## **Slaton Wins Conference Title From Whirlwinds**

Score of 13 to 6 is Registered When Heavier Team Wears Down The Whirlwind Defense Line.

Slaton High School won Conference B Championship in Section 1 from Floydada High School Friday afternoon of last week in one of the hardest-fought gridiron battles ever seen on the local gridiron before a crowd estimated at 1,500 people, and on the prettiest football playing day that could be asked. The score was 13 to

With a brisk norther blowing in the forenoon the wind calmed down by the time of play at 3:30 and the chill was just deep enough to make the boys

Doped for the weaker team of the two, on account of their weight and inexperience, the Whirlwinds were still fighting against odds when the last whistle blew having started a slashing open field game in an effort to retrieve the loss sustained two minutes before play ended when the Slaton line broke through the F. H. S. defensive and blocked Abbott's swifty executed punt, and covered behind the goal line. It was a heart-breaking moment for the local lads who had fought a brilliant defensive for the last half of the game, in an effort to keep the score tied.

Playing almost exactly the same type of football, in style of formation and field generalship, Slaton's greater weight and experience in the last five minutes of play was demonstrated

The Green and White got first blood in the first six minutes of play. Henry for F. H. S. won the toss and chose to defend the east goal, kicking to Slaton. On offside the ball was brought back to the 55 yard line and kickoff made to Slaton 14 yard line, the Tigers returning to the 22-yard line. For four downs neither side made their ground, fumbles being costly once each to both, a fumble and fake losing 15 yards for F. H. S. on their last effort, when Abbott kicked to the 20 yard line and the scrimmage line formed on the 25 yard line. Slaton in turn lost the ball. 





There so many ways of making really delicious dishes from this good and wholesome part of the animal that it is astonishing people do not use kidney recipes more than they do. Maybe it is not universally known just how to prepare them. Maybe you personally think you won't like kidneys simply because you have never tasted them or have heard others talk of them in derision.

Below are printed some recipes for cooking kidneys that are guaranteed to please:

Stewed Kidneys on Toast 2 lambs' kidneys (beef kidney can be used).

2 cups water, 2 slices onion, 4 slices toast, 2 teaspoons salt, ½ teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 table-

Remove thin skin from kidneys and cut in small pieces; soal: in cold water to cover for one hour. Drain, add two cups water and onion, and simmer until kidneys are tender. Melt butter, add flour and seasonings, and thicken water in which kidneys were cooked; cook five minutes. Arrange kidneys on toast, and strain sauce over them. Serve immediately Broiled Kidneys

2 lambs' kidneys (beer kidney can be used). 4 tablespoons cracker crumbs, 2 tablespoons butter melted, salt, pepper and lemon juice.

Remove the thin skin from the kid-

neys, and cut in one fourth inch slices.

Wash, soak in salted water one half hour. Drain, season, dip in butter, then in crumbs, and broil five minutes. Serve on hot platter with Maitre d'Hote! Butter. Maitre d'Hotel Butter.

3 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons lemon juice, 3 tablespons parsley, 1/4 teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon paprika,

Cream the butter and add remain ing ingredients.

Kidneys en Brochette Cut kidney in quarter-inch slices. Season with salt and pepper, dip in olive oil. Arrange on a skewer with alternating slices of bacon.

Dip in oil, in bread crumbs, and broil over a clear fire or else fry in butter. Serve with or without Poquante Sauce

Piquante Sauce 3 tablespoons butter, 4 tablespons flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 11/2 cups brown stock, ¼ teaspoon pepper, 1 tablespoon chopped chives, 1 tablespoons chopped pepper, 1 tablespoon chopped olives, 1 tablespoon chopped pickle, 1 tablespoon capers.

2 Tablespoons Vinegar. Brown the butter; add the flour; when browned, add stock. Cook chives, capers, pickles, olives and pepper in vinegar five minutes. Add to sauce and simmer twenty minutes.

Kidney Omelet. 2 eggs, 2 tablespoons hot water or hot milk, 4 teaspoon salt, 1 table-

spoon butter. Beat eggs well; add salt and milk. Melt butter in Frying pan; add egg mixture; shake pan vigorously until egg begins to brown on under side; then let it stand until golden brown, on part of range where it will not burn. If moist on top place in oven to dry. Before folding omelet add stewed kidneys highly seasoned.
