The paper said the plot-ters were all medium-ranking army officers who planned to seize control of Tehran, the Iranian capital, and then lay siege to the holy city of Qom Khomeini's headquarters 100 miles to the south

The plotters expected other opponents of Khomeini and supporters of the deposed shah to join them after they launched their coup, the report said.

An ABC News report, now denied in Tehran, said that Khomeini was willing to accept Waldheim as an intermediary with the United states even though he refused to receive him in Iran earlier this month.

Quoting U.N. sources in New York, ABC News reported Tuesday night that the Iranian Foreign Ministry sent a message to its U.N. ambassador, Mansour Farhang, stating Waldheim was now acceptable to the 79-year old religious leader of the Iranian revolutionary re-

Neither Waldheim nor Farhang was immediately available for confirmation of the report.

ROME (AP)-Two daring thieves dressed in mechanics uniforms, carrying a two-way radio and driving a stolen air-port truck today halted, an outbound jetliner on the pretext of a fuel leak, opened its cargo area and stole two pouches containing nearly \$2.2 million in cash, police reported.

The robbery was discovered after the Swissair DC-9, with 39 passengers aboard, arrived in Zurich, where an airline spokesman said police were questioning a courier hired to accompany the pouch from Rome.

The spokesman said he did not know why the man, a Swiss national, did not hand carry the pouch and instead had it stored in the cargo hold. A federal judge recently banned use of I.Q. tests to track children in California because he said the practice was unfair to minorities.

DEAR READER - It's unlikely that it's a metabolism problem other than getting more calories than your body is using, which is pretty normal metabolism. You'vealready proved that you can lose weight if you restrict your calories

I'm not sure that I like the kind of diet that you've described for yourself and for that reason I'm sending you The Health Letter number 4-7. Weight Losing Diet. It will provide a balanced diet approach that you can use as a basis to control your weight. Other readers who want this issue can send 75 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it. You're very wise to main tain a good exercise program as it is very helpful in aiding people to lose unwanted fat or to keep from getting fat.

A lot of people who are, moderately overweight think they have a metabolic prob-lem. This is so prevalent that I've come around to advising patients and doctors to have an old-fashioned basal metabolism (B.M.R.) test done. This is not to find out whether you have a normal thyroid or not. you can find that out with a simple blood test, but rather to establish how many caloies a person's body needs on a daily basis.

All that needs to be done isto take the old B.M.R. test and find out how much oxygen your body uses at rest for an hour. If the amount of oxygen used is multiplied by 4.825, that will tell you how many calories your own body uses every hour at rest. This can then be multiplied by 24 to find out how many calories your body should use in a day's time if you rested in bed





# Plea Bargaining **Effort Rejected Before Aquittal**

DALLAS (AP)-Prose- carrying the body guilty to a lesser charge before he was acquitted for his wife's murder, a Dallas newspaper has reported.

Gary Lynn Webster, 32, who admitted dismem -- A Jacksonville jury bering his wife's body, tried to plead guilty to a lesser charge of manslaughter in exchange for 15 years' probation, the Dallas Times Herald

The newspaper quoted sources as saying prosecutors thought the plea. bargain was too lenient. Public defender Bill White said the defense "tried all possible avenues to get a reasonable disposition before the

trial, but the state wouldn't have anything to do with it." He declined to go into detail.

Prosecutor Jay Howell confirmed Webster attempted to plea-bargain before the trial, but he declined to discuss the matter. 'It wouldn't be fair to

Webster since I don't know what his motivation was in plea bargaining, he said.

Webster, a piano player, admitted dismembering the body in a written statement given to police. in Garland, Texas, where the body was found in a mini-warehouse last July. Presecutors believed the statement gave them enough evidence for a secondidegree murder charge, the Times Herald

Webster had said he held his wife's neck for a minute at the most, but Dr. Linda Norton of the Dallas County Medical Examiners office testified strangulation takes three to five minutes.

She also described a rare reaction to a blow to the neck that causes cardiac arrest.

Jurors said her testimony, combined with a lack of medical evidence of strangulation, was the turning point in the trial.

"The dismemberment was not part of the murder," said juror Michael Burnett. "We were instructed not to consider that.'

"There was considerable reasonable doubt that he did kill her out of spite or hatred or whatever," said juror Steven Cope there was no evidence. It was not proven to me one way or another. We had to give the me the benefit of the doubt. They say a man is innocent until proven guilty; and he was not proven guil-

The Agriculture Department said Tuesday corn output was a record of more than 7.76 billion bushels Not only was direct 10 percent more than the 1978 harvest, it was about 2 percent larger than USDA had estimated in November when the previous figures were issued.

Soybean production, now. estimated at a record of almost 2.27 billion bushels. was up 21 percent from ctual 1978 figures and up about 1 percent from the November estimate.

"That would mean there would be so few of them we would not have to worry about them," said Bill Simes, executive director of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, at a Tuesday conference of governmental officials, environmentalsts and livestock raisers.

Earlier, Secretary of the Interior Cecil Andrus told the "summit" conference that it was his job "to remove predators from any area where there are problems, but it is not my ob to eradicate an entire species.

State agriculture department officials said the conference was not designed to furnish a solution to coyote control in Texas but "to get the leaders together and identify the problems so we can work out differences."

State statistics show a loss of \$21 million to the Texas livestock industry from predators in 1979. Coyotes were blamed for the largest single cause, killing 24 percent of all sheep and goats.

Sims presented pleas from the Texas Farm Bureau and the Texas Animal Damage Control Association that farmers and ranchers be allowed to use lethal chemicals in

Andrus said his department plan to phase out lethal preventative controls as non-lethal methods are developed. He repeated a November policy statement banning the use of Compound 1080, a highly toxic but effective control substance. He also outlawed killing covote pups in the den.

Steven D. Jellinek, assistant administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, said the only lethal pedacide au-thorized by EPA now is the use of sodium cyanide in M-44 devices, which shoots a capsule of the chemical in the coyote's mouth when he bites the

"The only way we would consider Compound 1080 or other lethal methods would be to be presented substantial new evidence of its need," he said.

DeDe Armentrout, regional representative of the Audobon Society, said the reason environmentalists worked against 40 Texas farmers and ranchers in coyote control was because they have been "too casual in the handling of poisons, too interested in overkill and too remiss to presented documental losses until just recently.


