We seem to have missed the April freeze this year (it's not too late, so keep your fingers crossed), but a nine-degree Sunday morning in March may have been just as devastating as an April killer so far as this year's apricot crop is concerned. That cold morning apparently came at a critical time for most apricot trees in this area, and it probably damaged other fruit as well, although we hear that there are some peaches left.



We are just about ready to concede that spring is here indeed. Pecan trees are beginning to leaf out, and they. are almost as reliable as the old mesquites in signalling the end of danger from late frost.

The pecan very seldom gets caught by frost, but it always faces another menace. We just received some information from the Texas Agricultural Experiment: Station on the pecan nut casebearer which says this pest threatens 90 percent of the pecan production areas in Texas. Fortunately we have proven methods of controlling the casebearer. There are labeled insecticides that prevent losses. However, the timing must be precise for success, because the casebearer is susceptible to the treatment only at certain stages. So, if you have pecan trees, watch for notices about the proper time to apply insecticides in this area. Billy Roach, county extension agent, keeps up with these things, and he always keeps us supplied with information at the proper time to pass along to the public.



#### driven into ground

Recently the Wall Street Journal published an editorial edged in black. It was titled "Death of

And the first paragraph read: "Barring a redemptive miracle, the United States Senate today will sacrifice the nation's future security to its own inslakable thirst for revenues. It will give final approval to the massive, falsely labeled, 'windfall

There was no redemptive miracle, and that day the Senate, having lost its reason just as has the President who sought the bill's passage, dealt this nation a deadly blow and passed it.

Where does that leave Texas, the oil state?

The Texas oil industry has been reeling under federal controls and tax policies for a long time, and last year it was knocked to its knees by that oppression. That was bad enough, but one probably hasn't seen anything bad until the impact of the 'windfall' profits tax is felt fully.

The Texas Railroad Commission has indicated that for the first time in 15 years, Texas' oil production in 1979 fell below the one-billion barrel mark, Edwin L. Cox, president of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, said.

The Commission reported that marketed production in 1979 in this No. 1 American oil producting state amounted to 978,544,145 barrels, which was 28,422,618 barrels less than the 1978 production.

The causes of the decline are numerous, Cox said, but mostly they have been political and economic in nature, and are the result of "unecessary intrusions of the federal government into the oil and gas business." Cox drew a word picture of the decline of the state's oil production over the past eight years of federal price controls on most domestic oil.

Because of these artificial ceilings," he said, "The U.S. petroleum industry was unable to attract or to generate sufficient capital to sustain or to increase oil production levels. In addition to these federal price controls, oil men in Texas and throughout the nation labored during the past decade under increasing governmental restraints.'

One of those governmental restraints has been on federal price controls on interstate natural gas which have virtually destroyed that market, he said. He pointed out that the depletion allowance was cut from 2712 percent to 22 percent in 1969 and practically eliminated in 1975.

Cox said that a counterproductive energy agency was added to the federal bureaucracy (the DOE), and a number of intimidating environmental acts became law. And, Cox emphasized, inflation affected the oil industry in much the same way it has every household

Inflation, of course, is caused by the government Now, the "windfall" profits tax. Instead of much needed deregulation, the Senate saddles the industry with a revenue scheme designed to take at least \$227.3 billion industry income for non-energy uses, Cox said. In tracing the dropoff of oil production in Texas each year since 1972, Cox said, "The federal policies of price control, discriminatory taxation, and oppressive regulation have proved to be too much of a handicap for Texas oil men to overcome." The Texas oil production industry, orphaned by the death of reason, like the Wall Street Journal said, has been driven into the ground.



It would seem that there must be a better way. But not only has it not yet been found, nobody seems to be seriously looking.

New York's Daily News greeted the first morning of the strike with a frontpage photo of transit workers responding with a spirit to word that negotiations had collapsed and the strike was on. It was a response worthy of V-J Day, or even the winning of the Olympics gold medal in hockey.

Only in this case the foe is not foreign. It is right here at home - a city full of hostages.

#### Jogging for women

DEAR DR LAMB I'm an 18 year-old female who enjoys jogging and exercising. mother has been concerned about this because she has read that jogging breaks down the breast tissues and can damage the uterus. Is this true? I have noticed that since I have started to jog and exercise. I have lost weight from the waist up. My mother is sure that this is not best for me. I don't want to do any harm to my body but most of the books that I have read on running favor women jogging. Is jogging good or bad for a woman's body? Mom told me to get a doctor's advice so

that's why I have written to

DEAR READER - The old saying, "Different strokes for different folks, does apply to the use of exercise. The choice of an exercise program for any one individual depends on his or her health status and the goals to be achieved. In other words, why do you want to

exercise' Now, I'm all in favor of exercise because I think it improves people's health. Certainly a major portion of our population is too inactive for its own good. Exercise can be done in the wrong way or the type of exercise a person may elect to use may not be the right one for the goal he or she wants to achieve.

Women who do not wear brassieres tend to develop sagging breasts, whether they og or not. Whether jogging will affect your breasts or not may depend a lot on your degree of development. In any wants to avoid sagging breasts should wear a brassiere that provides adequate support. Definitely she should wear it when jogging and she should also wear it when she's not jogging. The brassiere will help to prevent stretching.

I don't know of any evidence that shows that jogging will cause a woman's uterus to drop or in any other way damage the uterus

You've probably lost some weight from the upper part of the body because you may 7. have eliminated some body fat. At the same time, you. may have improved the tone of the muscles in your legs and lower part of your body that must support your body weight while you're jogging.

Since you're interested in jogging. I presume that you may be interested in knowing how it affects the heart and circulation. 

#### Guerrillas Cut Demands On Prisoners

(AP)-The guerrillas holding 20 hostages in the embassy of the Dominican Republic cut their demand for the release of political prisoners from 28 to seven, but said they still want safe passage out of the country and a ransom from 15 governments.

They also said they might free more captives April 19; the anniversary of their Movement 19, named for the April 19, 1970, elections they claim were fraudulent. Thirty-five of the original hostages have been freed. Another hostage, The Uruguyan ambassador, escaped two weeks ago.

The guerrillas said when they seized the embassy Feb. 27 they wanted Colombian military courts to free 311 jailed comrades of sympathizers, a \$50 million ransom and safe passage out of the country. They later scaled down the number of prisoners to 28 and dropped the \$50 million demand.

BOGOTA, Colombia mands, made Wednesday, are the release of seven top guerrilla leaders from jail, an undisclosed ransom from the governments of 15 countries whose envoys are captive, and safe passage to the Mid-




