New Gin to Be Built at Lakeview

Lakeview is to have a new gin ready for the season crop of 1924.

This, the third new gin to be announced for Floyd county since February 1st, will add very materially to the equipment in the county for handling the cotton crop of the county this year.

J. E. Newton, of Wake, will be the proprietor and manager of the new gin. He is an experienced gin man, having operated the gin at Wake for sometime. Machinery is now being hauled out and the building being built and the machinery installed long before the cotton crop is ready according to present plans. The gin will consist of three stands of 70 saws each. It will be located a short distance from the Lakeview Store and School House on the R. H. Conway land.

Lakeview is one of the steadiest agricultural producing communities in this section of the plains. It was in Lakeview community that a number of the first experimenters with cotton on the plains proved that the staple could be successfully grown on top of the caprock.

People of Lakeview expect the new gin to be of great value to them in reducing the cost of shaping their cotton up ready for market.

3 Firsts for F. H. S. at Lubbock Meet

Girls Debating Team, Girls Tennis Team and Half Mile Runner Going To State Tournament

The Floyd county schools, especially the Floydada High School made an excellent showing at the District Meet held at Lubbock, Friday and Saturday of last week. Floydada took three first places and won Silver Loving Cups in the girls debate and tennis doubles. There will be five contestants to enter the state meet at Austin, from this school.

The girls debating team, Misses Bess Houston and Miriam Olson showed much superiority against keenest competition in the contest, theirs being the only team winning in both affirmative and negative.

The tennis, girls doubles, was won by Misses Mildred Carter and Adelaide Scott of the Floydada High school, they having eliminated Abernathy and Olton in the preliminaries and Lubbock in the final. They defeated Lubbock 6-2, 2-6, 6-2. Miss Mildred Carter won second place in singles.

Beauford Terry, of Floydada won first place in one-half mile run, time 2 minutes, 15 1-5 sec., this being very close to the state record which is 2 minutes, 3 3-5 sec.

Other places won by Class A schools of Floyd county were 440 yd dash, 4th Norman, Floydada; mile run, 4th, Hicks, Lockney; 220 yd dash, 4th, Carter Floydada; mile relay, 3rd, Floydada. Class B: 50 yd dash, Hart, Baker; 440 yd dash, Fawver, Baker.

Other contestants from the Floyd county schools made a good showing in the various contests.

Many people from Floydada and other schools in the county attended the two-day meet. The Floydada High school was dismissed for Friday to give the pupils of the school an opportunity to go to the meet and see their classmates in the district elimination. A large number of student body took advantage of this opportunity.

Citizens Hinder Fire Department

Volunteer Fire Fighters Can't Get to Fires for Cars, and Lookers-On Who Block Way

The Floydada Fire Department held a meeting Tuesday night in the Chamber of Commerce office at which several things of interest to the town and its fire fighting force were discussed.

The department which was represented by practically every member went on record as being opposed to changing the location of the City Fire Truck from an uptown position to that at the city well, contending that it will hamper their work in that it will cause a delay in making the fires. They have petitioned the City Council not to make this proposed change.

The council will also be petitioned to furnish police protection at the fires. At the past few fires the department has been unable to fight efficiently on account of the general public interference. Notice will be served on all citizens that at fires their main job is staying out of the way. The department is asking that they be given police power to keep the people back even if force has to be used.

The council will also be asked to forbid automobiles from using the streets while the fire truck is making a run. They want an ordinance similar to that in larger cities compelling all cars and vehicles to pull to the curb while the alarm is being sounded. In many instances cars in Floydada keep the fire truck from reaching the fire in time.

Attention was also called to the fact that the people continue to disregard the ordinance with respect to running over fire hose with automobiles. The department expressed the belief that the city should enforce this ordinance to the limit calling the attention of the council to the fact that practically all the hose now owned by the city is in bad condition from this very reason. Every time a car crosses a piece of hose it costs the city fifty two dollars and fifty cents.

The department is very desirous of getting the co-operation of the citizenship in these matters. People in Floydada are simply thoughtless it is presumed at fires when they rush in and hamper the work of the organization.

The young man was holding the gun when it was discharged, blowing off two or three fingers. He was sitting in a car, and was taken immediately to Lockney for treatment.

Floyd Teaff, 21 year old son of J. B. Teaff, was also injured by scattering shot which discharged at a distance far enough that he was only "sprinkled" and not seriously injured.

Both accidents occurred during a huge rabbit drive organized in the community, at which there were probably a hundred guns. Many rabbits were killed. About 400 gathered for the dinner which was served at the Pleasant Valley school house.

Board and Citizenship Well Pleased With Modern New Building Completed This Week

The new Floydada High School Building, one of the prettiest architecturally inside and out, in this section of Texas, and of magnificent size was received by the board of trustees Tuesday afternoon, every phase of work on the building have been completed including plumbing, heating and lighting.

Mr. Rice, of the Rice Construction Company, the contractor, and E. F. Rittenberry, architect of the building, as well as representatives of the heating and lighting contractors were present. The building was accepted in every detail and all contractors were paid Tuesday night.

Several citizens accompanied the party on the final inspection trip to the school building. Everyone of these was voluble in expressions of praise for the excellent building completed.

Disinterested building material men and contractors are unanimous in declaring that the board has one of the best bargains in a school building they have ever seen.

Of particular interest to the taxpayers of the district everything complete, including the equipment for the building, will be done by the board within the original estimate of \$90,000 the amount of the bond issue. Much of the seating and equipment has already been placed in the building and the school building made ready for occupancy by the beginning of next week.

Lee Highway Support Matter of Duty

Judge Glenn Tells Chamber of Commerce Floyd County Owes Support to Organization

The Chamber of Commerce meeting Thursday night was not very well attended. Judge C. L. Glenn of Matador and Henry Pipkin were present at the meeting in the interest of the Lee Highway Association. Judge Glenn is one of the Texas Directors of that organization and is thoroughly sold on the proposition of making the Lee Highway one of the main streets of America.

Judge Glenn spoke to the small number present for several minutes outlining the work of the Lee Highway Association and urging Floydada to do her part in helping the organization function by paying her pro rata of the expense.

Judge Glenn pointed out that the Lee Highway Association was responsible for getting Highway 28 designated through Floydada as a state and Federal highway in the seven per cent system. "This one service to Floydada, alone, is well worth all the time and money that we can spend in the interest of the Lee Highway. Not only that, but Floydada has an eastern outlet now that means more to her than any other road you have, and as a matter of duty you should show appreciation to the counties east of you who have taken the lead and borne the burden so far of getting this commendable work done."

He further pointed out that this is not a grafting proposition. "Dr. Johnson, the promoter of the Lee Highway is a high class gentleman of standing in Washington and in recognized by the President and all the officials of the Federal government as such." Judge Glenn expressed the belief that within five years Lee Highway will be a Federal owned and maintained highway clear across the continent. Such a bill has recently been presented in Congress.

Practically everyone present expressed themselves as favoring the Lee Highway proposition following Judge Glenn's talk.

200 OAK SEEDLINGS GIFT OF W. H. NELSON, JR.

Little Trees Gift of Former Resident of Floydada Available for Citizens Who Will Plant Them

W. H. Nelson, Jr., of Abilene, a former resident of Floydada has made the Floydada Chamber of Commerce a gift of three or four hundred oak seedlings which he hopes to get the organization to distribute to people of Floydada who will want them.

In his letter Mr. Nelson gives the proper method of planting the trees. It is as follows: "Dig a hole about ten or twelve inches deep, take tree in left hand and hold in the hole so that the bottom leaf will be about level with surface of the ground, rake dirt in and press lightly, fill the hole about half full, then pour water in and allow to soak up, then finish filling hole with loose dirt, be sure to set little tree so that acorn will be an inch below the surface, and do not break the acorn off as it is necessary to support the trees growth. Keep well watered for a few weeks. Do not take the leaves off of the trees."

Maury Hopkins, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce wants all who will to call at the office and get the trees. They are absolutely given gratis and will take little time to put out.

Several trees will be put out at the City Waterworks and Park according to officials.

EASTLAND ATTORNEY WILL MOVE TO FLOYDADA SOON

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INSTRUCT OR NOT

USE NATIONAL FORESTS FOR GRAZING SAY SPECIALIST

"Fully one half of the 470,000,000 acres of forest land in the United States is not suitable for grazing livestock and the other half should be used only after every precaution has been taken to protect the young trees from injury," said W. R. Chapline, grazing expert at the recent forest research conference of the Forest Service United States Department of Agriculture.

"\$85,000,000 worth of meat and wool are produced each year from the herds of cattle and sheep that graze on the national forests. Grazing must therefore be regarded as a highly important economic use of the national forests, although, of course, it is secondary to timber-growing."

Grazing investigations are needed to work out better methods of handling grazing on 240 million acres of woodland pasture and over 600 million acres of semiarid cattle and sheep range in the West, according to Mr. Chapline, who asserted that better management is needed not only to preserve the forage plants from injury, but to protect young forest trees and to lessen erosion from trampling and overgrazing. He cited the use of fire in burning over grasslands, particularly as practiced in the southern pine forests, as a destructive practice designed to improve the forage but in reality gravely damaging both forage and timber.

A federal agent in New York City recently upset by accident a can of alleged Turkish paste in the appariser's storehouse, revealing opium hidden under the paste. This led to the seizure of between \$60,000 and \$100,000 worth of the drug hidden in other tins consigned to Abraham D. Lake, radio merchant.

INCREASE IN GAME BIRDS DUE TO COYOTE ERADICATION

As a result of continued activities on coyote control in the North Park Country, Col., the number of sage hens was greatly increased during the summer of 1923, according to a report received by the Biological Survey, U. S. Department of Agriculture. On one inspection trip flocks ranging from 12 to 60 were seen, whereas three years ago these birds were exceedingly scarce. Quail are also on the increase in Western Colorado. Hundreds of them are seen on the sheep ranges which have been cleared of coyotes.

Biological Survey field men report that game birds have increased over all the State of South Dakota during

the year. The season was very favorable for the native species, and all of the grouse family, the imported pheasants, and the quail are nearly twice as numerous as at the close of 1922. The bobwhite quail have increased in such numbers as to be plentiful along the timbered streams about the Black Hills and also in the Belle Fourche irrigation project and along the course of the White River.

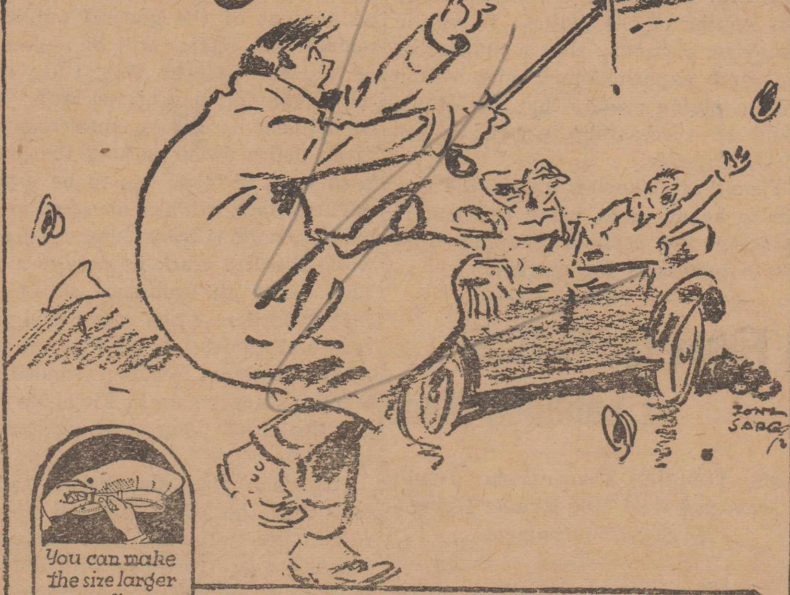

APPARATUS SEPARATES PARASITES FROM SOIL

In studying the nemas which exist in the soil and which, in many cases cause diseases of plants such as root-knot and certain rots, there has been much difficulty in separating the organisms from the soil. Most of them are extremely small and can not be picked out by ordinary methods; nor can they be washed out readily. However, Dr. N. A. Cobb, of the United States Department of Agriculture, has devised an ingenious flotation apparatus which affords valuable aid in removing the nemas from a sample of soil.

The apparatus consists essentially of a hollow cylinder several inches in diameter and three or four feet high, tapering for about a foot to a small opening at the bottom and provided with a spout at the top. This cylinder is fastened to a circular rotating table or frame which is turned at moderate speed by a motor while nema free water is run in at the bottom by turning a graduated tap. The soil sample is mixed with a small quantity of water and then poured quickly into the rotating cylinder when it is about a quarter full of water. The rotation currents any disturbing up-and-down currents which might interfere with the separation, as in some ore separating machines.

Nemas sink very slowly and rise if

the water is so regulated by the tap that it will little more than counteract their fall. As a result the soil particles which are heavier sink to the bottom and the nemas are lifted to the top. When the rising column of muddy water reaches the upper opening it is spouted with the contained nemas into a vessel set on the rotating table to catch the overflow. When all of the nemas are collected in this vessel they are allowed to settle to the bottom. The water is drawn off and a slimy mass containing the nemas in much greater concentration is found in the bottom. They may then be removed and examined under the microscope. By this method also the number of nemas in a given quantity of soil may be estimated.

BRAZOS COUNTY COW NEW STATE CHAMPION

Abbie Cornucopia Colantha Tinta is Texas' new champion Holstein cow for the production of butter in ten months as a full age cow, according to the advanced registry department of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America. In the herd of the A & M College at College Station this cow completed her test with 21,093.6 lbs of milk and 640.06 lbs butter fat—equal to 800 lbs butter.

As a consequence of this record she displaces the former state champion Holstein cow of this class, Maud Posch Queen 2nd, owned also by the state

college. Her record is 19,514.8 lbs milk and 742.6 lbs butter.

COTTON SEED TESTS GIVE INTERESTING RESULTS

Germination tests for various samples of cotton seed intended for planting from farms in this county and from other sections of the state, made by county agent, T. Scott Wilson, last Saturday, gave some interesting results.

For instance the seed used from one farm in this county ran 90 per cent while a number of other seed submitted for the test raised in different sections of this and adjoining counties have tests running from around 70 per cent to as low as 16 per cent.

16 samples were tested, two of each being made, all under identical conditions. Most of them ran lower than 70 per cent, Mr. Wilson said.

The tests were made for the purpose of putting farmers on guard against planting seeds this spring that do not show strong germination qualities.

An expensive fault of the narrow road is the concentration of traffic. Wheels moving constantly over the same places produce parallel lines of excessive wear. To prevent rapid disintegration of a single track road a heavier foundation and surface is needed than is required for a wider road.

Substantial shoulders at the sides on which passing traffic may turn out are also necessary, as otherwise the wheels of vehicles turning out to pass will quickly wear ruts at the edges. In these water collects, to penetrate beneath the foundation, with disastrous results. A narrow road with soft earth shoulders is dangerous to motor traffic in slippery weather.

To build the heavier foundation and surface needed to bear the concentration of traffic on a narrow road, and the substantial shoulders at the sides, requires as much money as to build a wider road. On a wide road, traffic is scattered, and wear is distributed. With a paved surface sufficiently wide for two lines of rapidly moving vehicles to pass in safety the necessity for artificial shoulders is eliminated. To build a narrow road thin and without shoulders, means a loss of the entire investment in a comparatively short time.

A narrow right of way requires drainage ditches close to the travel. With no shoulder between paved surface and ditch the chances of serious accident are largely increased. All drainage ditches tend to become deeper, so that the danger to traffic becomes constantly greater.

Before any program for beautification of highways is undertaken, some assurance that the rights of way are wide enough to accommodate future traffic should be had.

Motor vehicle traffic will increase as the mileage of hard roads increases. A general extension in the width of wearing surfaces will call for wider rights of way now means an ultimate saving of money and will prevent many future accidents.

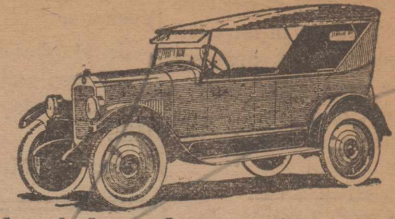

In the three months' period January 1 to Mar 31, 1924, the agricultural forces active in replacing scrub sires with purebreds had 896 new recruits. This number of livestock owners, according to the United States Department of Agriculture, signed agreements to use henceforth purebred sires exclusively for all classes of livestock owned. The number is an increase of more than 100 over that for the preceding quarter. The total number of livestock owners cooperating with the various states and with the department in the "Better Sires—Better Stock" campaign now exceeds 13,500.

A study of the relative size of various co-operative organizations shows that more than 25 per cent of 585 fruit and vegetable marketing organization do an annual business of \$20,000 or under, says the United States Department of Agriculture. The business of 4 per cent exceeds \$1,000,000 annually. Of 1,139 farmer - controlled creameries nearly 60 per cent do between \$21,000 and \$100,000 annually. Twenty three per cent of 1,861 grain associations do between \$61,000 and \$100,000 annually, and 14 per cent between \$201,000 and \$300,000.

This picture will be circulated through the film distribution system of the Department of Agriculture and the co-operating state colleges. 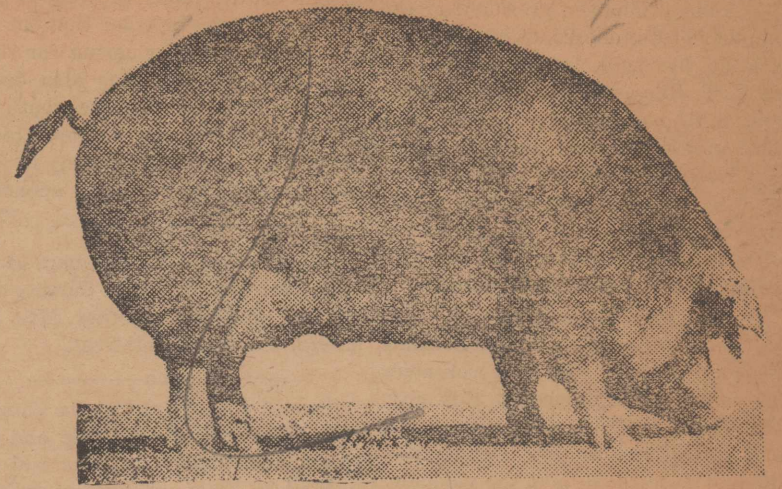
"And whereas, it is evident that such an effort, cordially supported and heartily joined in by every citizen, is badly needed for the purposes above named;
