





> Premier Theodore explained that the housing shortage was quite as bad in Australia as elsewhere and said that under the scheme to build workers' homes the government bought the land, erected the houses and then sold them to individuals, who paid weekly installments no higher than ordinary rent. At the end of fifteen or twenty years the workman owned the home. Queensland is spending \$2,000,000 this year for 1,000 dwellings to be sold in the same way.

> Premier Theodore said he expected to see Prime Minister MacDonald, whom he knows, on his visit to London. He declared that Mr. MacDonald now had the opportunity of demonstrating that his policy was workable and sane. If he succeeds, said Mr. Theodore, it will have a great effect throughout the British empire.

Among the accomplishments of the labor party in Queensland in nearly nine years Premier Theodore recited the institution of the compulsory arbitration act as among the most substantial, as it practically did away with strikes.

Under government direction the cotton fields of Queensland are being developed intensively. Farmers from the United States will be asked in a year or two to migrate to Queensland to develop the cotton fields, with the inducements of land at low rates and government assistance until their farms yield substantial chops.

### East African Elephant Herds Growing Larger

The elephant is a very useful animal both for draft purposes and for ivory. A few years ago 70,000 were slaughtered annually for their tusks, so that it seemed as though there was a good chance of the big animal's becoming extinct. Wise laws, however, have checked the destruction so that the number is increasing. The war gave the elephants their chance and the British authorities in East Africa have also protected them. South of Zambesi the elephant is virtually extinct and the Cape market for ivory has ceased to exist.

At present Mozambique is the center of the ivory trade. Oddly enough, the Portuguese, through whose hands it comes, send nearly all the ivor; across to Bombay, where it is sorted and cut and dispatched to the European markets. The world's supply of real elephant ivory is now about 250 tons a year.-Scientific American.

The chairman of the magistrates laughingly agreed with her and made her fine only 20 shillings and costs.

Visitors to the New York aquarium in the last year numbered 2,121,896, a monthly average of 176,825. Boston, Philadelphia, Detroit, Venice, Cal., and San Francisco are the only other American cities that maintain similar institutions. The Steinhart aquarium, lately opened in Golden Gate park, San Francisco, attracted 232,947 persons in its first month.

# **Power Possibilities**

While there will be an average daily output of power at Muscle Shoals amounting to 480,000 horsepower, and possibly more as the power possibilities further up the Tennessee River are developed, the amount of power required

to make 40,000 tons of fertilizer, the maximum amount any one has agreed to make under any conditions, is only 100.000 horsepower. Furthermore, this amount of power is based upon the use of the cyanamid method of making fertilizer, which has been found unecono mical. In Germany, the Haber process will produce 40,000 tons of nitrogen with only 35,000 horsepower. If fertilizer is made economically at Muscle Shoals, it will be by the Heber or some similar process rather than the cyanamid process, and the amount of power used will take only a small part of the

potential power at the Shoals.

Getting down to the facts in the case, Muscle Shoals is much more of a powr project than a fertilizer proposition. All power companies which have bid on the government's property at Muscle Shoals realize that some day Muscle Shoals will be the source of a tremendous amount of power and a valuable asset. They are not interested in securing Muscle Shoals for the manufac- nine feet distant.



FOR CAREFUL PLANNING

The most important part of building a house is very often accomplished before actual construction begins. The economy, comfort convenience and even the appearance of a house are largely dependent upon the care and thought employed in devising the plan. A well-planned house is a joy to those who live in it, while one that is badly planned costs as much or more to build and is a continual source of dissatisfaction and annoyance.

The results which can be secured by intelligent planning intimately concern every member of a household and are too important to be deliberately neglected. The home is the housewife's laboratory and workshop where the routine essential to a well-ordered home life is organized and carried on. Therefore, it is logical and imperative that careful consideration be given to these elements of the plan which sim-plify and lighten household operations. The welfare of the entire family is improved when proper attention is paid to the details of the arrangement and equipment which serve to add to the comfort of the individual. Economy must always be considered, but too often the opposite results when the plan is neglected or when it is the outcome of hurried, unwise or misdirected effort.

### Clock Built in 1711 Mrs. R. N. Burgett, who had been

A A clock which was 21 years old when George Washington first saw the light of day, and from which the Father of His Country on several occasions later took the time, it is said, still is ticking away, in Omaha, and recording the seconds, minutes and hours, the days of the month, the phases of the moon and the rise and fall of the tides.

It is the property of Mrs. Carrie M. Peters. At her death it will descend to her oldest surviving male descendant, or in case none survives, to her daughter, Miss Hester H. Peters.

Still Runs in Omaha

The clock, which was built by Felix Owen in Pork, England, in 1711, was purchased by Newton Peters, who seven years later came to America and settled at Jamestown. Va. A few years later, he, with William Byrd, founded the town of Petersburg, Va. At his death in 1725, the clock descended to his son, Absalom, and on his death in 1760 to Zachariah Peters, later an officer in the American navy.

The clock was on exhibition at the Centennial exposition at Philadelphia in 1876 as the oldest of the grandfather type, of authentic record, with none to dispute its precedence for age. It was keeping time when Lexington and Concord were fought and within sound of the cannons' roar when the Revolution closed at Yorktown October, 19, 1781. It still keeps perfect time.-Omaha Bee.



How do yeu reconcile your statements?



Glaciers are on every hand, and dozens of streams tumble into the picturesque lake. At one time a fine chalet was located on the shore, but it was swept away by an avalanche. Ice may occasionally be day. seen floating on Gunsight lake, but most of the glaciers which feed the lake are high above the water. The blackfoot glacier, two miles distant, is the largest in the park, covering an area of ten square miles.

Plasterco is a unique little city, troit News. having all modern conveniences, picture shows, lodge rooms, amusement parks, tennis courts, ball grounds, etc., maintained by the company for the benefit of its employes, who comprise the entire population of this little city.

The Texas Cement Plaster Company employs about 100 men, and has a daily capacity of 650 tons of plaster. It is known as a nine-kettle mill, and while they are only working gypsite at pres-ent, they are adding a "rock" plant for working gypsum in rock form, a rock plant and installing an automatic machine for the manufacture of gypsum partition tile, at a cost of several hundred thousand dollars. This plant has been in operation for about twenty years.

One of the latest additions to the industry in this section is the Universal Gypsum Company plant at Rotan, Texas. It has three 171/2 ton capacity kettles which make seven hatches each day with a total daily capacity of 385 tons. This plant is working only gypsite at this time; however, their wall board plant will soon be in operation and will have a daily capacity of this material of 150,000 feet. This plant, although less than one year old, now represents an investment of close to a million dollars. At this plant the labor is all white about 100 men employed. The Universal Gyp sum Company has seven plants throughout the United States.

Another mill that was built only this year is that of the United States Gypsum Company at Sweetwater, Texas, with

### Radio on Delivery Trucsk

A Philadelphia bakery has installed receiving sets on its delivery trucks. The driver wears his phones at stated intervals and picks up instructions from his manager, and thus makes calls that he otherwise would not be able to make without telephoning and taking extra time. Each truck owned by the company is outfitted with an aerial and receiving set and with a little knowledge of conditions in the city and routes of the various trucks the manager has no difficulty in getting into constant touch with his drivers.

#### New Aerial Bomb Powerful

Capable of making a crater 150 feet in diameter where it strikes, a new aerial bomb, ten times as large as any used in the World war, has been perfected by the United States ordnance department and was recently placed on exhibition as showing the aerial war devices used in 1917 and 1918 are already obsolete. It weighs 4,000 pounds and is designed to be carried in a bombing plane.

### **Millions of Coins Defaced**

Chromium's Great Value

has been described.

Chromium, a metal almost unknown 40 years ago, is now declared to be one of the indispensable elements in modern industry by Clifford B. Bellis in a report on the present uses of the metal festivities?" published in Chemical and Metallurgical Engineering. Stainless steel and high-speed steel are two of its many useful applications.

For chromium is a sociable sort of element. It is of little value alone, Nisse. while as an alloy or companion of other metals it does indispensable work. Alloyed with iron it makes a steel that is both hard and tough, and so has made possible the development of many characteristic modern appliances.

It is estimated that without chromium high-speed steel tools, the works of the Ford company at Detroit would have to be seven times their present size, and it is certain that without the use of chrome steel in automobile engines the motorcar would be a very heavy and cumbersome contrivance. Airplanes such as we know them

Stainless steel is produced by alloying steel with about 15 per cent of chromium; and rustproof iron contains about the same proportion, although with a less amount of carbon.

### Damage by Porcupines

Many of the trees on the sample plots in the Coconino National forest which have been studied for a number periment station have been entirely destroyed by porcupines and many more are reported injured, announces the forest service, United States Department of Agriculture. It is believed that porcupines are making the establishment of Western yellow pine throughout the forests of the Southwest considerably more difficult. Because of the moisture content of the bark, porcupines are very fond of this succulent growth and appear to take great delight in stripping the bark from young trees in their search for food and moisture.
