# Transfer Decision May Come Tonight

The Iranian government may announce new steps in the hostage crisis as early as tonight, perhaps including transfer of the 50 Americans to government custody, a Foreign Ministry spokesman said. At the same time, Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini attacked the United States for what he called threats of military force to free the American hostages. "It was all words," he said of the U.S. stance. "Even now it is all just words. Never be afraid of

such words because they are not followed by action," he said in a Tehran Radio broadcast, monitored in London. He also condemned the Soviet Union's intervention in Afghanistan and predicted the Russians would "eventually be defeated," saying no power can impose its will on the world. A Foreign Ministry spokesman contacted by a Western journalist in Tehran said the subject of a hostage transfer was taken up by the ruling Revolutionary Council and that President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr would discuss

the matter tonight with Khomeini, Iran's revolutionary leader who would have the final word. The student militants holding the hostages at the U.S. Embassy have rejected previous demands to turn them over to the government. CBS reported that the council had decided Sunday night, by a vote of 7-6 to get the Americans transferred to government custody and presumably use force if the militants balk. But Tehran officials denied any decision was reached. The Foreign Ministry spokesman today said announcement of a decision

on the transfer may be made after tonight's council meeting. Earlier he said Bani-Sadr is expected to make an important statement on the hostage issue and U.S. President Carter's latest messages at Tuesday celebrations of the Iranian republic's first anniversary. The report of the council's deliberations on the hostage transfer came after a White House spokesman said President Carter sent messages last week to Bani-Sadr but denied a report from Tehran that the White House admitted making mistakes in its policies toward Iran.

## Soviets Said Building Up Naval Power

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. intelligence analysts say the Soviet Union is stepping up construction of new warships, including a probable 50 percent increase in powerful missile-armed cruisers. In a recent assessment, analysts said Russia's shipbuilding program for the 1980s seems to place greater emphasis on improving Soviet ability to project naval power into remote areas such as the Persian Gulf. The Soviet Navy, once a basically defensive force, has been extending its range of operations for more than a decade with a variety of advanced warships, including the beginning of a carrier force.

An accelerating Soviet shipbuilding program suggests to analysts that, by the end of this decade, the Russian navy will be equipped with still newer classes of heavily armed major surface fighting ships supported by large auxiliary vessels so they can steam for long periods far from land bases.

## Ask Us

Q—Isn't there a law against putting political posters on telephone poles in Snyder and if so, why hasn't the law been enforced?

A—Not only political posters, but any type of posters on utility poles are prohibited in Snyder. The ordinance states that it "shall be unlawful for any person to tack, post, paste or nail circulars on any building, or fence, or any place, premises or locality, except on billboards and public posting places and other premises and localities specifically mentioned by law." If you observe someone tacking posters to utility poles and wish to file a complaint, it may be done at the police station. Actually, we are told that this has not been a big problem here. There have been a few instances in which organizations put out posters, etc., advertising special events, and in a few cases signs about garage sales and other activities have been tacked to poles, but on the whole compliance with the ordinance has been good, and it is a matter of enforcement, since a person would have to be observed in the act to make a good case.

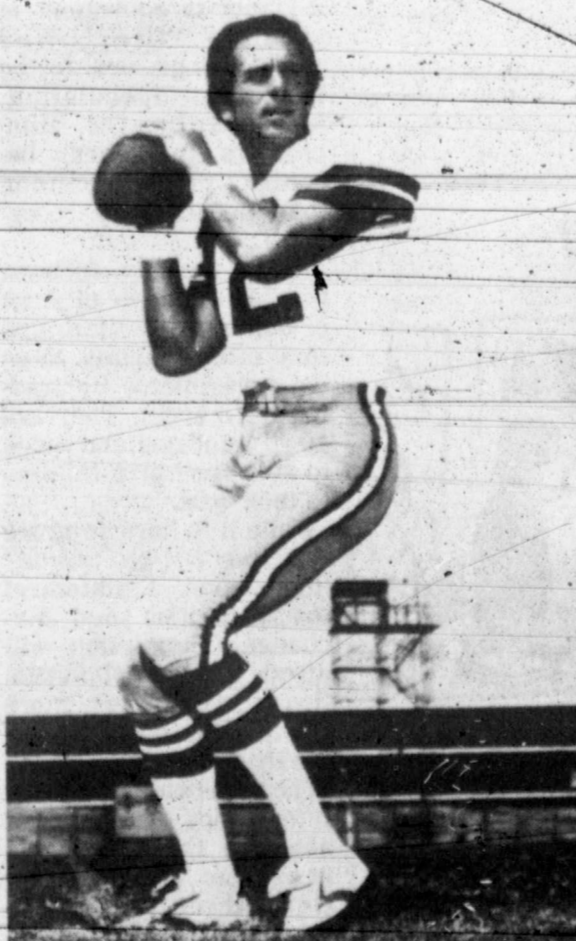

DALLAS (AP)—Dallas quarterback Roger Staubach announced today he is retiring after 11 seasons in the National Football League, saying, "he thanks the Cowboys" for his experience. "It's a decision based on various reasons," he said. "There's a point in your career when you have to make a decision... you want to spend the quality time with your family. A series of concussions this past season "was not

an overriding factor," he said. "I never worried about injuries." "It's a fairly complex decision for any athlete to make... being on top and winning the Super Bowl would be nice but there were a lot of good things in the 70s. "I will not look back on the decision." He said Coach Tom Landry thought he could have played at least another year but did not try to talk him out of retiring.

### Volcano Eruptions Diminish

COUGAS, Wash. (AP)—Eruptions had diminished to occasional puffs of smoke today after Mount St. Helens spewed fine ash in a thick cloud that sailed 55 miles southeast along the Columbia River. Meanwhile, scientists in airplanes kept a close watch on the first active volcano in the lower 48 states since 1917. Chunks of white ice, some 4-foot-square, also were erupting from the craters Sunday, "the biggest chunk of anything that has come out of the volcano so far," said Don Mullineaux of the U.S. Geological Survey.

### Shah's Cancer Spreads

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—The cancer afflicting the deposed shah of Iran has spread to his liver, one of the doctors who operated on him said today. Dr. Fouad Nur, head of the tumor section at Maadi military hospital, where the Shah's spleen was removed last Friday, said the liver also was cancerous. Nur was explaining to reporters the meaning of an official medical bulletin which said merely that medical tests had shown the two organs had "lymphatic swelling."

Alan: "When I played this hand in the match to determine first in a Swiss team, I led a club toward dummy and finessed the ten. This gave me five club tricks and three notrump."  
Oswald: "I assume that three notrump went down at the other table because your opposite number played out ace-king-queen of clubs."  
Alan: "Not only did he do that, but he was shocked when I told him I had taken the right line of play."

### Cheese Care

COLLEGE STATION - True devotees of cheese also know the care and storage do's, says Dr. Rose Tindall Postel, a foods and nutrition specialist.

Soft, unripened cheese (cottage cheese, cream cheese) need storage in air-tight containers, under refrigeration to prevent rapid spoilage and rancidity.

For a top-quality product, especially flavor, shelf life is usually five to seven days from the date of purchase.

Also refrigerate hard and semi-hard cheeses. Store them in the original wrapper, and once the seal is broken, wrap the product in a moist cloth or plastic wrap.

Normally cheese should not be frozen. Freezing makes cheese dry and crumbly.

## Gone on a diet

**DEAR DR. LAMB** My husband is 46 years old and he has what he calls "gone on a diet." He doesn't eat any breakfast or lunch, only coffee. And he tries to stay on a 1000-calorie diet for supper. He works hard on a construction gang and before he eats supper, he jogs two or three miles.

I told him he's hurting his health but he won't listen to me. Maybe if you told him he would pay more attention. He started at 240 and dropped 20 pounds in only a few weeks. He wants to weigh 200. What do you think of this?

**DEAR READER** Too much too soon. It would be much better if your husband learned to eat properly. That might also involve some changes in how you prepare his meals.

Most authorities believe that a person shouldn't lose more than two pounds a week on a weight losing diet. I think it's better if a person consistently loses about a pound a week and readjusts his life style on a permanent basis rather than on a crash project.

I'm sending you The Health Letter number 47, Weight Losing Diet. Other readers who want this issue can send 75 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it. Send your request to me, in care of this newspaper, P.O. Box 1551, Radio City Station, New York, NY 10019. You and your husband can use this diet

as a model to build a balanced diet for him. Once his weight is at the level he wants it, he can merely add enough foods to this diet to satisfy him and keep his weight at a stable level. It would be better to eat right while he's on the diet even though he may not lose weight quite so fast.

I'm glad he's physically active because exercise helps to prevent muscle loss when a person is on a diet. And I don't think you should discourage him too much but try to help him direct himself toward a program that will last on a long term basis.

It is true that excessive severe dieting over a long period of time can cause problems including loss of muscle mass, loss of important minerals and chemicals from the body that can be hazardous to a person's health.

**DEAR DR. LAMB** I've always heard that a pregnant woman should not smoke while she's carrying a child. I do not smoke but I work in an office where most of the men smoke. Will this hurt my baby?

**DEAR READER** That's a very good question and I don't believe there's sufficient information available to answer it. I'm inclined to say that it depends on how much smoke is in the room and how adequate the ventilation is. The truth is that nonsmokers do pick up some of the adverse effects of cigarette smoking if they have to stay in a room with smokers.

You're correct in saying that a pregnant woman should not smoke while carrying a child but the problem goes beyond that point. Recent studies have shown that a number of the hazards to the baby caused by maternal smoking can't be eliminated simply by stopping during the pregnancy itself. The only way to prevent increasing the risk to the baby is for the mother not to begin the smoking habit in the first place.

# Congress May Add Cuts To Budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter's revised fiscal 1981 budget may have little influence on Congress, which already appears determined to outdo the president in spending cutbacks.

Carter planned to release the new budget later today. It was known in advance that it will propose \$15 billion less spending than Carter's original budget, proposed in January.

The new budget, if adopted, will show a surplus of revenue over spending, marking the first time in 12 years the government has operated in the black. The budget is for the fiscal

year beginning next Oct. 1.

The president also was ready today to sign legislation designed to help small savers battle rising inflation.

The bill will phase out over six years all limits on the amount of interest banks and thrift institutions can pay savers. This will be particularly helpful to small savers who rely on passbook accounts which currently pay only 5.5 percent at thrift institutions and 5.25 percent at commercial banks.

Carter has said a balanced budget will be important in helping to slow inflation, now at an annual rate of 18 percent. His new anti-inflation strategy announced March 14 included a balanced 1981

budget, credit controls and a new oil import fee.

But while Carter said the budget would be in balance, he did not reveal just how he will do it.

Even before the new Carter budget went to the printers, however, the House Budget Committee had recommended still deeper cuts, totaling \$15 billion below the original Carter budget.

The president, it was learned, wants to cut \$1 billion from the defense budget he proposed in January. He also would effect major reductions in spending for jobs programs, the strategic petroleum reserves, federal retirement benefits and revenue sharing for the states, which would be

eliminated for an annual savings of \$1.7 billion.

The list of congressional reductions duplicates many of the areas where Carter wants savings made.

The president appears not to mind that Congress is ahead of him, however, and administration officials privately voiced pleasure that Congress thus will be sharing responsibility for the cutbacks in some of the government's more popular programs.

Some liberals and repre-

sentatives of minority groups have accused Carter of balancing the budget at the expense of poor and disadvantaged Americans, a charge the president has denied.

The president has said the pain of the spending reductions will be distributed fairly across the entire population, except

for the truly needy, who he says will not be affected.

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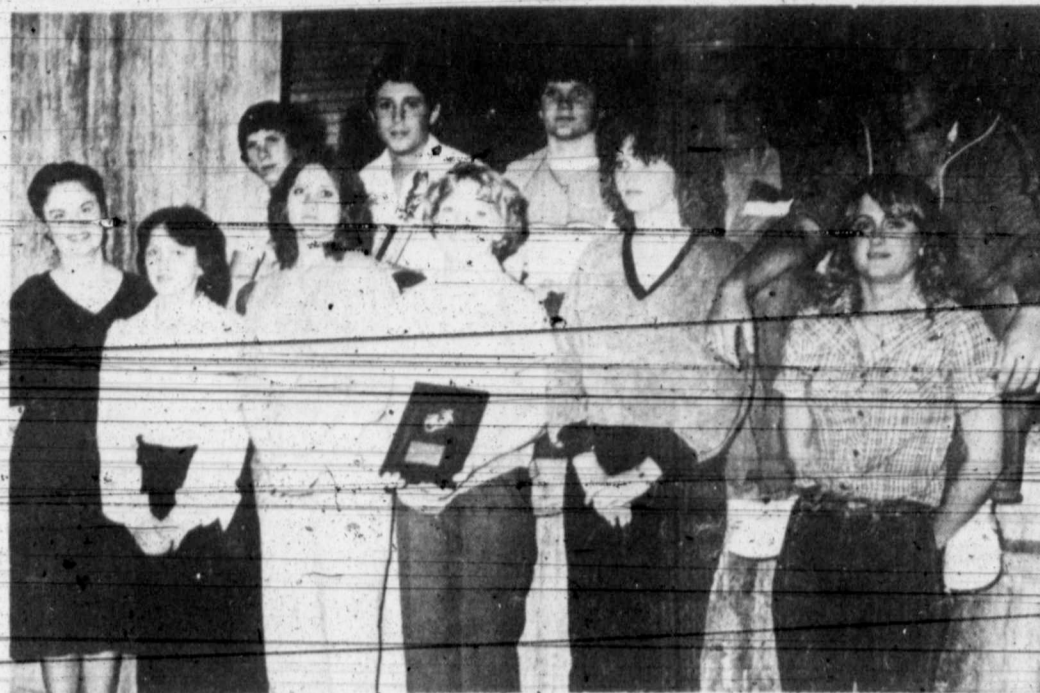
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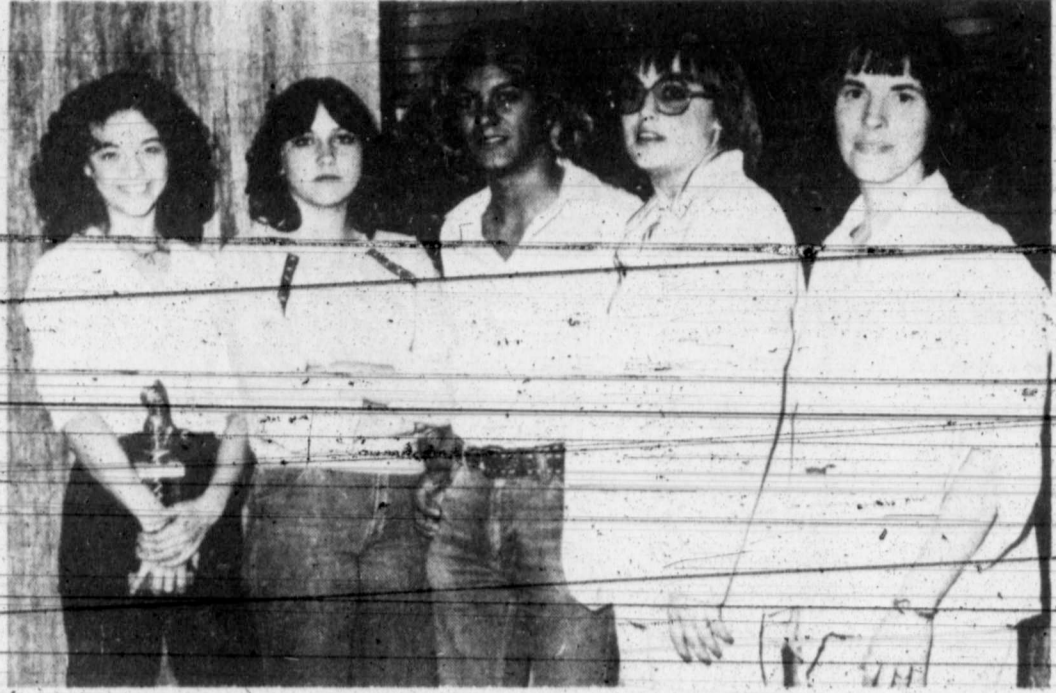
### Drilling Pace Holds Steady

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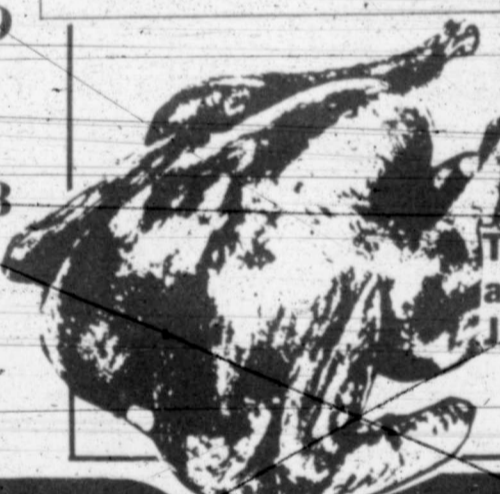
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
