Break Record Here

Grain Cars Broken Two Days in Succession

For two days in succession this week the shipments of wheat to primary markets from Floydada broke the record hung up by shippers in 1919, the new mark of twenty cars having been set Wednesday and today, when twenty cars were billed out each day.

The Santa Fe has been pouring trainload after trainload of grain cars into the south plains territory the past few days ,the empties on the tracks in Floydada territory having been used up last week. A total of 92 carloads of wheat have gone out including this mornings shipment since the first car went out Tuesday morning of last week.
