



When I checked the school storage room, I found a bass horn, some drums, and some blue flags. The band had been discontinued before WWII. When we started the band, about 70 students showed up. And, they were interested and conscientious. Very few had any music experience and, in six months they were playing John Philip Sousa's "the Thunderer March" and some overtures. We performed a couple of concerts and played at some of the basketball games. We didn't want to take band members out of the band, so the band elected Keener Rosemary drum majorette, Janelle Reynolds twirler, and another twirler

outside of the band.

Joe Crabtree was a good trumpet player, Deloris Smith was a tremendous piano player and 5th grader B. A. (Sonny) Donelson couldn't reach 6th position on his trombone. Keith Green from Conlen received a I, playing his baritone at a Pampa, Texas contest. I had grades in my grade book for everyone every day and I enjoyed teaching. However, I sincerely regret that I absolutely had to fail two boys that I considered friends. I tried every possible way to promote them, but they handed in very few daily assignments and flunked practically all weekly tests. Their average grades were so far below the lowest other grades that I had to flunk them.

In the summer of 1947 (58 years ago) Arthur King, a Stratford school board member came to Texhoma and tried to get me to come back to the Stratford School. He offered to double my salary. However, I had an oil field job waiting for me in Los Angeles, California. Arthur King was a long time personal friend of my dad, and they visited about an hour. Lloyd King, Arthur's son was a good kid who played in the band. I have fond memories of the Stratford school.





Seniors' Mental Health Problems Often Go Unnoticed

(NAPS)-Millions of older adults have a diagnosable mental health problem, but only a quarter of them get any type of mental health attention at all, and far fewer receive appropriate treatment.

Older adults commit suicide at a higher rate than any other age group. "This alarming statistic shows the need to better understand clinical depression and mental illness among the elderly," says Laurie Young, PhD., Executive Director of OWL (Older Women's League)

To help the public, physicians and older adults better understand mental illness, OWL, along with the American Psychological Foundation and other organizations, is promoting public education to end barriers to diagnosis and treatment. A few of the important things to know about mental health and aging include:

• Depression is not a normal part of aging. People expect older adults to be depressed or disoriented because of their age, their changing roles, or their loss of family and friends. The truth is that clinical depression is different than grief over losses, and older adults with depression can be helped through counseling and medication. Research from the National Institute of Mental Health shows that 80 percent of older adults recover from depression after receiving appropriate treatment.

• Mental illness can suddenly appear later in life. Many older adults become vulnerable to depression and other mental illnesses in connection with the national.org or call 1-800-825-3695.

onset of physical ailments. Stroke, Parkinson's, cancer, arthritis, diabetes and Alzheimer's can all cause or contribute to symptoms of clinical depression.

• Undiagnosed and untreated mental illness has serious consequences. Older adults who live with mental illness are more likely to have physical problems and stay sick longer. People with depression, for example, are more likely to have heart problems and need nursing care early.

• Older adults need special services. Research shows that the sooner older adults get proper diagnosis and treatment the better their long-term health will be. "Mentally healthy adults can continue to enjoy life, learn and grow," says Young. "Older adults need help from people who understand their specific needs and issues."



Marvelous Mangoes

(NAPS)—As the weather heats up, cool, refreshing smoothies just seem to hit the spot. Mangoes, whirled with frozen yogurt and a dash of honey, make a delicious, aromatic tropical treat. Richly colored and bursting with fiber, vitamin C, vitamin A, calcium and protein, mango smoothies are a



wonderful way to start the day.

Mangoes come in a variety of colors ranging from yellow with a red blush to all green. It's easy to tell when the fruit is

ripe if you use your nose. Choose mangoes that have a full, fruity aroma at the stem end; they also should yield a little to gentle pressure. Mangoes have a long, narrow seed, so slice lengthwise about 1/2-inch on each side of the stem. Peel the skin off or score the flesh of each half in squares, cutting to the skin, but not through. Turn the mango "inside out" and cut the squares from the skin. Do not eat the skin. Mangoes make great fruit salsas that go well with shrimp, chicken and fish. Whether blended in smoothies, tossed in salads, or enjoyed as a snack, juicy, succulent mangoes are a comfort food for all ages and tastes

When it comes to using color as a guide to good nutrition, mangoes rank among the best. Richly colored with a nutrient profile to match, mangoes are a must on your list of fruits and vegetables. Half a mango, about two-thirds of a cup, offers up. 70 calories, 2g dietary fiber, 46 percent daily value of vitamin C and 15 percent daily value of vitamin A, as well as a variety of disease-fighting phytochemicals. Most moderately active teens and adults



need about five cups of fruits and vegetables every day. Aim to fill half of your plate with fruits and vegetables at every meal, enjoy fruits and vegetables as snacks, toss in at least 30 minutes of physical activity and you will be well on your way to a healthy lifestyle.
