

The Stratford Education Foundation Board met in the home of Mr. and Mrs. BA Donelson for their August 24, meeting. LeRayne Donelson prepared lunch for the board and their guests. Guests were: Clint Sewerd, Ali Teigs and Mary Emeny.

Ali Teigs is the Education Director from the Globe-News Center for the Performing Arts in Amarillo. She provided a presentation about educational benefits panhandle children that will broaden the arts opportunities for area students. The Education Center is in the process of raising 1.8 million dollars for children's education.

The education program will offer opportunities for learning through artistic experiences, performances, innovative technology, using a world-class center. A question and answer period was held at the close of the presentation.

Following the presentation the Stratford Education Foundation Board held its quarterly meeting. Committee reports were given. Mr. Gilliland said school enrollment is up this year. LADY ELKS CROSS COUNTRY COMPETES AT TASCOSA MEET

On Saturday, August 27th, the Lady Elks Top 7 cross country runners traveled to Amarillo to compete in the Tascosa Rebel Cross Country Meet held at Thompson Park. Nine schools fielded teams in the class IA-3A division and the Lady Elks were able to come away with a 4th place fmish after a very rugged start. Yadira Ortega led all the Stratford runners by finishing 7th out of 107 runners and running a time of 13:34. This was 30 seconds faster and 16 places better than when she ran the course in 2004. Kristen Crabtree was the second Lady Elk to cross the finish line with a time of 14: 16 (28th). This was a good run for Kristen considering she was sick and unable to practice much of the first week of school. Perla Rueda, a freshman, ran a good race for her first high school competition and came in 57th with a time of 15:11. Whitney Reese followed Perla by running a time of 15:12 which was good enough for 58th place. Lucero Ortega was not far behind these young ladies finishing in 70th place and running a time of 15:28. Deborah Molina ran a time of 16:00 and Mary Lou Maldonado ran a 17:20 on the slightly longer than 2mile course. Farwell placed 1st with 64 points, Spearman was 2nd with 73, Vega came in 3rd with 134 and the Lady Elks finished 4th with 142. USDA Asking for Input on Upcoming Farm Bill

Aug. 29, 2005-The U.S. Department of Agriculture is asking for your help in identifying ways to address agricultural issues in the next Farm Bill. The 2002 Farm Bill (officially entitled the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002) authorizes many USDA programs, including farm price and income support programs. New legislation will need to be enacted prior to the bill's expiration in 2007.

USDA intends to develop recommendations for the new farm bill and believes that public input is essential to this process. Written comments may be submitted to USDA online at www.usda.gov/farmbill

In order for your input to be considered, please send your responses no later than Dec. 30, 2005. Comments should address one or more of these six questions:

1. How should farm policy address any unintended consequences and ensure that such consequences do not discourage new farmers and the next generation of farmers from

entering production agriculture? 2. How should farm policy be designed to maximize U.S. competitiveness and country's ability to effectively compete in global markets?

3. How should farm policy be designed to effectively and fairly distribute assistance to producers?

4. How can farm policy best achieve conservation environmental goals?

5. How can Federal rural and farm programs provide effective assistance in rural areas?

6. How should agricultural product development, marketing and research-related issues be addressed in the next farm bill?

Senior USDA officials will host issue-specific forums throughout the nation focusing on these six questions. In addition additional forums will address conservation, rural development nutrition issues. During these specialty forums, the public will be asked to respond to questions that are tailored to those subject areas. These questions will be announced prior to the specialty forums and published on the USDA website.

The dates, locations and times of the forums will be accounted as they are scheduled and posted on the USDA website. Information on the forums can also be obtained by calling any USDA office.

Living with one other person or living alone presents meal preparation challenges. Texas Cooperative Extension-Sherman County will be offering "Cooking for Pairs and Spares".



Health Awareness

A Disease Many People Don't Know They Have with vitamin D

by Miriam Nelson, Ph.D. (NAPS)-Diet and exercise have countless benefits, but strong bones are not automatically one of them. Despite eating more vegetables and fewer fats,



In his report on bone health, United Dr. Nelson the

States Surgeon General pointed out that many don't eat or exercise well enough to avoid the common bonedestroying disease known as osteoporosis. There are 10 million people suffering from it now and about twice that number are at risk. Many don't realize the danger. Weak bones are invisible, and a broken bone is usually the first sign of trouble.

The good news is that osteoporosis can be prevented and there are simple actions that everyone can take to help protect

· Get enough daily calcium

• Do the right kind of exercise several times a week Q: What's the easiest way to

avoid osteoporosis? A: A balanced diet rich in calcium and vitamin D is the first step. Eat at least three servings of nonfat or low-fat dairy products like milk, cheese or yogurt every day. Nondairy calcium sources such as tofu, almonds and greenleafy vegetables are also good

Q: What exercises help build strong bones?

A. Weight-bearing exercises and resistance training are two different types of exercise that improve bone health. Walking, jogging, aerobics, stair climbing and sports like tennis are all good examples of weight-bearing exercises. Weight lifting or strength training are resistance exercises. Don't be intimidated about starting or expanding your fitness routine. Your bones and overall health depend upon you taking steps to become more physically active. If you are not ready to join a fitness center, start exercising at home-whatever works for you is what is best. Try working out with a

buddy to help boost confidence and keep you motivated. Or get a trainer to help you out with a couple of sessions. Q: What about calcium sup-

plements? Do I need one? What kind should I take?

A: Unless you get three servings or more of calcium rich dairy foods every day, you should consider taking a calcium and vitamin D supplement. Calcium citrate and calcium carbonate are the two most readily available forms. I prefer a calcium citrate supplement such as Citracale that can be taken at any time of day or night, with or without food. Research has shown a reduction in osteoporosis with calcium citrate supplementation.

Q: How much calcium

should you get each day? A: Men and women ages 25 to 50 need 1,000 mg per day and those over age 50 need 1,200 mg per day. Most get only half their daily requirement from food.

Share this information with family and friends and help put the focus on prevention.

Patronage Cash Return to Great Plains Ag **Credit Stockholders Reaches New High**

The Board of Directors of Great Plains Ag Credit has declared a \$1.376 million cash patronage payment to its' stockholder owners borrowers. The distribution is the highest of record for the lending cooperative and is more than double last years' distribution, according to Mike McLain, the Board Chairman from Gruver. Since the 2000 year, \$8.3 million of GPAC earnings have been allocated to members and \$3.6 million in cash distributions have been paid. McLain added that the patronage allocation program, which defrays interest costs, is a strong cooperative benefit to producers.

GPAC, which headquartered in Amarillo, provided short-term loans through its Production Credit Association and real estate loans through its Federal Land Bank Association throughout the panhandle and upper South Plains. GPAC has loan assets of approximately \$250 million; and maintains other loan offices in Plainview, Dimmitt, Dalhart, Dumas, Friona, Olton and Muleshoe. Other directors are Anthony, Vice-Dennis Chairman of Friona; Danny Detten, Panhandle; David Doshier, Vega; Earl Harkins, Hereford; Dwight Teeple, Lockney; and Terry Sherrill, Outside Director from Gruver.
