The idea is too good for Floydada people to let go by default. Anything worth while can't be done in a day. And it will take some effort, but it can and should be done-and willbe done, and done right.

MOMENTOUS DECISION

That was a momentous and farreaching decision reached by the Supreme Court of Texas last week in which it was held that the act of the 38th Legislature placing the main tainence of the Highways in the State of Texas in the hands of the High-way Commission, was a valid and constitutional act; that the public high ways belong to the state and that power and control over them may be delegated to whatsoever power the state may see fit. The immediate effect of the decision will be to put new life into the activities of the highway department, insofar as sup-ervision and maintainence of the "Seven Per Cent System" is concerned. And it will automatically dissolve it is thought, every injunction brought against the highway department, of which there are said to be eight—Floyd County being among the number.

In Floyd County, the new tax collector, J. R. Maddox, was enjoined from forwarding moneys collected un-der the law, to the state commission, on the night before the decision of court was handed down. J. Grigsby, former collector, had been enjoined similarly, and Floyd County's depository has been carrying several thousand dollars, which will now be paid out in due course, unless the point raised in this county was not answered by the higher court.

In Lubbock County, the Commissioners' Court got on the injunction bandwagon just in time to be conspicuously first among those to crawl off.

BEGGING SOON

To a community like Floyd County the recent decision of a San Antonio judge, tying up the Texas Ranger force, does not mean anything. Floyd County doesn't need any rangers now and likely never will, as long as the citizenship of the community is composed of the proportions it has at this time.

To South Texans, and especially to border Texans, however, the idea of andcuffing the rangers, as has been one, after some 90 years of being sed to them as protection against order ruffians, has been a shock, without a doubt, What enjoining the rangers means is indicated by a news item one day last week, which will be repeated indefinitely until it becomes too common—in which the details of a raid by border bandits are given. The border bandits have been held back to some extent all these years by fear of the Texas Rangers. The makeup of this type, their raising as it were, is such that U. S. Troops or the militia do not scare them, nor would they consider such more than mere annoyance. But Texas Ranger stands for something to be afraid of. With the Rangers no more patrolling the borders the folk on the border are going to be asking for some help and that pret-ty soon. A good many of the best people in Texas have an idea the rangers have been a special aggregation of men whom the governor uses to butt in on people, where they are not wanted. Possibly the services of the Texas Rangers have not always been wisely used. But they have been filling a real need—and doing a good job of it at mighty small pay.


