3 Bombing Suspects Sought

STAELEINE, Nev. (AP)—Police today hunted three suspects in a bombing that blew the side out of a Lake Tahoe hotel-casino during a botched attempt to extort \$3 million in \$100 bills from the gambling house.

The FBI, meanwhile, said the sophisticated design of the complex bomb, which sent plumes of smoke skyward and showered debris over several blocks when it was accidentally detonated by a robot, may offer clues to who built it.

Anderson Cancels Train Tour

WASHINGTON (AP)—John B. Anderson's presidential campaign today canceled plans for a five-day whistlestop railroad tour across Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio and Pennsylvania next week.

Anderson spokesman Michael Rosenbaum attributed the cancellation to "a large number of complicated problems," including cost, the logistics of arranging network television coverage and problems with assembling enough cars for the train.

It also was disclosed that campaign strategist David Garth will move from New York to Washington and would take the title of Anderson's campaign director.

How does it feel to get hit by a bolt of lightning? Sounds like a silly question. Like the television news interviewer who asked the man, "how did it feel when you broke your leg?"

But it is no joke to researchers at the National Severe Storms Laboratory in Oklahoma. A team of people from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Langley Research Center in Hampton, Va., went to the Oklahoma center to conduct tests to determine how lightning affects aircraft in flight.

The best way to accomplish the objectives, of course, is to get lightning to hit an aircraft with people in it. So, that is exactly what they did.

After two fruitless weeks, the pilot was startled by the team's first lightning strike.

NASA reports his comments as follows: "We were inside a cloud, with visibility about 152 meters (500 feet). There was heavy rain and moderate turbulence. It didn't look that bad. I probably didn't see the whole thing, but I did see a lightning bolt come out of the fog, horizontally, from right to left. It curved toward me and I instinctively jerked the stick back in an avoidance maneuver. The bolt looked like a headless and tailless snake. It was incredibly fast. Even before I began to react, the 15-to-20-centimeter diameter 'snake' had struck the noseboom and spiraled down the left side of the airplane and was gone. I had my sunvisor down, just in case, and it was still fairly bright. There was a 'zap, crackle,' but there was no radio noise to warn of its coming."

They continued until the plane had been hit three times, after which researchers began the evaluation process. They were surprised to find that one of the hits was down the top middle of the left wing, but the thickness of the wing skin "prevented a burn-through to the underlying fuel tanks."

This fictional genius developed a process that involved loading his equipment with secret ingredients and then waiting for a lightning bolt to hit a huge metal pole on a mountainside. The bolt's power was transmitted by a cable to the diamond formula and it was the force that compressed the mass into a diamond.

We suspect that someone will accomplish this, or other awesome developments in the years ahead.

Speedy Hostage Decision Asked

A member of the Iranian parliament called for his fellow deputies today to make "a speedy investigation and decision" on the 52 American hostages, Tehran radio said.

The state-run radio quoted Khomeini's representative from Neyshabur province in northeastern Iran, as telling the Parliament that continuation of the existing situation regarding the U.S. "spy hostages" was not in Iran's interest. Further detail on his appeal, such as whether he favors releasing the Americans, was not available. Parliament has been

given responsibility by revolutionary leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini to decide what to do with the hostages, in their 299th day of captivity today. Parliament has set no date for beginning consideration of the Cabinet and organizational matters in Parliament.

Many members of the Islamic Republican Party, the clergy-dominated group that controls the Parliament, favor putting the hostages on trial as "spies."

On Wednesday, West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt appealed to Mohammad Ali Rajai, Iran's new prime minister, to work for the release of the American hostages.

Representatives of seven Texas women's groups told a news conference Tuesday they are ready to fight any attempt in the 1981 Legislature against the ERA.

Carter Proposes Tax Cuts In '81

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Carter today proposed \$27.5 billion in 1981 tax cuts for individuals and businesses as part of an election-year economic program that also aims to create 1 million new jobs in the next two years.

The president also requested congressional authority to spend an additional \$3.6 billion in 1981 to retrain workers, weatherize homes, maintain highways, build ports, boost research and development and help economically distressed counties and cities.

In addition, he urged Congress to rapidly extend unemployment benefits by 13 weeks to help workers laid off by the recession. Benefits currently expire after 39 weeks. This would

cost \$1.35 billion over two years.

The president officially announced the program in a White House address to an invited audience of representatives of business, labor, consumer and environmental groups and members of Congress.

Treasury Secretary G. William Miller told a news briefing earlier that all of the tax initiatives and virtually all of the spending proposals would not be proposed as legislation until January. The tax reductions would go into effect Jan. 1, retroactively if necessary.

"All of these things will contribute to reinforcing the recovery, but it's not a stimulus package," Miller said.

The wide-ranging package would increase the

proposed federal deficit by from \$8 billion to \$10 billion in the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1, bringing the projected budget shortage to nearly \$40 billion. Only five months ago, Carter was championing a balanced budget as the key to his economic policy.

Despite the enlarged deficit, Miller insisted the package is not inflationary because its initiatives will spur investment, boost productivity and put people back to work over the next five years.

"If the administration had indicated to people that come hell or high water we'll have a balanced budget, then we sent bad signals," Miller said. "Our signal was to fight inflation."

Calls For A Temporary Halt To Polish Strike

GDANSK, Poland (AP)—Polish strike leader Lech Walesa appealed today for a temporary halt to the spread of the strikes to give the communist government time to settle the labor crisis.

"It is not good to have Poland terrorized," Walesa said. "The people must have food. If we don't get results in three to four days, then let the strikes spread."

He said he would go on state radio and television to make his appeal. Walesa, chairman of the Gdansk area Joint Strike Committee, made the announcement at the request of government negotiators in an emotional speech while perched atop a gate at Gdansk's Lenin Shipyards, the unofficial strike headquarters.

Dissident sources earlier reported that the work stoppages were continuing to spread beyond the Baltic seaport cities where they began Aug. 14.

According to the communist regime's top negotiator, the government has

agreed to most of the strikers' demands, but progress has yet to be made on the key question of free trade unions.

A recorded message by Deputy Premier Mieczyslaw Jagielski, who has been trying to end the walkout, did not elaborate on the government concessions. It was broadcast by Gdansk radio after Andrzej Gwiazda, one of the strikers' negotiators, told reporters, "There is general agreement between strikers and the government on forming free and independent trade unions."

Gwiazda made the statement Wednesday after he and other strike leaders held their second bargaining session with government negotiators at the shipyards, where the mass walkout began and now counts at least 300,000 workers in all four corners

of Poland. Jagielski replied on Gdansk radio and TV Wednesday night that "these demands have to be discussed within the present trade union" setup, which is controlled by the state.

He resumed talks at the shipyard today with Walesa and striking workers greeted the premier with a polite "good morning" in contrast to their previous stony silences.

Meanwhile, informed sources said at least two factions had emerged with the 19-member leadership of the strike committee. They said one faction wanted to reach a compromise on the demand for free trade unions, while the other wanted to hold out for further concessions. It was not known how many members favored compromise or whether that faction included the most influential strike leaders.

It Did Rain Here, But Very Little

It rained this morning in Snyder, but, unless you are a night owl, or you happened to be watching the late, late show, you probably were unaware of it.

And most of the evidence was gone by daybreak. Nevertheless, .02 inch was reported in the official gauge at the city water plant from a light drizzle that fell after midnight. It helped send the thermometer down to a low reading of 65 degrees. Moreover, yesterday's high reading was only 93 degrees, which represented a welcome decline from 100-degree readings earlier in the week.

Forecasts call for scattered showers and a few thunderstorms for most of the state today. The overnight showers dotted Northwest Texas and North Texas, including the Dallas area. Showers also were reported on the coast, and some areas of Northeast Texas reported heavy thunderstorms. Dallas-Fort Worth was the state's hot spot Wednesday with 100. Patchy fog was reported before dawn today in Southeast Texas with visibility reduced to 1-3 miles, mainly around Houston and Lufkin. Early morning temperatures were mostly in the 60s and 70s. Extremes ranged from 59 at Amarillo to 80 at Galveston.

Food Labels Sometimes Misleading

It is time to take another look at the foods we are eating. For example, turkey ham may not be what you think it is. Actually, it is the ground meat from turkey thighs. It does not contain ham and the label must carry a qualifier informing the buyer that it is "Cured turkey thigh meat." Surveys show that at least 75 percent of purchasers of turkey ham expected to find some ham in it. But, ham, "is meat from the hind leg of a pig," according to U.S. Department of Agriculture standards of identity. And, this leads us to examine other directions our foods are taking. For example, you may be surprised to learn of the role played by complex carbohydrates commonly added to foods.

Pectin, for example, is found naturally in apples, oranges and grapefruit and is also made commercially. It thickens processed foods such as jellies, jams and marmalades. Most commercial pectin is extracted from citrus peels although some is made from apple pomace.

Chemically, pectin lowers cholesterol levels in the blood, according to Sheldon Reiser, chief of the Carbohydrate Nutrition Laboratory, Human Nutrition Center, U.S. Department of Agriculture. Reiser cited several studies in which cholesterol levels were reduced in the blood of males after they ate from six to 36 grams of pectin daily for two to four weeks.

In contrast, cholesterol was not lowered when males ate equivalent amounts of cellulose or wheat fiber.

Guar gum is another additive used as a food binder, thickener or texturizer. It is made from leguminous plants grown in the United States, India and Pakistan. Guar gum is used in many breakfast foods, processed vegetables, sweet sauces, cheese, imitation dairy products, milk products, fruit ices, snack foods, process fruits, gelatin puddings and fats and oils.

Guar gum may be even more effective than pectin in reducing cholesterol levels in the blood, according to studies noted by Reiser.

Two other fibers with anti-cholesterol effects are gum ghatti, also known as Indian gum, and carrageen, also called Irish moss extractive. Gum ghatti, obtained from trees found in India and Sri Lanka (formerly Ceylon), is used primarily as a stabilizer in frozen dairy products and non-alcoholic beverages, Reiser said.

Carrageen is used chiefly as a suspending agent in foods, a clarifying agent in beverages and to control crystal growth in frozen confections.

Healthful Punch In Tasty Chocolate Cake

How long has it been since you made a cake from scratch?

Here's a recipe for such a treat that even a beginning cook will find simple to put together. It has the richness of a regular chocolate cake with the added nutritional value from such ingredients as buttermilk and wheat germ.

Frost only the tops of the baked cake layers and drizzle a little white glaze around the

- edges and down the sides for a dramatic light and dark effect. Serve with your favorite ice cream or yogurt.
- WHEAT GERM CHOCOLATE CAKE**
- 1 1/4 cups flour
- 1 cup vacuum packed wheat germ, regular or sugar and honey
- 3/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup butter
- 3 tablespoons cocoa
- 1 1/3 cups buttermilk

- 1 egg
- 2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
- Chocolate Icing
- Wheat germ and walnut garnish

Mix flour with wheat germ, soda and sugar in large bowl. Heat butter, cocoa and buttermilk, stirring often, until butter melts. Combine with wheat germ mixture. Mix in egg and vanilla. Turn into two greased 8-inch round layer cake pans. Bake in 400-degree oven 20 to 25 minutes until top springs back when slightly touched in center. Cool in pans 5 minutes.

Remove from pans and finish cooling on rack. Spread tops of layers with chocolate icing. Stack. Sprinkle top with wheat germ and garnish with walnuts. If desired, drizzle a powdered sugar and milk glaze over sides of cake. This kitchen-tested recipe makes 1 (8-inch) cake.

Chocolate Icing
Combine 6 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons cocoa and 3 tablespoons milk. Heat to boiling. Mix in 2 cups powdered sugar and 1/4 cup wheat germ.

back and South sees that he must find East with either the ace of clubs or king of hearts if he wants to make his game.

Can he work out a way to try both plays? Yes, he can and does.

He runs diamonds to discard a heart from dummy. Then he tries the heart finesse and it works. If the heart finesse had lost he would have been able to get to dummy by ruffing for a lead to his king of clubs later.

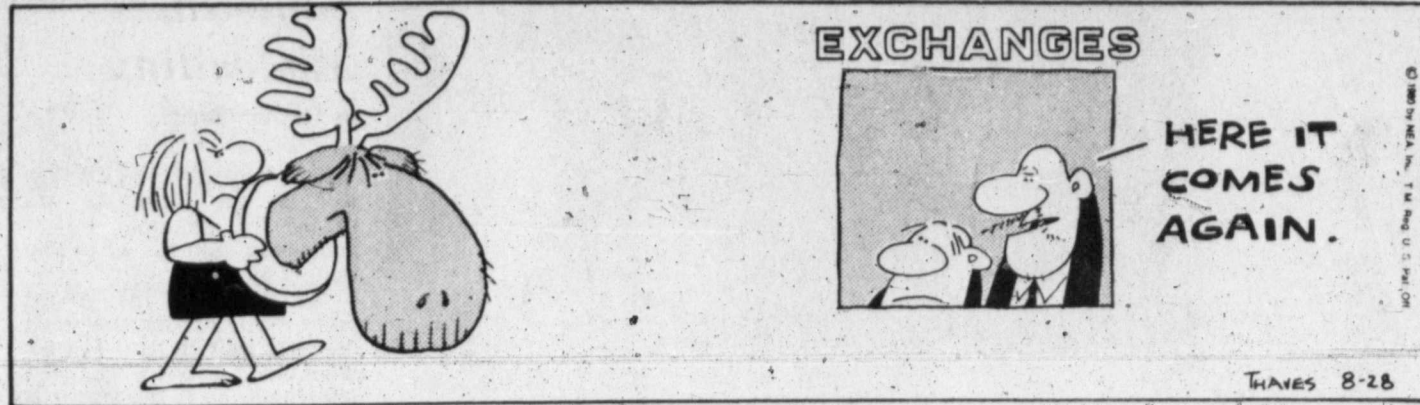

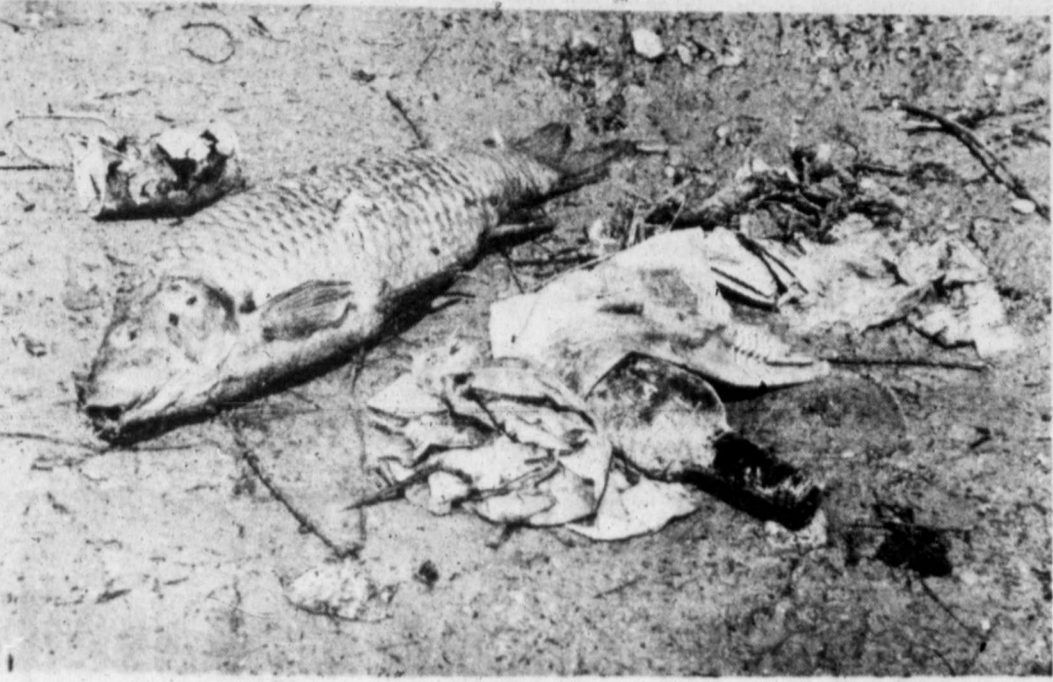

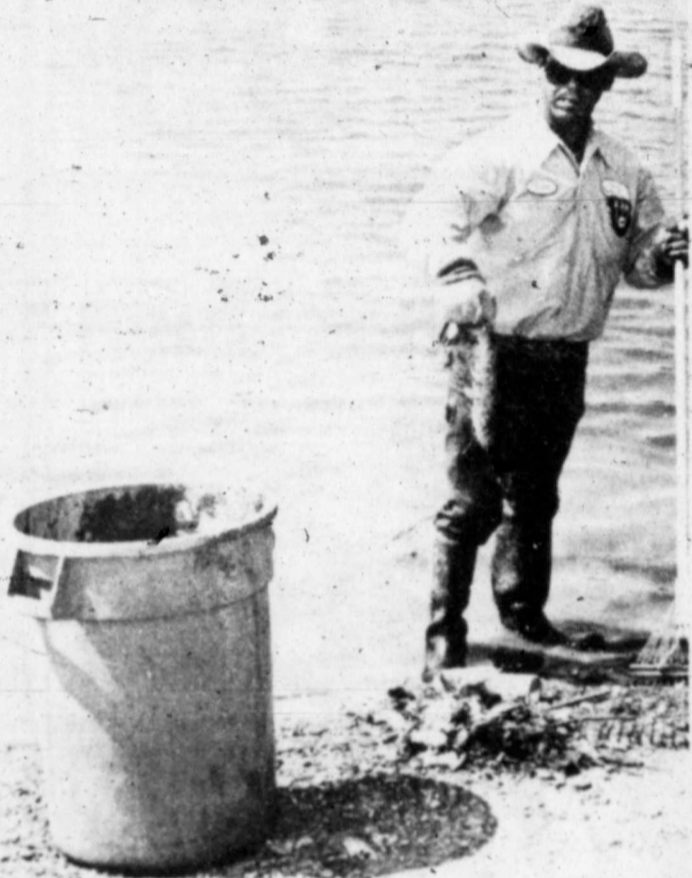

Details on tubal ligation

DEAR DR. LAMB — I'm 28 years of age and am thinking of having a tubal ligation. I've had three children and don't want any more for a long time. What aches and pains

will I have after the operation? Will I be more likely to have cancer of the uterus?

Will I have decreased hormone levels? If so, will I have hot flashes and swelling?

DEAR READER — If you have any pain, it will be strictly associated with the incision. It depends a lot on the method but some of the newer methods for tubal ligations are really quite simple.

Now remember when the tube is cut or tied or blocked in any way, that doesn't necessarily affect either the uterus or the ovary. The tube is just that — the tube through which the ovum that's released from your ovary descends to the

uterus. So what you're left with is a mechanical blockage problem.

That means that there's no reason that you should have any increased chance of having cancer of the uterus just because you've had a tubal ligation. It means that your ovaries should continue to function normally for you the same way they would have, even if you had not had a tubal ligation.

A tubal ligation should not cause you to have any increased need for hormones, and it certainly wouldn't

cause hot flashes and swelling. The latter symptoms are more likely to be associated with ovarian failure. This will occur if the ovaries are removed or the blood supply to the ovaries is damaged in such a way that they don't function properly. Or it occurs normally at the menopause when the ovaries stop functioning.

Many women are confused about the differences between a tubal ligation, having their uterus removed (hysterectomy) and having their ovaries removed. A hysterectomy

doesn't mean that the ovaries have been bothered at all. To help sort this out for you, I'm sending you The Health Letter number 14-12, Hysterectomy, Cystocele and Rectocele. DEAR DR. LAMB — Is hunger a good guide to use to control your weight? For example, if a person ate a

large meal and didn't eat again until he was hungry, could he maintain his desired weight?

DEAR READER — Unfortunately, hunger is one of the worst guides imaginable for weight control. Whether you're hungry is influenced by a lot of things such as the smell of fresh-baked bread, or the clock if you eat at a regular hour. One of the famous experiments in behavior related to habituating a dog to experience hunger and salivate every time he heard a metronome tick. Much over-

eating is related to conditioning you to be hungry in response to a lot of different stimuli. The main one here, of course, is the clock and the regular hours of eating.

If you've ever tried it, you'll know that if you pass your usual mealtime, usually about an hour later, the acute episode of hunger will disappear. It should also be added that hunger for specific items does not mean that a person has a nutritional need for that substance. Our urges do not tell us what our body needs. (NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.)

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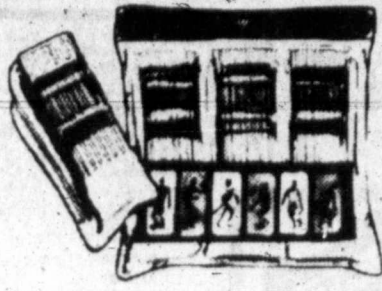
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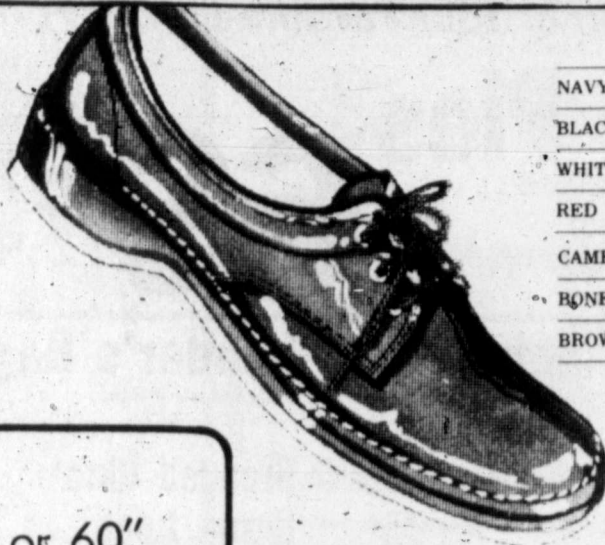

Reagan Rents Residence In Old Virginia

MIDDLEBURG, Va. (AP)—Ronald Reagan moves today from the adobe splendor of his California ranch to the elite hound-and-fox country of old Virginia, hoping it is only a way station en route to the White House.

He will spend his first night tonight in a newly rented country home on Rattlesnake Ridge, a house built for John F. Kennedy when he was president. Reagan's neighbor is fellow film star Elizabeth Taylor Warner.

Aides at Reagan's national campaign headquarters, some 50 miles away in the Washington suburb of Arlington, Va., said no special welcome was planned for the Republican presidential candidate, who will make the house his East Coast base until the election.

Sen. John Warner, Elizabeth's husband, may drop by to say howdy, an aide said, but that's just about all. The Warners own the 1,200-acre Atoka Farm estate that adjoins Wexford, as the Reagan residence is known.

Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, as first lady, designed the four bedroom house, situated on 46 acres in Virginia's horse country. She wanted it as a retreat for Kennedy and their two children.

The house was built to her specifications, but Mrs. Kennedy never visited it while it was being built. But Mrs. Reagan looked it over before leasing it from its current owner, Texas Gov. Bill Clements, a longtime Reagan supporter.

Wexford was completed in March, 1963, but Kennedy spent only a few weekends there before his assassination in November.

Most rooms in the house face west to catch the sunset and a glimpse of the Blue Ridge Mountains in the distance. The home, atop a bluff, will give the Reagans the same sort of privacy they cherish.

Draft Resisters Must Arm with Facts

DEAR ABBY: I am a "draft lawyer" from the Vietnam era, revving up for the new Selective Service registration. Based on telephone calls to me and statements I've read, I've become concerned about the young men born in 1960 and 1961 taking rash, ill-advised actions without being apprised of all the facts.

First of all, refusing to register is a federal felony, punishable by a maximum of five years' imprisonment and a \$10,000 fine. If any of your readers, their sons or friends are planning on refusing to register, I urge you to suggest first obtaining draft advice and counseling from any of the reputable agencies throughout the country, such as CCO, with offices in Philadelphia and San Francisco.

Fleeing to Canada will not work, because Canada has closed its borders to draft resisters. Also, deferments for college students are no longer authorized.

Although a young man who acts from deeply held principles in, let's say, refusing to register or accept induction is entitled to respect for taking a stand which can result in severe penalties, I think you'll agree he should first be fully aware of the ramifications of his actions and the possible alternatives available to him.

Inmate Doctor Once Prescribed Pills To Willie

TYLER, Texas (AP)—An "inmate" doctor involved in a flap over a Willie Nelson concert once illegally dispensed drug prescriptions to Nelson and his celebrity friends, records show.

John Marcus Young, 41, an Athens radiologist, provided a wide variety of prescription pills to Nelson, his wife and several other country and western singers.

The popular physician quietly pleaded guilty, to unlawful possession and dispensing "narcotic controlled substances" and was sentenced last January to three years in federal prison.

Sent to a minimum security facility in Big Spring, Young has become embroiled in a controversy swirling around a Nelson benefit scheduled there Sunday night.

Among the recipients of Young's prescriptions were country and western singers Waylon Jennings, Johnny Rodriguez and Sammi Smith, rock singer Steve Fromholz and Playboy Playmate Kelli Murphy.

A substantial portion of

Young's medical records, including the reports of investigating officers, were obtained by The Associated Press and the Longview Morning Journal.

The semi-secret documents indicated also that Priscilla Davis, wife of millionaire Fort Worth industrialist Cullen Davis, obtained 3,200 Percodan pills over a four-month period in 1978.

The prescribed dosage for Percodan, a narcotic

painkiller, is one every six hours.

Sources within the U.S. Attorney's office here confirmed the validity of the documents but refused a newsman's request to examine the federal files.

To do so, the source said, could trigger the wrath of U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice, the tough, highly respected "Law East of the Trinity."

Last January, in an emotional appeal to escape prison, Young told Jus-

ice: "I realize I've erred. I'm sorry I did it. I just ask forgiveness. It was not done maliciously or for personal gain."

Said Justice: "Your friends believe in you. I'm not certain that some of the people who had written me would have done so if they had known all that was in this report."

Justice did not order the records sealed but federal, state and local officials said he preferred that they

remain secret.

The judge denied Young's appeal for leniency.

"Prisons can't be reserved for the poor, the uneducated or persons without standing in the community," he said. "In instances where it is merited, the rich, powerful, professional and others in positions of prestige must also withstand imprisonment."

Justice sent the once-bearded doctor to the fed-

eral minimum security camp in West Texas, where he played a key role in luring Nelson to Big Spring for Sunday night's concert.
