WTU Employees Earn Award for Safe Driving

National honors for an outstanding safe driving performance have been won by the employees of the West Texas Utilities Company in the Public Utilities Group 1 Division of the 29th National Fleet Safety Contest conducted by the National Safety Council.

Group 1, in which West Texas Utilities was the first place winner, was composed of the motor vehicle fleets of 40 major American utility companies. In this group, which was the largest in the contest, the vehicles of each of the competing fleets operated 175,000 miles or more per month during the year ending June 30, 1960.

The WTU fleet averaged 321 vehicles and more than 530 drivers. They were awarded first place in the Public Utili-

ties Group 1 Division at ceremonies held in Chicago last week as part of the 48th National Safety Congress and Exposition.

The award is based on the employees' safe driving record for the period July, 1959, through June, 1960. During that year, WTU employees operated 3,125,365 miles with a rate of one-fourth of an accident per 100,000 miles of operation.

Winners were determined after an inspection of the records by an auditor representing the National Fleet Safety Contest Committee.

"Credit for this national recognition in safe driving goes to our employees who operate the company vehicles," stated Cal Young, WTU President. "This is an honor of which we are very proud."



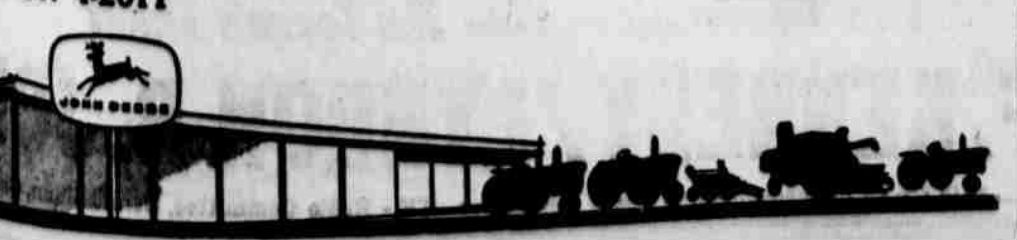

Changing Africa Is Program Theme of Magazine Club

The change in Africa is economic, social and political. Many great developments are changing the face of Africa.

Numerous dams are being built for hydro-electric power. The largest man-made lake is being built on the Zambezi River. When this lake is finished all the maps of Central Africa will have to be redrawn. It is estimated that from Africa's swirling rivers the continent has enough waterpower to light up the world.

In discussing the "Look of Africa," Mrs. C. J. Robinson pointed out that underneath the sun-baked crust of Africa lies every major mineral and across its vastness is grown every important crop. Yet in this land there is widespread poverty, illiteracy and need.

Africa is a boisterous, ambitious, and often proud continent suddenly awake and grasping at the wonders of our modern age, racing toward in-

dependence under African rule, and winning a more prominent position in world affairs.

Mrs. Al C. Williams told of the "African Tribes and Tongues in Africa." She said there is an estimated 225 million non-white and 5 million whites. It is a continent of innumerable clans and tribes and 700 different languages are spoken.

There are millions of Africans as foreign to each other as the different nationalities of Europe. It is a continent needing sympathy and understanding of the outside world.

There were almost twice as many rigs running than there are now. Producing days are now the lowest in history and royalty income has been drastically reduced.

We do not believe that the royalty owners nor the oil producer can afford another 4 years under the Republican administration.

FEDERAL AID TO THE WRONG PEOPLE

Just before election time, we are seeing an army of Federal Republican bureaucrats running around all over the country promoting the election of Richard Nixon.
