



David knew the penalty for his actions. "Cursed is everyone who does not abide by all things written in the book of the Law, to perform them" (Galatians 3:11). So David placed faith in the promised Savior. David therefore knew God's forgiveness. That Savior is Jesus Christ. Christ takes the curse. Through faith we receive forgiveness. The Bible declares Jesus Christ saves "us from the curse of the Law, having become a curse for us" (Galatians 3:13). Are you like David? Do you need God's forgiveness?


