Large Crowd Expected **At Rhodes Opening Day**

Arrangements to Furnish Lunch to Huge Crowd Expected at Railway Junction City Saturday.

Preparations are being made for between 3,000 and 4,000 people at the foropening Saturday, July 30th, of mal Floyd County's new railroad junction. city, Rhodes, according to W. A. Bergstrom of the Roxana Townsite Company,

developers of the townsite. The two new big railroad lines of the south plains—the 202-mile F. W. & D. from Estelline to Plainview and Dimmitt and the new line from Lubbock northeast to Silverton-cross at a point about 8 miles northeast of Lockney, and the new city of Rhodes is being developed at this point.

The new city will be located just south of the crossing and directly south of the Union Station, which will be built by the railroad for transfer of passen-

gers, etc. Earl Fuqua, owner of Sec. 56, Block D-2, Floyd Co., Texas on which Rhodes is located, has deeded 46 acres to the rail lines for right-of-way use and the railroad is providing a large depot and adequate freight facilities, it is stated by the developers.

The railroad company is locating extensive facilities at Rhodes, and a large railroad payroll alone assures a bright future for the city. In addition, it is anticipated that its strategic location will cause Rhodes to rapidly develop into one of the most important jobbing, passenger and freight transfer points, and commercial cities in the south

Proposed \$475,000 Road Bond Issue

Floyd County votes Monday, August 1, on a proposed bond issue of \$475,000 for hard surfacing Highway No. 28, running from the Motley County line on the east and the Hale County line on the west. The election for voting on the highway improvement project was ordered by the Commissioners' Court in session June 29. Citizens will cast their votes at seventeen precincts on the issue and at the same time on a separate ballot will signify their stand on four proposed amendments to the state Constitution.



It's inevitable that at one time or another we feel that our efforts are being wasted and that it isn't much use to try any longer.



Questions and Answers

Questions in regard to proposed road bond issue propounded to County Judge Wm. McGehee and his answers to same:

Question: What would be the tax levy to pay interest on the road bonds each year?

Answer: If the bonds are authorized, we do not contemplate making a tax levy for the current year as we understand there will not be any aid available before next year. If my plans are carried out by the Commissioners' Court we would issue something like one-third of the issue authorized each year for three years, hence about 11 or 12 cents tax would be levied in 1928, which would be increased as the bonds are sold until all bonds are sold by which time with the visible increase in new railroads and other public improvements I think the rate to take care of the bonds would not exceed 30 cents, which I believe within ten years could probably be reduced to between 15 and 20 cents.

Q: If Floyd County should fail to vote the bonds would it affect the other counties to the east and west on the Lee Highway?

A: This question I cannot answer positively, but I do know that our neighbor counties so affected are very uneasy about Floyd County not carrying. The proposition was put up to the highway authorities to grant aid on the proposition of a paved road from Vernon to the New Mexico line. If this paving is not continuous as the commission understood, then it will be another proposition and as to whether or not aid would be granted as previously agreed would be another question. It does not look reasonable that Federal funds would be appropriated unless there was a strong possibility that the road would be continuous (without gaps).

Q: Do you think that if the road is not paved that an-


a local proposition and if taken up at all should be for the whole county. It appears to me that if this road proposition carries that it would only be the beginning of a road system for the county that if made local in scope would seriously impair the usefulness and effectiveness of such a system, besides the cost would be much greater where handled by districts. I take the view that with the advent of the 88 miles of new railroad, the four or five new towns now springing up, the ten or twelve switches for the convenience of loading and unloading freight that within the next few years our road system will undergo a vast change. and while we cannot all have a paved road in front of our home that the demands will be for every portion of the county to be served by an adequate road system and that state highways will at least traverse every quarter of the county. I do not hesitate to say that I believe we have only begun to develop Floyd County and that if we think we are through that we are fooling ourselves.

Q: If Floyd County votes the bonds will they have to contribute towards maintenance of the highway upkeep?

A: Under the present law, our responsibility ceases when the road is finished and accepted and we do not have to ever be out any amount for maintenance and upkeep.

Q: Is there any way to get back the thousands of dollars we contribute to the State annually except as aid in highway construction?

A: There is no other way to recover these funds except as they are donated by the Highway Department as aid on highway construction. Last year about \$30,000 was remitted to Austin by our tax collector in auto registration fees alone. This year the gas tax of two cents collected in Floyd County that goes to the Highway Department has been estimated at \$48,000. I should think that a reasonable estimate of all auto and gasoline taxes to be paid in through Floyd County to the Highway Department will be in excess of \$80,000 in 1927. This amount is gone and we will continue to contribute each year unless we meet the requirements and secure the return of a portion of these funds. In looking over the answers to your questions it looks like an argument for the road bonds, but my answers have been arrived at by considerable investigation and if the facts are such as to create this impression on a reasonable unbiased mind there must be something to the proposition. Had I found the facts antagonistic to the proposition I would have answered as freely as I have.

A: I do not know whether such change would be considered, but I do know that the counties both north and south of the proposed line of road are eager to have the road come their way.

Q: In event the proposition to vote bonds fails to carry, would you consider it good policy to vote bonds by districts?

A: I do not consider it good policy to vote district bonds, for several reasons; namely: first, they are not considered desirable from an investment standpoint, consequently they would have to bear the maximum amount of interest to be sold to all; second, I think that as big a proposition as this that is national and state wide in service is not



"This is a matter that must of necessity be left up to the discretion of the Cemmissioners' Court.

"The entire Commissioners' Court understands that the bonds if voted are to be applied on the construction of a per-Inanent payment on highway No. 28 and I do not believe that there is any member of the court that would for an instant consider putting the proceeds of the bonds to any other purpose. As to the sale of the bonds as I understand the proposition we would have to sell at least a part of these bonds so that the State and Federal appropriations would have something tangible to match. The county before it applies for the aid must show to the highway authorities that they have actually available a certain amount of funds, then the highway anthorities make their appropriations as agreed on.

We must remember that we are furnishing the least amount of the cost of paving, so must be guided largely by the majority stockholder.

"If any person has questions I will do my best to answer them. If a person opposed to the issue wants informa-tion I will attempt to answer just as freely as I have in cases for those for the bonds," Judge McGehee said.
