5,000 People Here For Trades Day; Wide Publicity Brings Many to Floydada

Distribution of Prizes is Feature of First Monday Trades Day at Floydada.

MANY VISITORS FROM DISTANCE
Hundreds of Horses and Mules Brought Here for Trade or Sale—Many Trades Made

Any doubt that Floydada's first Monday would go off with a bang, was dispelled long before noon Monday, April 6th. And by night evidences that the widest trade territory Floydada had ever reached had sent people here from six or eight counties was dispelled. It was the biggest, most representative crowd ever in Floydada on business. Estimates vary from four thousand to five thousand visitors.

That the First Monday idea took well was proven by the fact that more than 200 head of horses and mules, ranging from the jockey's nag to 17 hands high mules, were on the square. Trading was brisk, especially along in the afternoon. Many sales were also reported. This feature was the one in doubt principally. If the success of this first venture is an indication the "hoss swapping" feature of First Monday in Floydada is well established.

The distribution of prizes to people from all portions of the trade territory was the feature of the day. It was held at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. Three thousand persons filled the court house lawn and two sides of the square while the distribution was in progress. T. P. Guimarin, secretary of the Retail Merchants' Association, Sheriff J. R. Maddox, E. E. Brown, distributor of the Detarex Washers, O. P. Rutledge, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce and others had a part in the work of awarding prizes. Little Miss Blanche West, of Newland, was chosen to distribute the prizes to the winners. Postal Laws and Regulations prevent the Hesperian from announcing the plan of distribution and the winners of the contest.

Of the many people here from a wide territory, Floydada business men had an opportunity to meet many and form personal acquaintances over eight counties. Delegations of generous proportions were here from every county adjoining Floyd.

The First Monday in May will be on May 4th. Plans are already under way to maintain interest in this second of the series of trades days here. The Retail Merchants' Association, and the Chamber of Commerce are sponsoring the Trades Day movement and have the co-operation of more than sixty retail firms of the city.

Frisco-Denver Rail Traffic Trade Rumor

Surveying Party, Said to be Denver Men, Working North of Wolf Creek Near McBain

The only definite railroad news this week comes out of Plainview, where the Denver is said to be perfectly willing for Plainview people to work in accord with the Santa Fe for a northwest connection, probably to Dimmitt, and at the same time definitely declare their plans also include an extension northward, and where likewise there is reported to be 150 men working in committees of three in an effort to guarantee by tonight \$300,000 worth of right-of-way to the Denver and enter into a contract with that company.

Other railroad news seems to consist principally of rumors and partial facts. Among the rumors is one to the effect that traffic arrangements have been made between the Denver and the Frisco roads by which the former will have the use of Q. A. & P. tracks to Roaring Springs. This rumor has not been confirmed locally at least. A report that seems to bear it out, however, is that the crew of surveyors who are working on a project, said to be westward from McBain, the terminus of the Q. A. & P. is one of the same crews which has been at work for weeks on the caprock at Quitaque. The report that the surveyors are at work is true.

That the Frisco may have its eyes on the territory above the caprock is given credence by the fact that Sam Lazarus, president of the Q. A. & P., Chas. H. Sommers, its vice president, and A. H. Sommers, secretary to Mr. Lazarus, were in this section Monday. They visited with the Chamber of Commerce and business men in Floydada while here, but did not talk for publication.

Dismisses Restraining Order Issued City

Construction of Sewer Outfall Lines Begins Following Raising of Injunction

Immediate construction work begun last Friday morning on the outfall line to the city mains from the intended site of the sewer disposal plant southeast of Floydada, following the dissolving of the injunction last Thursday afternoon by District Judge R. C. Joiner. The dismissal of the restraining order issued two weeks ago, followed oral arguments by attorneys in the case before the judge. A number of witnesses were summoned but none were put on the stand.

Following the refusal of the judge to make the order of restraint permanent against the city plaintiff attorneys gave notice of appeal to the Court of Civil Appeals at Amarillo.

Thursday marked the last day of district court for the spring term, the judge and other district officers returning to their homes for a three-day rest before going to Silvertown to open court Monday.

Two other cases were disposed of on Thursday. In the suit of R. A. Underwood vs. J. R. Sowell, filed to foreclose lien and clear title to a tract of land, a compromise judgment was entered, in which Underwood took title to the land for a consideration.

In a foreclosure suit Mrs. Ella M. Daugherty took judgment against C. C. West and others on a section of land in this county.

18th District Legionnaires Hold Meeting in Amarillo—Legion Heads There.

McDermott Post, American Legion, has asked for the 1927 meeting of the 18th District American Legion Convention, T. P. Collins, commander of the local post and L. G. Mathews, one of the prominent members, presenting the claims of this post for the honor of entertaining the legionnaires of the 18th district next year, at the organization meeting held in Amarillo Thursday of last week. Messrs. Collins and Mathews were accompanied by their wives, who attended the American Legion Auxiliary meeting held simultaneously with meeting of the Legion in the Queen City.

Mark McGee, Adjutant General of the state, and Wright Armstrong, leader of the famous Gray Mare Band, of Brownwood, were among the prominent legion members who attended the Amarillo meeting.

A banquet was tendered the visiting legionnaires, some 300 in number, following the all-day sessions at the Amarillo Hotel.

In view of the fact that Floydada has one of the strongest and liveliest Legion posts on the south plains in McDermott Post, both Messrs. Collins and Mathews believe that this city has a good chance to get the meeting next year. The decision was left to a committee, which will announce the time and place of next year's meeting at a later date.

Texas Utilities Co. to Build Ice Plant Here

Judge I. R. Kelso, on Inspection Trip, Says Plant Will be Installed Soon.

Construction of a ten or fifteen ton ice plant in Floydada this spring is in the plans of the Texas Utilities Company, as a part of its big expansion program for 1925. This was announced Monday by Judge I. R. Kelso, of St. Louis, general counsel of the company, and largely interested in its holdings, who was here Monday on an inspection trip.

The plant will be constructed at the site of the Floydada Ice Company, which was purchased last year by the Texas Utilities Company, and Judge Kelso said that it was among several being shipped to this section for installation this spring. "It will be a ten or fifteen ton plant, ample to take care of Floydada trade territory in fine shape," he said.

In the party with him on the triangle trip from Canyon westward to Hereford and Clovis, thence southeast to Littlefield, Lubbock, and Slaton, and to Floydada by way of Idalou, Lorenzo and Ralls, were D. A. Belden, of New York City, representative of New York banking interests, W. F. Corl, of St. Louis, a stockholder of the Texas Utilities Company who also has other utility interests in Texas, and J. B. Scott of Plainview, general resident manager of the company.

The company began a plan of expansion about one year ago. At that time it was operating in Floydada, Lockney, Plainview, Lubbock, Idalou, Lorenzo and Ralls. Since that time Slaton, Littlefield, Canyon, Hereford and Clovis plants have been acquired. Hundreds of thousands of dollars are being expended in the big expansion program of the company.

Half City's Voting Strength is Polled

Strickland Easy Winner for Marshal—Henry Re-elected Mayor.—Interest Lagged.

G. R. Strickland was an easy winner in the only officially contested race for preferment with office at the hands of the city electorate yesterday, getting 214 votes out of a total of 285 cast, of which R. N. Burgett received 41 and A. J. Ryals 14 for City Marshal.

Interest in the election lagged until the last 24 hours before the opening of the polls when three tickets, some of which contained the same names, were printed in handbill form and distributed over the city. About half the voting strength of the city was polled at the election.

F. P. Henry was re-elected Mayor. One ticket broadcast by handbills carried the name of L. G. Mathews, who received 59 votes for this office. Judge Henry received 223 votes, his name and that of the three marshal candidates and Burl Bedford being on the official ballot. Bedford's vote was 278 out of a possible 285.

B. P. Woody, T. R. Webb, Oscar Stansell, Jas. K. Green and Frank Moore were elected aldermen. None of these were active candidates, and Jas. K. Green has announced that he will be unable to serve on the board. T. P. Collins, I. C. Surginger, Fred Brown, Jim Wilson, A. L. Scoggins, F. C. Harmon and W. A. Baker were among those who received between 50 and 100 votes for aldermen.

A. C. Goen was presiding judge of the election, with J. G. Wood and Mrs. Lon M. Davis as judges and Mrs. E. L. Angus and J. B. Bishop clerks.

DR. J. F. OWENS, PROMINENT PLAINVIEW PHYSICIAN, DEAD

Dr. J. F. Owens, prominent Plainview physician, who has many friends in Floyd County, died yesterday afternoon at 2.15 from blood poisoning, at a sanitarium in Plainview. He was active until Monday, when he became ill.

Funeral arrangements had not been made late yesterday afternoon.

He was 55 years of age, had lived in Plainview 15 years and is survived by a daughter and three sons.

FLOYDADA LEADS IN CLASS A

Sand Hill Leads Class B, with Fairview First in Rural School Division.

Floydada, Sand Hill and Fairview were winners in the Class A, Class B and Rural School Divisions respectively in the Interscholastic League Meet and County School Fair held in Floydada last Friday and Saturday.

Floydada and Fairview nosed out Lockney and Roseland respectively by uncomfortably narrow margins. Sand Hill was an easy winner in Class B.

Interest from the beginning of the tennis singles Friday morning, until the last track event Saturday afternoon was sharp and the rivalry keen, and the event made colorful by the hundreds of students of different schools present. Heavy entries in numerous divisions, especially in athletic events, made eliminations necessary before room was available for major events, with the result that the program was prolonged. Close arrangement of various contests and careful attention to their prompt dispatch only made it possible for the entire program to be carried through. This was especially true of track events in athletics.

Estimates made that 2,000 school children attended the School Fair with a thousand or more parents and guardians, are believed to be conservative.

Country Club to Have Ideal Golf Course

Making the greens, the tees and clearing the fairways for Floydada Country Club's golf course are under way this week, an assistant of George Sampson, Post City, having this work in charge. Mr. Sampson was here Monday and laid off the course, and is authority for the statement that it will be the most nearly ideal course in the panhandle.

As laid off the course will cover slightly over 3,000 yards, and par on the nine-hole course will be 35, the longest drive will be 5, and the shortest 3. With every natural hazard the course will need little or no artificial building, Mr. Sampson states. Two of the holes are "blind", three of the fairways are "dog legs", there will be three water hazards and two tree hazards. One of the greens will be located on an island in Blanco Creek.

FLOYDADA GROWS

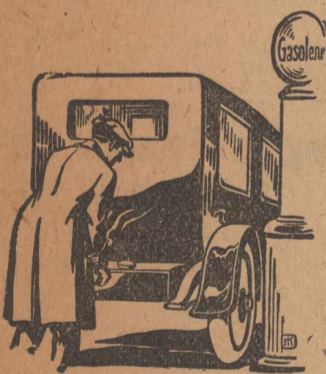

The County School Fair and Interscholastic League Meet in Floydada last Friday and Saturday was one of the best-attended in the history of interscholastic events in the county. It was, in number of schools having entries, the biggest the county has ever had. 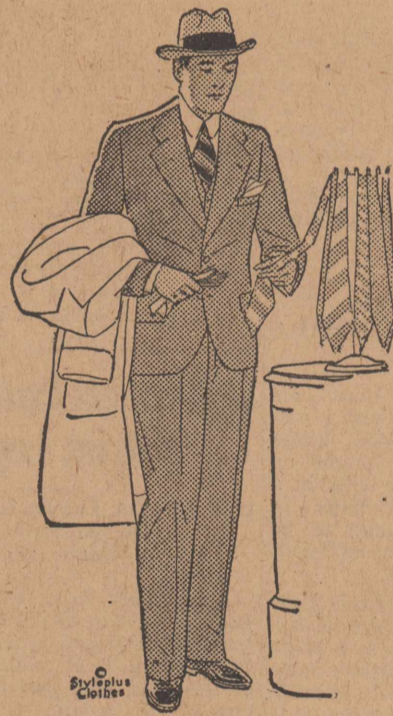

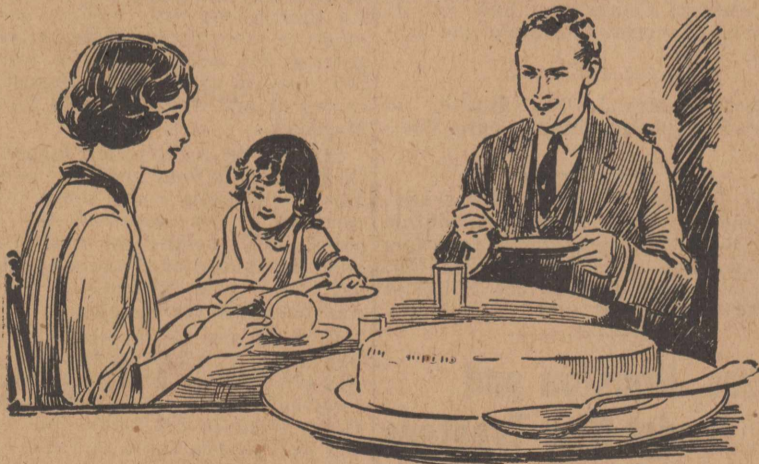

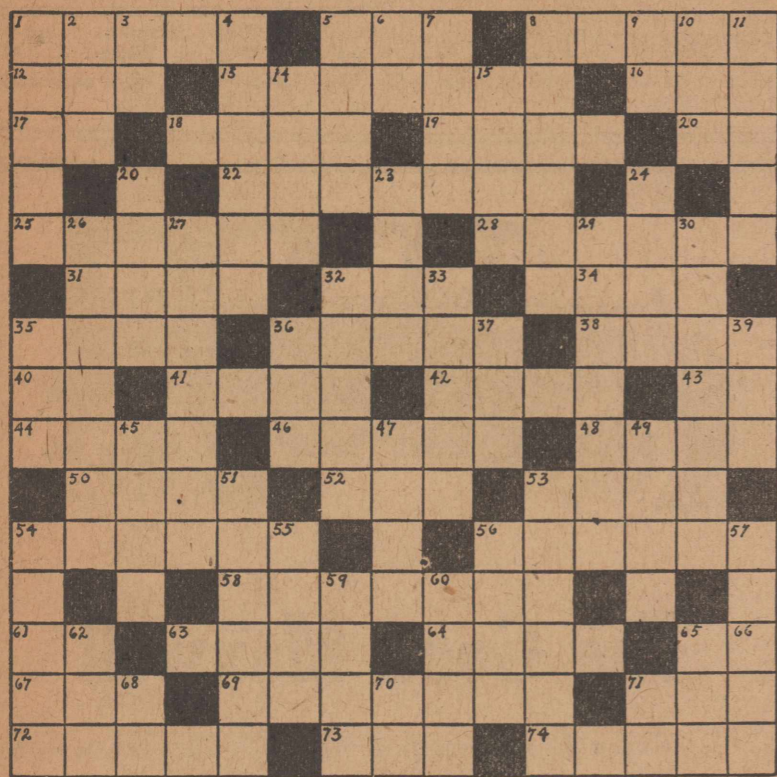

For your cookie jar we offer the following recipes that will prove to be a delicious change in the children's lunches and after school snacks.

Walnut Molasses Bars

- 1-4 cup butter
- 1-4 cup lard
- 1-4 cup boiling water
- 1-2 cup brown sugar
- 1-2 cup molasses
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 3 cups flour.

- 1-2 tablespoon ginger
- 1-2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1-3 teaspoon clove
- 1-3 teaspoon salt
- chopped walnut meat

Pour water over butter and lard, then add sugar, molasses mixed with soda, flour, salt and spices. Chill thoroughly, roll one-fourth inch thick cut in strips three and one-half inches long by one and one-half inches wide. Sprinkle with nut meat and bake ten minutes.

Scottish Fancies

- 1-2 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 2-3 tablespoon melted butter.
- 1 cup rolled oats
- 1-3 teaspoon salt
- 1-4 teaspoon vanilla

Beat egg until light, add gradually sugar, and then stir in remaining ingredients. Drop mixture by teaspoonfuls on a thoroughly greased inverted dripping-pan one inch apart. Spread into circular shape with a case knife first dipped in cold water. Bake in a moderate oven until delicately browned. To give variety use two-thirds cup rolled oats and fill cup with shredded coconut.
