Saturday morning for Clovis, returning home Monday morning. Mrs. Robin Baker, and Mrs. Harding Nall, niece, with Mr. Nall and Mrs. Schmidt, went to Clovis Sunday to attend the funeral, which was held at 5 o'clock in the afternoon. W. W. Wisdom, of the Dougherty Ranch in southeast Floyd County is a brother of Mrs. L. H. Mickey.

For the past 20 years L. H. Mickey has been U. S. Marshal, Ranger or Cattle Inspector in New Mexico and Arizona. He had been living in Clovis two or three years where he worked for the Santa Fe as special officer. Old-timers in this county will remember Mr. Mickey as having filed on the place south of Mickey one mile, now owned by A. R. Hanna. This was about 1891 or 1892. He lived here two or three years, coming to this section with his brother, Charlie.

## O. P. Rutledge Named C. of C. Secretary

Maury Hopkins Resigns to Take Similar Work at Plainview, Effective April 1st.

Tuesday morning the board of directors of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce named O. P. Rutledge, for a number of years one of the more prominent business men of the city, to succeed Maury Hopkins, resigned, as secretary of the organization. Mr. Rutledge consented to take the place and will arrange his business affairs before he takes the reins of the secretaryship, so that he can give Chamber of Commerce work his entire attention.

Announcement of the resignation of Maury Hopkins, secretary of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce, was made Tuesday morning by the directors of the organization at a called meeting of the board, following Mr. Hopkins' request for release from the position held with the local Chamber for three years, to take a similar place with the Plainview Board of City Development and Chamber of Commerce, proffered last Friday, when John Boswell resigned there to go to Dallas.

Regret that Mr. Hopkins saw fit to resign was expressed freely and warm praise was given his work here by members of the board and the membership generally. This regret was put in the form of resolutions unanimously adopted.

Although Mr. Hopkins resigns to take effect April 1st, several matters which now have his attention will be completed before he turns over the job to Mr. Rutledge, and he will probably spend sometime with the local office up till the 15th of April, if necessary.

"I had a hard time making myself consent to give up this work here," Mr. Hopkins said. "Floydada has been good to me, and I have had the pleasure of doing a lot of hard work for the town. The kind words friends have said to me and about me are deeply appreciated. I hope I can make as many friends in Plainview. The warm support of the forward-looking citizenship of Floydada for Chamber of Commerce work I do not expect to excel anywhere."

O. P. Rutledge, whose choice as successor to Hopkins, came as a surprise to many, is considered a good man for the place. Although he has had wide experience in business, and is always identified with every movement for the betterment of the business or civic conditions of the community.

"Since we are losing 'Hop,' we are mighty fortunate to be able to out-talk O. P. Rutledge," T. R. Webb, president of the Chamber of Commerce said Tuesday. "His ability is unquestioned, his loyalty has been the admiration of all and he is an untiring worker."

Mr. Rutledge has been a director of the Chamber of Commerce and a successor will be named to fill this place on the board soon.

**SAVE SOME MONEY**

Floydada people, in making a good fire record last year not only saved a considerable amount of destruction by the ravages of fire, but saved some money on their insurance premiums as well. Early in this month the Fire Insurance Commission of the State announced a flat reduction of 6 per cent in the insurance rates written within the corporate limits of Floydada. Six per cent of the fire insurance bill in Floydada is several hundred dollars.

It pays to be careful to prevent fire. Another good record during 1925 would lop off a considerable amount more of the bill, the maximum reduction possible by this means being 15 per cent.

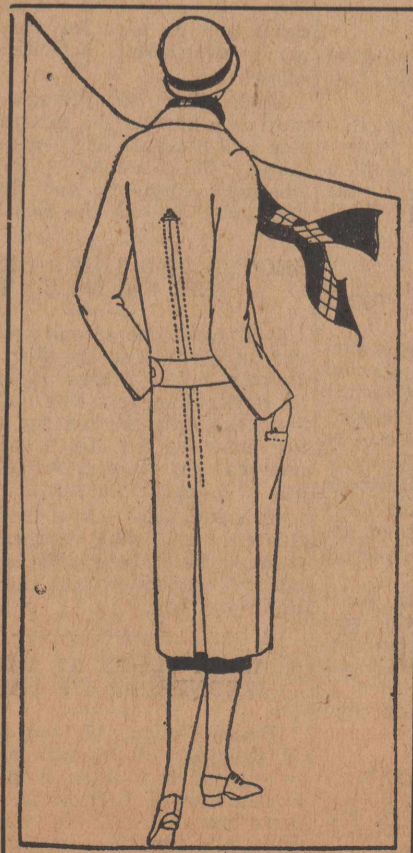

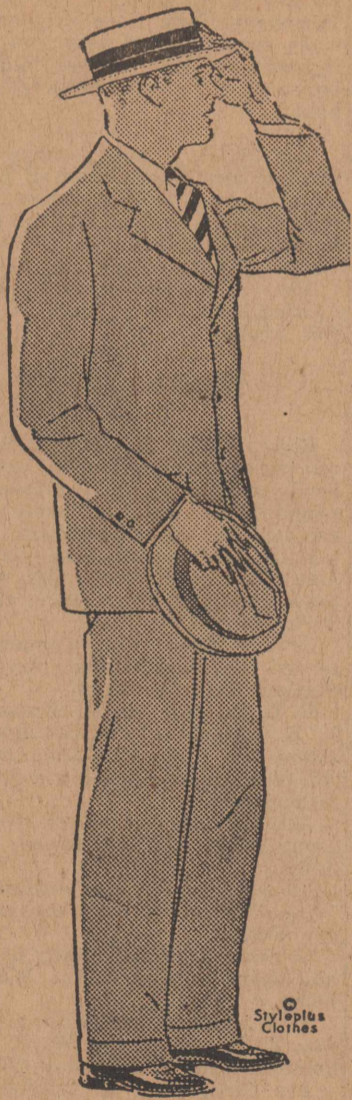

MAKING AMERICAN CHEESE AT HOME

In last week's issue we gave the recipe for making American Cheese at home as submitted to us by Miss Mabel Faulkner, County Home Demonstration Agent, and announced at that time that in this week's issue would follow some further hints on successful cheese making.

Hints For Cheese Making

1. Sometimes it cracks in center caused from lack or too much weight.

2. Be sure to have fresh milk. Only whole milk should be used as skim milk cheese made by this method is hard, dry and lacking in flavor.

3. Having control of temperature throughout the manufacturing process is essential to the successful making of cheese. A good dairy thermometer is therefore necessary.

4. Regular cheese color should be used and not butter color, as the butter colors the fat and not the curd.

5. After the rennet has been stirred in, the milk must stand undisturbed until curded. If there is the slightest motion to the milk while curdling the curd will not be firm.

6. The curd must be cut at the right stage of firmness. Cut with large knives both ways.

7. As soon as the curd is cut it should be stirred gently in order to prevent the pieces from striking together and forming large lumps.

8. The proper degree of firmness of the curd may be determined by pressing a mass of it between the hands. If when suddenly freed from pressure the pieces fall apart at once and show no tendency to stick together the curd is of proper firmness. At this stage the cubes have contracted to about 1-2 the size they were when the curd was cut. If the curd becomes too firm the cheese will be dry and "corky" while on the other hand if the curd is not firm enough, the cheese will be soft, too moist, and likely to sour.

9. The amount of acid which is allowed to develop in the curd before removing the whey is the most important step in cheese making process. The curd while in the whey should be closely watched to prevent the development of too much acid, as a curd that is over-acid produces a dry mealy cheese with a sour flavor while a curd with too little acid is likely to develop gas and bad flavors during the curing process and does not keep well. The proper amount of

acid to develop in the curd before removing the whey may be determined by pressing a little curd in the hand, pressing gently but with increasing firmness for about a minute, or until the particles adhere and moisture is expelled. This piece of curd is rubbed gently on a clean hot iron until it adheres and is then very slowly and carefully pulled away from the iron. If in doing this fine like threads, 1-4 to 1-2 inch long are formed, the whey should be removed. If threads do not form, sufficient acid has not yet developed, the curd should be left in the whey to permit the development of acid. During this period occasional stirring is required to prevent matting. The iron should be just hot enough so that the curd will stick to it and not burn the fine threads.

10. As soon as the curd is firm and the proper amount of acid is developed, the whey should be removed. The curd should be kept warm and as near 100 degrees F. as possible to prevent the development of acid.

11. Curing is an important part of cheese making. Both the temperature and humidity should be under reasonable control.

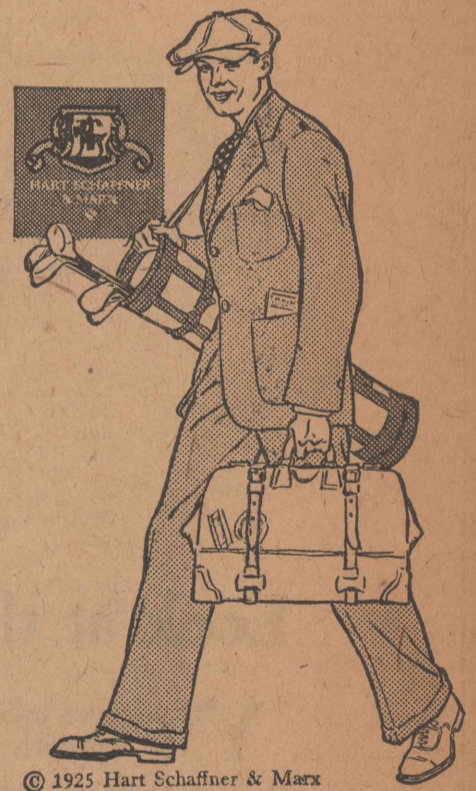

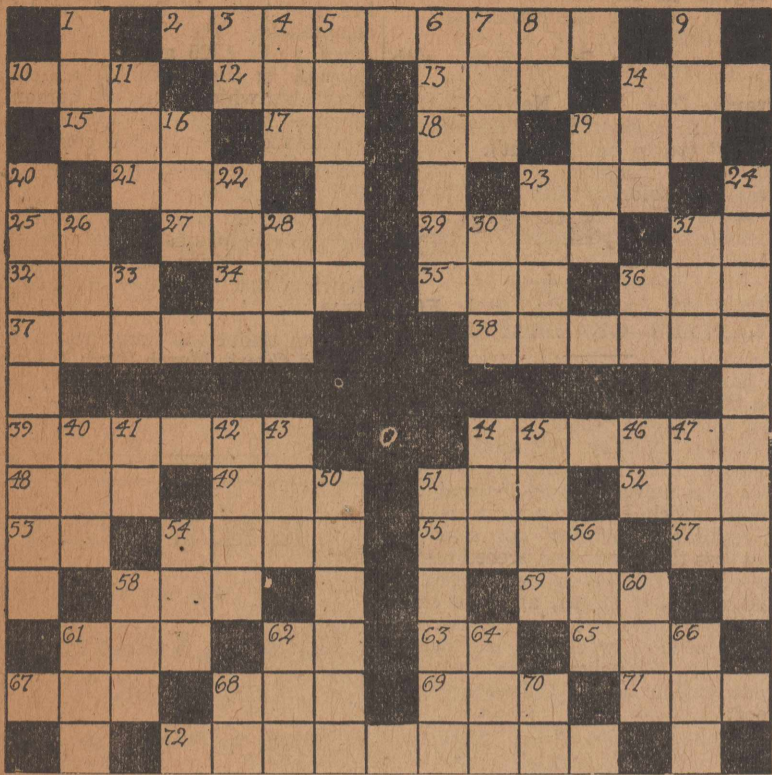

District Interscholastic Meet April 17-18

W. E. Patty, Director of Athletics, Issues Statement to Schools of Lubbock District.

W. E. Patty, superintendent of the Plainview High School, and District Director of Athletics in the University Interscholastic League, has issued the following statement relative to the forthcoming meet in April.

"The University Interscholastic League District Meet for the Lubbock District will be held in Lubbock Friday and Saturday, April 17th and 18th. All County Directors should make prompt reports of County Winners to proper District officers, and all schools represented by these winners should mail entries to District officers not later than April 13th. For your convenience the following list of district officers with their respective addresses is given: Director of Debate, Sup't. H. F. P. Moss, Post; Director of Declaration Sup't. H. P. Caveness, Tahoka; Director of Essay, Sup't. I. C. Bagwell, Snyder; Director of Music Memory, Miss Mary Dunn, Lubbock. County Directors of Public Music, and of Spelling will forward all 100 per cent papers to the state office of the University Interscholastic League, Austin, Texas.

"The District Executive Committee has provided for a District Music Memory Contest during the District Meet. Teachers coaching teams in Music Memory, after having won the County Meet, should file entries with Miss Dunn, Lubbock, Texas.

"All contestants in Debate, Declaration, Music Memory, Extemporaneous Speech, Volley Ball, and Tennis should report in the Auditorium of Lubbock High School at one o'clock Friday, April 17th for instructions and to draw for position.

"There will be Class A and Class B divisions of track in the county contests, but only one division in the District Track Meet. All winners of first, second, and third places in the County Meets, either A or B may enter the District Track Meet. I am enclosing herewith some old entry blanks on which you will make application to me for entries in the District Track Meet. You should en-

close a fee of 25c for each original entry and 5c for every additional entry of same contestant in other events. This official entry blank with fees should be mailed to me not later than April 13th. There will be no 50 yard dash in the races, and the javelin throw has been added to the field events. The Track Meet will begin at 9 A. M. Saturday morning in the Lubbock County Fair Grounds.

"The baseball championship for this district will be determined in Lubbock May 2, beginning at 10 o'clock in the Fair Grounds. Teams to be eligible to compete in this final series, shall be from member schools and shall have won from two member schools out of the four required to play. If any team plays more than four games, then such team, to be eligible, shall have a percentage of not less than 500 per cent. No team shall count more than one game won from the same school. Every team that has an eligible record on April 25th and expects to enter the final series at Lubbock on May 2nd should wire me at my expense. In case six or eight teams should be eligible to take part it would be necessary for the series to begin on Friday May the first. If this condition should develop I will notify the winning teams not later than Wednesday, April 29th."

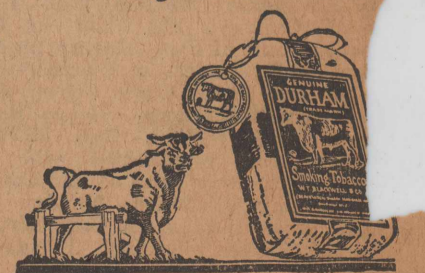

The county winner will represent Floyd county at the Short Course at A. & M. the last week in July.
