## Questions and Answers

Questions in regard to proposed road bond issue propounded to County Judge Wm. MeGehee and his answers
to same:
Question: What would be the tax levy to pay interest on the road bonds each year?
Answer: If the bonds are authorized, we do not contemplate making a tax levy for the current year as we understand there will not be any aid available before nex
year. If my plans are carried out by the Commissioners Court we would issue something like one-third of the issue authorized each year for three years, hence about 11 or 12 cents tax would be levied in 1928, which would be increased
as the bonds are sold until all bords are sold by which time as the bonds are sold untif all bords are sold by which time
with the visible increase in new railroads and other public improvements I think the rate to take care of the bonds would not excced 30 cents, which I believe within ten years could probably be reduced to between 15 and 20 cents. Q: If Floyd councy shouid fail 1 vote the bonds would it affect the other counties to the east and west on the Lee
A: This question I cannot answer positively, but I do know that our neighbor counties so affected are very un-
easy about Floyd County not carrying. The proposition was easy about Floyd County not carrying. The proposition was
put up to the highway authorities to grant aid on the propo put up to the highway authorities to grant aid on the propo-
sition of a paved road from Vernon to the New Mexico line. If this paving is not continuous as the commission understood, then it will be another proposition and as to whether or not aid would be granted as previously agreed would be another question. It does not look reasonable that Federal fundis would be appropriated unless there was a strong pos-
sibility that the road would be continuous (without gaps). Q: Do you think that if the road is not paved that another designation would be made for the Lee Highway? A: I do not know whether such change would be considered, but I do know that the counties both north and
south of the proposed line of road are eager to have the road soume their way.
con fails to ar Q: In event the proposition to vote bonds fails to car-
ry, would you consider it good policy to vote bonds by districts? A: I do not consider it good policy to vote district
bonds, for several reasons; namely: first, they are not conbonds, for several reasons; namest : frst, they are not con-
sidered desirable from an investment standpoint, consequently they would have to bear the maximum amount of interest to be sold to all; second, I think that as big a proposition as this that is national and state wide in service is not
a local proposition and if taken up at all should be for the whole county. It appears to me that if this road road system for the county that if only be the beginning of a seriously impir county that if made local in scope would system impair the usefulness and effectiveness of such a system, besides the cost would be much greater where handled by districts. I take the view that with the advent of the 88 miles of new rairoad, the four or five new towns
now springing up, the ten or twelve switches for the convenience of loading and unloading freight that within the next few years our road system will undergo a vast change and while we cannot all have a paved road in front of our home that the demands will be for every portion of the
county to be served by an adecuate road system and that county to be served by an adequate road system and that
state highways will at least traverse every quarter of the cousty. I do not hesitate to say that I believe we have only begun to develop Floyd County and that if we think we are through that we are fooling ourselves:
Q: If Floyd County votes the bonds will they have to A: Under the present law, our responsibility ceases when the road is finished and accepted and we do not have to ever be out any amount for maintenance and upkeep. Q: Is there any way to get back the thousands of dol-
lars we contribute to the State annually except as aid in highway construction? A: There is no other way to recover these funds ex-
cept as they are donated by the Highway Department as cept as they are donated by the Highway Depariment as
aid on highway construction. Last year about $\$ 30,000$ was aid on highway construction. Last year about $\$ 30,000$ was
remitted to Austin by our tax collector in auto registration remitted to Austin by our tax collector in auto registration
fees alone. This year the gas tax of two cents collected in Floyd County that goes to the Highway Department has been esiimated at $\$ 48,000$. I should think that a reasonable estimate of all auto and gasoline taxes to be paid in through
Flovd County to the Highway Department will be in excess Floyd County to the Highway Department will be in excess
of $\$ 80,000$ in 1927. This amount is gone and we will conof $\$ 80,000$ in 1927 . This amount is gone and we will con-
tinue to contribute each year unless we meet the requirements and secure the return of a portion of these funds. In looking over the answers to your questions it looks like an argument for the road bonds, but my answers have been arrived at by considerable investigation and if the facts
are such as to create this impression on a reasonable unbiased mind there must be something to the proposition. Had I found the facts antagonistic to the proposition I would have answered as freely as I have.

## Some Highway Facts

The entire public road system of Texas is approximate ly 180,000 miles in length. Floyd County will vote AUGUST 1 , on a $\$ 475,000$ proposed bond issue for paving approximately 40 miles of this system, which is State Highway No. 28 (Lee Highway), from the Motley County to the Hale County line. It is understood by the Commissioneers' Court that the proceeds of the bonds will be expended for permanent paving, if the issue is voted and will no consider cheap or inefficient paving of any description; that issue unless aid in the amount of not less than two dollars for one is granted by the State and Federal authorities.

The State Highway Commission on May 23, 1927, granted aid to four counties east of Floyd on the Lee Highway, pledging participation in the construction of the paved highway across these counties in a sum not to exceed two-thirds of the cost of the construction, and have com mitted themselves informally to a similar appropriation for the line through this county.

The $\$ 475,000$ bond issue, plus the same amount from the State, plus the same amount from the Federal government, will provide more than $\$ 30,000$ per mile for the high
way. Paved roads in other sections of Texas are being buil wor this amount of money and less in some instances, and there is every reason to believe that it can be done in Floyd County.

The tax levy for 1927 will not include the bond issue if it carries. The levy will be made on valuations for nex year, 1928 . and January 31 , which means the first taxes will be collected about January 1, 1929.

Floyd County pays out $\$ 102,000$ annually on gasoline and license taxes. It gets back $\$ 10,000$ on the State Highdifference is going into the State Highway Fund every year to help build paved roads and maintain them in other parts of Texas. In addition, every man who pays any kind of fed-
ral tax is also helping to build highways all over the Unit d States. Floyd County can enjoy its share of its own axes by building good roads with State and Federal aid. ummed up, all this would mean voting an expenditure of $\$ 475,000$ to get $\$ 1,425,000$ worth of roads built in Floyc County.

## How the Issue Will Be Met

The proposed issue will be met by an advalorem tax upon all taxable property subject to taxation within Floyd County for the year 1928, and thereafter as long as any of the bonds are outstanding. The estimated taxable values of Floyd County for 1927 is $\$ 10,980,000.00$, the approved taxable values for 1926 were $\$ 10,764,640.00$
