



Dreams of anothe" Utopia were shattered recently when the majority of stockholders of the Santa Barbara Fellowship Colony filed a petition for dissolution of their corporation in the Superior court in Santa Barbara.

The colony was organized June 9, 1921, as a nonprofit corporation to purchase homes and the necessities of ife on a co-operative basis.

Socialists and other "fadists," together with a number of more conservative citizens, purchased land with the intent of building a colony "conceding freedom of opinion" with indorsing any "religious, metaphysical or political doctrine," but "to encourage the spirit of good will and mutual service at all times," says the Los Angeles Times.


