INCREASING SCHOLASTICS

The increased number of scholastics in Floyd County is believed to be a very material figure this year and if the figures of increase in Cedar District, the first to report , holds up over the entire county, Floyd County will come under the requirements of the law which makes the establishment of a county suprintendent's office mandatory on the Commissioners -Court.

Perhaps no one would be more pleased than the county judge to have the superintendent's job given to some body else. The two jobs-that of judge and that of superintendentcarry with them too much detail for one man to do full justice. Every judge of Floyd County for the past ten years has said the same. The schools need all the attention of one man and the judge has a full-sized job all of his own.

For the reason that we just naturally like to see the country developed and fill up with people, and the additional reason that the heavy duty of two jobs under the present arrangement makes too much work for one man to do justice to both, we'd like to see the scholastic figures in the county pass the 3,000 mark.

And if the increase is past the 3,000 mark we know just exactly who the commissioners ought to name for the office of county superintendent. Of course, every other man in the county has the proper man picked out, too, and is as ready as we are to tell the commissioners all about it.

SCHOLASTIC CENSUS

"Now is the time for all good men to come to aid of their party," or words to that effect. Now is the time for all school boards in Floyd County to get their enumerators out over their districts to take the scholastic census. A few days of delay will be too long a delay. The time for the census taking closes on March 31stnot April 1st.

Taking the scholastic census takes more time than you imagine, if you for nine years enumerator in Floydada District. And every child you enumerate means from \$9 to \$12 in the treasury of the district. Failure to enumerate one child means the loss of that much money, every cent of which is sorely needed in these days of increased educational costs.

Just how big the poultry industry in Floyd County has gotten to be is hardly realized until one digests the statement that the produce dealers of Floydada alone are sending out a car of poultry a week destined for markets such as Los Angeles, and that equally as great shipments are being made ,according to reports from Lockney as well. The figures show that ,although last year was a light one for production of feed, somewhat curtailing the production of poultry, the receipts from poultry since the fall season opened has been nothing short of tremendous, very probably only second to the receipts from the cotton crop. With the culling season, opened in January, the movement of poultry grew tremendously and this activity is being felt still. How many hundreds of small loans the sale of culled poultry-non-layers-has saved the poultry raisers of the county is just a guess ,but the number is large, without doubt.







UNDERWEIGHTS DECREASE IN NUMBER DESPITE MEASLES

Although the measles epidemic over this school district had a tendency to reduce the weights of children between the time of the first and second weighings conducted under the auspices of the Floyd County Chapter, Red Cross, the number of children 10 per cent or more underweight in the school district was reduced from 17 to 15 in the period, according to figures made public this past week by Miss Alva Morrow, nutrition specialist, who has been in Lockney the past 3 weeks conducting nutrition work in that school and in schools over that section

At the same time the number of pupils in the school 15 per cent or more overweight was reduced from 6 to 5. The percentage within two was reduced from 26 to 19. The measles brought many normal weight children four or five pounds underweight, which seems to account for this reduction.


