

## Entrance Requirements Announced by Wester

Floydada Public Schools Will Open Monday, Sept. 14th.—"Unders" Rule of Board Given.

J. C. Wester, superintendent of the Floydada Public Schools, has made the following announcement concerning the school:

"Floydada Public School will open Monday, September 14th, at 9 a. m. A short program will be given in the high school auditorium and announcements will be made which will concern both parents and pupils. Students will be classified and books issued at 1 p. m. Students must present their old book card certifying that they turned in their books last year. Those who have lost their book cards may get a duplicate from their principal, but this will cause a delay in getting books.

"Students in elementary grades should also present their report cards for entrance into the new grades.

### Concerning Unders

"Students under seven years of age on September 1st will not be admitted at the beginning of school unless they have completed kindergarten work and are ready for second grade. They will pay three dollars per month tuition until January 1st.

"Children reaching the age of seven between September 1st and January 1st will be admitted to first grade at the beginning of the second term in January, and will not have to pay tuition.

### Eighth Grade

"Students entering the eighth grade should present a report card or statement satisfactorily completed the seventh grade. Students are not promoted conditionally from the seventh grade to high school. Those entering Floydada Schools for the first time must present their credits from the school (Continued on page 4)

## Community Problems Discussed at Meeting

Paving, C. of C. Membership Drive, Luncheon Club, Advertising Talked at Mass Meeting

Proposals of plans that will bring about an election to vote bonds for paving several blocks adjoining the square in Floydada without any increase in the present tax rate are being considered by the City Council, it was stated by T. R. Webb, member of the council and president of the Chamber of Commerce at a called mass meeting of citizens at the district court room Tuesday night. While the purpose of the meeting was to discuss matters relevant to outlined work for the Chamber of Commerce for the next few months, the subject of city improvements was brought up and was given several minutes discussion by those present.

Suggestions for a weekly luncheon club for the Chamber of Commerce, discussions for making the membership drive, approval of motions for the naming of committees to assist in forming delegations to the Amarillo fair and opening of the Tech College were among the other business matters coming before the open forum meeting Tuesday night.

D. D. Shipley said that he believed that the opportune time for paving the streets had come and urged those present to "boost for this paving" and to think the matter over carefully. "Floydada needs more pavement, and if we will all get behind this thing when the time comes for a decision in our favor, we'll get it," Mr. Shipley said.

"We are trying to work out a scheme in the form of an election that will make it possible, if it carries, to take the present outstanding warrants of the city's indebtedness, bearing a rate of interest of six to ten per cent, and refunding with serial bonds with maturity dates from one to forty years of \$1,000 denominations and bearing five and three fourths per cent interest," Mr. Webb said. ## Hoxe Family Rescued After Whole Maize Field Cut Down With Axes

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hoxe and their little daughter, Mary, age 3, were rescued at a late hour Tuesday night from the maize field at their home three miles west of Floydada on Truth Lane, where they have been held captive for over two weeks. They were removed Wednesday morning to the Smith & Smith Sanitarium, according to Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce R. A. Highsmith, who was a member of the rescuing party.

While the whole nation mourned, Highsmith had never ceased his efforts sending out wire after wire for aid. This morning the respective members of Hoxe family were smiling and happy as a result of his unceasing efforts. Apparently none the worse for their harrowing experience, the family will be entirely revived in a few days, it is thought by attending physicians. Little Mary, whom Mr. Highsmith has known for a great many years, was blushing noticeably this Thursday morning when a representative of the Hesperian visited the sanitarium and discovered Mr. Highsmith holding the little lady's hand.

The rescue of the Hoxe family was effected in an unusual manner, Mr. Highsmith said. In response to telegrams to East Texas, 4,000 men reported for duty late Tuesday afternoon and equipped with axes set to work chopping down the immense stalks of maize in the field where the

## EXTEND LIGHT LAW DATE FOR COUNTY MOTORISTS

Because state equipment arrived late, Sheriff J. R. Maddox stated this Thursday morning that Floyd county motorists will have an extension of at least ten days on the time to have the lights and lenses on their cars tested. 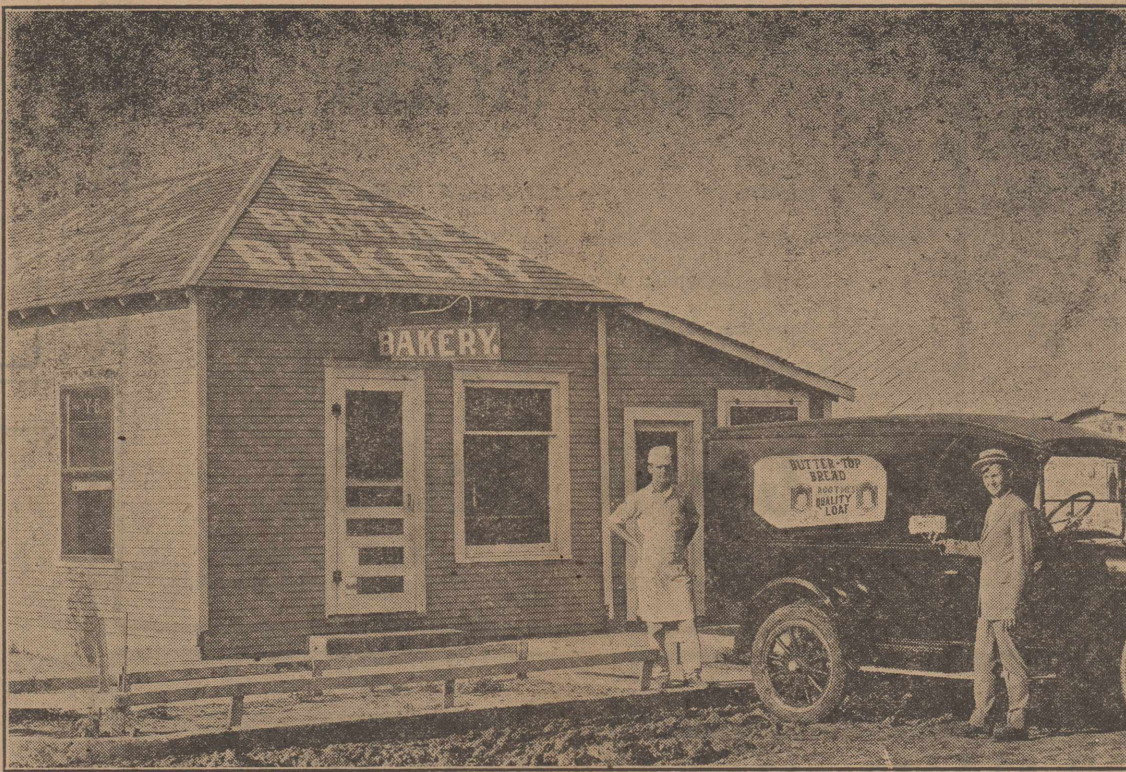

**Entrance Requirements Announced by Wester**

formerly attended. Bring them when you come the first day and you will avoid delay in your classification and possibly an entrance examination.

"Students entering eighth grade are required to take English I, History I, Algebra I, and may elect the fourth unit from either Latin, Spanish or General Science. If the student ever intends to go to college or university he should take at least two years of foreign language in high school, as all colleges require them for entrance. If a student elects Latin or Spanish he must take it for two years, as one unit of foreign language is not counted either for graduation from high school or for college entrance.

**Ninth Grade**  
Candidates for ninth grade should have four eighth grade credits but will be admitted to ninth conditionally, if they have three credits. The required subjects of ninth grade are English II, History II, Algebra II and the fourth unit may be elected from Spanish, Latin, Commercial Geography and Business Arithmetic.

**Tenth Grade**  
Candidates for tenth grade should have eight credits but will be admitted on a minimum of seven units. The required subjects are English III (Amer. Lit.) History III (American History) Plane Geometry, and may elect one unit from Chemistry, Latin Home Economics or typing and short hand.

**Eleventh Grade**  
Candidates for the eleventh grade should present twelve credits but will be admitted to senior class conditionally if they present a minimum of eleven units. In some cases it would be possible for a student with less than eleven credits to complete enough work in one year to graduate and we will grant diplomas to this type of student, but such students will be enrolled in the junior class until mid-term, and if they complete enough work by that time, to be classified as seniors, they will then be allowed to enjoy the privileges of the senior class.

"Students entering the senior class who expect to enter college after graduation should study the entrance requirements and so elect their work so that they can enter without entrance examinations. The required units in eleventh grade are English IV (English Literature) civics one-half year, economics one-half year, and the other two units may be elected from physics, solid geometry one-half, trigonometry one-half, typewriting one-half, short hand one-half, Commercial Law one-half, and Home Economics.

**New Subjects**  
"Second year work will be offered in cooking and sewing, which will be open to students who have completed one year's work in these courses. First year cooking and sewing will be open for members of tenth and eleventh grades only.

"Typewriting and short hand will both be given this year and students looking forward to college entrance should take both, as no credit is given for one without the other. Rent on typewriters will be the same as last year, payable monthly in advance. It may not be possible to accommodate all who wish to take typing and shorthand. For this reason, preference will be given to members of senior and junior classes and if the sections are not filled, candidates from the other high school classes will be admitted.

**Boarding Students**  
"Board will be available in good homes for boys and girls at prices ranging from \$25 to \$30 per month.

Tuition will be five dollars per month for high school students, four dollars for elementary grades, and three dollars for primary grades.

"If people having places for boys or girls who can do work to earn part or all of their board, will notify me, I will appreciate it very much, as we have a number of students each year who have to work their way."

**NEW COMET COMING**

A faint comet which may, however, become bright enough to be seen by the unaided eye as a small patch of light, has been discovered by Prof. Richard Schorr of the Bergedorf Observatory, near Hamburg, Germany, according to advices received at Cambridge by Dr. Harlow Sharpley, director of the Harvard College Observatory.

The celestial visitor is said to be Tuttle's comet which was first discovered in 1790 by P. F. Mechain at the Paris Observatory. After this, it was lost until 1858 when C. W. Tuttle, then at the Harvard Observatory, rediscovered it and found that it was periodic, returning to the neighborhood of the earth every fourteen years. Now it has returned for the fifth time since his observation.

At present it is of the eleventh magnitude, so that it can only be seen with the aid of a telescope of moderate power. It is in the constellation of the Sextant, below the bright star Regulus, which is directly south about 8 o'clock in the evening. Regulus is at the end of the handle of the "Sickle," a group of stars in the constellation of the Lion resembling that gardening implement. The comet is moving toward the northeast so that

it is coming into a better position for observation. As it is not a very large comet, however, and when nearest, is farther away from the earth than the sun, we will not get a very close view of it at the best.

From 300 to 500 dozen frogs or frog legs are shipped daily from Oshkosh, Wisconsin, during the summer season. Motorists of the United States paid \$80,000,000 in 1924 in a gasoline tax.

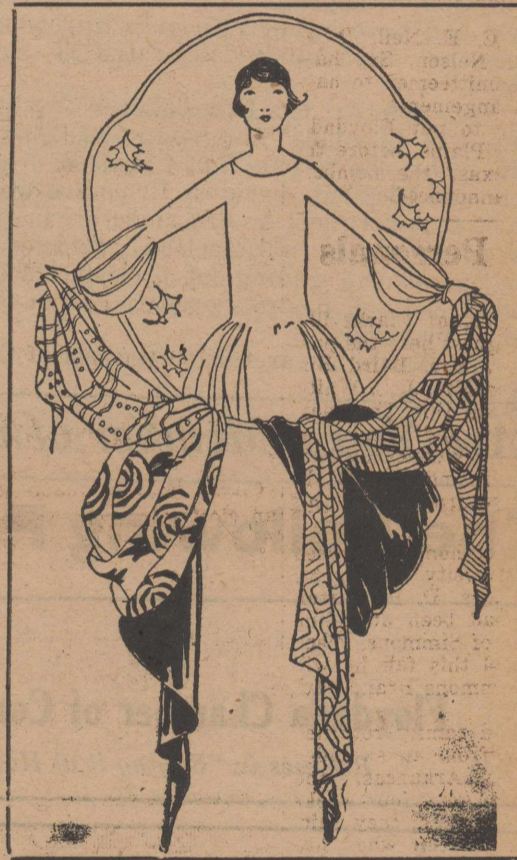

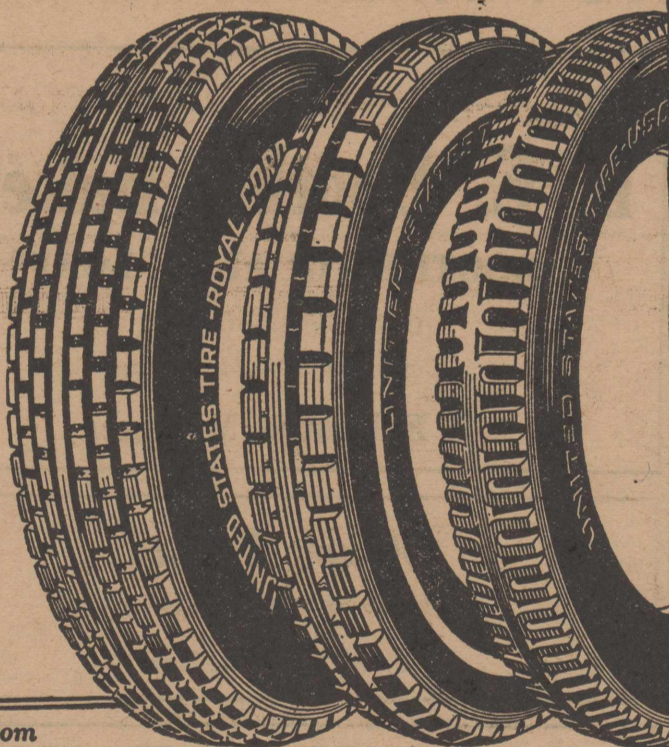

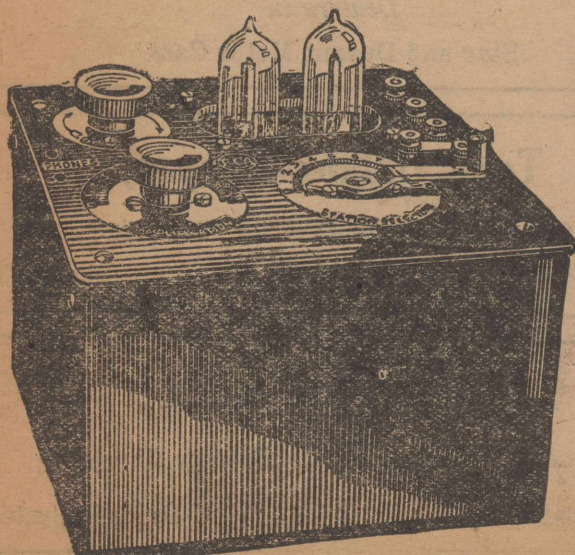

Capitalizing on the idea that "Floyd county grows the best maize in the world," the boosters will make their appearance at the fair and will carry out a general advertising scheme that was started by an Amarillo paper recently. The story was invented by a newspaperman and he described graphically the heavy row crops in this section and to better illustrate his point told of how a supposed family and 23 rescuers were lost for three weeks in the dense undergrowth of a maize field near Floydada.

"If we can get 300 people to go with us and if each person will carry about a gallon of maize as a 'conviner,' we'll put over one of the biggest advertising programs ever accomplished in West Texas," is the way one prominent citizen summed up the possibilities of the proposed trip.

The Chamber of Commerce officials are heartily in favor of sending a strong representation to the fair and to tell the world of the many diversities that Floyd county has to offer the agriculturist and the business man. The germinal idea to send a crowd of live-wire boosters to the fair started Tuesday night at a mass meeting at the court house, at which time the Chamber of Commerce representatives present voted to sponsor the Amarillo trip. As the affair has been discussed, the general plans have been enlarged.

The committee of the Chamber of Commerce has started to work creating interest and will make detailed arrangements for the trippers. The general plan, it has been pointed out, is to attend the fair on Floydada day, September 28, and to use the maize scheme as the background for advertising Floydada and its resourceful territory.

O. M. Watson, C. E. Neil, B. K. Barker and E. C. Nelson, Sr., have been named as committeemen to have charge of the arrangements. "We're going up to put Floydada, the Gateway to the Plains, before the eyes of all West Texas," the members of the committee announced.

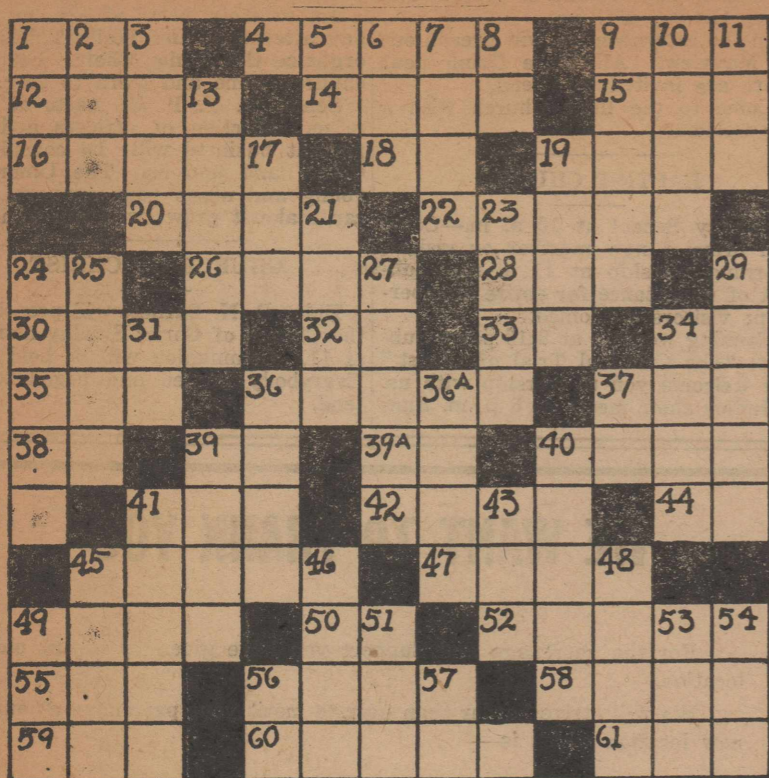

School Board Levies District Tax for Year

Tax for the support of schools of Floydada Independent School District for the year 1926-27 was levied by the school board at their session Monday night.

Taking a total valuation of \$3,411,000 in the district as a basis for their figures the board set aside 23 per cent of the total to be collected for interest and sinking fund to take care of outstanding indebtedness, and 77 per cent goes to maintenance of the schools.

The board recently purchased another block in the Bartley Heights Addition for their school plant. The block lies immediately south of the present site of the high school.

FISH THAT CLIMBS

Scientific investigation into the habits of fishes has shown that many of them are by no means helpless when out of water. There is for instance, a perch, which has the very curious habit of scrambling by means of its fins, up stones, in search of the intrunks of trees, in search of the insects on which it feeds.

During the past year this organization disbursed considerable sums in community service. A mountain boy and girl were maintained in college, milk was supplied to undernourished children, a bed was endowed in a children's home, needy pupils were furnished clothing to enable them to keep in school, a playground and play and individual equipment were given a local tuberculosis sanitarium, and Christmas joy was brought to many overlooked little ones.

In less than two years 300 small rural schools in Texas have accepted the provisions of the rural aid law and have introduced instruction in prevocational and industrial subjects according to plans furnished or approved by State department of education. The State contributes to rural schools of two or more teachers, under certain conditions, not more than \$250 each to aid in installing equipment for industrial training in practical agriculture, animal husbandry, farm mechanics, and the household arts. The reports of the results of the new instruction are entirely favorable.

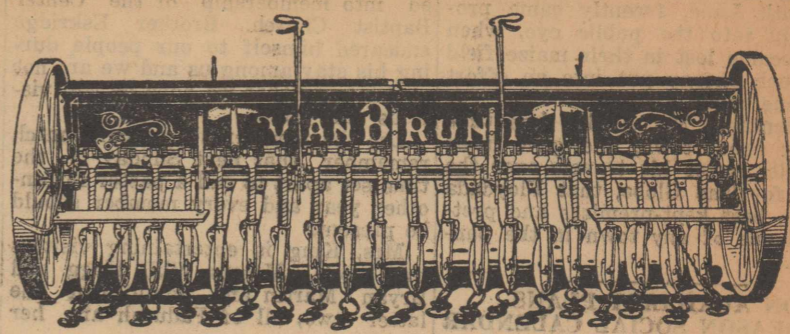

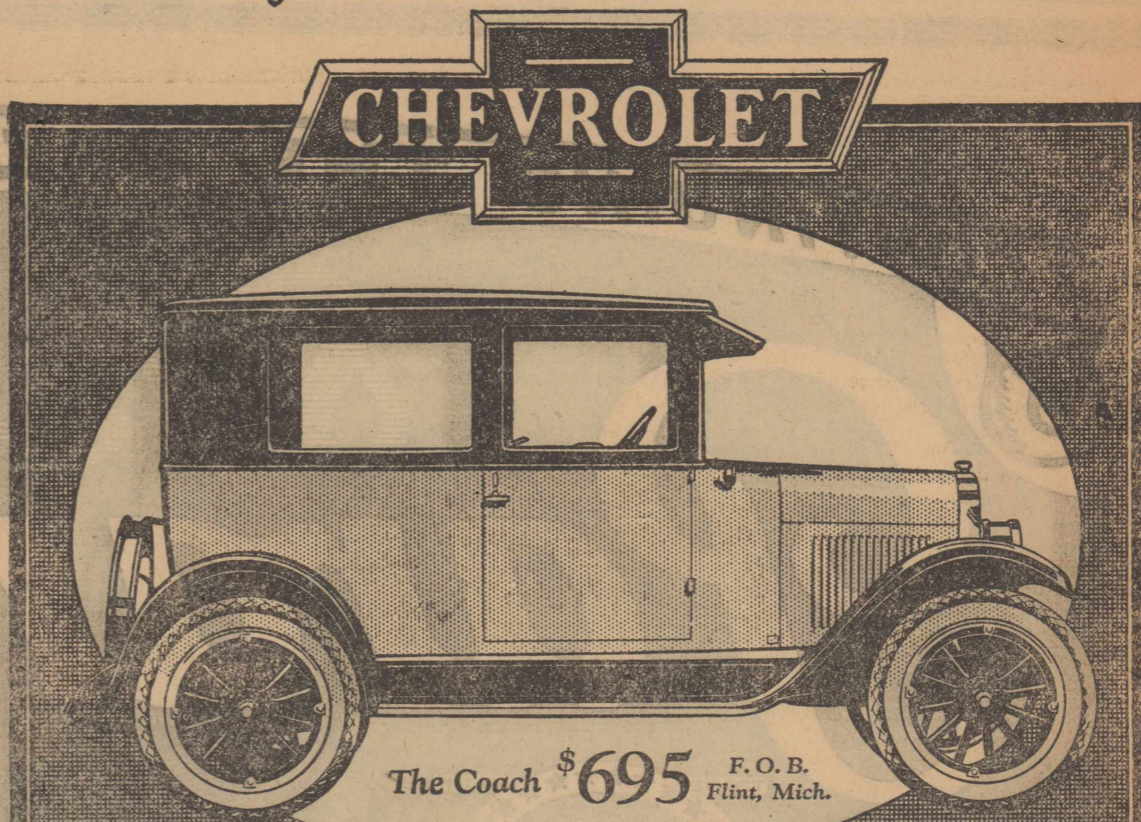

The present tax rate of \$1.45 would neither be raised nor lowered under this plan, he pointed out.

A motion at the meeting to give the farmer bringing the first bale of cotton of the season to Floydada a year's paid membership in the Chamber of Commerce carried unanimously. The membership will be given in addition to cash prizes, it was stated.

"This Chamber of Commerce does not belong to one man or to the directors or to any group of men. It is a body that should represent every man in town, and it is up to you to make it a success," said Secretary R. A. Highsmith in opening a discussion that pointed out the numerous means by which the organization could serve the town and its trade communities.

"There should be a strong bond of friendship between the farmer and the business man and that can be brought about by personal contact," he said.

"Go out and meet the farmers at every opportunity. Don't ask him to come in and see you; go see them. But before you do anything, you should consider a little more unity here at home that could be made possible through weekly luncheons. A business man may have an idea of some improvement that could be made in the town; he may think of something that could be done, but that idea remains in his individual mind. At a weekly luncheon, you fellows could talk over your plans and get over a constructive program through concerted action.

"Three things are essential to the success to such a club: a good lunch, a snappy business meeting, and a short entertainment feature," Mr. Highsmith said.

Judge L. G. Mathews, J. H. Reagan D. D. Shipley, O. P. Rutledge, N. W. Williams, and Lon M. Davis also made short talks during the discussions of the meeting that was conducted in open forum style.

Henry Ansley, representative of the Amarillo Globe, urged the business men to attend community gatherings in the rural districts and quoted instances of success had by other towns in fostering community social programs.

The membership drive being conducted by the Chamber of Commerce will close in two weeks from Tuesday night, it was voted at the meeting. O. L. Stansell and Luther Fry leading the two divisions in the campaign are lining up their forces and will solicit new members "until the final gong sounds to stop," they said.

In the contest between the two teams in the race for honors in the membership drive, 100 points will be given for each paid membership of \$1 and attendance of a member at meetings adds ten points to his respective group of "odds" or "evens," it was explained.

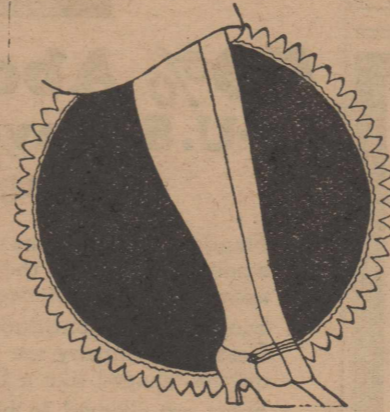
