

HEADLIGHT LAW

Owners of motor vehicles of the State of Texas must have their headlight lenses tested for position, strength and type before September 1st, if they plan to operate the vehi-cles on the highways.

Provision is made for stations over the motoring public to test their lamps. Officials say the new law is badly needed for the protection of the public, the estimate being made that the anti-glare law will reduce very materially the number of accidents on the highways.

Most of the automobiles being built at the present time will approximate-ly meet the requirements of the new law, it is thought, although a certificate from a properly accredited station must be obtained.
