Carter, Reagan Even In Poll

NEW YORK (AP)-President Carter and his Republic can challenger, Ronald Reagan, ran even in Time magazine's latest poll, of voter preference, the

Carter and Reagan both attracted 39 percent of those surveyed, Time said Sunday. The poll's sampling error was plus or minus 3 to 4.5 percent, a spokesman

Meanwhile, Rep. John B. Anderson was favored by 15 percent of the 1,644 registered voters nationwide surveyed Aug. 26-28 for Time by the polling organization Yankelovich, Skelly and White, the magazine said.

Refugees Attack Camp Fence

FORT McCOY, Wis. (AP)-Soldiers and security officers formed a "human fence" to keep back Cuban refugees after some 300 Cubans tore down a chain-link fence and looted a mess hall at this refugee center

Eight people were injured, none seriously, in the

Officials said they knew of no escapes, but as a precaution military representatives drove along rural roads near the western Wisconsin infantry training eamp to knock at farmhouse doors and advise residents to be on alert.

The cause of the uprising was not determined immediately.

Top Chinese Officials Resign

PEKING (AP)-Chinese Premier Hua Guofeng, Vice Premier Deng Xiaoping and six other wee premiers have resigned their government posts, signaling an infusion of new blood into the top level of the Chinese bureaucracy and intensification of Deng's pragmatic economic policy

Both Hua and Deng-will retain their more important, policymaking posts as chairman and vice chairman, respectively, of the Chinese Communist Party.

7-Year Old Escapes Captor

DALLAS (AP)-Youth investigators are tight-lipped about their search for the kidnapper of a 7-year-old boy who broke free from his abductor while his frantic parents and authorities tried vainly to rescue him.

More than 28 hours after he was snatched from his northside neighborhood, Matthew Mueller was reunited with his tearful mother.

"That's my baby! I want a kiss!" Beth Smith, cried as a police car carrying Matthew turned into her driveway last Saturday night.

Gunmen Take Hostages

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)-Three gunmen who apparently bungled a robbery attempt took several persons hostage at a popular steakhouse early today, then demanded \$500,000 and a getaway vehicle, authorities

Five of the hostages later were released, but deputies said seven more were believed still to be held. One of the freed hostages said the gunmen served free drinks and told the captives not to worry.

Hijacks Jet With Bottle

MIAMI (AP)-A Spanish-speaking man carrying a bottle of liquid and demanding to go to Cuba hijacked an Eastern Airlines jet carrying 88 people en route from New York to Florida today, authorities said.

No injuries were reported, and the plane, Eastern Flight 161, landed at Jose Marti in Cuba at 11:52 a.m. the Federal Aviation Administration said.

Clayton Presses For Speedy Trial

HOUSTON (AP) - Texas surance Co. during the House Speaker Billy Clayton wants to accelerate the wheels of justice when the Texas Brilab trial opens Tuesday - the first trial in the FBI's far-reaching undercover Texas Brilab op-

More than 100 jury panelists have been called to appear in the Houston courtroom for a proceeding that could sound the death knell to Clayton's political future in the

Clayton and two Austin attorneys', Donald W. Ray and Randall B. Wood. have been charged with racketeering, extortion, fraud and conspiracy.

The crux of the prosecution's case is a tape recording of a Nov. 8, 1979 meeting between Clayton, Deer Park labor leader L.G. Moore and FBI informant Joseph Hauser.

From that tape and other. evidence, the government has outlined an alleged scheme chock full of bribery allegations and intrigue centering around the speaker, who has expressed hopes of running for

governor in 1982. Moore, the regional director of the Operating Engineers Union, also indicted by a federal grand jury, has been granted a separate trial. Hauser posed as an undercover agent for Prudential Inundercover operation.

The government claims Clayton, a 20-year legislative veteran, accepted a \$5,000 payment from Moore with another \$500,-000 promised if he could reopen a \$76 million state employee insurance con-

Clayton acknowledged he received the money but considered it a campaigncontribution and planned to return the stack of \$100 bills to Moore at a later -date.

But Clayton never reported the contribution, and Assistant U.S. Attorney Ron Woods said "this has become an important element in the case. There would not have been a case if Clayton had repor-

ted the \$5,000," he said. The Brilab investigation -'Bribery-Labor' - has brought additional indictments in Louisiana and prosecutors have said more are expected in Te-

Iran Closer To Filling Cabinet

By The Associated Press-In another step toward debate on the American hostages, Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr accepted two-thirds of Prime Minister Mohammad Ali Rajai's proposed cabinet and submitted the names to Parliament for approval. But the Bani-Sadr and Rajai remained at odds over the other

seven ministers.

Tehran Radio reported Bani-Sadr accepted 14 of the 21 ministers nominated by Rajai, who was elected prime minister by the Majlis, or Parliament, after Bani-Sadr's first choice for the job was rejected. The broadcast said Rajai nominated seven other men for the vacant posts, but five of them were the same nominees Bani-Sadr refused to agree to earlier. Hossedein Musavi, Rajai's pick for foreign minister, was among them.

In a letter to the Majlis, the prime minister said he hoped Bani-Sadr "will finalize the investigation of some cases and that I can take the necessary measures to introduce the rest of the members of the Cabinet.

The Majlis will begin consideration of the cabinet nominations on Tuesday, Radio Tehran said. Approval of the lineup will advance the Parliament another step toward consideration of problems facing the country, including the fate of the 52 American hostages who today were spending their 310th day in captivity.

Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, the leader of the Iranian revolution, has given the Majlis authority to determine the fate of the Americans taken prisoner when militant Is-

lamic students occupied the U.S. Embassy in Tehran last Nov. 4.

The Foreign Relations

Commission of the Majlis held preliminary discussions on the issue Saturday, but no date was announced for debate in the full parliament to begin. However, Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie said Sunday, "There are signs that they're beginning to think actually debating the hostage issue. There are signs of increasing awareness on the part of leaders of the various factions that the hostage. Iran's interest."

The budget of \$3,493,211 is approximately \$450,000 greater than the budget for the current fiscal year. However, it includes over half a million dollars in capital items and provides for a pay increase averaging about seven percent for city-employees.

Reports and discussions on the agenda include repainting of the city's outdoor advertising signs, the city's contract for the alfalfa farm adjacent to the wastewater disposal plant, and left turn lanes on 25th St. in the central business district.

CampaignEmbroiledIn 'Peripheral Questions'

By The Associated Press Ronald Reagan was defending himself against criticism on Social Security, George Bush was defending Reagan as a "peace candidate," and John Anderson weighed in with more in the debate on debates.

So it went as the fall presidential campaign entered its second week Sunday, with much of the rhetoric still concentrating on issues such as Republican Reagan's 1964 comments on Social Se curity, the Klu Klux Klan, and who would debate whom.

Bush; the Republican vice presidential candidate, himself questioned the direction the campaign was taking when asked about Reagan's statement last month that * he had doubts about the theory of evolution.

"I'm not going to answer that," Bush said. "I'm not going to answer peripheral questions that do nothing but divert the American people from the No. 1 issue - getting Americans back to work.

Bush made the statement in an interview on NBC's "Meet the Press," while his running mate, Reagan, was campaigning in Philadelphia, and independent presidential candidate Anderson was in upstate

Both President Carter and Vice President Walter F. Mondale took the day off Sunday, but they are to head out campaigning again Tuesday - Carter to New Jersey and Mondale to Chicago.

On Sunday, Reagan promised a "strong and reliable" Social Security system in a speech to a senior citizens rally in Philadelphia. "As president," he said,

"I will defend the integrity of the Social Security system. That system will be strong, reliable and profected under a Reagan administration." Reagan's comment came after Carter charged last week that the Republican had once suggested making Social Security voluntary

The Republican nominee

had already denied the accusation repeatedly. Actually, speaking in October 1964 in behalf of GOP presidential candidate Barry M. Goldwater, he

had asked rhetorically in discussing Social Security whether it would be possible to "introduce voluntary features that would permit a citizen to do better on his own...

School Enrollment Now Over 3,400

our unlikely allies

We've had Iran - or to put it another way, in Iran we've had it.

We've also had Pakistan, Iraq and Ethiopia as client-allies at various times and under varying circumstances during the past quarter century or so. More recently we almost had Yemen.

Now we have Somalia, the newest base for American power on that 2,000-mile arc where the strategic Mideast and strategic East Africa meet along the strategic Indian Ocean.

After a year of skittish negotiations, Somalia has agreed to-make facilities available to U.S. forces in return for an arms and economic aid package. Rarely has the United States linked itself with a country with which it has less in common.

Somalia is one of the world's poorest sovereign states no industry, no mineral resources waiting to be exploited, only semi-desert and an agricultural economy that with considerable effort just might be brought up to the subsistence level

It is a nominally Arab nation that became independent of British and Italian colonial rule in 1960. Since a 1969 coup, it has been under the autocratic rule of General Mohammed Siad Barre, the founder of what he calls 'scientific socialism.

Not even the Soviets are quite certain what that is supposed to be, but it was enough to make him appear a natural ally at first. For a time there was more to it than appearances and they enjoyed the use of the former British port of Berbera. That ended with the revolution in Somalia's neighbor and arch foe, Ethiopia. The Soviets rushed in to replace ousted American influence and got themselves ousted from Berbera in turn.

Since 1977, Somalia and Ethiopia have been squabbling over the Ogaden, a Somali-populated but Ethiopian-administered wasteland that no one else could possibly want, its most distinguishing features being giant anthills.

That off-and-on-again war has, however, produced one bumper crop. Refugees, more than a million of them in a country whose resident population is less than five million.

As such arrangements go, the U.S.-Somali pact is no big deal. The United States gains access to Berbera and the port-capital of Mogadishu as bases for a Rapid Deployment Force still largely on the drawing boards. Most of the RDF is - or will be - air and seaborne. American personnel on station at the two bases will be. a few hundred at most.

Somalia, compromising somewhat on its initial bid for \$2 billion, gets \$5 million in economic aid plus \$40 million in military credits. It is pledged not to aim the latter at Ethiopia

It is a minimal new investment in a region in which the United States has already sunk bundles. Which is just as well considering now things have gone in those parts. On the evidence of Pakistan, Ethiopia, Iran and the rest it is obviously not the place for stable relationships.

But then, all that was in the '50s, '60s and '70s. If it's 1980, it might as well be Somalia.

under tow, escort vessels took the shortest route. home to Vladivostok despite Tokyo's denial of permission for passage through Japanese territorial waters that this entailed. The Japanese were concerned that the sub, a semi-antique model known to be powered by a pressurized water reactor of the type that figured in the Three Mile Island scare, could be leaking contaminants. In a worstpossible scenario, a meltdown could dump the radioaetive core itself into Japanese coastal waters.

But the Soviets sailed on, disregarding protests they full well knew were all that would be forthcoming from the Japanese

The latter, who will never be in danger of being considered dense, drew the obvious lesson: Those leverage with those who possess it - in this case in abundance and in the immediate neighborhood. For several years the Soviets have been building

up their Pacific fleet, based in Vladiyostok, to the point where it is now by far the most powerful force in East Asian waters. Further, they have been staging naval exercises almost within Japanese waters, practicing troop landings on islands seized after World' War II but still claimed by Japan, and making regular reconnaissance flights

off the Japanese coasts. If there was any possible question about the point being made, there can no longer be in the wake of the nuclear sub incident in which the Japanese have had no alternative but to eat their protests.

Well, almost none. In what could not be a more exquisitely timed coincidence, the Japanese government has come up with a proposed new defense budget that calls for a 9.7. percent increase, It would raise military spending in the coming year up to the \$10 billion, depending on the yo-yoing yen-dollar

rate.

No big deal by superpower standards, but a big jump in Japanese spend-ing and thinking. It is a jump that has been a long time in the preparation, with the encouragement of some intensely interested outside parties. Washington has been pressuring Tokyo for some time to make a greater defense effort and so, more recently has Beijing.

To obvious Chinese interest, is to strengthen an unofficial Sino-Japanese-American common front against the Soviets. Not too subtly they have been leaning on the Japanese Socialists to drop their long-standing opposition in the Diet to meaningful defense spending.

Too long on laxatives

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D.

DEAR DRALAMB - I amconcerned about my husband. Many years ago he had an operation for hemorrhoids and is afraid of becoming constipated. He takes 12 or 13 Milk of Magnesia tablets at night. Please tell me if this can harm him.

DEAR READER - Yes, it can. After all these years of taking such a large dose of laxatives, he'll probably need some professional help to get rid of the habit. He can help avoid constipation by using a proper diet that includes adequate amounts of bulk. He may need some bowel training and other help, however, at this stage of his problem.

don't believe in the regular use of any of the magnesium salt laxatives. These salts work by "purging the bowels." A major portion of the magnesium stays in the bowel and draws water out of your circulation, and body tissues. In this way the excess water stimulates bowel function. In larger amounts it can cause frank diarrhea

Magnesium salts may act in other ways as well. The principle action is by their inability to be absorbed from the digestive tract. This is not complete and that's why they can be dangerous. About 20 percent of the magnesium can be absorbed into the bloodstream. In a normal person who has normal kidney function, that won't pose any major problem because the kidneys will just simply get rid of the excess magnesium.

The problem is in the person who has any abnormality. in, kidney function for any reason. This is particularly apt to occur in older people. They may not be able to eliminate this 20 percent of magnesium that's absorbed. As a result, the magnesium level in the body builds up rapidly and

this can be particularly hazardous in older people. It can affect the function of the: brain and the rest of the nervous system

DEAR DR. LAMB - I've had a swollen gland for 12 years at the uppermost part of my leg. There is no pain. This past year though, because I've been very active, it has been bothersome. Could this be treated without surgery? I'm 59 and have been taking medicine for high blood pressure for two years...

DEAR READER - When in doubt, take it out," is not a good idea in all cases but it is often a good idea regarding lumps. It is important to know what a lump is before deciding what to do about it. The length of time you have had your lump suggests that it is not dangerous. But is it really a lymph gland? If so, do you have other swollen lymph glands and why are they enlarged? Is it something else, such as a small femoral hernia? The point I'm making is that it will have to be examined before anyone can tell you what it is. Your doctor may have a pretty good idea by feeling it. If he is still in doubt then he too will want to
