\$85,970 indebtedness of the city is the total of the debts that will be refunded by the refunding bonds voted Tuesday. The rate of interest that will be borne by the bonds is lower than the lowest rate borne by any of the present outstanding debts of the municipality and on some of the outstanding debts the rate of interest is very materially reduced. The refunding bonds also spread out over a longer period of time, giving greater elasticity to the city's credit and at the same time save thousands of dollars in interest pledged

by maturing on the serial basis.

Vote of the refunding bonds at the same time the paving bonds were voted means that the increased indebtedness of the corporation can be taken care of without an increase in the tax rate or an inflation of valuations for taxes.

According to the plans of the council eight additional blocks of paving are contemplated in the paving program to be inaugurated in the spring. though petitions for several more blocks by the property owners have been made, it is said the council are of the belief that eight blocks is all that should be undertaken at this time. The cost of this program to the city is estimated at \$35,000, while property adjoining the paved area will be assessed the remainder of the burden.



Japanese Islands villages along the shore and the terraced rice along the hillsides presented a strange new picture to us. Everywhere about us were the fishing junks, both sail and motor propelled. We saw many schools of porpoise and great sharks alongside the ship. The harbor was filled with ships, freight ships principally; the breakwater had been rebuilt and the bay was smooth. When we got near the dock we could see things more in detail—nothing but wreckage! Temporary huts have been built to replace the once densely populated district of American homes.

When our boat dropped anchor the quarantine inspectors came aboard. I never saw so much red tape to anything as going on land, never felt so "un-necessary" as when waiting and going through inspection. The Japanese officials were very courteous and worked quite rapidly. For the first time I realized that I was on foreign soil-had to have our American gold exchanged to yens, sens and so forth. 
