

SAN ANGELO - Eldon Udell Black, 76, died Tuesday, Nov 8, 2005, in Houston.

Services were held at 4 p.m. November 12th in Southland Baptist Church in San Angelo with the Rev. Terry Rothermich of Memorial Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Midland officiating. Arrangements were by the Robert Massie Funeral Home.

Eldon Black was born Feb. 23, 1929, in Spearman to Walter Joseph and Myrtle Black. He spent most of his childhood in Dalhart. He received his undergraduate degree in music in 1953 at the University of North Texas and his Master of Music Education there in 1954, when he came to San Angelo College as Professor of Vocal Music. In 1970, he temporarily left San Angelo for Austin to obtain his Doctorate in Musical Arts in Vocal Performance and then returned to Angelo State University in 1973, where he remained until his retirement in 2003. His uniquely long tenure at ASU made him professor" of the university.



Preparation for cold and severe winter can lessen its impact on you and your family. Here are some tips to help get ready.

### AT HOME OR WORK MAKE SURE YOU HAVE:

- a working flashlight
- radio, or TV tuned to weather information
- extra food, water, medicine, and baby items
- first aid supplies heating fuel (propane, kerosene, fuel oil, etc...)
- 6 emergency heating source
- fire extinguisher and smoke detector IN CARS AND TRUCKS:
- 1 fully check and winterize your vehicle
- 2 keep your gas tank near full
- try not to travel alone let a friend or relative know your timetable for travel
- carry a WINTER STORM SURVIVAL KIT which contains:
- blankets/sleeping bags
- flashlight with extra batteries
- high calorie, non-perishable food
- a smaller can and water-proof matches to melt snow for drinking
- sand or cat litter
- shovel windshield scraper
- tool kit
- o tow rope
- o jumper cables
- o water container o compass
- o road maps
- ON THE FARM:
- 1 Move animals to sheltered areas
- 2 Haul extra feed to nearby feeding areas
- 3 Have a water supply available (most animal deaths in winter
- storms are from dehydration) IF CAUGHT OUTSIDE:
- 1 Find a dry shelter. Cover all exposed parts of the body.

based on their own native thing we learned was that one language of Spanish. Then the classes exchanged coded messages and translated them into English.

Mrs. Glass's classes (that's a mouthful!) always have neat things going on. Her Biology classes are making Cell Cycle poster by using manipulatives to build models of the stages of cell division. The Anatomy classes are working with boxes of bones (disarticulated skeleton) to learn the bone markings in order to prepare for their field trip to the Texas Tech Gross Anatomy Lab (I think that means they get to see cadavers!). The Environmental Systems class is simulating predator-prey relationships with game pieces, and then they are graphing the interpreted results.
