## **Connally Leaves Race**

HOUSTON (AP) John B. Connally, who spent an estimated \$10 million and won only one delegate, withdrew from the race for the Republican presidential nomination Sunday and pronounced Ronald Reagan "still the champion."

Connally, beaten badly Saturday in South Carolina, where he said he would seriously begin his bid for the GOP nomination, quit one year from the time he announced his candidacy.

### **Oil Rig On Capitol Mall**

WASHINGTON (AP)-A group of ou producers, protesting President Carter's "windfall" oil profits tax that Congress is expected to pass soon, has set up an oil rig on the Capitol mall:

A caravan of about 30 vehicles, including oil pumpers, trucks and buses, arrived Sunday morning with about 100 oilmen from Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansa

Charles Morgan, an independent oil producer and an Oklahoma state legislator, said the group wants small producers exempted from the proposed "windfall" tax.

The \$227 billion tax bill is now in the House, where it is expected to be passed Wednesday or Thursday and sent to the Senate, where approval is also expected.

### More Scandals In Italy

ROME (AP)-A new wave of scandals has erupted in Italy, casting dark clouds over the ruling Christian Democratic party, the corner savings bank and even some of the country's adored soccer players. In the past few weeks:

-Three construction tycoons fled the country in their private jet ahead of arrest warrants, allegedly leaving behind unpaid debts of 10 billion lire (\$190 million). A Cabinet minister quit under fire after admitting he accepted campaign funds from the builders for the long-dominant Christian Democrat Party.

### Pastor Electrocuted

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)-A microphone suddenly became active and electrocuted a Pentecostal pastor. standing in water up to his hips preparing to baptize a boy Sunday in front of a church congregation of 150, police said today. The 11-year old boy was not hurt. The pastor, Kaarlo Toivo, 62, was struck by 220 volts of electricity when handed the microphone.

Police speculated there was a malfunction in the electric heating coils that keep the water in the baptismal basin warm at the Finnish Pentecostal Community Church. The microphone provided grounding when grabbed by the pastor, they said. Toivo was taken to a hospital but doctors were unable to revive him.



WASHINGTON (AP)-President Carter is expected to unveil a new anti-inflation strategy late this week, although it appears some parts of the program may be incomplete when it is announced.

Efforts continued Sunday to write the new plan as Treasury Secretary G. William Miller and Charles Schultze, chairman of the president's Council of Economic Advisers, met with key congressional leaders to try to win their approval.

An administration source who declined to be named said the package is not expected to be complete in all its details when it is announced later this week. No announcement time has been set.

The program, according to the source, is getting all sides to agree on how best to cut the proposed 1981 budget to bring it into balance.

When the budget was released Jan. 28, Carter said it had a deficit of \$15.8 billion. There is agreement now the spending plan needs to be balanced, the source said, but disagreement over where the cuts should come



With its soldiers fighting all over the world, Cuba would seem to be a world power. Not only is that small Caribbean nation not a major power, it is on the verge of an economic collapse. If it were not for massive Soviet aid the island's economy would have collapsed ong ago

It's been 21 years since Castro threw out the last fictator, but one, and not once has his government managed to survive a year on its own. The bearded despot used to blame this on the United States, but that is becoming increasingly difficult to do. And now Castro thinks he has found the reason his economy isn't working: it's because the people aren't working. And Fidel blames it on them.

In recent speeches the Cuban dietator harshly condemned the working people of his nation for a myraid of economic faults. He claims that "slovenliness, cronyism, and lack of worker discipline" are undermining his government's attempt to build a tropical workers' paradise. Apparently his social planners have been stymied by bad work habits. Public transportation, food, and education are areas of the economy especially hard hit by the worker traits that Castro now blames for his economic woes. At a time when many in this country want the government to provide mass transit, Castro's system is breaking down, of course his workers don't have the same initiative that ours do.

It should not surprise anyone that the Cuban people are not motivated to work. The socialist system is infamous for its inability to motivate people to do the hard everyday work necessary for a society to. prosper. Communism has inspired millions to unparalleled commitment in the political arena, yet once the revolution is won the government is unable to channel that momentum into the economic sector. This phenomenon results from a philosophy that glorifies sacrifice and condemns profit. And profit is essential to a vibrant economy.

The effects of the lack of profit motive in Cuba are easily seen. Fidel and his brother Raul point out that laborers intentionally work slowly in order to avoid having their quota raised. If their pay were based on piecework - profit motive - it is likely the productive evel would pick up immediately. The Cuban leaders also complain of unjustified absenteeism among their. working population. Obviously many Cuban workers are not even motivated enough to come to work.

There are two major ways of getting people to work, especially at the more burdensome jobs; discipline or motivation. The former relies on threat of punishment, the latter promises reward. Invariably the communist system degenerates into a society where the government is threatening everybody who does not do as they are told. In market societies, on the other hand, people stimulate themselves hoping to improve their own condition. With everyone trying to improve their condition, the society as a whole progresses. Consequently it is rare that a leader of a ... market-oriented nation complains that the workers, are lazy. There is nothing inherently wrong with the Cuban people; prior to Castro they were a fun-loving and hard-working lot. What is wrong with that Caribbeanisland is that its economic system is based on an incorrect theory of the nature of man. It has no trouble recruiting men to dress in a military uniform and travel thousands of miles to kill. Nonetheless, it is a system that is unable to get people out of bed and to the job in the morning. It is a good lesson for those in the United States who are constantly calling for expanding the public sector.



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

### **Heel spur pains**

#### By Lawrence Lamb, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am a female, age 43 and weigh 269. pounds. I'm 5 feet 7. I'm having trouble with the bottom part of my heel. I've been to the doctor and he tells me I have an arthritic spur and

I am also taking Hydropress to control my blood pressure and I'm on the pill. Thank God, after having 10 I don't need any more. I've taken the pill for 13 years. Please give me some advice so I can get my life back to normal. I hate to be an old grouch but my foot hurts and I can't help it. Also send a diet for weight

DEAR READER - There are quite a few things that cause painful heels. You can have a spur on the heel and not have any pain at all, or you can have just as painful a heel and there won't be any spur. The spur itself is sometimes formed because the tendons and tissues that stretch across the arch of the foot attach to the bottom of the pulled across the arch, they literally irritate or 'damage the bony attachment spot: This causes a little bony spur

to grow. The irritation and pain may come from the stretching and pulling of the tendons and tissues at their attachments. That's why one of the treatments for such disorders is to

relocate the way force is distributed on the foot. One way is to wear an insole that rolls the foot to the outside so that you walk more on the outer edges of the foot and have less weight across the main arch. about your foot problem.

NEW DELNI, India (AP)-Members of a Polish expedition who recently scaled Mount. Everest claimed they saw footprints of a Yeti, the legendary abominable snowman, during their climb.

"I lost my balance when I heard about Yeti's footprints at an altitude of 18,150 feet," expedition leader Andrez Zawada said Friday in an interviewwith Indian journalists in New Delhi

At first, Zawada, a geophysicist, said he didn't believe the reports of the sighting by team members 'because there are so many jokes about the Yeti." So he sent the team doctor, "a quiet, intelligent man," to the spot to verify the report. The climber photographed the footprints.

'Each print was about 14 inches long and nearly 7 inches wide," Zawada said ..

He said that the depth of the prints in the snow ndicated that the creature was "very heavy" and tall. The footprints were more than 3 feet apart, he added. Zawada's expedition was the first to conquer the 29,198-foot mountain, the world's tallest, in winter-

LUBBOCK-Some may think if you've seen one hailstone you've seen them all, but not Dr. Milton L. Smith of Texas Tech - University. To Smith hailstones are like snowflakes - each different

Smith should know. He has been making a special study of hail since 1977 through slicing the stones, measuring them, weighing them, photographing them, even shooting them out of a cannon designed at Texas Tech specifically for the purpose. .-

As an industrial engineer, Smith's immediate goal is to find materials for solar collector covers which resist hail damage. His studies are important +also to manufacturers of roofing and siding mater-ials and of glass. There could, of course, be future uses for his research not apparent at this early. stage. Smith-said he knows of no other comparable research going on at this time.

Although. Smith, with help from colleagues and the public, collects genuine hail stopes, he has learned to duplicate them in the laboratory. That is not an easy task. Hailstones are less dense than an ice cube. Sometimes there are pockets of water trapped within the ice and, when a hailstone is cut in half, rings of varying density appear -something like the ringsof a cut onion or tree trunk. This is caused by the stone moving through temperature various zones before it falls to earth.

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
